Farwell approves **RV** restrictions

The Farwell City Council on Monday approved an ordinance curtailing the parking of RVs on the street and in front yards.

The vote was 4-0. There was no discussion -- it had been discussed at the previous two meetings.

Councilman John Carlson, who was absent when the vote was taken, asked to go on record with his views later in the meeting after he ar-

Carlson strongly opposed the ordinance and called it a mistake to approve it. He urged folks to petition for its elimination.

In other business, the council:

-- Changed the animal ordinance to include language dealing with vicious animals and to double the pound fees.

-- Approved the budget, which calls for a tax rate of .3663, up 3 percent over last

The budget includes 3 percent pay raises for city employees except for the police chief, who received a larger

Also, a new police car will be purchased.

- -- Heard Mayor Jimmie Mace report that the state has approved the \$200,000 grant for a new ground storage
- -- Plans to change the peddler's ordinance to specify where peddlers can put up their stands. This is being done at the request of the Border Town Days committee.
- -- Heard BTD Chairman Mike Pomper suggest a small ramp be built behind the gazebo for folks in wheelchairs.

The council asked street Supt. Dee Hammit to build two such ramps into the city park.

Farwell reported a total of 573 students, an increase over last year of 10 students.

The high school enrollment increased from 169 to 173. Junior high increased from 125 to 130 and the elementary increased from 269 to 270.

Lazbuddie


Lazbuddie reported students, up 9 over last year's first day totals.

The high school enrolled 79, the junior high had 50 and the elementary reported 100 students.

Texico

Texico schools reported 516 total students for their first day enrollments. This is a decrease from last years' 556 students.

The high school enrollment was 174, down from 170 last year; junior high, 126, down from 149, and elementary school 216, down from 237.



Lazbuddie Schools approve new budget

The Lazbuddie School Board on Tuesday approved a budget based on a \$1.50 tax rate.

That number can change, and due to state law, a final figure cannot be adopted until after Sept. 1. Last year's rate was \$1.46.

A small tax hike is expected but school officials are still waiting to see their exact

student enrollment, upon which state funds are based. The current budget is based on 207 students, but as

of Tuesday 225 had enrolled -meaning more money. The board has cut the school budget by about

\$57,000 over last year. Teachers are receiving pay raises of 6 to 8 percent, de-

On school bus safety

From Debbie Pollard:

For 23 million students nationwide, the school day begins and ends with a trip on a school bus. The greatest risk is not riding the bus but approaching or leaving the bus. In 1995, 23 student pedestrians were killed nationwide in school bus loading/unloading zones.

Every school bus is surrounded by a danger zone. It consists of the 10 feet in front of the bus, and on all other sides of the bus that are used for loading and unloading the bus. Here are some school bus safety tips:

1) Children should arrive at the bus stop at least five minutes early to prevent running up to the bus stop when the bus is approaching.

2) As the bus approaches, stand at least 6 feet away from

3) Wait for the bus driver to signal before entering the bus.

4) Use hand rails to avoid falls. 5) When crossing in front of a bus, wait for the driver to

signal before crossing.

6) Be sure the driver can see you at all times. Just because a child can see the driver doesn't mean the driver always sees the child.

7) Always look left-right-left before crossing a street.

Never walk behind a school bus.

9) If you drop something, notify the driver immediately. Never try to pick it up.

Cloud-seeding program flying in high gear

Precipitation enhancement (cloud seeding) has been in effect over the area since May 31, reports the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District 1. The area includes 17 Texas counties, plus three in New Mexico.

Participants pay a pro-rata share of the costs, based on total acreage. The District is paying 70 percent of the cost, with the New Mexico counties the rest.

It appears the District will not have to raise taxes to fund the program for the next two years. The first year of the program has been paid for by the District with operating fund re-

As of July 19, pilots had flown 27 cloud seeding missions. No-seeding orders were issued for parts of the District during the time crops were planted in June. And if an area received two or more inches of precipitation during the prior 10-day period, it was added to the no-seed order. Areas receiving less than one-half inch of rain were priority areas. County committee members within the District provided advice for their re-

The program will continue to Sept. 30, 1997.



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



IS CONSCIENCE A SAFE GUIDE?

"Let your conscience be your guide" is a very dangerous dictum! Dangerous because conscience may mislead.

Conscience is that faculty of the heart which passes judgment upon one's deeds, approving the good and condemning evil. It is a witness: if one has a pure conscience, he has a reliable witness; if conscience is defiled, it is worthless (Rom 9:1).

One's conscience will never condemn one until he acts or speaks in a manner contrary to what he believes to be right. It matters not whether the deed be right. If one believes an action to be right, right or wrong, his conscience will not condemn. Where there is no concept of right or wrong, there can be no conscience.

Conscience is like a watch: it must be properly set or it has no value. Since conscience sits in judgment upon man's deeds, to approve or disapprove, it follows that conscience must be synchronized with the truth. Only when conscience harmonizes with truth does it have worth!

The Bible mentions a "good conscience," (1 Pet 3:21); a "pure conscience," (2 Tim 1:3); a defiled or seared conscience, an evil conscience (1 Tim 4:2; Heb 10:22).

Clearly, one may have a good conscience and be guilty of wrongdoing. Saul (Paul) was a persecutor, a blasphemer and injurious; he referred to himself as "chief of sinners" (1 Tim 1:12f). Yet, at that point in time, he lived "in all good conscience" (Acts 23:1). His conscience did not condemn when he tried to make havoc of the church because he thought (honestly) that he was doing the right thing.

Believing a thing to be right does not make it so. A thing is right if in harmony with God's standard of right, the truth. However, if one believes a thing to be wrong, to him it is wrong, wrong or not (Rom 14:14). If man persists in violating conscience it becomes seared, worthless. Conscience is a creature of the intellect; it must be informed to be of value.


