## On cooking

From Judy Pomper:  
 Cookbooks and cooking are a special delight that I savor. I can look at the pages of a cookbook and imagine the fine food completely cooked and served with style.

Recently, I noticed something I had not seen before. Have you noticed it, too?

Oriental cooks use exotic ingredients and tools that we have only seen in our markets in the past few years.

I could always find tofu and black bean paste if I went to a large city that had an oriental market, but we didn't see mirin and egg roll wrappers in our local markets when I was a girl. It took special knowledge to know that to buy and how to cook it in an oriental fashion.

Julia Child was one of the first chefs to bring her special knowledge to the screen. She studied cooking techniques in France and knew how to use the tools of the trade.

She could debone a chicken with a sharp little deboning knife. Then she would stuff it and sew it up with a few swift stitches.

She was as skillful as a doctor or a tailor with a needle and thread. She knew how to insert lardons of fat into a roast, and why you might want to do so.

She could assemble a bouquet garni in a square of cheese cloth that would perfume the dish with herbal essences. Fish was wrapped in the finest parchment paper the stationery shop had to offer. And she was one of the first chefs I ever saw who used a balloon whisk.

The skills she showed were quite feminine. They were the things housewives and mothers understood. The recipes used things that most had in their homes.

Lately, I've noticed a different trend among chefs. It's a masculine approach to cooking. The tools seem to come from the building supply shop. The tools are different and the finished results are, too.

One chef I saw wrapped pastry dough around a piece of copper pipe before baking both dough and pipe.

Another used the plumber's favorite PVC pipe to mold a custard. A third used PVC pipe as a cookie cutter. And yet another chef browned the top of a creme brulee with a blow torch.

When they start mixing the dough in the cement mixer, I'm turning the cooking shows off!

Because the old chefs wrote the classic recipes for beef, chicken, turkey and fish, the new chefs are using ingredients from far corners of the earth. They mix oriental and western products with ease, and they pile the result up in a small stack in the center of a large plate.

Most of the main courses are grilled, fried or sauted in a few moments. The day of a stew left to simmer on the stove all day are over. Time is money.

Decorating the finished plate with artistically arranged drops of sauce has become an art form.

A pile of exotic ingredients with a picture perfect sliced strawberry or a sprig of rosemary helps to cover an otherwise empty plate.

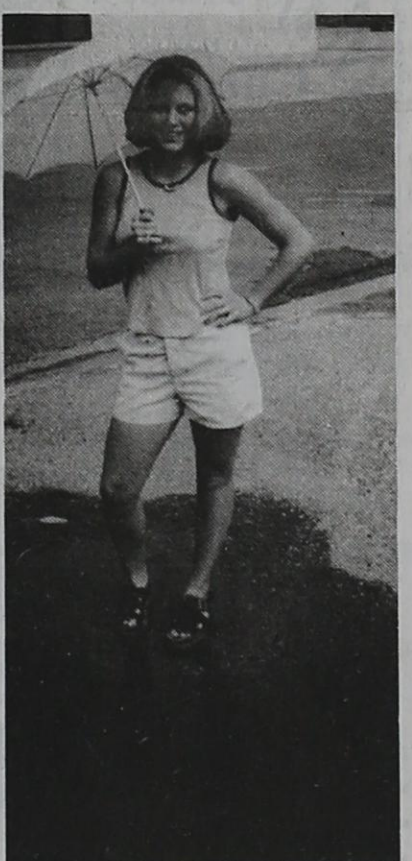

## Lazbuddie, Farwell schools 'recognized'

The Texas Education Agency on Monday released its annual accountability ratings and Farwell and Lazbuddie schools did very well.

The rating system goes in this order:

Exemplary is first, followed by recognized, acceptable, and low performing is last.

Farwell and Lazbuddie were both recognized.

It's very difficult for a small school to achieve exemplary status because every sub-group has to score 90 percent or higher.

For example, if just one student in a school system does poorly, exemplary status is lost.

Here's how Farwell's three campuses scored:

High school -- exemplary, for the fourth consecutive year.

Junior high school -- recognized (one sub-group was at 87.2 percent).

Elementary school -- acceptable (math scores were down).

Rankings are based on student test scores and drop out rates.

Farwell's attendance rates were:

High school, 96.3 percent, same as the previous year; junior high, 97.7 percent, same as the previous year; and elementary school, 97.1 percent, compared to 97.3 percent the preceding year.

Here's a look at the TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) results by school:

High school -- reading, 90.7 percent passed, compared to 96.3 percent the preceding year; math -- 100 percent, the same as the preceding year; and writing, 95.3 percent, compared to 96.3 percent the preceding year.

Junior high -- reading, 97.8 percent passed, compared to 96.8 percent the preceding year; math, 93.3 percent, compared to 97.8 percent the preceding year; and writing, 96.9 percent, compared to 100 percent the preceding year.

Elementary -- reading, 95.6 percent passed, compared to 86.6 percent the preceding year; math, 85.4 percent, compared to 89.2 percent the preceding year; and writing, 91.9 percent, compared to 96.2 percent the preceding year.

### Lazbuddie

Supt. Hardy Carlyle reports that Lazbuddie Schools also did very well in this state yardstick.

Lazbuddie has one campus (kindergarten through 12th grade) and it received a "recognized" ranking.

This was Lazbuddie's second straight "recognized" rating.

Lazbuddie's scores were:

Reading, 92.7 percent, up from 92.3 percent last year; writing, 94.4 percent, up from 94.1 percent last year; and math, 96.3 percent, up from 89.6 percent last year.

It's difficult for a small school like Lazbuddie to achieve "exemplary" status because that ranking is based

on all percentages being over 90 percent for every sub-group tested.

All it takes is for one pupil

to do under 90 percent to eliminate the school's chance for an "exemplary" rating.

Carlyle said he was "very, very pleased" at the school's accountability report. He credited the teachers for doing a masterful job and noted that the new educational programs put in the past few years seem to be helping.

"These programs are beginning to kick in, and we hope to see continued growth," he said.

## Texico Schools alter busing policy

The Texico School Board on Tuesday altered its policy on dealing with students who live out of the district.

The board agreed that its school buses would not cross the district line to pick up out of district students nor to alter its bus routes.

But after listening to Judy Bell and other parents, some of whom have been provided bus service for several years, the board agreed to allow To and From Bus Co. owner Rick Queener and Supt. R.L. Richards to allow some out of district students to ride the buses if they get to regular bus stop points within the

district.

This will be done on a case by case basis.

In other business, the board:

-- Approved offering family passes for all activities during the school year for \$70. Passes can be bought at the high school office.

-- Discussing possibly having a 2-mill levy put on the February election ballot. No decision was made. If approved, the levy, if voters approve, would raise funds for buying equipment and building maintenance.

-- Heard that Citizens Bank

usage in Farwell has been cut in half. Farwell is now using about 300,000 gallons a day. That is major drop, compared to the 600,000 to 800,000 gal-

lons of water being used during the early days of the drought.

Farwell is now using only two pumps -- down from five before the rain came.

The recent precipitation has helped out Texico, too. Texico Water Supt. Matt Meeks said water usage has decreased about 40 percent since it started raining. Texico is using 350,000 gallons of water a day -- down from earlier totals around 180,000.

Sherley-Anderson Pitman reported .7 inches of rain for Farwell this week. Sherley-Anderson Grain of Lariat reported .73 inches of rain and Sherley-Anderson of Lazbuddie reported the most rain for the week with .75 inches in their rain gauge.

Sherley-Anderson Elevators in Bovina reported that there have only been traces of rain there.

Cherinell Riley, Parmer County entomologist, said the recent rains have helped crops a little, but the cooler temperatures that came with the rain are really doing the

job. The cotton and corn was getting really stressed because of the heat and drought. The recent cooler climate has helped the crops look a lot better.

"We're still waiting on the good rain," Scott Brown of Sherly-Anderson Lazbuddie said.

Farmers are still tapping out their wells trying to give their crops enough water.

It is too late though for dry-land farmers to gain any help from this rain. Most of them have already re-planted their fields or given up altogether.

There has been no significant change in the amount of pests because of rain either. Bowl worms are being found. There are about 3,000 - 8,000 eggs per acre found per acre last week in the cotton. There are also low number of greenbugs being found.

Overall, this rain has been a good thing for people. It's amazing. I saw something the other day that I haven't seen in about a year -- a puddle. I think that everyone needs to go out and enjoy them!

**County eligible for disaster loans**

Parmer County was declared eligible for Farm Service Agency (FSA) disaster emergency loans on July 24. Generally that means that farmers who have lost at least 30% of their production due to drought temperature conditions that occurred from June 1, 1997 through July 8, and continuing, are taken into account when determining eligibility.

FSA Ag Credit Manager Tom Taylor urges farmers who are interested in receiving an emergency loan to get their applications into FSA as soon as possible. Taylor said, "We hope farmers will get their applications in early rather than waiting until near the deadline which is March 23, 1999. The longer they wait, the more chance there is for long delays. If the applications come in early, we can avoid backlogs and speed up the process."

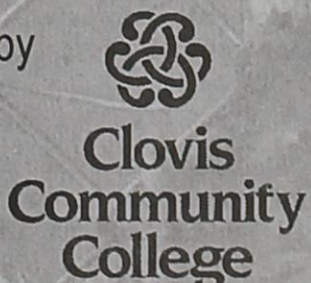

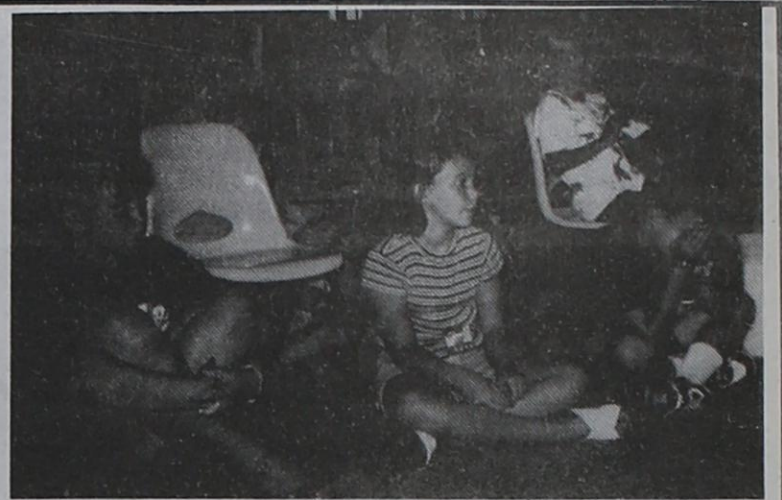

President Clinton last week declared farmers and ranchers in all Texas counties eligible for federal disaster assistance due to the drought.

This means that producers who have suffered severe production losses can apply to the Farm Service Agency for emergency loans.

In most cases loans would be repaid within one to seven years, although some could be paid out over 20 years.

Under this program, the loan limit is up to 80 percent of actual loss, or a maximum of \$500,000.

The current annual interest rate is 3.75 percent.

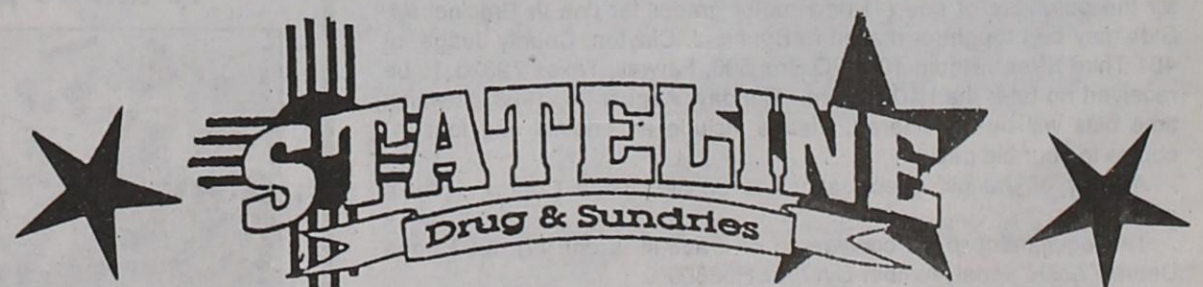

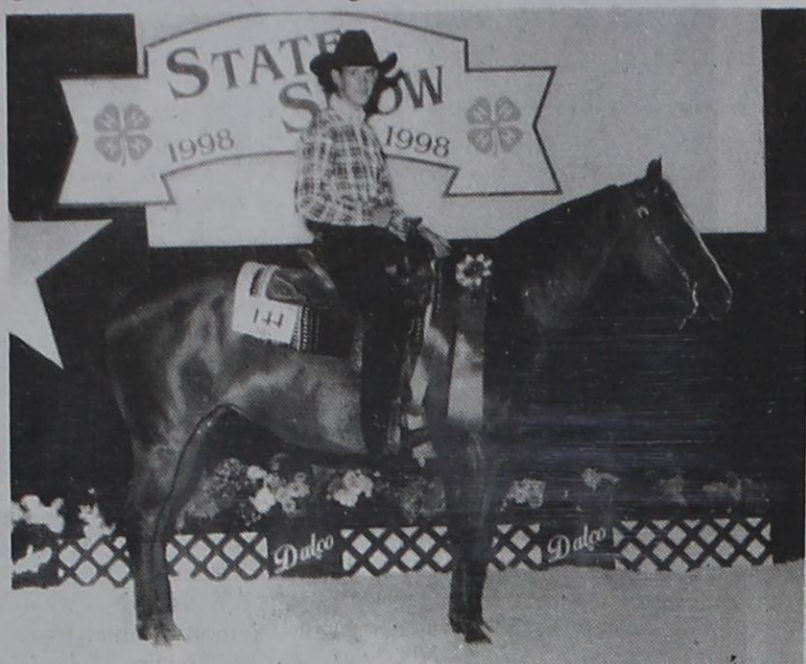

## Tray Thorn competes at state horse show

Tray Thorn competed in the State 4-H horse show in Abilene. While there he was entered in the reining and in working cowhorse.

With a field of 60 reiners, and 44 cowhorse contestants, intimidation was a big factor. Unfortunately, in our area these events are not popular among entrants. During the summer he has competed in all of the LEHA 4-H horse shows and is the reserve high point in performance in the senior division. Also, he qualified and attended the Texas High School Rodeo Association Finals in cutting.
