Primrose defeats White for Democrat nomination for county commissioner

Parmer County mirrored the state of Texas in having a low turnout for the primary election Tuesday. But there was a "tilt" to the Republicans.

The county's total registered voters are 4,202. Of that, 462 voted Democrat and 556 Republican -- about 25 percent of the registered voters.

These totals have changed dramatically from 1994 when 299 folks cast Democrat ballots and 199 cast GOP ballots.

There was one county race -- Lowell Primrose defeated incumbent Robert White for the Democrat nomination for Pct. 3 (Farwell area) county commissioner, 139-128.

Primrose will face Republican Jerry Davis in the general election in November.

White has served as county commissioner for three terms. There will be another race in the fall for county com-

missioner -- for the Friona

area. In the primary, incumbent Democrat Johnny Mars got 67 votes. Republican John Tan-

nahill received 113 votes.

Another race in the fall will be for Parmer County tax collector-assessor. On the GOP side, Teresa Ancira received 324 votes. On the Democrat side, incumbent Doris Herington received 361 votes.

As expected, the majority of Democrat voters supported President Bill Clinton. He got 228 votes in Parmer County. His six opponents got a total of 87 votes.

On the Republican side, Bob Dole got 310 votes for president. His closest competitor, Pat Buchanan, got 129 votes. Steve Forbes was 3rd with 53.

Both Parmer County party chairmen were re-elected without opposition. GOP chairman Teena Hughs got 329 votes. Democrat chairman Bert Williams got 345 votes.

The Parmer County candidates who are unopposed in the fall election are incumbents Sheriff Rex Williams, 386 votes; county attorney Charles Aycock, 371 votes, and district attorney Johnny Actkinson, 363 votes.


The Pleasant Hill Pals 4-H Club's monthly meeting was hosted by Watson Langford at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Langford.

Here's why:

Curry County Clerk Coni Jo Lyman said it was found that Ronquillo was a convicted felon, thus making him ineligible to seek election.

Mrs. Lyman said Texico City Clerk Marie Christian had informed her Feb. 29 of the situation involving Ronquillo, who had been Guadalupe County Sheriff. Ronquillo, also a former Texico city marshal in the 1970s, had returned to Texico last year.

Mrs. Lyman said Mrs. Christian had told her that she had been told in January that Ronquillo was a convicted felon. The state was asked to check on it and reported back that Ronquillo had been convicted of a felony in 1983.
