We all know the unpredictability of Mother Nature, but lately she's been down right stingy and stubborn with the snow and rain that usually comes our way during this part
of the season. Sadly, moisture is something that hasn't of the season. Sadly, moisture is something that hasn't
been part of the weather forecasts for many a week and the drought situation that the region is in is putting many a farmer in a world of hurt.
Reports from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District stated that this region needs 2 to 10 inches of water to bring the top 5 foot zone soil profile to field capacity. This report was made over three weeks ago and the meter is rising on the amount of water needed.
The majority of farmland in this area is irrigated or under center pivot sprinklers, so the immediate moisture problems are not as critical as they are to dryland farms. However, the money that it is taking to irrigate and run the sprinklers is making the crop profit forecast pretty dismal.
According to an article in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal on March 18, farmers have seen only about a quarter-inch of rain around the Lubbock area this year. Parmer, Bailey and Curry County totals are less than this
Curt Miller, of the Farm Services Agency office in Farwell, is seeing more and more concern over the effects of the drought and the results of the new farm bill that is currently under negotiation in Washington D.C.
"The outcome of the farm bill and the lack of moisture are putting a lot of pressure on farmers right now. They're needing to know how much of their land they can plant and if it will even be profitable enough to plant," Miller said. have to make some tough decisions" if the drought continues.

Planting season is fast approaching and farmers without irrigation may have to consider planting alternative crops, such as grain sorghum. This crop requires less moisture such as grain sorghum. This crop requires less moisture
than cotton, but it also makes less money according to Crenwelge.
The irrigated farmlands in the area are pumping more and more water and putting down what fertilizers they can to prepare the land for planting. Sugar beets began being planted on March 19 in the region and the water it has taken Tim Cooper, of the Wilbur-Ellis Co. in Farwell feels for the dryland farmers in the area. "Normally at this time of the year, we're busy spraying the dryland wheat fields for insects, but because of the drought conditions, the wheat crops are all heat stressed," he said.
Todd Christian, a farmer in the Oklahoma Lane area, is seeing the cost of farming irrigated farmland go up every year. "We're watching our water table go down and the cost of operation going up, up, up because we're having to pump
out so much more water to replace the moisture in the soil. out so much more water to replace the moisture in the soil.
Right now, we're looking at $\$ 40$ an acre to get the ground Right now, we're looking at $\$ 40$ an acre wet before we even plant a seed," he said.
The water situation is becoming more and more critical because of the amounts being pumped out onto the farmlands, without any great prospects of replacement. This situation is forcing many area farmers to rethink their crop must start to think about crops that require little moisture.
