- Cannon Air Force Base honor guard will put up the colors and give a 21-gun salute.

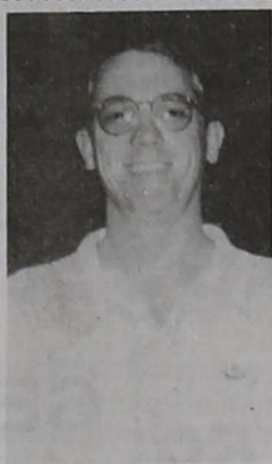
The Chamber hopes that area residents come to this ceremony and help make it a special day to honor our veterans.

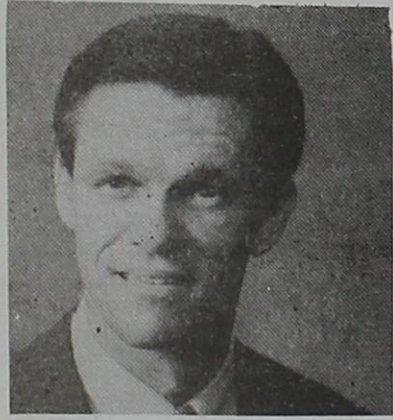

World War II exhibit coming here

A very special exhibit will be displayed at Farwell Junior High for six days.

Cotton activity picking up

Through November 2 a total of 287,007 bales of High Plains cotton have been processed by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Cotton Division offices in Lubbock and Lamesa. To date the crop seems to be tracking identically at the two offices.

Analysis by Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers indicates the 1995 crop is of generally high quality, even though it appears the crop will not rival the unprecedented quality exhibited in 1993 and 1994.

With harvest activity just now beginning to pick up, the High Plains appears to be on its way to producing another crop of respectable size. Current predictions place the area crop at about 2.75 million bales, approximately 250,000 bales short of the 3.06 million produced in 1994.

Early and late season weather problems, insect pressure and dry conditions put a great deal of stress on the crop and accounts for the drop in expected production. The 1995 crop appears to be falling a little short in some quality measurements, even though others appear to be running slightly higher than what was seen through the same time in 1994.

Of the 1995 crop cotton classed so far Color, Leaf and Micronaire readings appear to be slightly below the 1994 crop while measurements for Strength and Length appear to be a little better. Base quality for the 1995 Upland Cotton Loan is Color 41 and Leaf 4.

Color grades contain more grade 31 and 32 and less 21 and 22 at both the Lubbock and Lamesa classing offices. Leaf grades also show fewer bales are receiving grades of 1 or 2.

I am looking forward to hearing from you and learning about your story! I hope to get a great response from you again this year.

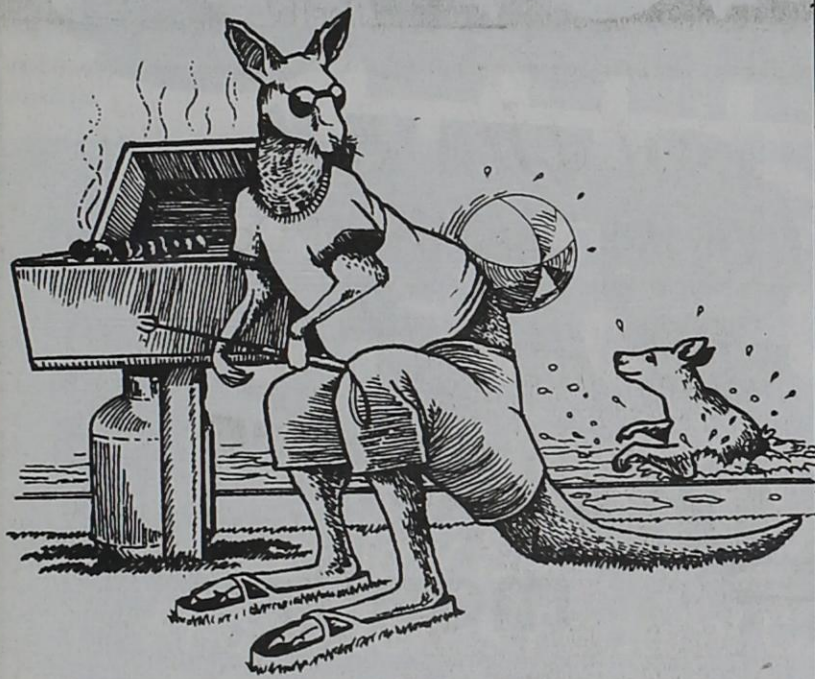

Longhorns rebound to beat Silverton

The Lazbuddie Longhorns rebounded from a pair of losses to top-rated teams with a victory last Friday at home over Silverton, 28-14.

Lazbuddie is now 5-4 on the season and 2-2 in district. They finish the regular season at Threeway tonight (Friday) at 7:30.

The Longhorns only have an outside chance at making the playoffs. They have to beat Threeway while Whitharral, 3-1, loses to underdog Cotton Center. If that occurs, both Lazbuddie and Whitharral would finish 3-2 in district and a coin flip would be used to pick the team to advance to the state playoffs. Amherst, 4-0, is already in the playoffs.

But first the Longhorns must tackle a tough team at Threeway. They like to spread their receivers and that has caused some problems for the Longhorns this year.

The first quarter found both teams scoring once. After the Owls tallied on a short run, the Longhorns tied the game on a 28-yard pass play from Justin St. Clair to Josh Warren. The Jason Thomas kick made it 8-all.

Lazbuddie pulled ahead in the second quarter on a 5-yard TD pass from St. Clair to Guy Nickels. The kick failed and it was 14-8. Once again the score was tied when Silverton scored on a 20-yard run, making it 14-all.

But the Longhorns took the lead for good late in the second quarter when St. Clair scored on a 70-yard run. The Thomas kick put Lazbuddie up 22-14 at the half.

The defenses proved strong in the second half as only one score was recorded. Lazbuddie tallied on a 15-yard aerial from Warren to Nickels for a final 6 points.

Recipe of Week

 - 1-1/2 teaspoons dried oregano leaves, crushed

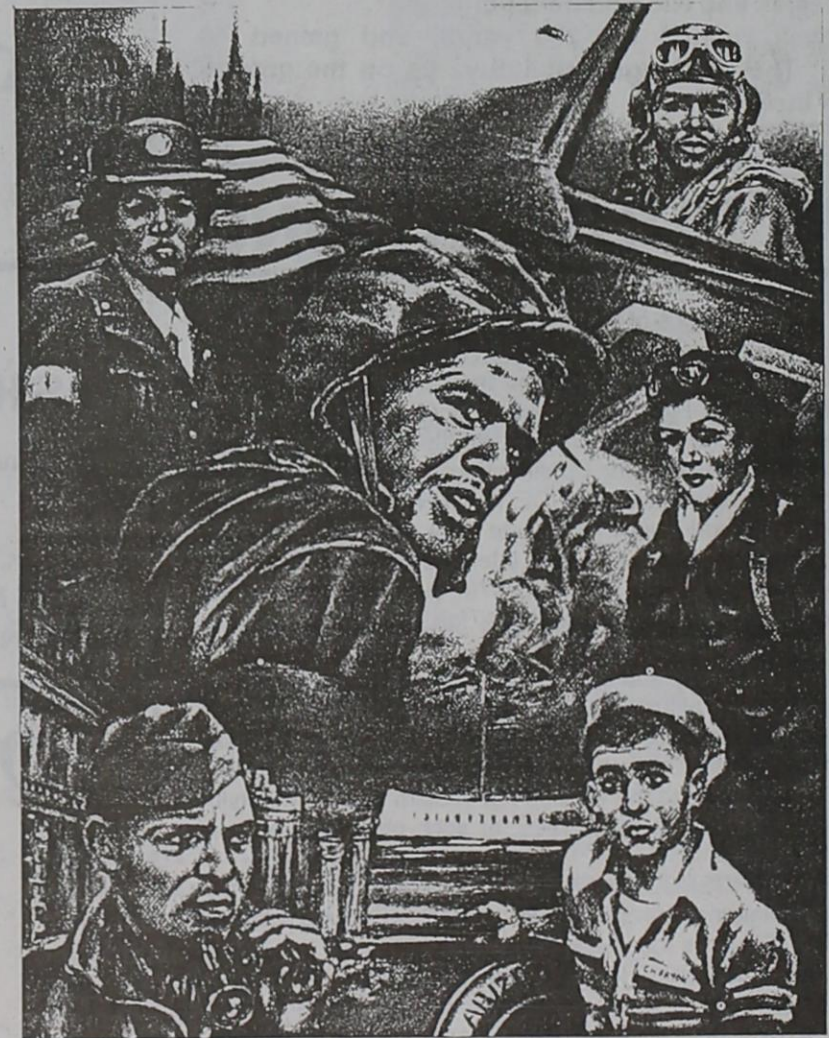

Steers earn state playoff berth by beating Claude

The Farwell Steers have earned a spot in the state playoffs for the first time since 1990.

The Steers whipped Claude last Friday in an away game, 32-12. Farwell finishes the regular season tonight (Friday) by hosting Nazareth at 7 p.m.

Both Farwell and Nazareth are 4-0 in district. Tonight's game will determine the district champions and the seeding in the playoffs. Farwell is 6-3 on the season.

Although Claude is well over two hours away by car, the stands were packed with Farwell fans. According to one Farwell fan, there were more folks from here present than from Claude.

The Steers kicked off and Claude started at its 30. Steve Miller promptly turned in a major hit on defense. Other tackles were turned in by Adrian Gonzales and Nic Ketcherside, so Claude had to punt.

The Steers moved the ball well on the ground throughout the contest. Landon Lunsford started Farwell's first drive with two good runs. Then Brock Anderson, led by a blocking Steve Miller, gained 7. Nic Ketcherside ran 6 more to the Claude 7. And Farwell tallied on a pass from Anderson to Chase Hardage for their first TD. The Jason Miller kick made it 7-0.

Claude started at its 30. It seemed the entire defensive line was involved in several tackles. Gonzales hurried the QB and Hardage intercepted at the Mustang 40, returning it to the 11. Farwell fumbled at the 10, and Justiss picked up the ball for Claude, running it back 90 yards for a score. The kick failed and Farwell led 7-6.

Farwell started at its 20. The Mustangs recovered another fumble at the Steer 15. But Anderson halted this threat with an interception in the end zone. The teams traded possessions, as Claude intercepted a pass. Minutes later, Hardage stripped the ball from the Mustang runner, and Anderson recovered the fumble.

The Steers' running game was in gear again. Anderson and Preston Ketcherside had good runs for two first downs. Jason Miller gained 11 up the middle. A counter play resulted in Preston Ketcherside scoring from the 17 at the end of the first quarter. The kick failed and Farwell led 13-6.

Good tackles were recorded by Lunsford, Anderson, Steve Miller, Jason Miller and David Everett. A combined hit by Anderson and Hardage caused another fumble, recovered by Steve Miller. Penalties hurt the Steers and Russell Williams punted to the Claude 17.

Claude was held and Farwell scored quickly, with Anderson running in from the 17. The kick failed and it was 19-6.

Claude fought back. The defense played tough, with Everett and Hardage combining on a score-saving tackle. Other tackles were turned in by Michael Treadway, Steve Miller and the Ketcherside brothers. But Claude ran 7 plays inside the Farwell 10 (helped by penalties), and scored from the 2. It was now 19-12.

Hardage returned the kick to the 25. Nic Ketcherside had 3 good runs, and Anderson ran well, too. Claude intercepted in the end zone.

There was no scoring in the third quarter. Farwell took the kickoff and moved the ball to midfield. But Claude held on 4th down at its 42. Preston Ketcherside broke up a pass and Claude punted. David Dannheim returned it to the 22. On defense, Nic Ketcherside had a tackle in the backfield and Luke Diaz had a QB hurry on a 4th down play.

In the final quarter, it was all Farwell. One TD was scored by Anderson on a 1-yard plunge and another score came on a 1-yard run by Jason Miller behind superb blocking.

Defensive plays during the quarter included a QB sack by Nix Ketcherside, a Jason Miller fumble recovery, two more interceptions by Anderson, and tackles in the backfield by Treadway, Gonzales and Nic Ketcherside.

Overall, Farwell rushed for 283 yards, and gained 40 through the air. The Mustangs had 129 yards on the ground and 50 through the air.

Wolverines fall to Escalante

The Texico Wolverines' season came to an end Saturday with a 21-7 loss to the Escalante Lobos in the state playoffs.

Texico finished the season at 4-6. The Lobos will play Animas in the Class A semi-finals Saturday.

The game didn't start very well for Texico. Escalante scored on its second play from scrimmage on a 70-yard run. The kick was blocked and Escalante was up, 6-0.

On Texico's first drive, Mel Askew ran for 45 yards on an option play. But the drive stalled at the Lobo 30.

In the second quarter, the Wolverines sacked the Lobo punter and Pecos Chumley caused a fumble. Leroy Salinas recovered it in the end zone for a TD. The Luis Trillo kick put Texico ahead, 7-6.

The second half saw colder temperatures and snow flurries help both defenses bottle up the other's offense. Escalante managed a 30-yard field goal to increase its lead to 15-7.

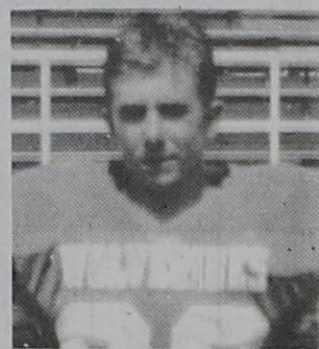
Texico moved the ball well but couldn't get it into the endzone. Then the Lobos scored with 2 minutes left in the game for its final score.

Here are Parmer County election results

13.52 percent of Parmer County's 4,230 registered voters went to the polls Tuesday. About an 11 percent turnout was predicted statewide.

Voting totals, by precinct, were: Calvary Baptist Church, Friona, 194; Bovina, EMS, 81; Friona Community Center, 46; Rhea, 20; Farwell Community Center, 81; Oklahoma Lane, 32; Ridgelea School, Bovina, 12; Lazbuddie, 35; Friona fire station, 31; and early voting, 40 -- a total of 572 voters.

Here's how Parmer County voted on the constitutional amendments:

No. 1 - Provides for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students: 336 for, 226 against.

No. 2 -- Authorizes the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent or public service activities of the organization: 256 for, 302 against.

No. 3 - Allows the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing and export of Texas agricultural products: 304 for, 256 against.

No. 4 - Permits an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinancing of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the owner: 222 for, 333 against.

No. 5 -- Increases by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II: 298 for, 263 against.

No. 6 - Exempts from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person: 442 for, 120 against.

No. 7 -- Reduces the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million: 404 for, 146 against.

No. 8 - Provides for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan and Roberts counties: 377 for, 137 against.

No. 9 - Allows investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia: 195 for, 353 against.

No. 10 - Abolishes the office of state treasurer: 377 for, 165 against.

No. 11 - Allows open spaced land used for wildlife management to qualify for tax appraisal in the same manner as open space agricultural land, subject to eligibility limitations provided by the legislature: 306 for, 243 against.

No. 12 - Authorizes the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes: 332 for, 224 against.

No. 13 - Authorizes the governing body of a political subdi-

vision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish and other marine life: 120 for, 431 against.

No. 14 - Raises the limits of the exemption from ad valorem taxation or property owned by disabled veterans or by the surviving spouses or surviving minor children of disabled veterans: 361 for, 198 against.

Miss Robinson had attended Texico Schools until a couple of years ago when she transferred to Clovis schools.

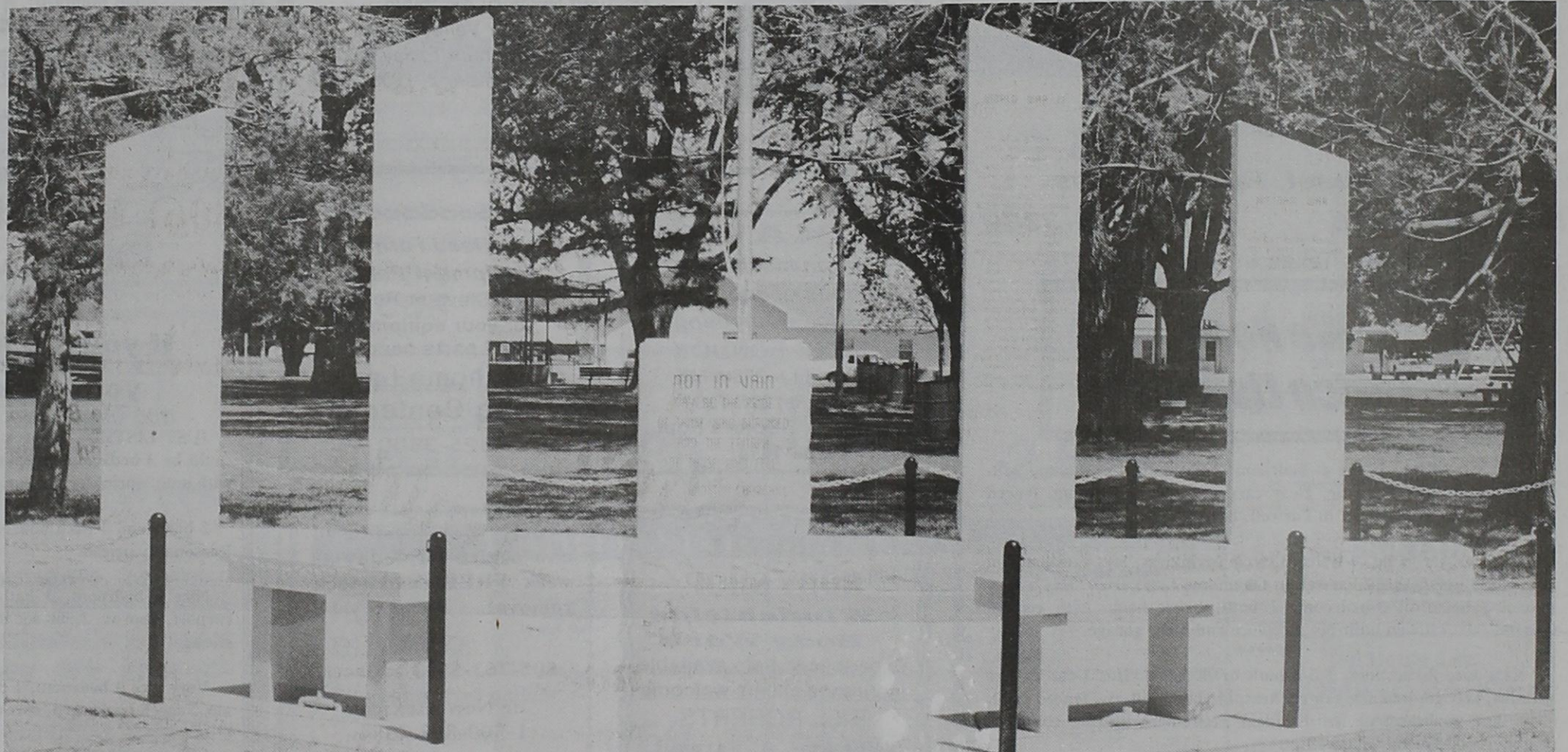
Police Report

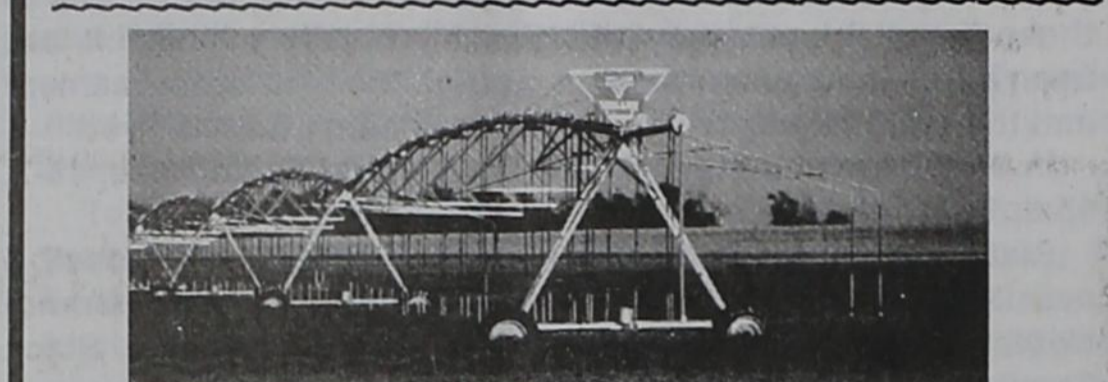




