Weldon Kube delivers mail to 37 customers on Rural Route 2. He travels 48 miles and delivers over 150 pieces of mail daily.
The postal employees enjoy the challenge of meeting their customers' needs. To help you handle the holidays, the post office offers stamps in various denominations and quantities. There are also stamped envelopes for your convenience. These can be ordered preprinted with your return address. Packaging items are available, in cluding padded mailers, photo mailers, labels, tape and boxes. Priority and Express mail envelopes and boxes are available at no cost.
