## State officials discuss overpass

## The Farwell City Counc

 met Tuesday with representa tives of the Farwell Chambe of Commerce and Texas De partment of Transportation to discuss a possible overpas over the railroad tracks be tween Texico and Farwell.The Chamber suggested this a couple of months ago after learning the Santa $F$ plans to four-track the line, and a much hea
Mayor Jimmie Mace told the Mayor Jotives that the city representatives 100 percent supportive of the Chamber on this.
Steve Warren, director of transportation and planning transportation and planning ment's Lubbock office, and two area department engineers attended
Warren explained the proc
Ess: Each year, Texas gets about $\$ 13$ million to $\$ 15$ million in federal funds for projects such as overpasses.
The state prioritizes pro ects and each year about projects are approved
In priority 1 phase, plans are developed, an environmental statement taken agreements made with the New Mexico highway department and the railroad, state ments of impact on the righ of way and access, and preparation to compete wit other projects statewide In priority 2 phase, long erty purchased and construc tion costs looked at.
Off the top of his head Warren estimated at head million would be needed here He said "it's definitely a fea sible project."
He said the work would im pact many buildings along Avenue A, possibly up to 3 rd Street.
If the project gets to Priority 2, Farwell would have to pay for 10 percent of the right of way costs and 10 percent o the utility relocations. All other funding is provided by the state.
Warren cautioned that proj ects such as this sometimes take as long as 20 years to compete, but can go quicker. Asked how the state prioritizes such projects, Warren said they look at average daily traffic, average daily train traffic, delays caused by the site, cost of proiet and the site, cost of project and

## What happens if the drought continues?

Fourth in a series
Wayne Wyatt, manager of the High Plain Underground Water Conservation District Number 1 knows that cloud seeding can be and is successful at bringing precipitation to a given area. Unfortunately for this area, the basic ingredients for this project have been non-existant...clouds. Mr. Wyatt was also quick to point out that the water situation is nearing the condition critical stage both from the standpoint of water reserves in wells and the aquifers without precipitation to recharge these sources.
But, what if the drought conditions continue and no precipitation comes our way in this region? What exactly can we expect to happen?
The obvious concern for our area is the effect that the drought is having, and will continue to have on farming Many farmers are being forced into a tough financial corner that will leave few fighting to get out.
But aside from the effects on the farmers, many other and industries will $i$ also be affected
Ranching and the beef cattle industry is growing smaller and smaller due to the high cost of cattle and feed. The demand for beef is not as high as it once was and the lower grades of beef could become the predominant product sold in the grocery stores. The higher grades and choices of beef will have to be priced two to three times higher because of the types of feed fed to the cattle that produce them.
The feed program for beef cattle has long been patched together with wheat. This has become a precious commodity and the costs will only continue to rise in drought conditions. Wheat crops in the region aren't making enough for the area demand for wheat, if they make crops at all.
One alternative that Wayne Wyatt discussed for the beef cattle industry is to put the cattle back on grass. He feels that grass fed beef will become the predominant stock in

For the consumer, the drought conditions are affecting the prices of goods in the grocery and retail stores. The price for a loaf of bread has gone up, on the average of $.50 \phi$ to $.85 \phi$ in the region. The cost of wheat is affecting the price of the four to make bread, alhough there
about $.15 \phi$ to $.20 \phi$ worth of wheat in a loaf of bread. prices for milk in the coming weeks wue to the soaring production costs dairy farmers are experiencing. Dairymen productiong to cope with grain and hay shortages brought are by the drought conditions and an increased world demand for U.S. grain.
Feed accounts for more than half of a dairy's operating costs, and the increases are causing many dairy operations to go out of business. The dairy co-ops are now having to consider charging milk processors more for processing consider charging milk processors more for processing
just to help cover the escalated prices in grain, fuel, hay and other factors in their operations.
The sad fact for crop and dairy farmers and ranchers is that currently, the cost of production is exceeding the market price. This situation is not just due to the lack of rain or the diminishing water supply. It is however, being magnified by the conditions and drastic end results are being brought on more quickly
Smart money managers will see that capital is needed to make it through these tough times. The drought conditions are forcing us to rethink our financial strategies for the coming months and years.
The costs of textiles have been increasing, especially the price of cotton clothing. Poor crops within the state of Texas forced textile manufacturers to look elsewhere for cotton sources and it made the cost of American made cotton clothing to increase
It is hard to understand at times why prices go up when supplies are down. The U.S. operates on a market driven economy, and if demand is steady for a product or commodity, then the prices will stay up even though the supply to manuracture the good is in short supply. As a it as not just "supply and demand," but as "the good goes it as not just "supply a
Unfortunately for us, the demand for water is beginning to exceed the supply and it is causing havoc on everything from business to our attitudes. It is hard to be in a good mood when the forecast for the week doesn't include a chance of rain.
The chances for rain are better if the cloud seeding project could be put to use. Clouds are obviously needed for this, so perhaps the prayers that are being said for rain, should include prayers for good clouds if the rain doesn't comel
This time of drought is a trying time for everyone, but by taking the time and effort to save our water currently available and our money, the trickle down effects of the drought won't completely wash us away.

Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa wants folks to know about the stages in the criminal justice system. The following is a summation. Complete information is available at the police office in City Hall. McGaa has a video tape available for loan.
Here's what happens when a crime is committed:

1. Police investigate the case. If there's not enough ev dence against a specified person, the case may be closed.
2. If police feel sufficient evidence points to a person, they give it to the district attorney or county attorney, who determine whether there's enough evidence to charge the person with the crime.
3. The "complaint" is the affidavit that charges a person with a crime.
4. If the defendant (the person charged with the crime) is not already in jail, the judge may review the complaint and is ue a warrant for the arrest of the defendan
5. The defendant appears before the judge. In most cases bail is set. 6. In felony cases, the legal document is called the indictment." It's returned by a grand jury. In misdemeano pared by the prosecuting attorney.
