The EMS consists of the Farwell ambulance service folks who have split off from the Farwell fire department.

Aloha Fulcher heads the EMS.

As of Oct. 1, the EMS has begun charging fees for its services:

The basic rate is \$275 plus \$5 per "loaded" mile, plus \$30 for oxygen if needed, and \$30 for "night charge" -- from 8 p.m. to 8 a.m., holidays and weekends.

The Advanced Lifesaver rate (if an Advanced Life technician is on the truck) is \$325 per hour, plus the other fees. Currently, Joe Haseloff is the only EMS tech with this qualification.

For a non-emergency transport, the fee is \$250, plus the other rates.

The rates went into effect when the EMS signed up with its billding company, which recommended the rate structure. EMS officials said it's comparable with other small town rates, and is considerably lower than Texico's.

Once the rates are set, they cannot be changed for five years.

The EMS does not charge for having an ambulance at football games but will charge if a transport is made. It was noted that UIL rules don't mandate ambulances to be at the games, but must be on "stand by" basis.

In the coming months, the EMS will be working diligently to get into state compliance so it will be eligible for many state grants, some of which

are very large. Within two years, the EMS folks said a new ambulance (or major repairs to current one) will be needed. They also spoke of the need for a copier and computer.

In other business, the council:

-- Approved rate increases for Duncan Disposal, the waste hauler for Farwell.

Earlier this month, Duncan raised its Texico rates, as reported in last week's Tribune. The reason given was the steep increase in fees charged by the Clovis landfill (up 84 percent).

As of Oct. 1, the monthly fee for residents will go from \$11.75 to \$13.16.

Other new rates are: 1.5 yard container 1 time a week, \$26.32; 3 yard container 1 time a week, \$52,64; 4 yard container 1 time a week, \$70.56.

It was noted that the new price structure is only guaranteed for 14 months, at which time the Clovis landfill may raise its fees.







The game started with Michael Ancira returning the kick 23 yards to the Farwell 29. An intentional grounding call against QB Tyler Chadwick was made while he was in the end zone, leading to a 2-0 Sundown lead at 10:34.







#### Football outlook is bright

The Wolverines are tied at 1-0 with Fort Sumner atop District 1-1A, with Questa at 1-1 and Springer at 0-2. The Wolverines host Springer tonight (Friday) and a win vaults the Wolverines into the state playoffs, regardless of how they do against Fort Sumner the following week.

Texico has a young team that is growing up rapidly under the tutelage of veteran coach David Lynn. Despite some key injuries, Lynn is molding his youthful team into a contender. The Wolverines are ranked No. 5 in the state Class A polls. Fort Sumner is rated No. 1, followed by Escalante, Hagerman and Reserve.

Farwell is in the driver's seat to make the playoffs for the first time in several years. In fact, the Steers have a good chance to win district for the first time since 1991. The Steers have defeated two top contenders, Sundown and Hale Center. And in Class 2A, the top three teams make the playoffs now.

The UIL has changed its rules to allow three teams in some districts to move on. Cynics feel the UIL did this to make more money for its bureaucracy.

Farwell and Bovina are tied atop District 4-2A with 2-0 records. Although season stats put Farwell ahead of the Mustangs, whenever these teams bang heads, the outcome is always close. And this year's game will be at Bovina on the last Friday of the regular season -- it could determine whether Farwell will be the district champion.

So, of Farwell's last regular season games, one team is 2-0 in district (Bovina) while the other two foes are Olton and Morton, both 0-2 in district.

The toughest road to the playoffs is faced by Lazbuddie. A make or break game for the Longhorns is scheduled tonight at Silverton. Both teams are 1-1, currently in 3rd place. Only the top two teams make the playoffs.

With 2-0 records are Amherst and Whitharral. Amherst beat the Longhorns two weeks ago. Also in the district are Three Way and Cotton Center, both at 0-2. But Three Way is 5-2 on the season, and is capable of beating any of the other teams in district.

Regardless of what security we select, it should meet our goals.

One of the basic tenets of investing is that it should not be done on impulse. Know what you want before you buy. Then, determine if your selection will do for what you want - in short, if it will meet your needs.

If, for example, you want your investment to give you income, then you must expect your choice to provide suitable dividends (stocks or equity investments provide dividends) or interest (bonds or debt securities produce interest) to meet your needs. In addition, you must be reasonably convinced that this income will be paid to you regularly and on time.

Whether you receive this income will depend on the ability of that particular corporation to meet its obligations. It is also generally true that the higher your yield or return, the more risk you assume.

A u.s. governmentguaranteed bond probably will not provide as much income as an unsecured note of a small corporation. On the other hand, the government bond will afford you more safety. So, if you're aiming for maximum income on your investment, chances are you're going to have to sacrifice a bit of safety. To put it another way, "There's no such thing as a free lunch."

If, on the other hand, income is secondary and you're after capital appreciation, then you probably should invest in securi-, ties you believe you may sell for more than you paid for them.

One thing you can be certain of, however, is that no stock or bond can simultaneously offer you minimum risk, attractive income and tremedous growth potential. If a security features one of these attributes, the others will be secondary or practically nonexistent. At certain times, however, it may be possible to obtain securities that potentially offer some modest combination of these features over a period of time.

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### Lazbuddie named 'Best Team Winners!'

What measures 24"x24"x24" and weighs only 24 pounds?

It's the latest invention of a group of Lazbuddie High School students and it's a robot named "RAMROD."

RAMROD was designed and built by twenty-one science and mathematics students of Mrs. Debbie Weir and Mr. Ralph Welker as an entry into the "West Texas Best Robotics" competition sponsored annually by Texas Instruments and Texas Tech University's School of Engineering - IEEE.

Together, the students worked diligently to design, engineer and coordinate the support documentation for RAMROD over a six-week period of time. Their hard work and determination paid off last week at the West Texas Best competition when the Lazbuddie students were named "Best Team Winners," beating out much larger schools like Odessa Permian, Midland High School and Lubbock's Coronado High School. The competition was held in the Allen Theater at Texas Tech University in Lubbock on Oct. 17.

Lazbuddie was in fact, the only 1A school entered in the competition. There were 24 teams at the competition.

"I'm so proud of these kids!" Mrs. Weir stated. "They worked for about four hours each night in the school shop on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays, plus they played in the band and in the football games. It took a lot of their time, but they really had a great time working together on such a challenging project."

The project comes in a box from Texas Instruments as

a mass of parts, transmitters, speed controls and plywood. The design and engineering of the robot must be completely original and must be a fully functioning, working robot.

If the robot works, it is eligible for the competition. In the competition it must perform tasks within a certain time frame. This year, the robots were required to clean up a mock toxic waste dump and put the debris and trash into upper and lower level bins. The robots received 3 points for each piece of debris it discarded into an upper level bin and 1 point for discarding into a low level bin. The robot also received 5 points for picking up a CD-ROM off the floor. RAMROD did very well in its competition, but it was placed as 9th overall.

The team proved unbeatable though in their school spirit, self-promotion and cheering on of each other and RAMROD at the competition. These factors were part of their being named Best Team. They also had strong documentation, a diary, business cards and an excellent, technological power point display that was run on a lap top computer for the judges.

This competition was designed by Texas Instruments and the School of Engineering to promote engineering studies and opportunities. Nine regional competitions are held throughout the State of Texas. This year, 175 robots made it to the regional competitions. This number has now been narrowed down to 26 robots that will compete in the Texas Best Robotics State competition on Oct. 30 at Texas A&M University in College Station, Texas.

RAMROD and the Lazbuddie team will be there ready to show how students in a 1A school know their stuff! They're gearing up for the competition by preparing a videotaped documentary on the Lazbuddie Schools and the robotic design projects they (the Robotics team) are involving the 4th, 5th and 6th grade students in. ### Cloud seeding stops

Even though most of the area still needs moisture, High Plains Underground Water Conservation District officials ended the 1998 summer precipitation enhancement program on Sept. 30.

Board President James Mitchell said it was the board consensus that "we do not need to add problems to the already stressed farming community by enhancing precipitation which might result in possible crop harvest delays."

However, due to the extreme moisture deficiency within the 5-foot root zone soil profile at the end of the growing season, Mitchell said the district may begin the program earlier next year to increase the possibilities of getting moisture into the soil profile for crop production.

"We can see some serious problems, especially for drylands." farmers, if the 1999 crop season starts with the soil profile as dry as it is now or even drier. Farmers who irrigate would have to apply heavier amounts of ground water during pre-plant irrigation, and that could have a considerable impact on the Ogallala Aquifer -- especially after the heavy pumpage that occurred during the 1998 irrigation season. It's for this reason, well City Park the weekend of Oct. 10-11. City emthat we are considering an earlier start to the 1999 precipitation enhancement program," he said.

Smoke from forest fires in Mexico until mid-July and persistent drought conditions reduced the opportunities for precipitation enhancement activities within the 10-million acre Texas/New Mexico target area this summer.

On a good note, since opportunities for cloud seeding wa vastly reduced this year, it resulted in unused budgeted funds that can be used to start next year's program earlier.
