Farwell EMS now charging for services

The Farwell City Counci a go-ahead Tuesday to the rate structures for the ewly-formed "Farwell Em gency Medical Services." The EMS consists of the Farwell ambulance service foiks who have split off from he Farwell fire department. AMS.
As of Oct. 1, the EMS has begun charging fees for its services: The basic rate is $\$ 275$ plus $\$ 5$ per "loaded" mile, plus $\$ 30$ or oxygen if needed, and $\$ 30$ m. to 8 a molidays and weekends.
The Advanced Lifesaver ate (if an Advanced Life echnician is on the truck) is 325 per hour, plus the other fees. Currently, Joe Haseloff is the only EMS tech with this qualification.
For a non-emergency transport, the fee is $\$ 250$, plus the other rates.
The rates went into effect when the EMS signed up with ts billding company, which recommended the rate structure. EMS officials said it's comparable with other small bly lower than Texico's.
Once the rates are set, they annot be changed for five The EMS does not charge for having an ambulance at football games but will charge if a transport is made. It was noted that UIL rules don't mandate ambulances to be at the games, but must be on and by basis.
in coming months, the MS will be working diligently o get into state compliance state grants, some of which are very large.

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## Lazbuddie named 'Best Team Winners!'

What measures by Teresa Mesman
What measures 24 " $\times 24$ " $\times 24$ " and weighs only 24 It's the latest invention of a group of Lazbuddie High School students and it's a robot named "RAMROD."

RAMROD was designed and built by twenty-one science and mathematics students of Mrs. Debbie Weir and Mr. Ralph Welker as an entry into the "West Texas Best Robotics" competition sponsored annually by Texas Instruments and Texas Tech University's School of Engineering - IEEE.

Together, the students worked diligently to design, engineer and coordinate the support documentation for RAMROD over a six-week period of time. Their hard work Best competition when the Lazbuddie students were Best competition when the Lazbuddie students were
named "Best Team Winners," beating out much larger named "Best Team Winners," beating out much large schools lubbock's Coronado High School. The competition was held in the Allen Theater at Texas Tech University in Lubbock on Oct. 17

Lazbuddie was in fact, the only 1A school entered in the competition. There were 24 teams at the competition.

I'm so proud of these kids!" Mrs. Weir stated. "They worked for about four hours each night in the school shop on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays, plus they played in the band and in the football games. It took a lot of thei time, but they really had a great time working together on uch a challenging project.

The project comes in a box from Texas Instruments as


The Lazbuddie RAMROD robot is a fully functional ro bot that responds to signals from a remote transmitter.
a mass of parts, transmitters, speed controls and plywood. The design and engineering of the robot must be completely original and must be a fully functioning, working robot.

If the robot works, it is eligible for the competition. In the competition it must perform tasks within a certain time frame. This year, the robots were required to clean up a upper and lower level bins. The robots received 3 points for each piece of debris it discarded into an upper level bin and 1 point for discarding into a low level bin. The robot also received 5 points for picking up a CD-ROM off the floor. RAMROD did very well in its competition, but it was placed as 9 th overall.

The team proved unbeatable though in their school spirit, self-promotion and cheering on of each other and RAMROD at the competition. These factors were part of their being named Best Team. They also had strong documentation, a diary, business cards and an excellent, technological power point display that was run on a lap top computer for the judges.

This competition was designed by Texas Instruments and the School of Engineering to promote engineering studies and opportunities. Nine regional competitions are held throughout the State of Texas. This year, 175 robots made it to the regional comperions. This number has now Texas Best Robotics State competition on Oct 30 at Texas A\&M University in College Station, Texas.

videotaped documentary on the Lazbuddie Schools and the robotic design projects they (the Robotics team) are involving the 4th, 5 th and 6 th grade students in. They are also polishing their speaking skills to take part in a 30 minute oral presentation that is part of the state level competition.

## Armstrong sent to Grants for diagnostic evaluation

Court actions continued on Monday in the shooting death of Farwell resident Red Prather, owner of Play-o-rama in Texico, last December.
In September, the Curry County District Attorney's office announced that Billy J. Galvan, 18, and Ronald Armstrong, 19, both of Farwell, had pled guilty to second-degree felony charges, while Armstrong also pled guilty to conspiracy to armed robbery, a third degree felony.
DA Randy Harris said Tuesday that Armstrong pled guilty in court on Monday to conspiracy to armed robbery, a third degree felony; and accessory to armed robbery, a second degree felony.
Judge Stephen Quinn ordered Armstrong be sent to Grants, N.M., for up to 60 days for a diagnostic evaluation. After it's received, a sentencing hearing will be held.
Galvan has already pled guilty to accessory to armed robbery, a second degree felony, and is currently at the Grants facility undergoing a diagnostic evaluation.
Michael Treadway, 19, of Farwell, is charged with first degree murder, armed robbery with a deadly weapon, and conpiracy to commit armed robbery with a deadly weapon.
The state is seeking the death penalty against Treadway for the murder charge. A jury trial is set for March 29 through April 30, 1999.
Treadway is held without bond at the Curry County Adult Detention Center.

## Cloud seeding stops

Even though most of the area still needs moisture, High Plains Underground Water Conservation District officialis ended the 1998 summer precipitation enhancement program on Sept. 30.
Board President James Mitchell said it was the board's. consensus that "we do not need to add problems to the already stressed farming community by enhancing precipitation which might result in possible crop harvest delays.
However, due to the extreme moisture deficiency within the 5 -foot root zone soil profile at the end of the growing season, Mitchell said the district may begin the program earlier next year to increase the possibitios of getting soil profile for crop production.
We can see some serious problems, especially for dryland farmers, if the 1999 crop season starts with the soil profile as dry as ity heavier amounts of ground water during pre plant ir rigation, and that could have a considerable impact on the Ogallala Aquifer -- especially after the heavy pumpage that occurred during the 1998 irrigation season. It's for this reasot that we are considering an earlier start to the 1999 precipitation enhancement program," he said.

Smoke from forest fires in Mexico until mid-July and per sistent drought conditions reduced the opporturltes for prét cipitation enhancement activities within the 10 -million acre Texas/New Mexico target area this summer.
On a good note, since opportunities for cloud seding w vastly reduced this year, it resulted in unused budgetted fund that can be used to start next year's program earlier.
