We begin to realize that God's plan for us does not only include the things which bring us happiness, but sometimes we are called to go through the valley of sorrow, or disappointment. Perhaps it is the loss of a loved one, or maybe the loss of a home or job, that threatens to shake our security. Perhaps we had a disaster financially, and we begin to wonder why we are faced with all this difficulty. It is of-



ten later that we can look back and thank God for the sustaining power of His love, and often we see lessons that we learned in the dark hour. We emerge a more compassionate, more humbled, and more thankful person than before.

Now back to the verse quoted at the beginning of this article: "Oh that men would praise the Lord for His goodness and His wonderful works..." Truly, we can say that His goodness and wonderful works go beyond the wonderful temporal blessings in life, for, "He satisfieth the longing soul and filleth the hungry soul with goodness." The full measure of that goodness is the beautiful gift of salvation, and the peace of God that cannot be taken away. May God bless each of you with a Thanksgiving experience from the heart.

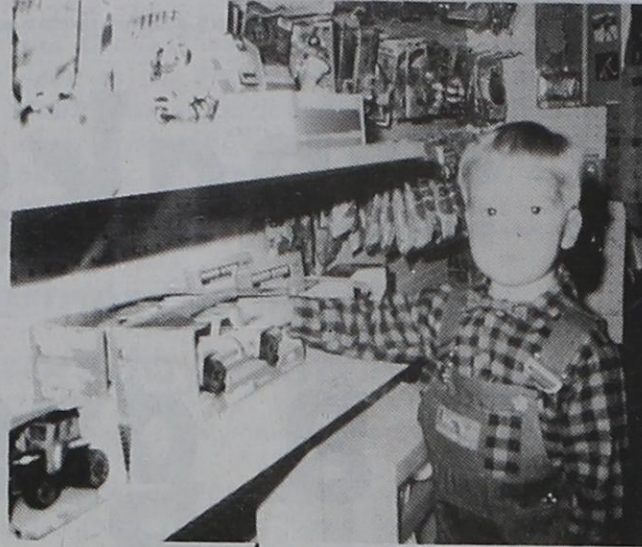

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School report made

Texico Schools last week puts its annual accountability report for 1994-95 in all the school district postal boxes. Some highlights were:

* Expenditures for 1994-95 were: direct instruction, \$1,550,899; instructional support, \$383,080; administration, \$112,288; business and support services, \$61,598; operation and maintenance of plant, \$235,193; food service, \$2,921; athletics, \$40,757; non instructional student support, \$9,251; community services, \$2,539; capital outlay, \$74,249 -- total, \$2,472,775.

* Revenue sources were: state, 98 percent; federal, 1 percent; local, 1 percent.

* The average teacher's salary was above the statewide average, as were the average expenditure per student and average administrative cost per student.

* A followup of students who graduated in 1994-95 showed: fulltime employment, 19 percent; college, 66.7 percent; vo-tech, .1 percent, and other, 14.2 percent.

* Student enrollment, by ethnic groups, shows: Anglo, 58 percent; Hispanic, 35 percent; black, 7 percent.

* Enrollment trends over the past decade have showed a steady increase from 400 to around 500.

* The college entrance exam used most frequently in New Mexico is the American College Test (ACT). The average ACT scores for New Mexico are slightly below those for the nation. Texico seniors scored slightly higher than the rest of the seniors in the state. Texico is ranked 17th in the state (among 89 schools) and is No. 1 in the cluster ranking with other districts comparable in size to Texico.

* Also, results of the quality of education survey were reported. This involved community response to the annual questionnaire. Community responses included:

-- Texico Schools should be on a 4-day week: 46.7 percent agree; 19.6 percent disagree; 22.4 percent don't know.

-- Texico Schools should have longer days: 34.2 percent agree; 63.8 percent disagree; 1.7 percent don't know.

-- Texico Schools' Parentlink is effective: 77 percent agree; 15.8 percent disagree; 7 percent don't know.

-- Texico staff members communicate positively outside of school hours: 68.3 percent agree; 20.8 percent disagree; 10.6 percent don't know.

-- Too many out-of-district students are accepted into Texico Schools: 38.2 percent agree; 44.3 percent disagree; 13.8 percent don't know.
