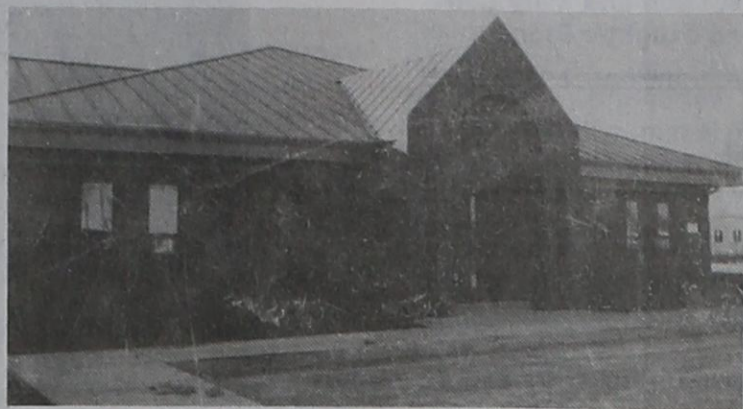
The concert's title is "Christmas From The Heart."

Pheasant hunt starts Saturday

Through the generosity of local farmers and ranches, Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority is sponsoring its 14th annual hunting preserve.

"Without their help and volunteering of their land, this project would not be possible," said Tracy Devault, chapter representative.

The number of permits sold will be limited to assure all hunters a fair chance of obtaining their limit. The land posted for the preserve will be patrolled and open only to those with permits. All reservations will be made on a first come, first serve basis. Permits sold will be good from the date issued through the remainder of the season. One cap will be included for each permit purchased.

Permits for the 1995 hunting season will be as follows: Permits sold Dec. 9-10, \$100; Dec. 11-17, \$75; Dec. 18-24, \$50; ages 12 and younger, \$50.

The permits and maps can be picked up on Dec. 8 from 2 to 6 p.m. at Hughes True Value or on Dec. 9 from 5 to 9 a.m. at the Farwell Community Center. After Dec. 9, available permits can be obtained from any of the following:

The pheasant hunt is an annual fund-raiser for ESA's philanthropic projects. The sorority says that its landowners have reported a good population of pheasants in Parmer and Bailey counties again this year.

As of last weekend, 60 hunters had signed up so far to come to this area.

A raffle, \$5 per ticket, for a shotgun is being held. It will be given away on Saturday at noon at Hughes True Value.

In conjunction with the signups at the Farwell Community Center Saturday morning, Beta Sigma Phi sorority is having an all-you-can-eat breakfast there. Tickets are \$4.50 per person; everyone is invited.

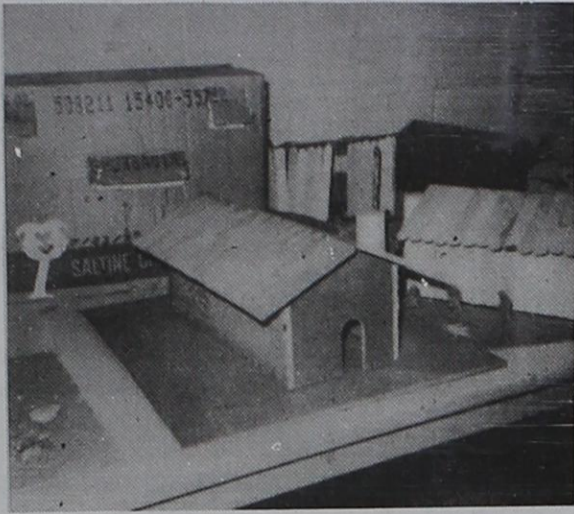



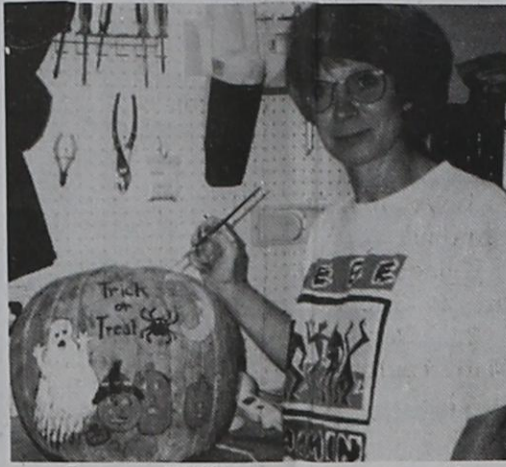

Cathy Shields and "Charlie" Villarreal assist Mrs. Mahaney in delivering over 3,000 pieces of mail a day to their 850 box customers. Weldon Embry is the regular carrier for Rural Route 1. He takes pride in his job as he drives his route's 111 miles, delivering over 900 pieces of mail to his 173 customers. Weldon Kube delivers mail to 37 customers on Rural Route 2. He travels 48 miles and delivers over 150 pieces of mail daily.

The postal employees enjoy the challenge of meeting their customers' needs. To help you handle the holidays, the post office offers stamps in various denominations and quantities. There are also stamped envelopes for your convenience. These can be ordered pre-printed with your return address. Packaging items are available, including padded mailers, photo mailers, labels, tape and boxes. Priority and Express mail envelopes and boxes are available at no cost.

Think of the Post Office as a one-stop gift center. Stamps and envelopes make excellent gifts for all occasions. The history buff will enjoy the "Legends of the West" mint set, the "Civil War" set or the "World War II" series.
