Well, even though the gossip wasn't always true, it sure was a heckuva outage. Biggest one I've ever seen.

Fortunately, I had a flashlight at work, so I was able to find things I needed. And I did do some work that didn't require electricity.

But, basically, it was a matter of waiting. There's nothing that makes a day go more slowly than having to wait. Time drags.

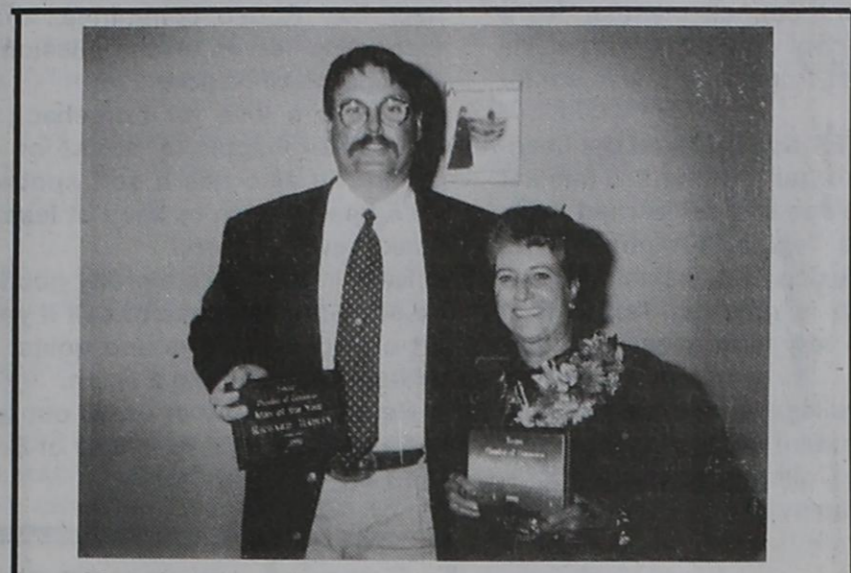
But, at least, our phones were working. One of the things that really threw me was hearing that some folks' phones didn't work. I didn't realize that some phone lines are tied into systems which use electricity.

I started getting excited about the outage ending when Farwell teachers Stan Stroebel and Doug Boyd stopped by the office a little after 2 p.m. They reported that the lights were back on at school.

But that bubble was burst when I soon discovered that the school lights went out after only a few minutes. The two teachers had left the school before the outage returned there.

Then came word that part of Portales had electricity. What I was told was that high priority areas, like hospitals and street intersections, would get power restored first. I don't know if that's what happens, but I'm sure there was some method involved.

Then came word about 4 p.m. that electricity was restored on the east end of Farwell. It made sense that electricity was being returned in "increments" so it would just be a matter of time before it reached 3rd Street. And about 4:20 p.m. it did. Wow, what an exciting day!

Marijuana worth \$52,000 found in pickup truck

Fifty-two pounds of marijuana, with an estimated street value of \$52,000, was found in a vehicle search by Texas Highway Patrol trooper Craig Willis on Tuesday while on patrol on U.S. 60 west of Friona.

Willis, a Farwell resident, said he spotted a red and white 1979 Ford pickup with Texas plates. He noted the driver had no safety belt, then failed to maintain his lane.

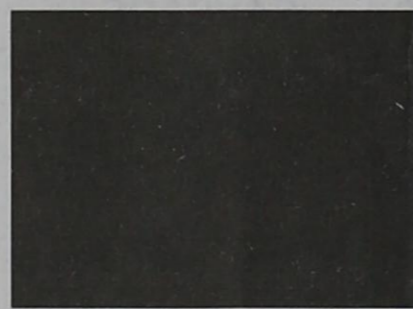
When he stopped him, Willis said the man seemed very nervous. Willis also smelled "masking agents." The trooper has gone to schools to learn about drugs and how certain odors are used to mask their smells.

Police said they would not release the man's name until he went to court. He's 37 years old and from Garden City, Kan. The man agreed to let Willis search his vehicle, the trooper said. When the man was standing away from the car, Willis said he could smell odors in the vehicle -- but not on the man. Also, the man seemed to have bloodshot eyes, which could have been caused by a burning odor.

Willis discovered that the man was wanted on a misdemeanor drug charge from Garden City, Kan. The man told Willis he was en route from El Paso to Kansas.

In his vehicle search, Willis tried to roll down the windows. But one went only halfway. Checking the door panel -- a common place where drugs are secreted -- he saw that some screws in the door panel were missing and others had been scratched. He took off the panel and found some of what ap-

Hey, where did all the lights go?

The biggest electrical outage in history struck parts of four states Tuesday -- and Parmer and Curry counties were part of that history.

Power went out at 10:20 a.m. and wasn't restored locally until at last 4 p.m. It came back in increments, as some areas got power back faster than others. All power was restored by 5 p.m.

According to the Lubbock newspaper, utility officials blamed the blackout on a sudden failure at SPS' Tolk Station power plant near Muleshoe. The plant normally supplies about a fourth of SPS' power. A Public Utility Commission official said a worker there washing out insulating equipment, a routine maintenance chore, caused the failure.

One million kilowatts of power went down (about 75 percent of SPS' power) and prompted plant officials to shut down all remaining switches to prevent further problems. About 52,000 square miles were affected in New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. About 750,000 people were affected.

Other plants automatically shut down after the Tolk Station problem occurred as protective measures. It took awhile for SPS to determine who and what was without power.

The power grid was restored slowly to avoid overloading remaining plants.

Without electricity, businesses closed by the score. Employees at the Parmer County courthouse went home early. Texico Schools let students out early. Barber shops closed. Businesses found they couldn't even open their cash registers.

Few restaurants could operate. In Clovis, Wienerschnitzel and Taco Box were able to stay open, among others. Police were at key intersections, helping stop traffic because the traffic signals were inoperable.

Towns getting power from other sources were not affected. Thus, Hereford and Muleshoe had power while Morton and Olton didn't, for example.

Some phone lines also went down as they were tied to the electrical system.

Richard Hadley was named Man of the Year and Anna Southard was named Woman of the Year at the annual Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet Tuesday night at the school cafeteria.

Margie Crooks gave the progress report. She noted that the community center construction has started, recycling bins placed near City Hall, and funding received for a new fire substation, ambulance and 4-wheel drive to fight wild fires.

She noted that the Chamber has bought 6-ft. lighted candy canes to be placed on light poles on the north side of the highway at Christmas time. This way, both sides of the highway will have lighted figurines.

Texico school officials discussed school happenings, including an "outstanding set of test scores" vis a vis other school districts in New Mexico, the junior high being connected to the Internet, computers in all classrooms, a vocational ag program that had 4 local teams place at state, construction upcoming on the ag farm, and athletic team feats.

Winners of the \$1,000 Chamber scholarships were Lindsey Kittrell and Clay Lewis. Funds are raised for these scholarships by the \$1 million hole-in-one golf shootout that Ronnie Warmuth has spearheaded. Farwell Country Club pro Chris Fontanilla was thanked for his outstanding support of this fund-raiser.

The Chamber officers for 1996-97 were re-elected: Doyal LaRue, president; Lewis Cooper, vice president; Marcia Leavell, secretary, and Fern Tharp, treasurer.

Woman of the Year
 The cliché "Dynamite Comes in Small Packages" is the perfect description for this year's Woman of the Year, and anyone who knows her will surely attest to it. She is a dynamite of a lady, in a pretty small package, who came into this world in Lindsey, Okla., with what I'm sure must have been a big bang!

Her family moved to New Mexico when she was 4 and settled west of Melrose. Her college degrees include home ec and elementary education. She also has a master's degree in special ed and a principal's certificate.

She taught home ec in Amarillo at the beginning of a career that would influence the lives of many young people in the next 37 years. In 1987, the family moved to Kansas. They lived there for three years before they regained their senses and moved back to New Mexico.

In 1970, she began teaching at Texico Elementary. In 1976, when the junior high was built she moved to the new building to teach English. This must have been when she began what her students believed to be her mission -- to teach them the parts of speech. Even though she had some tough recruits, mission was usually accomplished in the first six weeks of the school year.

In 1985, she became junior high principal. She continued the "Parts of Speech" mission by teaching English classes, also. She wasn't going to let those kids off easy. Farwell to build new water well

The Farwell City Council on Tuesday purchased two vacant lots in the block south from the post office for a new well site.

The price was just over \$3,000. It's an estimated it will take about 4 months before the well is operable. An engineer must be hired first.

There's a 6-inch water line in the alley behind the site.

In other business, the council:

-- Approved \$560 to add parking striping to both sides of Avenue A between the railroad tracks and 3rd Street.

-- Approved putting Johnny Vidaurri on fulltime employment. He has worked part-time for the city for six months. He also got a pay raise.

-- Heard water supt. Dee Hammitt say the city almost ran out of water during the power outage on Tuesday. Electricity runs the pump at the water tower site.

-- Gave Theresa Weeks until July 15 to clean up an old house at 5th Street and Avenue G. The good lumber will be removed first.

If the site isn't cleaned up by July 15, Mrs. Weeks signed a release stating the fire department could burn down the structure.

Old Texico landfill to be used

The High Plains Waste Management Association has filed a permit application with the state to use the old Texico landfill for a solid waste facility.

J. David Duran, of the New Mexico Environmental Department, told the Tribune that the landfill, if approved, would only be used for non-hazardous construction demolition materials, such as rocks, bricks, stone and wood.

It would not be used for food or what is normally called household garbage.

Duran said it would be set up only for use by Texico area businesses and governments.

Projected startup date is April of 1997. Estimated hours of operation would be 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays and by appointment.

Chet Wyant, project manager, said the facility will take in about 3.25 tons of debris per average day. Local public, commercial and private haulers would be allowed to use it.

Summer school to be offered

The Farwell School on Tuesday approved offering a half-day limited summer school.

It will be held for 15 days, beginning June 2, for elementary and junior high students who need extra help.

So far, 109 students have enrolled. Teachers haven't

been hired yet.

In other business, the board:

-- Heard a report on TAAS scores from high school counselor Weldon Killough.

Farwell is a "recognized district" by the state, which is very exemplary. The Tribune will report more details next week.

-- Signed the contract with Panhandle Information Network. This involves the "interactive education" system which was reported in last week's Tribune.

-- Elected Ronald Byrd as delegate to the state school boards' association convention.

-- Moved next month's meeting up to May 9.

All told, about 30 lbs. were found in the door and 20 lbs. in the tire.

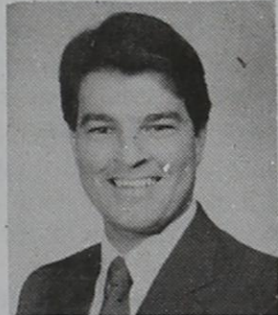
Willis was assigned to this area 11 months ago. This was the fourth drug catch he has been made. The largest earlier was for about \$8,000.

New generating station planned

Golden Spread Electric Cooperative has announced plans to build a new 400 megawatt high efficiency gas-fueled generating station as part of a new power supply plan that is expected to save \$1 billion in wholesale power costs for its 11 member systems, including Bailey County Electric Co-op and Deaf Smith Electric Co-op.

The plant, to be named Mustang Station, will cost about \$175 million and be built on Golden Spread property 4 miles east of Denver City, Texas.

The new power supply plan will provide Golden Spread with a diverse portfolio of low costs resources to serve member system loads. During off-peak periods, low cost surplus power will become available from the Mustang Station and from purchases Golden Spread will make from SPS.

The biggest complaint that I hear people make is that they are tired. The scriptures shed some light on this condition.
