
This pole will not be shaken or ripped loose by anything short of an earthquake. And, asthetically speaking, it's very attractive

# Farwell Chamber awards given

More than 300 folks packed the Farwell Community Center Saturday for the annual Farwell Chamber of Commerce banquet. Top awards went to: Larry Gregory, Man of the Year; Lynne Mahaney, Woman of the Year; Marrion Hudson, Teacher of the Year; David Norton, Agriculturalist of the Year; and Brea Travis and Jarrod Franse, Students of the Year.

The banquet emcee was Mike Ratke. Steaks were cooked by Fred Chandler & Co. The meal was prepared by the Farwell school cafeteria staff -- Stella Garcia, Lillie Hughes, Linda Moss, Lisa Sanders, Joy Stanton and Maria Vidaurri. Farwell High School Student Council members and friends served the meal. Appetizers and punch were provided by Beta Sigma Phi. ESA put up the decorations.

"The Sagebrush Sounds" provided music and comedy relief. The trio, originally from Farwell, now are based in Seminole, Texas. They consist of Greg Meeks, J.R. Sewell and Doug Harriman.

Recognized as the Distinguished Community Service Group for 1996 were the Lutheran Braile Workers of St. John Lutheran Church. They produce books of the Bible and religious tracts that are sent to blind people all over the world. These books are free of charge to the blind and are sent to people in 110 nations.

The 24-year-old ministry has about 30 volunteers from Rhea, Farwell, Lariat and Clovis. They meet once a month to produce 70 to 80 braille books. Since their beginning, they have made over one million pages. Here are the speeches that went to the top honorees (as put together by last year's honorees):

#### Man of the Year

He was born in Morton, Texas and moved to West Camp as a kld. He graduated from Farwell High in 1966. Some of the humorous comments by classmates in his high school annual were: "You're the Greatest" and "There isn't enough room to say all I'd like to say" and "To a senior who I'll never forget. You taught me basketball better than any coach could." He was a member of the Letterman's Club and excelled in basketball -- perhaps holding Farwell High's record -- 56 points in a game.

After graduation, he went to Eastern New Mexico University, where he played some basketball, and graduated with a degree in physical education and a minor in English. He then went to Wayne State University, then moved to the Dallas area. He came back to Fawell and farmed and was in the spraying business. He got married in 1976.

He worked very hard to further his education, going to school weekends at Alpine, Texas, and getting his master's degree. Meanwhile, he taught and coached boys' basketball at Farwell High before taking his current post, Farwell High School principal.

His leadership at the school is phenomenal. Twice, Farwell High has gotten state awards for excellence. And his record of 157-87 as a basketball coach included 4 bi-district wins, 2 area wins and 1 regional victory. In 1989, he had the state semi-finalist team that lost to eventual state champion Edgewood in overtime.

He and his wife, Robin, have two sons, Gage and Gregory. His mother, Cleo, lives in Austin. Our Man of the Year is Larry Gregory.

#### Students of the Year

This award is presented to two outstanding high school students who are chosen by the faculty. Recipients are chosen on the bases of academics, athletics and other extracurricular activities. Picked were:

#### Woman of the Year

This young woman was born in Clovis but is a Texan through and through. One of her first accomplishments in life was to win a baby contest for babies 6 months to 2 years of age. She early on displayed that she was going to be a leader and stay very busy in the pursuit of her interests.

She attended Farwell Schools and as a first grader learned that bus drivers were truly her heroes -- and who could blame her when her first drivers were Benji Dial and Bobby Actkinson. Reaching 8th grade graduation found her at the top of her class and as a freshman marked her singing career with the "Michelles." She was very competitive in sports and academics and discovered she had a talent for art.

Soon after high school graduation, she took the big plunge into matrimony and married her high school sweetheart. The pitter patter of little feet came three times to their home. She was a member of the Methodist church and later joined her husband as a member of the Church of Christ. She has taught Sunday School a number of years, putting her artistic abilities to work to share Bible stories with the pre-schoolers, and always enjoyed singing in the choir.

She has been an active leader in the local 4-H club, leading groups in food and nutrition, method demonstration, photography and clothing, and currently serves as club manager.

She has served as president, secretary, city council rep and city council president for Alpha Rho Lambda chapter of Beta Sigma Phi. ## WTRT offers gateway to the Internet

Parmer County residents who can make local calls into one of the exchanges of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative also now have low-cost access to the vaunted Information Superhighway via WTRT's local gateway to the Internet.

Previously, local home computer users interested in accessing the Internet have had to hook up with a service provider in Amarillo, Lubbock, Dallas, or further away, and might spend from \$50 to \$150 a month on their on-line service charges, in addition to regular long-distance phone bills.

Earlier this year, WTRT's new computer division became a provider of the Internet Service. Originally, WTRT sought to make Internet Service available to schools for educational purposes. Now that WTRT's computer division is established as a service provider, home or office computer users in all of WTRT's exchanges, as well as in Friona, Bovina and Farwell, can place a local call for access to the Internet and avoid hefty long distance charges.

Tom Hyer, WTRT manager, said the cooperative is charging its Internet customers a flat fee of \$30 a month for unlimited access to the service.

Here's how it works:

WTRT will provide each Internet customer with an account and a password. Customers dial a local phone number to connect their computer to the WTRT office in Hereford.

At the Hereford office, a device relays the commands of the customer's machine over a phone line to WTRT's provider in Amarillo. In turn, that computer is connected to another computer in Lubbock that plugs into the mass of computers making up the Internet. WTRT thus serves as an intermediary between a customer's personal computer and the machines on the Net.

Hyer said WTRT offers electronic mail and access to the World Wide Webb, a graphics-oriented Internet function that allows users to obtain photos, audio information, graphics and text from literally anywhere in the world.

Currently, WTRT's home page on the Internet allows access to subjects including government entities such as the White House and NASA, in addition to venues for sports, entertainment, news and weather.

Head smut research at the Texas A&M research station at Halfway is part of a \$10,000 program to help corn growers better control this and other diseases. The study is part of more than \$190,000 in disease, insect and crop production research

Even though most corn hybrids have some smut resistance, some which reach Texas fields don't. The research will help identify hybrids which are susceptible to the disease.

TCPB has also funded nearly \$20,000 for mite control research and \$6,000 in research to kill earworms. This is being done in Plainview and Lubbock.

One study will include development of an improved method of measuring the densities of small samplings of spider mites and beneficial insects which are their natural enemies. This fall, the effects of various Comite pesticide application rates on mites and beneficials will be documented.

In other study, they will look at the impact of spraying Comite and Capture, another pesticide, through various chemigation nozzle settings. They also will check methods of controlling mites which may develop a resistance to pesti-

Corn earworm research will focus on the level of control by using Pounce, Capture and Lannate pesticides. They will work to develop better methods of sampling for moth abundance and relate it to late season ear infestation. Also, more work will be done to develop earworm resistant corn.

TCPB has approved more than \$35,000 in drought tolerance, soil fertility and limited irrigation studies. A Texas Tech professor hopes to develop corn hybrids with improved drought and heat stress tolerance. In a soil fertility study, a research consultant in Plainview looks to determine if phosphorous fertilization can be reduced or eliminated in soils with high residual phosphorous carryover without reduction of

Also, they will determine at what level yield reductions occur when phosphorous is added to soils with a high residual. Banding application tests are part of this program.

Another study says short season hybrids with no more than 105-day maturity have shown promise in limited irrigation situations.






# **Junked Vehicle Notice**

Conviction of this misdemeanor shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$200.00 for each day the violation continues after the time for abatement has been set.





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

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#### Here's some information about new Farm Bill

From Plains Cotton Growers:

Things are happening fast. Passage of the Federal Agricultural Improvement Act (FAIR) of 1996 by the House and the Senate will begin the second phase of the effort to get producers the information they will need to make 1996 planting

The first phase, getting the new farm bill written and passed, was completed March 28. Once signed by the President the second phase can begin in earnest.

It is expected that writing the regulations of new legislation will take United States Department of Agriculture staffers two to three weeks. So far, there is no word on when the sign-up period for the new program will begin.

Preliminary information about the FAIR Act indicates cotton producers will have a Program that contains a great deal of flexibility and retains important provisions that made the Cotton Titles of the 1985 and 1990 Farm Bills so successful. Primarily this means provisions authorizing a marketing loan for cotton.

Producers participating in the FAIR Act will sign 7-year contracts. Program participants will receive a set, but declining, payment each year.

Contract acreage will be made up of one or more program crop acreage bases, established according to rules in effect for 1995. Payments will be made on 85 percent of the contract

Contract commodities include wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, upland cotton and rice. All crop acreage base on a farm at the end of 1995 will be eligible, as will base acreage associated with a Conservation Reserve Program contract that expires during the next seven years.

Payment rates will be calculated based on the adjusted Congressional Budget Office estimates of deficiency payments for 1996-2002 divided by the number of eligible quantities of contract commodities.

Information received March 29 indicates the repayment procedure for 1995 advance payments, approximately 1.85 cents, will be applied to the 1997 payment rate instead of 1996 as earlier thought. Producers need to be aware that the estimated payment rates shown below are still subject to revision until the repayment procedure is finalized and sign-up is com-

> It was at this time that the Governor invoked the use of the age-old Passover custom of releasing a criminal from jail. Shrewdly he selected Barabbas, a hated and dangerous killer. The governor thought that society would not want this crazed rebel and murderer back in circulation. To his distress the leaders persuaded the crowd to ask for Barabbas' freedom and Jesus' death.

> Sensing that the crowd would be satisfied with nothing less than blood, the judge compromised justice and ordered the innocent prisoner scourged. Dripping with blood, disheveled and thorn-crowned, Jesus was presented to the crowd as Pilate announced: "Behold, I bring him forth unto you that you may know that I find no fault in him. Behold the Man." Again the crowd would not himself to the fact that neither compromise nor reason would satisfy the mob.

> It was then that the opposition took command calling out: "If you release this man, you are not the emperor's friend." Was this a veiled threat? Would Pilate's past misdeeds be reported to Caesar? Reluctantly but deliberately, he washed his hands before the mob, saying: "I am innocent of the blood of this just Person; see to it yourselves."
