Bollworm population peaked

The first week of August brought lower temperatures and some much needed moisture to the area. Although rain is always welcome, it was, the for the most part, too late. Area crops with limited irrigation were stressed too long without a decent rain. Farwell received 1.5 inches of rain, according to the PET weather station. September has been drier but temperatures remained above normal for the most part, giving producers the opportunity to mature late set bolls.

Cotton bollworm populations peaked from Aug. 10-26 here as moths moved from maturing corn into cotton. Some fields required two insecticide applications to make it through this extended bollworm period.

With the cooler temperatures in August. verticillium wilt was seen in area cotton fields. This wilt is characterized by brown streaking in the stem, whereas a healthy plant would have a solid white stem.

Boll weevils are making their presence known as their late season migration continues. This results in weevils traveling many miles northward from maturing fields down south in search of fields that still have squares and soft bolls to feed on. Plains Cotton Growers and the Texas ag extension service GRIP traps showed significant increases in weevil numbers starting in late August. Parmer County, with 27 traps, showed 2 last week, while Bailey County, with 24 traps, caught 181.

This is the typical pattern we have seen the last three years. These late weevils pose little threat to this year's crop but can provide earlier problems next year. Producers are encouraged to add a weevil insecticide to their harvest aid treatment to kill boll weevils if they saw boll weevil activity in their fields. Timely use of harvest aids will deny late weevils the opportunity to feed and gain enough fat to make it through the winter.

Late aphid infestations in early opening cotton posed a possible sticky cotton problems early on. However, parasitic wasps cleared out remaining populations.

Smut is very evident in corn fields throughout the area that was stressed by early hail or lack of adequate water. This was an unforgiving season on corn with limited irrigation.

Greenbug populations in sorghum peaking Aug. 10-20. Most fields received an insecticide application with remaining greenbugs soon eliminated by parasitic wasps. Some sorghum fields that were stressed did not pollinate. For those who are wondering if this season will ever end, it's coming around the last stretch and this race is almost behind our area producers.

Before we invest, we should determine what we want our investments to do for us.

When we invest, we're using money in the hope of making more money. I seldom receive any argument over this. However, the money we use for investing should be extra money - money that represents surplus savings or income not needed for essentials.




A- I have covered jurisdiction in previous articles but it is worth repeating. As a general rule my jurisdiction ends at the city limits. There are exceptions to that rule such a certain misdemeanors and all felonies. Writing tickets for New Mexico license plates is not one of those exceptions.

However, if a person who lives outside the city limits drives a vehicle, (bearing NM license plates) within the city limits, that person can be cited.
