Supt. R.L. Richards reported that results were in from the annual statewide battery of academic tests.


Of 89 New Mexico schools, Texico came in 13th among the 3rd graders, 4th among the 5th graders and 18th among the 8th graders.

Farwell to combine 2 half-day programs

The Farwell School Board on Monday approved a change in its Head Start and pre-kindergarten programs.

Currently, both are half-day programs.

Effective Nov. 27, the two will be combined into a full day program.

Supt. Richard Boothby said this will also allow pre-k students to ride the bus.

In other business, the board:

-- Met with Friona Police Chief Randy Gerles on the future of the county's DARE (drug education) program. He explained that if his department takes over the DARE program, funds will go into a special fund, with a county-wide board, and be administered by him.

The board voted to go with the transfer, if the city of Farwell also does. The Farwell city council meets next week.

After a year, it will be re-evaluated.

So far, Friona City, Friona School Board, Bovina City and Lazbuddie Schools also have approved the transfer of DARE from the county sheriff's department to the Friona police department.

This has come about because DARE officer Roy Smith left the sheriff's department and taken a post with Friona's police.

-- Discussed a problem of senior classes leaving small balances in their amounts after graduation.

The board agreed to transfer such monies to the school activity fund. And senior classes will be urged not to leave any balances.

-- Heard Boothby report that a House bill that passed the state legislature makes it

Investment policy OK'd

The Lazbuddie School Board on Tuesday approved an investment policy with three priorities: safety of funds, liquidity of funds, and yield of funds.

Most of Lazbuddie's current money on hand is secured by state agencies.

Investment officers will be Kim Puckett and Phil Warren. They will be bonded.

In other business, the board:

-- Agreed to renovate the school playground at a cost of \$2,900. This was recommended by pre-k through 2nd grade teachers, and parents.

-- Approved the senior trip to Cap Canaveral, Fla., and a cruise to the Bahama Islands.

-- Approved a pact with a company for annual drug testing of bus drivers, as is state mandated. It will cost \$52.50 per driver and goes into effect on Jan. 1.

-- Will implement the sex education curriculum, with parent approval, at the 8th grade and below levels. Some summer optional courses for grades 9-12 will be offered.

-- Reviewed the construction grant, which has been approved by the state but fi-

High and Junior High both received \$1,000 for their excellent test scores from the Texas Education Agency. The elementary school scores just missed the cut-off point.

The high school teachers voted to give their \$1,000 to the elementary school as a way of saying thanks to those teachers for their good preparation of students.

Also, Farwell High Principal Larry Gregory and Junior High Principal Jerry Dee Owen received plaques in appreciation of their work.

Charges filed

Six charges have been filed by the District Attorney's office against Phillip L. Moore, 41, Clovis, in the deaths of two persons in a vehicle collision near Clovis on Oct. 26.

DA Randall Harris said Moore has been charged with two counts of vehicular homicide and 4 counts of bodily injury.

Moore was the driver of a vehicle that collided with a vehicle driven by Jeanette Talley, of Clovis.

Killed were one of Mrs. Talley's children, Rebecca, 7, and Mrs. Talley's sister, Margie Robinson, 17.

The Talley family lives in Clovis.

Ms. Robinson also lived near Clovis, but had lived in Texico and attended Texico Schools until a couple of years ago. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Robinson, of Texico.

The bond on Moore, who has been employed at Capitol Foods in Farwell for several years, has been reduced from \$60,000 cash to \$60,000 surety bond or 20% for bail purposes.

Marshal's Report

Here is the weekly report from Texico Marshal Gil Holguin: Police concluded an investigation of burglaries on Nov. 4 and 9 at the Little Mexico flea market with charges of burglary, larceny and criminal damage filed against four Texico juvenile boys. Their cases will go to district court in Clovis.

On Nov. 8, police were called to the Town & Country convenience store where a man was reported as having overdosed on drugs. Stephen Cole, 30, Farwell, was charged with possession of a controlled substance and possession of drug paraphernalia.

On Nov. 11, police responded to a domestic call on State Street. A juvenile boy was charged with possession of marijuana. Robert Duran, 38, Texico, was charged with interfering with a police officer and resisting arrest.

A lengthy investigation into a hit-and-run report on Sept. 28 on Garwood Street has led to charges being filed against Jesus Retana, 47, Texico. He is charged with being party to an unlawful act and failure to give a written report of an accident.

On Nov. 6, a domestic call was made from a home on Avenue D. John Winegeart, 44, Texico, was charged with 2 counts of carrying a deadly weapon, domestic violence, tampering with evidence and child abuse endangerment.

On Nov. 12, a domestic situation on Katherine Street involved two juvenile girls, said Holguin. One girl, who he said had a knife, was charged with aggravated assault.

On Nov. 12, Jesus Gaytan, 26, Portales, was charged with DWI and speeding.

On Nov. 13, a girl walking to Texico School was bitten by a dog through a fence. The dog has all its shots.

On Nov. 10, a broken window at the Texico gym was reported.

Designations to change

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday received an update from Pam Neilson, of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, on the upcoming change involving road designations in Parmer County.

All north-south roads will be numbered, with east-west roads being lettered. The changeover likely will occur next year. The commissioners are reviewing the PRPC plan.

In other business, the commissioners: -- Agreed to seek a new road grader for the Farwell precinct.

-- Received three bids, all from Friona Motors, for a new sheriff's department vehicle. One was picked.

-- Discussed moving the early voting office in Friona from the Friona credit union to the bank, for residents; convenience. U.S. Justice Department approval is needed first.

-- At the last meeting, the commissioners asked local governmental entities to recommend whether the DARE (drug education) program should stay with the sheriff's department or be moved to the Friona police department, because the DARE officer has left the sheriff's department to join the Friona department.

County Judge Bonnie Clayton said three responses have been received so far: Bovina City, Friona City and Friona Schools all favor having the program continue through the Friona police department. After the commissioners receive word from the others (Lazbuddie, Bovina and Farwell schools, plus Farwell City), then a decision will be made.

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Steers topped by Nazareth

Two excellent teams went at it last Friday at Roberts Stadium, with Nazareth topping Farwell for the district championship with about a minute left in the game, 24-18.

Nazareth finished with a 5-0 district record for the second year in a row. Farwell ended regular season play with a 6-4 mark and 4-1 in district.

The Steers will play Shamrock, 9-0, at 8 p.m. on Friday (today) at the Canyon High School football stadium. Earlier reports that the game would be at 7:30 p.m. are incorrect.

To get to the school, as you come into Canyon on Highway 60, turn right at the flashing light (11th Street). Eleventh Street goes right by the stadium.

A tip if you are driving: there is a hidden parking lot on the visitors side which is the best place to park. You drive past the school and down a hill, then turn right after the practice field. It's at the southeast corner of the stadium. And you can buy your ticket right there.

It was another seesaw affair for the Steers, but this time conversions after TDs by Nazareth made the difference. Both teams had to fight gusting winds between 20 and 30 mph.

The game opened with Chase Hardage returning the kick to the Farwell 20. Nic Ketcherside ran for 6, then Brock Anderson for 8. Farwell moved the ball effectively on the ground, as Anderson gained 18 on another keeper. Farwell was stopped at the Swift 41 and was set to punt. But Nazareth left end Preston Ketcherside uncovered and the ball was snapped directly to Anderson, who passed to Ketcherside for a 34-yard gain. Six minutes into the game, Farwell drew first blood when Jason Miller scored from the 1. The kick was wide and Farwell led 6-0.

Nazareth started at its 38 and moved the ball effectively on the ground behind its big running backs. Anderson made a major hit on a Swift runner, jarring the ball loose. Jason Miller recovered the fumble at the Farwell 16. On an option play, Nic Ketcherside ran for 39 yards. But Farwell was held at the Swift 45 and Russell Williams punted.

On defense, David Everett and Michael Treadway had good tackles. On some plays, it seemed like all 11 Steers were in on the tackle as they played hard defense. On a 4th and 6 play at the Steer 29, Nazareth was finally stopped.

The teams traded possessions after punts. But with 2:24 left in the half, Nazareth scored on a 4th and 10-play at the Steers 11. A pass off a fake kick put Nazareth ahead, 8-6.

On the ensuing kickoff, Hardage got the ball on a reverse and sped 85 yards for a TD at 2:07. The kick failed, and Farwell led 12-8.

On defense, Nic Ketcherside had two QB hurries and Everett had a QB sack. Anderson and Preston Ketcherside also had strong tackles as the half ended.

Nazareth opened the third quarter at its 27 after Nic Ketcherside and Treadway combined on a good tackle. Luke Diaz recorded a QB sack, forcing a punt to midfield. Nazareth intercepted at its 40. Steven Miller had a strong tackle. The Swifts moved the ball, scoring with 29 seconds left in the quarter on a 1-yard plunge to go ahead 14-12. The run for extra points made it 16-12.

Nazareth tried an onside kick but Treadway fielded it at midfield. Anderson hit David Dannheim with a first down pass. Farwell was held and Williams squib kicked to the Swift 8. On defense, Ronald Armstrong, Adrian Gonzales and Everett had good tackles, forcing a punt to the Farwell 44.

After a fumble and QB sack, Farwell found itself in a 3rd and 25 situation. But Anderson hit Preston Ketcherside on a fly pattern up the middle for a TD with 5:21 left in the game. The Steers were ahead, 18-16.

Anderson tackled the punt returner at the Swift 28. Nazareth hit a 25-yard pass. Then the big running backs took over, pushing the ball downfield on the ground. Nazareth scored with 1:16 left in the game on a 3-yard run. The run for extra points ended the scoring.

Farwell, with one last chance, got to the Swift 40 when Anderson and Hardage combined on a 45-yard pass play. But that's where the drive ended as time ran out.

Nazareth had 18 first downs, Farwell 10. The Swifts gained 79 through the air and 256 on the ground. Farwell gained 142 passing yards and 89 on the ground.

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

Want to run for election? Jan. 9 is signup day in Texico

Texico City Clerk Marie Christian noted at Tuesday's City Council meeting that Jan. 9 is the only day for residents to sign up in the next city election.

Residents will need a certified copy of their current voter registration, which they can get at the county clerk's office.

An address must be shown on the voter registration -- not a post box number.

A voter identification card which has been stamped by the county clerk's office will be accepted.

If an individual fails to submit the required documents in the form and with the contents required, the clerk shall not certify the person as a candidate.

If a person doesn't file properly as a candidate, they can still file as a write-in candidate.

Once filed, the declaration of candidacy is a public records, she added.

The election will be March 5. Four posts will be on the ballot -- the city judge, held by Carol Snider; and three council posts, held by Rick Queener, Ronnie Warmuth and Ricky Qualls.

-- Heard Mayor Butch Tharp say he has received complaints of motorists running the stop sign at State Street and the highway (near the post office). The marshal's office will be watching this.

-- Heard Marshal Gil Holguin say there have been a lot of near-accidents on the highway near the Spur Restaurant and he has asked the state to take a traffic survey, hoping to lower the speed limit there, and add more markings.

-- Heard Cooper report that plans have been re-worked for the proposed community center to get within funding limits and plans call to seek new bids next month.

-- Will discuss at its next meeting a problem with lots of delinquent water bills. The required deposits likely will be raised.

The Chief's Corner

When is a person grown up?

I want to address just one aspect of that question, and it has to do with confrontations that start with 'he said you said...' or 'I hear you....' There is an old saying that goes 'sticks and stones can break my bones but unkind words can't hurt me.' You are grown up when you believe that, or if you can't believe it, you act like you do.

The manipulator: This is the person who is dead in the heart, who doesn't care about anything but self gratification. He or she wants to see a confrontation. It is very easy to spot this malfunctioning excuse for a human being because they will tell you something like 'Billy Joe said you were ugly.' A friend who cares for your feelings will never say anything like that to you. You are grown up when you recognize this fact. However, if you go to Billy Joe and challenge him over something you never heard him say, then you have a long way to go.

The Bully: This person, male or female, is easy to spot. Their favorite approach is usually, 'I hear you said.....about me.' First off, they demonstration their lack of maturity by that statement. Texico fire insurance rates to decrease

"Thank you, Texico Volunteer Fire Department and City Council."

Texico residents and folks living in adjacent area will be saying those words for years to come, not only for the services the two groups render to the community, but also for a recent reduction in fire insurance rates.

As of Nov. 1, Texico residents and those living within five road miles of the city are eligible for lower fire insurance costs, possibly as much as 30 percent, due to several years of concentrated effort on the part of the fire department and city council.

A Colorado-based group called Insurance Services Organization (ISO) visits each community within this region at least one time every 10 years, evaluating its fire department and water system. The evaluation is then used to establish the insurance rate class of the town. For about 40 years, Texico was consistently rated as Class 8. However, following the ISO's recent inspection, Texico was moved from Class 8 to Class 5.

Under the new rates, any fire insurance policy written after Nov. 1, will reflect the change in class, dropping the cost of fire insurance for homes and other structures by as much as 30 percent. Policies written prior to Nov. 1 may remain under the earlier Class 8 designation. Individual insurance companies will decide whether they will lower rates or retain the higher classification. Residents are encouraged to check with their insurance companies regarding policies written before Nov. 1.

In the 10 years since the previous ISO inspection, the city council and fire department have exerted great effort to bring about a change in classification. The city has upgraded water mains and water wells, and, most recently, linked the two city water wells and replaced water lines along Turner Street.

The fire department has acquired a tanker and a new Class A pumper; has obtained, with the help of the forest service, 10 SCBAs (self-contained breathing apparatuses) to update equipment; and the fire department members have undergone training in fire suppression, search and rescue operations, truck operations, and mutual aid training with other fire departments.

While in Texico recently, the ISO team thoroughly checked out both the fire and water departments. They went over fire station and water department records and all training and maintenance records to make sure that documentation was complete and appropriate. Also, they physically inspected fire plugs throughout Texico.

Texico residents will reap the benefits of the new Class 5 rating in more ways than just decreased fire insurance premiums; the change will also mean more funds for the fire department, about \$5,500 a year.

Fire Chief Lewis Cooper paid special thanks to the 23 members of the fire department for their hard work and efforts.

From all the staff and residents at the FCC, we wish you a safe and happy Thanksgiving. Have a good week!

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
