The field demonstration day will focus on the installation and management of drip irrigation systems, according to High Plains Water District Assistant Manager Ken Carver.
Drip irrigation is the slow, frequent application of small amounts of water to the soil area directly surrounding plant roots.
The drip tape is installed on 20 acres at this site and has been in operation since February 1997. Owens' system operates in a series of three stations.
High Plains Water District personnel will be on hand to answer producers' questions and demonstrate various wa ter conservation techniques, including soil moisture montoring with gypsum block and resistance meters, use of Potential Evapotranspiration ion, and design and installa ton, and design and installston of a drip irrigation sys-
ten, as well as pump plant energy use efficiency testing. CARLTON

## What's a feed yard all about?

We all know that the feed yards don't smell like daisies, but what do they do out their anyway?
ing towel Feed Yard has been around sense the 60's, according to manager Bob Mab. During that time, the purpose of the feed yard is to produce cattle that are ready for slaughter. Right now, they employ 24 people to get this job done. The jobs at the feed yard range from office clerks to cowboys that ride through every single one of the pins each day and check for sick cattle.
When the cattle first come in to the feed yard, they only weigh 600 to 800 pounds. It's the feed yard's job to get the cattle up to par before they are sold. To raise the cattle's weight they feed them corn, milo, alfalfa hay, molasses, and a pelleted feed three times a day. The cattle grow at an out standing rate of speed, three pounds every day when the weather is good. Even when the weather is bad, they still gain
about two and a half pounds a day, said Tabb.
The cattle normally take about 140 days to get heavy enough to slaughter. During the duration of their stay at the feed yard they gain enough weight to weigh about 1,150 to $1,250 \mathrm{lbs}$. That means that they gain about 550 to 650 lbs while at the feed yard.
Out of the 2,600 head of cattle at the feed yard right now, the majority are not owned by the Farwell Feed Yard. Most are care of local form and ranchers. The feed yard takes care o
ers.
When
When the cattle finally weigh the proper amount, most them are sold to Excel. There are some cattle that are sent to slaughter in Amarillo and Dumas, though.
