As an ex-Northerner, it simply amazes me to see Southerners' reactions to the white stuff that falls from the skies -- snow.

Reading the Lubbock and Amarillo papers last week to see the shock that South Texans felt when a measly one or two inches of snow fell made me laugh.

Up North, when it snows -- and I mean SNOWS -- you take it for granted. Four, six inches of white fluff are normal. You only really begin to talk "snow" when it reaches the foot mark. As a youngster, I remember walking the mile and half to high school through thick drifts, wandering out into the streets to walk in the vehicle tracks. No problem.

I first found out that Southerners have a different outlook when I attended a Young Republican national convention in Washington, D.C., in 1962. I found myself in a motel room with some fellows from Kentucky and Louisiana when someone came in to announce that it was snowing out.

Immediately, this fellow from Baton Rouge jumped up, ran to the balcony, held his arms outstretched and exclaimed, "Look, look! It's real snow!"

No, I didn't run outside, too. I had seen snow before.

To tell you the truth, that's one of the reasons my family decided to leave Northern Indiana in 1979 and move south. The two previous winters had seen heavy snowfalls, almost enough to suffocate you.

There were days when you couldn't leave the house -- the snow was too deep. I figured there were other places I'd rather live.

Moving to the Washington, D.C., area, I found out first-hand how alien snow was to the federal bureaucrats.

When it would begin snowing -- even if the forecast only called for an inch or two of the stuff -- federal employees were allowed to go home immediately under what is called a "liberal leave policy." This occurred several times each winter -- one more indication that the bureaucrats in Washington are not over-worked. Never, ever did I hear one of my federal employee neighbors complain that because he left work early he couldn't get all his work done. Instead, they would say how nice it was to get the time off.

Seeing fear grip our government each time snow would fall didn't surprise me that much. Actually, I always felt it was better to have the bureaucrats at home instead of at work where they could do mischief.

But what did surprise me was the schools' attitude toward snowfalls. As I said, when I was a kid you went to school regardless of how heavy the snow was. So you can imagine my shock when school would be called off -- just on the forecast of snow!

To be fair, I can appreciate calling off school, or ending school early, due to snow. Southern communities don't have the snow-removal equipment that Northern areas have in case of snow. They just aren't needed that often down South.

But knowing I was putting a full day of work in while it snowed, and knowing that the federal employees already were home, did kind of get to me.

If the Communists ever decided to attack this nation, they would be smart to wait for a day when it snowed in Washington.

Our government would be in chaos.

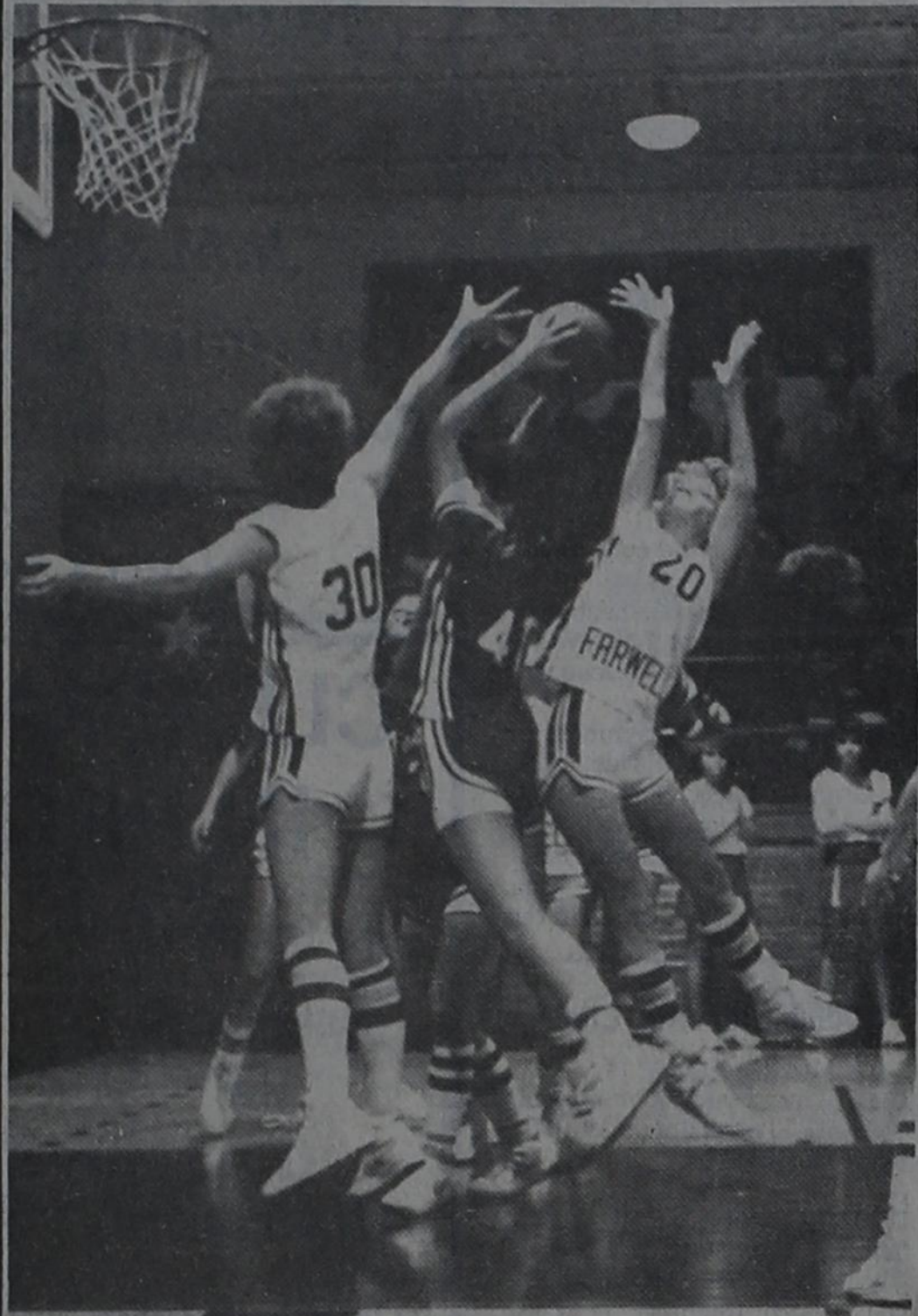
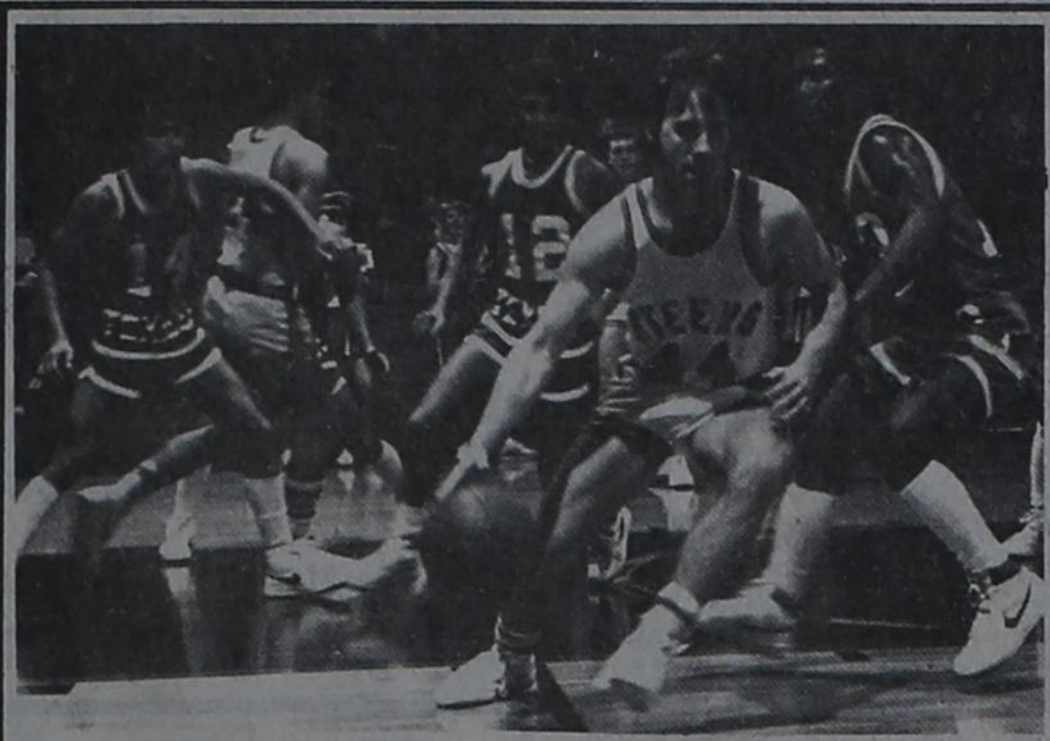
Texico repairs planned

Highway official coming

Councilman Steve Chancy reported at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting that a New Mexico highway department official will be coming the week of Jan. 21 to view the intersection of 21st Street and Route 108.

-- Approved a lease agreement with the state regarding the Senior Citizens Hall remodeling.

-- Hired Charles Martin on a temporary basis to run the Caterpillar tractor at the landfill.

Schools seek funds

The Farwell School Board unanimously agreed Monday night to seek funds from the county permanent school fund.

The county fund consists of money held in trust for the four county school systems -- Farwell, Lazbuddie, Friona and Bovina. Farwell Supt. W.M. Roberts estimated that the fund has between \$800,000 and \$900,000 in it. Interest from the fund is split each year among the school systems.

Roberts said the superintendents and board presidents of the four school systems will meet with the county commissioners at 3 p.m. Jan. 14 to discuss this request. The other school systems already have passed the same resolution.

If the funds are distributed among the schools, according to state law, they must be used either for reducing bonded indebtedness and/or making permanent improvements.

Roberts said that if Farwell gets its share of the county funds, they probably would go to reduce the current indebtedness. Farwell schools have a \$320,000 debt that must be paid off by December 1987.

The thinking behind this decision is that it would allow funds from the state that have been going toward the debt to go to school programs. Roberts foresees more state mandates concerning education that will cost local school systems more

money. John Grigsby, who will succeed Roberts as superintendent this summer, was present at the board meeting. Grigsby is currently superintendent of Wildorado schools.

High Plains Conservation District election set

Officials who are charged with representing the interests of the residents of the counties they serve to the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 are to be elected by registered voters residing within the boundaries of District Director's Precinct Three on Jan. 19.

Bailey, Castro and Parmer counties make up Director's Precinct Three. One position on the Board of Directors and three places on the five-man county committee for each county in Director's Precinct Three are to be decided in the 1985 election.

A.W. "Webb" Gober of Farwell was elected to his first term on the Board of Directors representing Director's Precinct Three in Janu-

ary 1973. Gober is eligible for re-election at the upcoming election and is running unopposed in this election.

Bailey County Committeemen-at-large David Stovall and Ernest Ramm have both served two consecutive four-year terms and are ineligible to run for re-election while Lewis Scoggin from Committeemen's Precinct 2, has just completed his first term and is running for re-election. Sam Harlan and Jay Herington are seeking election to the committee seats vacated by Stovall and Ramm.

In Parmer County, John R. Cook, Committeeman-at-large, and Wendol Christian from Commissioner's Precinct 3, are both seeking election to their second terms in office, while Ronald Elliott will be leaving the county committee having completed two consecutive terms in office. Robert Gallman from County Commissioner's Precinct 4 is running for election to fill the vacancy left by Elliott.

Voters who wish to cast their

ballots in Bailey County should vote at either the Enochs Gin Office in Enochs where Mrs. W.R. Adams will be presiding or at the Bailey County Courthouse in Muleshoe where Mrs. Margrethe Taylor will serve as Presiding Judge.

The County Courthouse in Farwell where Mrs. Albert H. Smith will

preside is just one of the Parmer County polling locations. Parmer County voters may also cast their ballots at City Hall in Bovina with Jay Sherrill, Jr. presiding or the Council Meeting Room at City Hall in Friona where Melba Burleson will be serving as the Presiding Judge.

Election upcoming

Farwell voters will go to the polls Jan. 19 to answer only one question:

For or against a six member aldermanic form of government.

The special election was called by the City Council after a petition was presented with 93 qualified signatures asking for the election. Fifty-eight signatures were needed.

Currently, Farwell has a three member commission -- two councilmen and a mayor. The mayor votes in case of a tie. If voters approve the change, there would be five councilmen and a mayor.

The election will be held at the City Hall. Billie Blain has been appointed judge. Ysleta Kittrell is alternate judge. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

For voters who will not be in the city on election day, absentee voting is under way at the City Clerk's office at City Hall through Jan. 15. City Clerk Jane Bowery is in charge of the absentee voting.

The ballots that voters will get

will contain two boxes -- one supporting the change in government, the other against. All that is needed is to place an "X" in the square which the voter supports.

If the change in government is approved, an election will be held in April to elect six aldermen. Aldermanic terms would be for two years and staggered.

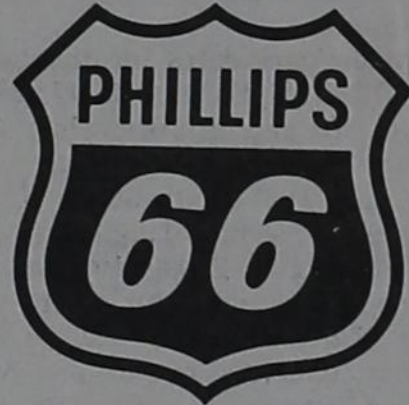
If the change in government is rejected, an election still will be held in April for the current three positions.

Cotton meeting set

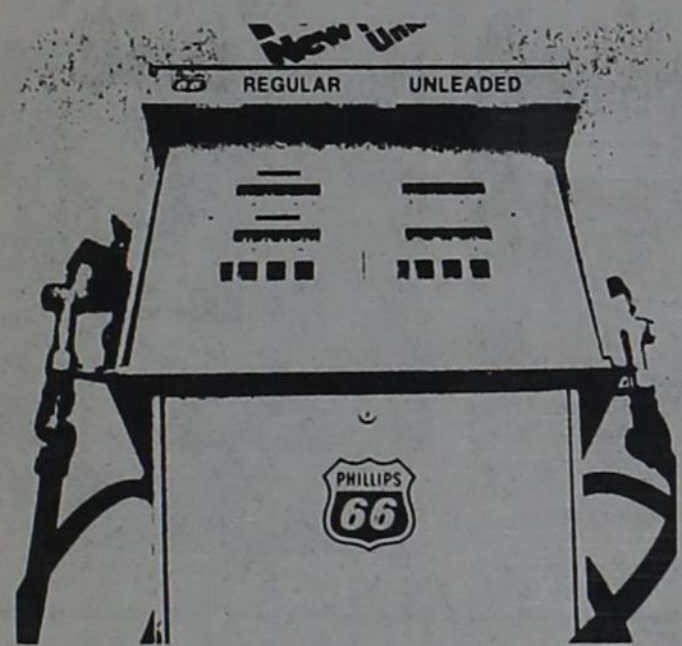

The hour-and-a-half meeting to follow will work from the theme "Building Markets for You."

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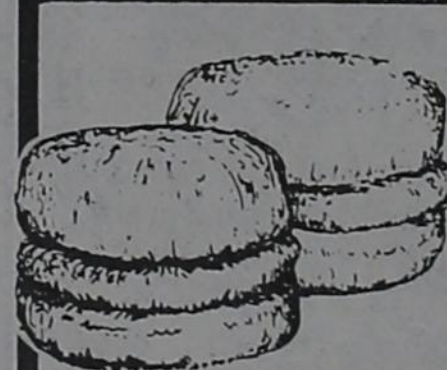
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Manicure program given
