-- Sent a letter to the Texas Association of School Boards asking that Mike Pomper, publisher of the State Line Tribune, be added to the TASB's Honor Roll for his assistance to Lazbuddie Schools. Also, a resolution to this effect was approved by the school board.

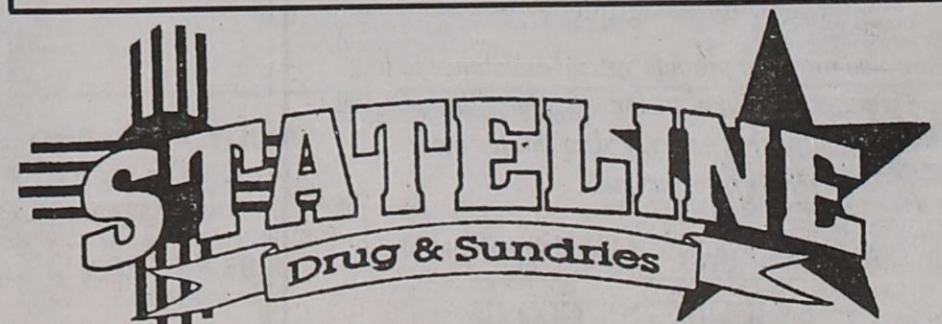

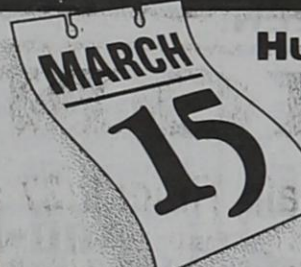

Our mayors deserve a 'thank you'

There are fewer more difficult things to do than to work on a meaningful cleanup of an area that has been allowed to get slovenly and hazardous.

But a major compliment needs to be given Texico Mayor Butch Sharp and Farwell Mayor Jimmie Mace on their leadership in this area.

With the backing of their respective city councils and police departments, great strides are being made to eliminate the hazardous, disgusting debris that has been a blight on our area.

After city fire marshal Lee Hutchins put together a list of structures in Farwell that needed either to be razed or repaired, Mace and the council have moved at an excellent pace on this project.

As Mace has put it, "the city wants to work with the property owners" on this. And Farwell is doing so, moving at a deliberative speed.

So far, most property owners have been extremely cooperative in agreeing to either remove or repair the problem areas.

For years, I've been hearing folks in Farwell complain about some of these dangerous eyesores. So it's nice to report that city officials are doing something about it.

Folks need to thank Mace for his leadership in this area.

And folks shouldn't forget that the ordinance which is allowing Farwell to move ahead on these problems was passed during the tenure of former mayor Chris Gikas.

Too often, folks who start a project don't receive their due honor. Thank you, Mr. Gikas.

As for Texico, Sharp and his council have attacked the problem on several fronts, a

very difficult process.

Texico has had to deal with mobile home problems, debris in yards and alleys, abandoned vehicles, hazardous structures, and junk, in general.

Here, too, outstanding progress has been made. And it's been hard.

The usual complaints of "how come I have to do it if so-and-so hasn't had to do it" have been made.

Those folks miss the point. Two wrongs don't make a right.

And I haven't seen any favoritism being displayed. What I have seen is a determined effort to get rid of the blight that has festered here.

I admire Sharp very much for sticking to his guns in the face of some opposition.

It doesn't get you votes when you have to tell someone to clean up his act. National politicians avoid such actions; one of the reasons I don't have a lot of respect for such folks. But it does the heart good to see local folks say "enough is enough" and want their community to improve.

Yes, I know the old adage that "one man's garbage is another man's treasure."

That may be true 10 percent of the time. But the other 90 percent means that one's man garbage sickens everybody else.

You can drive through both towns now and see the progress that is being made. I'm very proud of the leaders in Texico and Farwell for working on this instead of looking the other way.

Everybody who is involved in this -- the mayors, city councilmen, police, Chamber of Commerce members, and the property owners who are

cleaning up their act -- should feel good about the job that is being done and be sure to stay the course.

The citizens of the Twin Cities appreciate you.

Here's why Texico judge's candidate was disqualified

It was announced last week after Texico's city election that municipal judge candidate Willie Ronquillo had been disqualified.

Here's why: Curry County Clerk Coni Jo Lyman said it was found that Ronquillo was a convicted felon, thus making him ineligible to seek election.

Mrs. Lyman said Texico City Clerk Marie Christian had informed her Feb. 29 of the situation involving Ronquillo, who had been Guadalupe County Sheriff. Ronquillo, also a former Texico city marshal in the 1970s, had returned to Texico last year.

Mrs. Lyman said Mrs. Christian had told her that she had been told in January that Ronquillo was a convicted felon. The state was asked to check on it and reported back that Ronquillo had been convicted of a felony in 1983.

Thus, Mrs. Christian deleted Ronquillo's name from the county voter registration and disqualified him as a candidate.

Mrs. Lyman said the problem with Ronquillo's situation is that on Jan. 11 he signed a voter registration form swearing he was not a convicted felon.

Due to the legality of the situation, Mrs. Lyman said she has turned over the documents to District Attorney Randall Harris's office.

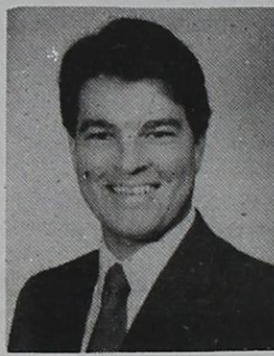





Schwertner tops 8th grade string art competition

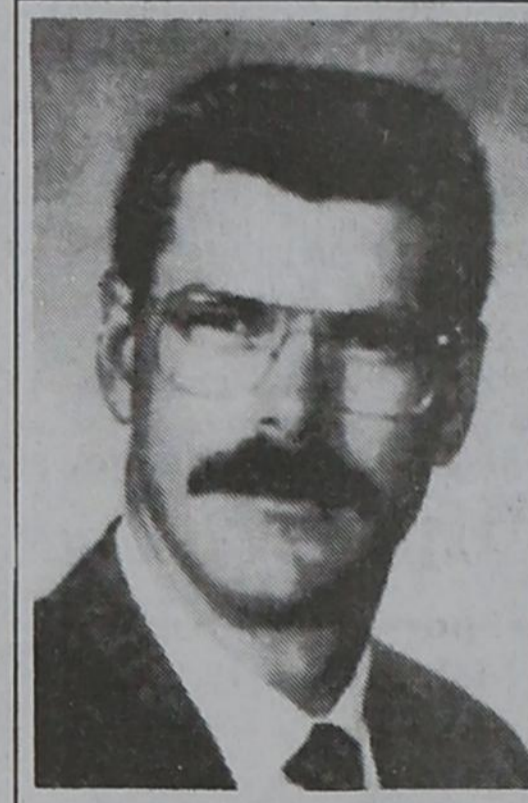
