On paper, I would agree wholeheartedly that putting such agencies under one roof would help efficiency. No question. On paper, that is. Not in real life.

Here is what really happens. A huge, new bureaucracy grows up. And just because a bunch of federal agencies are under one roof doesn't mean they are going to work together. Every federal agency is a Lord Unto Itself.

Now if Combest really wants to get a handle on controlling foreign trade in agriculture, here's how he can do it.

As I've written earlier, federal employees in Washington have more time than they know what to do with. All Combest has to do is have the number of Washington employees in the U.S. Department of Agriculture cut in half. The remaining employees could handle the extra workload without any problem. There would be a real good savings to taxpayers. AND red tape would be cut since work done by two departments, for example, would be done by one.

I have a smile on my face as I write this because the logic is so simple. And I believe I am correct. But, obviously, such a plan doesn't have a snowball's chance in Hades.

And why doesn't a Congressional candidate suggest something along these lines? Because they know they can't do a darned thing about it. They don't have the power and they can't publicly admit it. The federal bureaucracy would make such decisions, not little, itty bitty Congressmen.

But that's not to say that Congressmen don't have some power. Why, they can propose expanding the bureaucracy!

# Hamlin gets Allen organ

Members of the Hamiin Memorial Methodist Church had braced themselves for a long campaign to raise the money to buy a new organ

But their prayers were answered earlier than they had anticipated. They had dedicated the money

from their memorial fund for the purpose of buying the organ, and some individual gifts were donated to the organ fund. The choir scheduled a rummage sale, but an anonymous donor presented the church the needed funds before the rummage sale occurred. The new organ is an Allen digital

computer organ, model 3000. It can act and sound like a pipe organ even though it does not have pipes. It uses a computer to reproduce sounds. Unlike a pipe organ, weather will not affect the sound of the new organ, and it will not need frequent tuning.

There are other computer programs available to make the new organ sound totally different.

"I'll have to show some restraint," said organist Margaret Aycock. "It can shake the rafters."

Mrs. Aycock said that she would have to practice before using the organ in a service so that she wouldn't blow the socks off people."

Mrs. Ward was raped eight years ago in Hereford by the "traveling rapist," Samuel Hawkins. Hawkins admitted during his trial to committing hundreds of rapes, and leaving many of his victims dead.


During her talk, Mrs. Ward answered questions in a very frank and open manner. She used the details of her own experiences to underline the hard, cold statistics of rape. Her words had great impact upon the audience not only because they related to her as another woman, but also because some of them had known another victim of Hawkins -- Abby Hamilton of Bor-

Mrs. Ward was asked what advice she had for people who are approached by rapists.

She replied that if the assault occurs in an isolated spot, it is probably best to submit because fighting would only anger the rapist. Yelling and fighting are effective tactics in places where others might hear the noise and respond to the cries for help. In Mrs. Ward's case, the attack occurred when she was alone in her home with a 13-monthold baby. Her screams for help were not heard by neighbors.

What advice would she offer to minimize the chance of rape?

- 1. Lock your doors at home.
- walk to your car with others whenever possible.


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
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



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# Steers blank Lazbuddie

All the scoring came for the Steers in the first half. On the opening kickoff, Felix Lucio darted straight up the middle of the field and returned the kickoff 68 yards for the first Farwell touchdown. Roger Robertson kicked the extra-point to give the Steers a 7-0 lead, with only 13 seconds run off the clock.

### Prices, Profits and Jobs

A had good yields—better than we've had in the last few years. But prices are so low that many farmers still won't make a decent profit. Sometimes it seems like the family farmer can't win for losing. If the West Texas weather doesn't get us, low prices do.

The problems facing the future of family farming are complex. No one has all the answers, but I believe the job of your Congressman is to find the causes of these problems and work for their solution.

In this column, I'll discuss what I believe is a fundamental problem with our federal government, one that has hurt our family farmers. I'll also offer a proposal that I believe has great potential to solve this problem and help increase farm prices, profits and jobs.

Farm profits are dictated by prices, and a good way to increase prices is to increase demand. In the last decade foreign exports have contributed more and more to the demand for our dollars in goods and services were exported from our region. One-eighth of our manufacturing jobs and one fourth of our farm jobs depend on our ability to export-at a profit.

Increasing foreign sales offers us our best chance to increase demand for our products; but, unfortunately, our country's international trade policy has been inconsistent, inefficient and sometimes counterproductive.

When it comes to our international trade policy, it seems like the right hand doesn't know what the left hand is doing. Policies adopted for one group hurt other groups more. For example, grain exporters say that

This year most farmers have during the time we were negotiating an increase of \$34 million in cotton textile imports from the Peoples Republic of China, we lost \$550 million in grain exports to them.

And the disastrous grain embargo that was intended to hurt the Soviet Union hurt our farmers more. Trade embargoes also hurt our producers' dependability in the eyes of the world. First we're in the market, then we're not, then we are.

The problem is our international trade policy lacks consistency and continuity. Farmers can't predict it. Manufacturers can't predict it.

We've seen what can happen when the State Department dictates agricultural policy, but it's not just the State Department that's involved. Our international markets can be affected by any one of more than a dozen government agencies including the departments of State, Labor, Commerce, and Agriculture as well as the S.B.A., the International Monetary Fund and the products. Last year half a billion Import Export Bank. We've even got export licenses that have to be approved by the C.I.A.

> With all these agencies working on their own goals without looking at the big picture, it's no wonder that our trade policy is erratic and ineffective.

I believe these are strong reasons to develop a Department of International Trade, a cabinet level department that would bring all the agencies which now deal in international trade under one umbrella. Much research and study has already been done on this, and there are many benefits:

First, it would provide for a unified, consistent, long range international trade policy. We could then make long term trade agreements with other countries and put the world on notice that we're going to be there, that our policies, our producers and our supply can be depended on. This would greatly strengthen our position in the world market.

Second, it would make international trade an integral part of the farm bill making it possible to adopt farm programs and production levels that can be profitably supported by domestic and foreign demand.

Third, by combining existing agencies that deal with international trade under one umbrella we would reduce duplication of efforts and prevent the actions of one agency from undermining the actions of another. The right hand would know what the left hand is doing and both would be guided by the same unified

I spoke in support of the development of a Department of International Trade in a debate sponsored by the West Texas International Trade Forum. In that debate, my opponent said it was a good idea but he was against it because he thought it would be too costly.

But, as I said here and in that debate, creating this department would reduce costs. It would not add to the agencies already in existence, but would combine the efforts of those agencies. It would replace 25 federal agencies and eliminate job duplication in the many departments that deal with international trade. It will save money by taking people already on the payroll and making them more efficient and effective.

And a consistent, unified international trade policy would increase tax revenues, reduce trade deficits; and, most important, it would help provide new jobs and a brighter economic future for West Texans.


The Rev. Leonard E. Riddle will be installed as the pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church, in Friona, at 3 p.m. on Oct 28.






