I sure have enjoyed the Dallas Cowboys' season so far.

I especially liked how they have proven the naysayers wrong -- once again.

No depth, the negative-types kept saying!

Shante Carver's a bust at defensive end, they said.

Larry Allen has stepped into Gogan's shoes very nicely. No mis-step there.

With All-Pro Kevin Smith out due to injury, defensive back Clayton Holmes has done well.

Sure, a lot of passes have been completed in his zone. But when opposing QB's throw repeatedly in anyone's zone, the completions will be there. Don't ever forget that Irvin caught a bunch of passes last year in the 49'er game -- with a fella named Sanders guarding him.

Meanwhile, the trusted vets are doing their thing -- Smith is leading the league in rushing; Haley disrupts offensive plays continually; Maryland and Lett stop up the middle; and the Moose mooses on.

Sure, the distractions are there, with owner Jerry Jones and his wheels and deals. But that's just part of the game, now.

At the beginning of the season, I predicted the Cowboys would go 12-4. I thought the loss of so many veterans would show.

I was wrong. What I have seen is that the Cowboys' director of personnel and his staff have done a superb job of stocking athletes. So when a vet leaves, a youngster capably fills in.

The Dallas organization has to be one of the best run in professional sports. I am impressed.

I do expect the 'Pokes to lose one or two more games during the regular season. When you have San Francisco, Kansas City and Oakland in a row, it's tough.

But it is sure fun .. watching a lot of these new names and

Carroll Huggins patiently awaits heart transplant

Carroll Huggins, son Carol Dean Huggins of Farwell, is in Salt Lake City, Utah, patiently awaiting a heart transplant.

He was moved up to the first name on the list of patients in need of normal sized hearts recently. He and his wife Alice and brother Clive Huggins went to Salt Lake City a little over a week and a half ago. He checked into the Veterans Hospital and is now waiting for a donor heart for transplant.

Carroll is 53 years old and has diabetes and a blood disorder that causes his body to make too much blood. The two problems have taken a toll on his heart.

There has also been some thought to the theory that Carroll's heart was adversely affected by exposure to Agent Orange during the Vietnam War. He served as a Marine on the U.S.S. Hancock and the ship carried Agent Orange as part of its mission.

The doctors have ascertained that Carroll had been having silent heart attacks during the past few years and much damage had been done to his heart as a result. As of right now, he only has use of 13percent of his heart.

His wife has rented a small apartment close by the hospital because after the transplant, they will have to stay in Salt Lake City for about one year for tests and checkups on his condition.

Carroll and Alice live in Clovis and are the parents of two, now grown children, Staci and Dennis. Carroll has been a great help to the Farwell community in taking care of the cleaning of the American Flag that flies over the Veterans Memorial in Farwell City Park.

A medical assistance fund has been established to help the Huggins family with the cost of the transplant and other expenses at the First Savings Bank of Clovis. All donations would be greatly appreciated by the family. The donations are being held as the Trust Account For Carroll Huggins at First Savings Bank on Pile Street in Clovis.

Constitutional amendments to be on Texas ballot

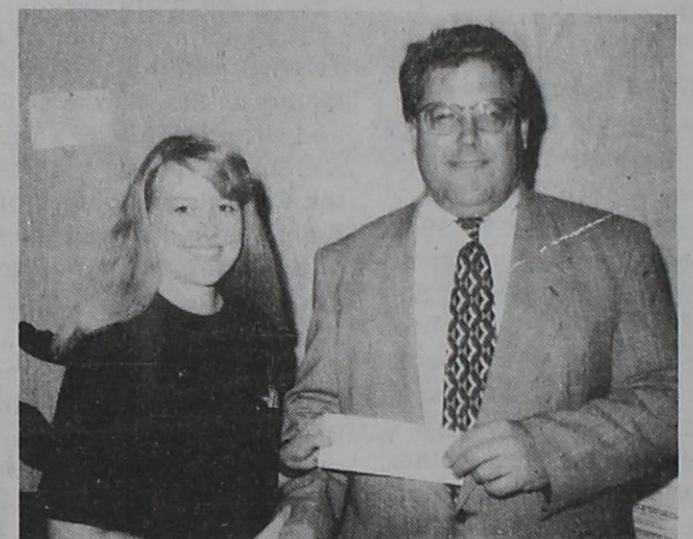
Tuesday is election day in Texas. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Muleshoe State Bank acquires BofA Farwell, Muleshoe branches

Bank of America Texas and Muleshoe State Bank today announced they have signed a definitive agreement under which Muleshoe State Bank will acquire Bank of America's branches in Muleshoe and Farwell. Completion of the transaction is subject to approval of applicable regulatory authorities and is expected to close in early 1996. Terms were not disclosed.

Bank of America had previously announced in August that it would sell its Muleshoe and Farwell branches to American State Bank of Lubbock. However, a subsequent offer by Muleshoe State Bank for the two branches was agreed upon by American State Bank and Bank of America. American State Bank's acquisition of three other Bank of America branches in Floydada, Littlefield and Plainview will go forward as previously announced.

"We look forward to offering the same high-quality service to Bank of America's customers that we have provided to our customers in Muleshoe and Farwell," said Bob Finney, President, Muleshoe State Bank. "We are dedicated to making this transition a smooth one for the people of Farwell and Muleshoe."

Muleshoe State Bank has two offices, one in Muleshoe and one in Farwell; and is currently constructing a new facility at its Farwell office. As of September 30, 1995 Muleshoe State Bank had assets of approximately \$49 million, and total deposits of approximately \$43 million. Muleshoe State Bank is a home owned community bank dedicated to serving the local communities of Muleshoe and Farwell. Muleshoe State Bank has been a part of Bailey and Parmer Counties since 1914.

Former Texico resident dies in vehicle accident

A former Texico resident was killed in a two-vehicle accident on Oct. 26 about three miles northwest of Clovis on County Road 14.

Margaret Robinson, 17, who lived northwest of Clovis, died in the accident. She had attended Texico Schools until a couple of years ago when she transferred to Clovis Schools.

She was a passenger in a car driven by Jeanette Talley, 24, also of Clovis. Mrs. Talley was Miss Robinson's sister.

According to police reports, the Talley vehicle collided with a pickup driven by Phillip Moore, 41, of Clovis.

Mrs. Talley's four children also were in her vehicle.

Three of the children -- Rebecca, 7; Kenneth, 3, and Katie, 6, were taken by helicop-

ter to Lubbock Methodist Hospital. Rebecca was still listed in critical condition in the ICU unit Monday, while Kenneth and Katie were listed in stable condition.

Mrs. Talley and the fourth child, Krystal, 4, were taken to Clovis hospital, as was Moore. All three were listed in stable condition on Friday.

Miss Robinson's parents, Floyd and Lynne Robinson, live in Texico.

Police reports said the Talley vehicle was westbound on County Road 14 and the Moore vehicle was northbound on County Road K (Thornton Street) when the accident occurred.

As of Monday, the investigation was continuing and no charges had been filed yet, said New Mexico state police.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ELECTION NOVEMBER 7, 1995

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students."

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products."

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinancing of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the owner."

"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II."

"The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person."

"The constitutional amendment reducing the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million."

"The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties."

"The constitutional amendment allowing investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia."

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state treasurer."

"The constitutional amendment to allow open-space land used for wildlife management to qualify for tax appraisal in the same manner as open-space agricultural land, subject to eligibility limitations provided by the legislature."

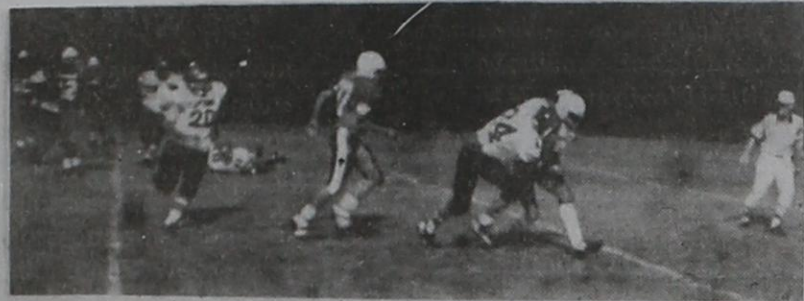
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes."

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life."

"The constitutional amendment relating to raising the limits of the exemption from ad valorem taxation of property owned by disabled veterans or by the surviving spouses or surviving minor children of disabled veterans."

Farwell gas franchise being sold to West Texas Gas

Several gas pipelines and utility systems in the Texas Panhandle, including the one serving Farwell, is being sold by Southern Union Gas Co. to West Texas Gas, Inc.

The contract has been signed and the purchase is expected to close before the end of May 1996.

Larry Cochran is expected to stay in Farwell with the new company.

"West Texas is currently adding to its operations, and the purchase of the Southern Union systems makes strategic and economic sense," said J.L. Davis, president of West Texas Gas. "We have gas pipeline and utility operations in the northernmost counties of the Texas Panhandle, so adding systems in that area will allow us to grow in an orderly fashion. This type of orderly expansion of our business will ultimately benefit our customers because it is cost-effective and will allow us to hold the line on expenses and to compete effectively in the energy market place."

The utility systems involve serve about 2,200 customers in the communities of Cactus, Etter, Farwell, Kerrick, Stratford and Texhoma.

West Texas Gas currently provides gas transmission and distribution services to more than 15,000 customers in the Texas Panhandle and West Texas. It also is involved in non-utility operations such as oil and gas production, gas gathering and processing, refined products distribution and retail gasoline/convenience store outlets.

Recipe of Week

2 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon salt
1/3 cup acceptable vegetable oil
Egg substitute equivalent to one egg
1 1/4 cups skim milk
1/2 cup raisins, chopped dates or blueberries
Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Lightly spray muffin tins with vegetable oil.

Sift dry ingredients together into a large bowl. Make a well in the center. Pour oil, egg substitute and milk into the well all at once. Stir just enough to dampen the flour. Batter should be lumpy. Add raisins, chopped dates or blueberries to the batter.

Fill prepared muffin tins 2/3 full with batter. Bake 20 to 25 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Serves 12; 1 muffin per serving.

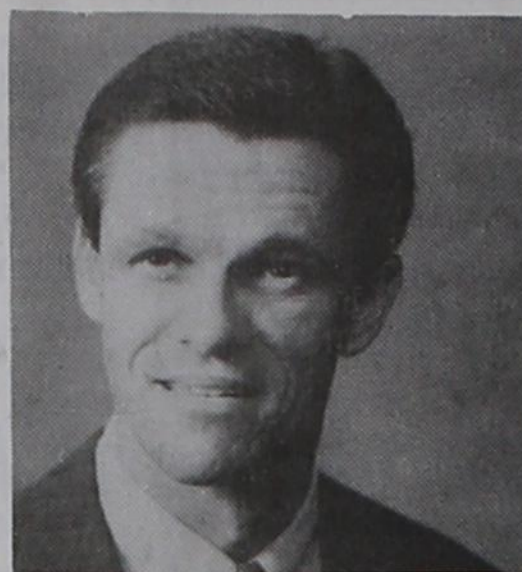

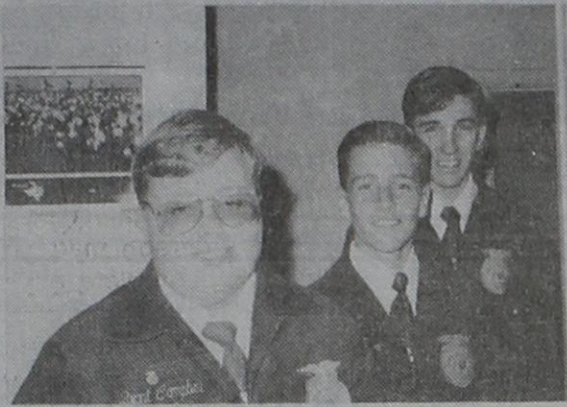

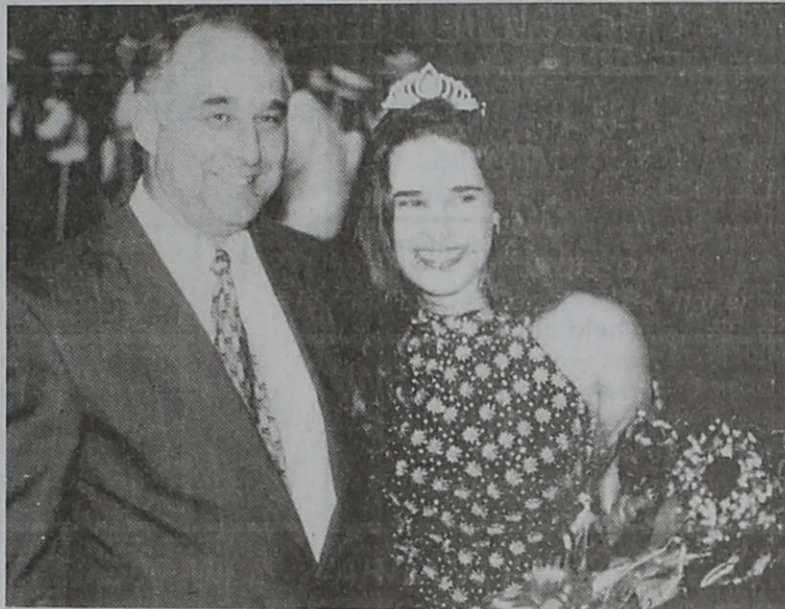
Parents were elected to serve on the school improvement committees for each campus. They were:

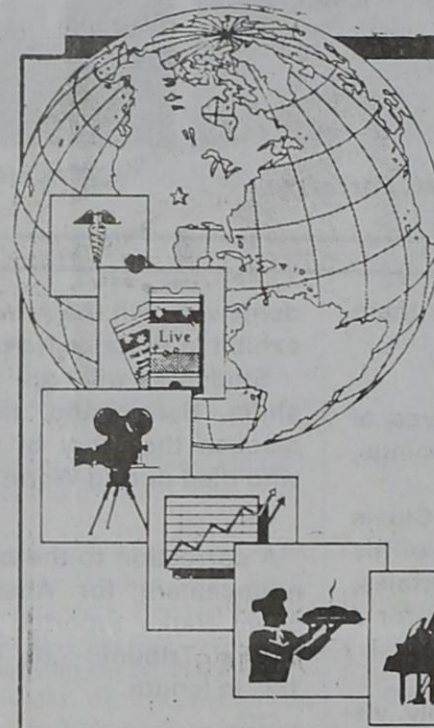

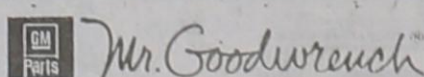

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Steers come from behind to beat Vega; go 3-0 in district

The resurgent Farwell Steers, fighting off some early season losses, have come on strong the past few weeks. The Steers won an exciting, seesaw affair with the Vega Longhorns last Friday at home, 15-13.

The Steers are now 3-0 in district and 5-3 overall. Farwell plays at Claude tonight (Friday) at 7 p.m. If the Steers win, they are in the state playoffs for the first time since 1990. Farwell's last game in district is against Nazareth.

Vega is 0-4 in district. Nazareth is 3-0 in district and Claude is 2-1. Bovina is 1-2 and Happy is 0-3.

The excitement was shown in the scoring. Farwell went up 6-0, then Vega responded, going ahead 7-6. Then Farwell hit a field goal and took a 9-7 lead. Then Vega scored, going up 13-9.

Then Farwell scored with less than two minutes left in the game.

The game opened with Chase Hardage having an excellent kickoff return, good for 44 yards. Landon Lunsford ran for 15. On a 4th and 9 play, Brock Anderson hit David Dannheim with a 15-yard aerial. The drive culminated with a 13-yard TD pass from Anderson to Nic Ketcherside at 8:09 of the first quarter. The kick was wide.

Vega started on its 21. A QB keeper gained 30 yards. Anderson had a good tackle. Vega was forced to punt but a roughing the kicker penalty allowed the Longhorns to keep the ball. David Everett had a strong tackle. Vega finally scored on a 20-yard pass at 4:01. The kick made it 7-6.

Hardage returned the kick to the Steers 37. Farwell was held and Russell Williams punted. Williams also put a big hit on the returner at the Vega 45, knocking him out of bounds. Vega was stopped at the Steers 25. Farwell was held and punted to the Vega 20.

Preston Ketcherside broke up a pass. Michael Treadway had an excellent tackle. Vega was held at the Farwell 38. Anderson hit Dannheim with two passes for 13 and 6 yards. Nic Ketcherside then caught a 10-yard aerial. But Farwell was stopped at the Vega 36 on a 4th and 7 play.

The teams traded possessions as the half ended. Vega started at its 17 after Nic Ketcherside made a good tackle. Preston Ketcherside then intercepted again at the Vega 50. A personal foul against Vega had Farwell start on the Longhorn 20. Farwell was held but Jason Miller hit a 30-yard field goal to put Farwell ahead, 9-7.

After a short kick, Vega started on its 37. On defense, Luke Diaz had a good tackle and Nic Ketcherside had a QB hurry. Vega scored with 3:28 left on a 1-yard plunge. The run for extra points failed and Vega led 13-9.

Hardage returned the kick to the Farwell 38. Anderson took to the air successfully, hitting a 10-yarder to Dannheim and an 18-yarder to Lunsford. Farwell scored on a 22-yard pass to Preston Ketcherside with 1:57 left in the game.

Whitharral tops Lazbuddie

Whitharral pulled away after a tight first half with Lazbuddie to defeat the Longhorns, 73-42 at Whitharral last Friday. Lazbuddie is now 4-4 on the season and 1-2 in district. Whitharral and Amherst are both 3-0 in district so it appears the Longhorns only have an outside chance of making the state playoffs this year. Whitharral hasn't been to the playoffs since 1982.

The Longhorns host Silverton at 7:30 tonight (Friday). The game opened on a high note for the Longhorns when Juan Reyes returned the kick 73 yards for a TD. The kick by Jason Thomas made it 8-0. After holding Whitharral, Lazbuddie tallied again, this time by Reyes on a 51-yard run. The score was now 14-0.

But Whitharral tied it up during the first quarter, scoring on a 6-yard pass and a 25-yard run. The Panthers then took a 20-14 lead in the second quarter on a 22-yard run. Lazbuddie responded when Justin St. Clair hit Guy Nickels with a 15-yard TD pass. After Whitharral scored, Reyes raced in for a 30-yard TD, followed by a Thomas kick. Lazbuddie led at the half, 28-26.

But the third quarter did Lazbuddie in as the Panthers scored 31 unanswered points to take a 57-28 lead. The final quarter opened with Brice Foster scoring on a 10-yard pass from St. Clair, followed by a Thomas kick. Whitharral scored on a 20-yard run. St. Clair scored from the 40 on a QB keeper. Whitharral finished the scoring on a 40-yard pass play.

Coach Mark Scisson noted that Lazbuddie has been in the state playoffs seven straight years, but that the district was tougher this year "and every team in district wants to make the playoffs."

He credited Juan Reyes as his Longhorn of the Week, noting that it hurt after Reyes was injured.

Parmer County ranks 1st in corn production

Here are some Texas agricultural statistics that concern Parmer County:

Sugarbeets

Sugarbeets are only planted in five counties of the Panhandle. Parmer County had 5,100 acres planted in 1993, but only 2,800 acres planted in 1994. Acres harvested also fell, from 4,900 acres in 1993 to 2,700 acres in 1994. But the yield increased, from 23.2 tons per acre in 1993 to 25.2 tons per acre in 1994.

Parmer County ranked 3rd among the counties involved. Deaf Smith is first and Castro County is second. Swisher County is 4th.

Wheat

Wheat is grown over a large area of Texas. Parmer County was not listed in the top 10 in 1993, but jumped to No. 8 in 1994. 1994 production was 2,164 (per 1,000 bushels) for 2.9 percent of the state's total.

Deaf Smith ranked 4th in the state with 3,131 (per 1,000 bushels).

Sunflowers

Sunflowers are only grown in a few counties in Texas, mainly the central Panhandle and a few counties in South Texas. In 1993, Parmer County ranked 6th in the state with 1,765 (per

1,000 pounds) -- 5.4 percent of the state's totals. But Parmer County was not listed in the top 10 counties in 1994 production.

Corn

Corn is heavily planted in the Panhandle and throughout east and south Texas.

In 1993, Parmer County ranked first in Texas with 16,974 (per 1,000 bushels) -- 8 percent of the state's total. But Parmer County fell in 1994 to No. 3, with 16,304 (per 1,000 bushels) -- 6.8 percent of the state's totals.

First in 1994 was Castro County with 18,031 (per 1,000 bushels), up from 15,625 (per 1,000 bushels) in 1993. Dallam County stayed second in 1993 and 1994.

Cattle & Calves

Cattle and calves are prevalent throughout Texas. But a large number are in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties. Here's a look at the inventories as of Jan. 1, 1995:

Deaf Smith ranked first in Texas in the "All Cattle and Calves" category with 628 (per 1,000 head) -- 4.2 percent of the state's total. Parmer County was second with 384 (per 1,000 head) -- 2.5 percent of the state's total.

None of the Panhandle counties were listed among the top 10 in two other categories -- "All Beef Cows" and "All Milk Cows."
