From nothing has come something

It's always nice to give an update on a nifty situation that has developed over a lengthy period of time.

Such is the case with Lions Park in Texico. First some background:

Four years ago, the Texico-Farwell Lions Club proached the Texico City Council with a proposition.

At that time, the area known as the Water Tower Park (behind the First Baptist Church and a block north of Rip's Western Wear) was, to be blunt, a complete mess.

It was full of small chunks of concrete and broken bottles. The old tennis court had broken apart. There was little grass, just sand. Calling the area "a park" was really a misnomer.

What the Lions Club suggested was having the City Council allow them to renovate the area, and rename it "Lions Park." The city council agreed.

First, club members and city officials and employees and kids cleaned up the area -- no small undertaking. The old tennis court was removed. concrete and broken glass were picked up piece by piece and carted away.

Then club members and officials installed a sprinkler, vital to having the area really be "a park." That installation went well.

Then the club bought seed from Kelly Green Seeds to get the grass going. And that went well. The grass came up beautifully.

Last summer, thanks to a state grant, some small bushes and trees planted. A large tree also was donated and planted, but it didn't take and had to be cut

The final stage occurred this month -- adding several pieces of playground equip-

The concrete footings were laid last Saturday, with some painting to be done in June. That will mark the end of the project.

I think it very important that folks know who the men were who donated their time, expertise and equipment to literally make something beautiful out of nothing. That is no small achievement.

At the top of the list of community-minded these folks should go Oran Jay Autrey, Matt Meeks and Hal Helton. Without their work, little would have been achieved.

Oran Jay, a city councilman who runs Stephens Construction in Clovis, is one of the most public spirited individuals the Twin Cities has. Texico-Farwell should be proud to have him as a member of our community.

Matt is Texico's water/street superintendent. Getting the sprinkler installed and the grass growing is owed to his expertise.

Hal, who runs Helton Oil, has been Lions Club president for the past several years. He spearheaded the whole project and has been at every work day to ensure its success. Nothing would have

Recipe of Week

CHERRY COBBLER

- ½ cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon baking powder 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons butter or
- margarine
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar 2 tablespoons cornstarch

For biscuit topping, in a medium bowl stir together flour, the 2 tablespoons granulated sugar, baking powder, and salt. Using a pastry blender, cut in butter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Make a well in the center; set aside.

For filling, in a medium saucepan combine the 34 cup granulated sugar and cornstarch. Add cherries and water. Cook and stir over medium heat until slightly thickened and bubbly. Reduce heat and keep hot.

Add milk all at once to dry ingredients. Stir just until moistened. Transfer hot filling to a 11/2-quart round casserole. Immediately spoon biscuit topping into 4 mounds on top of filling. If desired, sprinkle biscuit topping with coarse sugar.

Convection Bake in a preheated 375°F oven for 18 to 20 minutes or until a toothpick inserted into biscuit topping comes out clean. (Or, standard bake in a preheated 400°F oven about 20 minutes.) Serve warm. Makes 4 servings.
