Times are a'changing

Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren tells me that last week's primary election was the first time that more voters had cast their ballots on the Republican side than on the Democrat side.

Times sure are a'changing. Of course, that doesn't necessarily mean that folks are automatically switching their party allegiance from Democrat to Republican.

For example, more folks may have wanted to vote in the Republican presidential primary where there was a race between Dole, Buchanan and Forbes.

On the Democrat side, it was President Clinton and a bunch of unknowns. No race

At the county level, there was one race -- on the Democrat side for Farwell area county commissioner. That probably drew some folks to vote Democrat. But that race was for only one of the four county commissioner posts -meaning there were no county races elsewhere in Parmer County.

What the election results showed me is that Parmer County is becoming a place for a two-party system. Remember, it was only two years ago that the first GOP candidate since the 1970s won a countywide office (Sandra Warren, District Court clerk).

I may have looked at GOP candidates a few years ago as decided underdogs, but that obviously is no longer the case.

And with GOP candidates this year for county tax collector and two county commissioner posts (Friona and Farwell areas), I wouldn't bet against another Republican or two or three elected in No-

Why the change? It seems to me that folks around here have been conservative for guite awhile but voted the Democrat ticket for various reasons that literally can go back to the Civil War.

But I don't see a lot of these conservatives folks supporting President Bill Clinton, thus making it easier for them to vote for some folks on the other side of the ballot.

It will be very interesting to see the voting totals in the general election this fall to find out what gains the Republicans have really made in our area.

I'm sure glad I'm not a politician trying to forecast the next vote here. I'd be in a real quandary right now.

A sports note: It was neat to see both Texas Tech basketball teams advance in the NCAA Big

Dance. And it was especially sweet to see the boys knock off perpetual Big Guy North Carolina. I bet that did more to help the Red Raider recruiting than anything else in their

history. Any detractors who may have pooh-poohed the Red Raiders for playing a soft schedule while running up a 30-1 record should see that it is well deserved.

Area farmers face tough decisions

We all know the unpredictability of Mother Nature, but lately she's been down right stingy and stubborn with the snow and rain that usually comes our way during this part of the season. Sadly, moisture is something that hasn't been part of the weather forecasts for many a week and the drought situation that the region is in is putting many a farmer in a world of hurt.

Reports from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District stated that this region needs 2 to 10 inches of water to bring the top 5 foot zone soil profile to field capacity. This report was made over three weeks ago and the meter is rising on the amount of water needed.

The majority of farmland in this area is irrigated or under center pivot sprinklers, so the immediate moisture problems are not as critical as they are to dryland farms. However, the money that it is taking to irrigate and run the sprinklers is making the crop profit forecast pretty dismal.

According to an article in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal on March 18, farmers have seen only about a guarter-inch of rain around the Lubbock area this year. Parmer, Bailey and Curry County totals are less than this.

Curt Miller, of the Farm Services Agency office in Farwell, is seeing more and more concern over the effects of the drought and the results of the new farm bill that is currently

under negotiation in Washington D.C. "The outcome of the farm bill and the lack of moisture are putting a lot of pressure on farmers right now. They're needing to know how much of their land they can plant and

if it will even be profitable enough to plant," Miller said. Soil scientist Gerald Crenwelge said farmers "are going to have to make some tough decisions" if the drought contin-

Planting season is fast approaching and farmers without irrigation may have to consider planting alternative crops, such as grain sorghum. This crop requires less moisture than cotton, but it also makes less money according to

The irrigated farmlands in the area are pumping more and more water and putting down what fertilizers they can to prepare the land for planting. Sugar beets began being planted on March 19 in the region and the water it has taken to get the soil prepared for planting has been tremendous.

Tim Cooper, of the Wilbur-Ellis Co. in Farwell feels for the dryland farmers in the area. "Normally at this time of the year, we're busy spraying the dryland wheat fields for insects, but because of the drought conditions, the wheat crops are all heat stressed," he said.

Todd Christian, a farmer in the Oklahoma Lane area, is seeing the cost of farming irrigated farmland go up every year. "We're watching our water table go down and the cost of operation going up, up, up because we're having to pump out so much more water to replace the moisture in the soil. Right now, we're looking at \$40 an acre to get the ground wet before we even plant a seed," he said.

The water situation is becoming more and more critical because of the amounts being pumped out onto the farmlands, without any great prospects of replacement. This situation is forcing many area farmers to rethink their crop strategies. Rather than plant moisture intense crops, they must start to think about crops that require little moisture.

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number of payment options ranging from early payment discounts to the development of a delayed payment plan based on the billing practices of ag businesses statewide.

He said the new collection policy will help alleviate the apprehension of producers who feel they are simply unable to pay their assessment on the specified due date.

What is known so far, according to the PCG, are:

-- Early payment: Cotton producers across the state will be given an incentive to pay boll weevil assessments early through the initiation of discounts for accounts settled prior to the scheduled due date in each area. The High Plains currently has an assessment due date of July 15.

Producers opting to pay their 1996 assessments 30 days before to the scheduled due date will qualify for a 1 percent discount. Producers who pay 45 days before the July 15 due date will receive a 2 percent discount on their assessment.

-- Delayed payment: Some producers may want to ask for a delayed collection schedule for their 1996 assessment. Assessments for which a Payment Extension Agreement has been properly executed will not be assessed any penalties but will be subject to a monthly finance charge of 1 1/2 percent on the unpaid balance. A 10 percent down payment will be required at the time an agreement is executed.

-- Failed acreage: Producers who suffer crop losses during the season will also be allowed to request relief from the TBWEF in 1996. Producers who have failed acreage may furnish the TBWEF with a signed FSA Form 574 and proof of crop destruction to apply for a refund, partial refund or credit for paid 1996 assessments.


