If a man is president, he should be above the law. And what Mr. Clinton is accused of isn't murder, for


gosh sakes. Rather, it's sort of like sexual harassment to the highest degree.







This letter is written with mixed emotions. I will hasten to explain:

Many years ago, during the 1960s, before Dr. Russell retired as a veterinarian in Clovis, I was designated the sole unofficial Humane Society for this area.

There were many small animals that needed shots. Some needed to be put to sleep because of being hit by a car or an advanced illness.

The expense for this I paid personally, along with the cost for their food and care. In order to find homes for some of these abandoned, stray animals, I paid to have them spayed or neutered.

All of this I did with love and best wishes for both pet and owner.

This humane work I did became soon common knowledge in our community. Local citizens started dropping their animals off at my home when they were ill, thereby infecting the healthy animals I cared for.

I cared for and did as my heart told me was the humane thing to do, even in the face of derisive snickers. My own family and friends, including my dear husband, thought that I was crazy to care for these poor forgotten crea-

All these years, I thought I

was doing the community a service. Many of the cats I healed found homes with local farmers to help with their vermin problems or as pets with numerous families. Most of my neighbors were grateful

that we did not have a problem with rats or other vermin because the cats I have cared for kept their numbers in

"The Cat Lady of Texico" this week has taken down her sign. I have been served a citation for being in violation of Ordinance No. 268, Texico's pet ownership ordinance.

I was not aware this ordinance had been passed into law in 1995. With the new hiring of an animal control officer, Texico is now implementing that ordinance.

As the adage goes, You cannot fight City Hall, but you can write a Letter to the Edi-

Because of my age (72), financial restraints and the town's ordinance, caring for these animals is something I will no longer be able to do.

Please stop leaving your unwanted animals at my home on Turner Street.

Texico now has a very able animal control officer that will assist you should you find that you are not able to care for your pets. Please call City Hall and let them help you.


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P.O. Box 669 Farwell, Texas 79325 happy (feliz) to have me in their home and I am gracious that they have taken me into their home.

Many things are different than at home. They don't have hot water heaters in their homes so the bath and shower water is very cold (frio)! The shower has a small machine that heats the water as it comes out of the shower head. The bath has jets that shoot out water. The water can be heated by flipping a switch. The jets then begin to take in the cold water, heats it and shoots it back out. Just the other day I waited two hours for a steaming hot bath.

We also don't have air conditioning. It is already hot here and heat it is just the beginning of spring. They told me that during the summer it is even hotter, but it rains a lot. Anyway, during the day, our air conditioning is God and the small breezes He blesses us with, by blowing it through the open windows and doors.

This small city is still living in the past. They refuse to believe in the new technology that has taken over the world. Computers are hard to find and horses still pull carriages around. This primitive village makes me miss what I have at home and also makes me realize what Farwell is missing. Because the town has cut itself off from the world around it, there are no major problems such as violence, rape, robbing, gangs and stealing.

Food is also very different. They eat pizza with french fries like we do with hamburgers. They also each french fries with a toothpick or fork, never using their hands. They have a kind of salad called "mayonase"; it is kind of like our potato salad with eggs and potatoes, but it also has carrots. I ate some pizza with shredded chicken and corn on it. Surprisingly, it was very good. I told them I was going to make them American pizza and they were very excited.

They also have a drink here that I like very much. It tastes much like ginger ale but it has more of a fruity taste. It is called "Guanara."

Well, I better run! I love you and miss you very much. Tell everyone I said hello or ola!

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Combest says President Clinton is not above the law

The situation that President Bill Clinton finds himself in these days is not one that he can take lightly. Nor is it one that will just go away after a week's worth of highly publicized public apologies.

The fact is, the entire set of events that were set in motion upon the delivery of the now famous Starr report, is history in the making and will be the new chapters in history books.

Congressman Larry Combest perhaps summed it up perfectly when he stated, "No matter what happens to Clinton from this point on, legal and political precedents will be set and history is now affected."

Combest coordinated a lengthy conference call with a whole group of newspaper editors and reporters from his constituency in the Texas Panhandle on Monday. He wanted the newspapers to know his viewpoint on the entire matter and, he wants to assure Texas Panhandle residents that he is among the majority of Congressmen that are ready to get to work on the issues that immediately affect our areas - farm issues and the other topics on the agenda.

But this issue with the President is not one that Combest is willing to put off. He is totally in favor of advancing to the

"Obviously, this is not a situation that a Congressman looks forward to," Combest said. "The issues and answers to the many aspects of resolving these issues with the President concern those of us in Congress and the House of Representatives a great deal. I am very impressed with the manners and degrees of professionalism that my colleagues and associates have been handling these events and issues. It could have turned into a cat fight very quickly, but the truth is now out and we're all dealing with it in a very professional manner. We will also do our very best to serve the American people in the resolution of the situation."

Combest said the process established is this: the judiciary committee has the entire report published with Kenneth Starr's findings and all of the supplemental evidence. The committee will read the entire report and will then have two choices to make.

The first choice is to ask themselves how much more of the report can be released without hurting innocent people? The second choice is to determine whether or not there are legitimate reasons to advance to the hearing process.

"I personally see no way that a hearing can be avoided in this situation," Combest stated. "There are too many unanswered questions brought forward by the report thus far and the only way to fairly bring forth each charge against the President is in a hearing."

Combest also feels that moving forward as expeditiously as possible is in the best interest of the nation.

"This matter is taking far too much emphasis away from the other important issues facing the nation," he stated.

Combest is among the congressmen wanting to see the

hearing process begin in about two weeks time. The core of this entire matter has now become a question of resignation vs. impeachment, and it is now a total "political" proceeding. The "illegalities" of the President's actions have been established in the final findings and the case now moves into the political arena on how to officially handle the situation.

"The Starr report proves with strong grounds that the President committed perjury," Combest stated. "The perjury

offense also includes all the peripheral people around the President because they are all involved as well."

When questioned about the President's ability to maintain office, Combest adamantly stated his feelings:

"I feel that the President's ability to govern, with any credibility is greatly impaired," he replied. "He's put our entire legal and political system in jeopardy by his actions and lack thereof. What happens to the legal precedents that have been established in cases of rape, sexual harassment and other similar cases if he happens to "get away with this"? We'll be sending a message to every woman involved in these circumstances that she no longer has a legal avenue to

In order to impeach the President, Combest admits that President Clinton must have his day in court. He also feels (as did many of the reporters on the call) that there are way too may lawyers looking into this report. The fear of many on Capitol Hill and throughout the nation is that somehow "Slick Willie." as some put it, will once again manage to slip through the noose.

"Clinton is our chief law enforcement officer in this country. He is not above the law! The ironic thing about this whole mess is that he did it to himself; he did it on his own and he is accountable for every one of his actions, misdeeds, lies and the cover-up he orchestrated," Combest said.

One of the most worrisome issues that has been brought forth by all the attention placed on the "Clinton Crisis" is that of the problems arising in the overseas and foreign affairs that the U.S. have been addressing.

Combest feels that it is a distinct possibility that some, who are so inclined, may take advantage of a "wounded commander-in-chief." He also finds it a little too coincidental that the United Nations chief ground inspector, Scott Ritter, resigned his post, while in the midst of the most aggressive biological and chemical warfare search in history.

"Ritter was so glad that the U.N. and the U.S. were moving forward aggressively in their search and they were so close to squelching problems in Iraq," Combest said. "Then one day, Butler, the head of the U.N. inspection team, receives word to not go into sites that are known terrorist or hot spots for biological and chemical weapons. This was right around the finalizing of the Starr Report. I don't blame Ritter for throwing his hands up and feeling like the U.S. is now turning their heads. And why? Because he needs all the help he can get right here at home to figure out a strategy to beat the odds?"

This is just one example of the focus being taken away from the important business of running the nation.

Combest was asked about what would happen if Clinton resigns or is impeached? What about Al Gore stepping into the presidency?

"Al Gore is even more liberal than Clinton, so we know what the agenda would most likely become with him at the helm," Combest stated. "The terms of Gore as President are also constitutionally outlined as follows: If Gore takes office prior to Jan. 20, 1999, he cannot run for a second term. He can run for "election" for only one term as President. If he were to win, he cannot run for "re-election."

The other aspect of concern for the standing Congress is what happens if nothing has been resolved by the Congressional recess in October.

"The Judiciary Committee will still be convened and by

Constitutional order, they will have to finish their investigation," Combest reported. "It is very possible, however, that a new Congress could take on the impeachment decision in the new year. Over 40% of the Congressional seats are up for election or re-election."

Because of this fact, "censure" is being discussed as a last resort to work through the situation.

"The President cannot apologize for committing perjury," Combest stated. "He did it on his own volition; he knew what he was doing. His apologies are mere words at this point. However, I cannot stand in judgment of him...only God can. I am part of the majority party that feels that the situation is being handled properly and both factions, Democrats and Republicans, have uniformly agreed upon the course of actions. If there was ever a time to set down our "Party" affiliations and do what was best as Americans and for Americans, it is now."

Combest also wants to warn his constituents to not believe everything the television news media reports about this issue. Many things have been misconstrued, misquoted and blown out of proportion. In fact, there have been several topics brought forth on the world news broadcast that have absolutely nothing to do with the circumstances of the Presidential issue.

"All I can say to you out there is to stay strong, keep informed and most of all, pray for those that will be involved in this historical decision. Pray for guidance and for the right things to be done in the meantime," Combest said.

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
