## Hizzoner De Mare

Watching the election campaign this year brought back memories of growing up in Chicago, where politics is king.

It was definitely more exciting than a Parmer County election. In Chicago's old days, people who were dead and buried got to register to vote. And they even voted!

Periodically, the Chicago newspapers "exposed" this type of hanky panky, much to no one's surprise. Yet it continued, as did the all-powerful Chicago Democratic Machine.

I'm hard put to be critical of that famed Machine, since one of my wife's relatives was its co-founder. But it has provided many a chuckle over the years.

Every four years, the Republicans would put up a sacrificial lamb to be led to slaughter at the hands of Hizzoner De Mare (an affectionate title) Richard J. Daley. The GOP mayoral candidates, who even lacked traditional business community support, always put it this way: "Our polls show it will be close. We've worked hard and a lot of independent and undecided voters are swinging over to our cause. With a heavy voter turnout, we stand an even chance of defeating the Machine. People are sick and tired of letting the Machine run this city."

Ha. When you have voters legally dead casting ballots for the Machine, "an even chance" is far from reality. Sure, there was a heavy turnout sometimes. But the turnout was in the Machine wards on the South Side.

Thus, each four years during Mayor Daley's terms, the vote was a predictable landslide for him. I even read a book once on why it was impossible for a Machine candidate (backed by thousands of city employees) to lose an election for mayor. Impossible, they said.

That is, until Michael Bilandic was picked as mayor following Mayor Daley's demise. Bilandic lost the Democratic primary despite Machine backing in a classic case of political foolhardiness.

The primary was held in April. The winter before the Bilandic-Jane Byrne primary struggle was especially harsh in Chicago, with heavy snow and bitter cold.

Because of that double dose from Old Man Winter, more commuters to Downtown (the "Loop") forgot about driving and went to take the "El" (elevated subway), a very comprehensive train network throughout Chicago and its suburbs.

Well, the trains were not equipped to handle the extra-heavy load of passengers. So some of the trains, full of commuters from the Chicago suburbs, where their runs started at, would not stop at the city train stations -- because they had no more room for passengers.

Try to see yourself standing at a railroad station in minus-10 degree weather, watching YOUR train shoot past without stopping. Would you say, "Oh darn" or "Gee whiz?" I've got a feeling that it might be something else.

Couple that with the fact that the city workers had real problems clearing the snow from the streets (it takes work to do something like that and Machine employees frowned at that innovation) and city residents couldn't drive anywhere (more "darns").

And what did Mayor Bilandic do about this sorry mess? Little. He

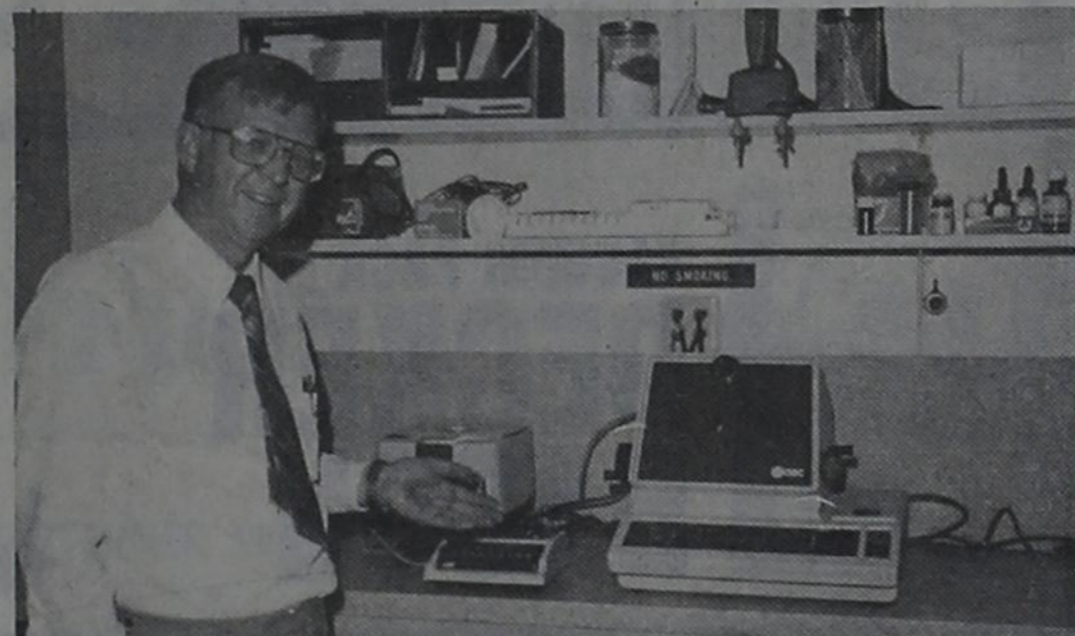
Both ladies received \$7.50 cash prizes.

## Farwell Clinic equipped with blood-count machine

For the first time, the Farwell Clinic is equipped to do complete blood counts thanks to the hospital district, which bought the new machine for this purpose, along with Dr. William Green, who also supplies the chemicals for the machine.

Until now, the doctor has had to wait for six days to get the results of a blood count back from Path Lab in El Paso, Texas, where he previously had to send them. Now, Dr. Green says he can have the results

within an hour.

Before, the nursing home patients often had to ride to Clovis in an ambulance for a blood test, but that will no longer be necessary, either. And tests done by this machine have been accepted for Medicare benefits.

The new machine does the platelet count, lymph/mono count, granulocyte count, total white cell count, and hematocrit.

## 1984 harvest looking good

With the corn harvest nearly finished, and the grain sorghum just starting, due to a delay caused by the wet weather, this year's harvest is looking pretty good.

According to Martin Chandler of the ASCS office in Farwell, most of the corn in Parmer County has been harvested. That corn which is still in the field has mostly fallen, but it is being picked up, and most of it is being saved.

"The nice sunny weather we've been having has allowed for a startup on the grain sorghum harvest," stated Chandler. He also said that some of the sorghum has started to fall, but the harvest still looks good.

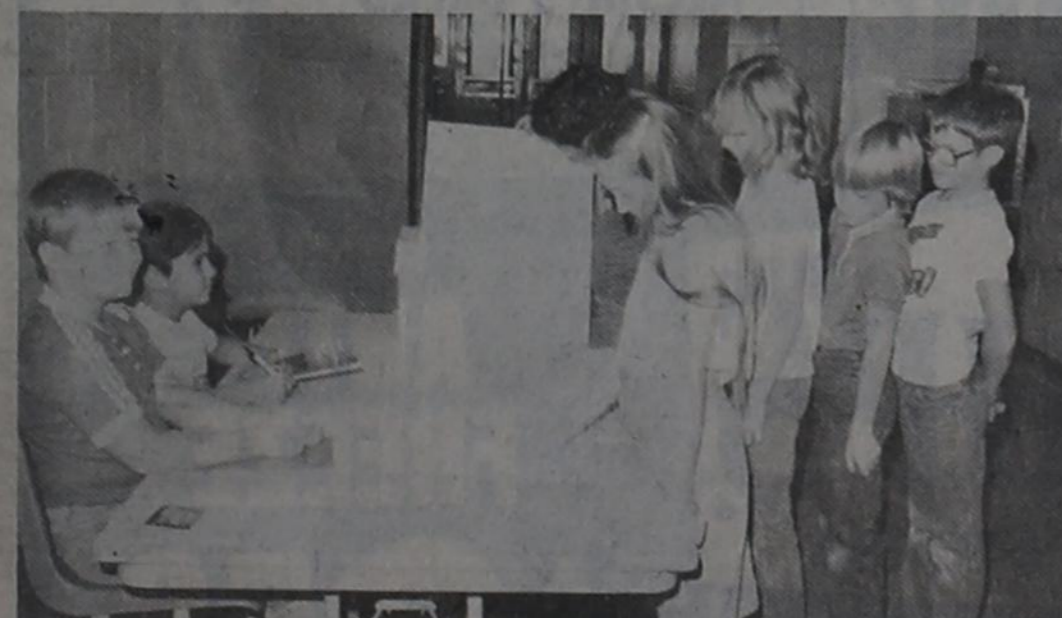

## Teacher's aide to be hired

The Farwell School Board Monday night agreed to hire a teacher's aide for the first grade, pending state approval.

In other business, the board: --Approved the following graduation dates: May 26, 1985, 8 p.m., baccalaureate; May 30, 1985, 7:30 p.m., 8th grade graduation; and May 31, 1985, 8 p.m., commencement.

--Named the following to the Textbook Selection Committee: Supt. Roberts; principals Lynn Burton, Jerry Dee Owen and James Craig, and teachers Dorris White, Ed Wees, Eva Dean Stephens, Jo Lynda Robbs, Frances Boling, Rex Cumpton, Leesa Stephens, Billie Worley, Billie Carlyle, Nelle Craig and Lynn Roberts.

--Heard from Supt. Roberts that 10 applications have been received for his job. He announced in Sep-

tember he would resign at the end of the current school year. The board will meet Nov. 19 to begin screening applications.

--Agreed to offer for sale two houses the board owns at 702 Fifth St. and 506 Eighth St. Bids will be opened Dec. 10. The board has the right to refuse the bids if it so chooses.

--Appointed the superintendent and three principals to the Career Ladder Committee, with two teachers also to be named to it. The board has about \$12,000, from the state to give extra pay raises to qualified teachers. Up to eight teachers can benefit.

Roberts, Burton and Owen will serve on the committee considering teachers with last names starting from A to M; Roberts, Burton and Craig will be on the committee to consider teachers whose last names start from N to Z.

--Noted that the band bus was late coming back from Odessa Saturday night. Richard Haseloff suggested that band officials call ahead to Farwell to leave a message when it appears the students will be back later than expected.

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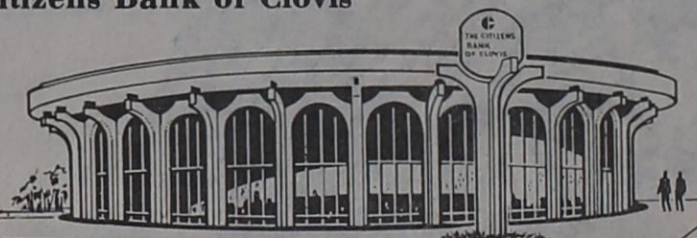

This week, Farwell brings its 5-1 record against Nazareth.

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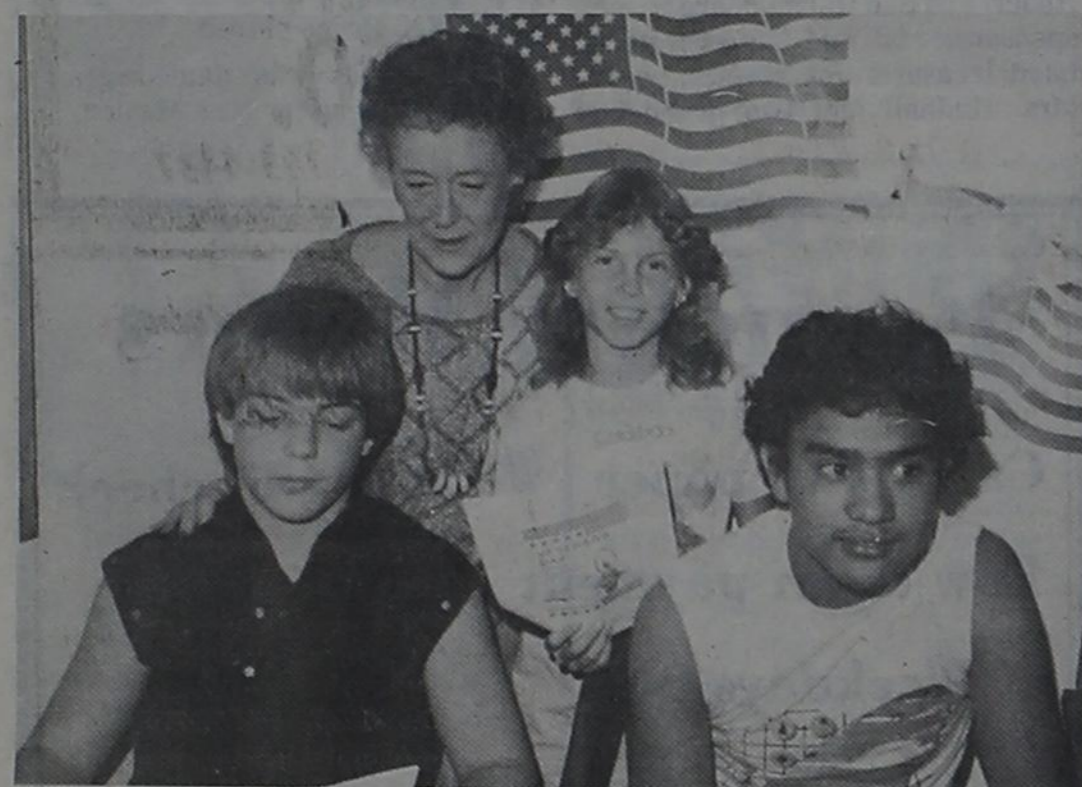

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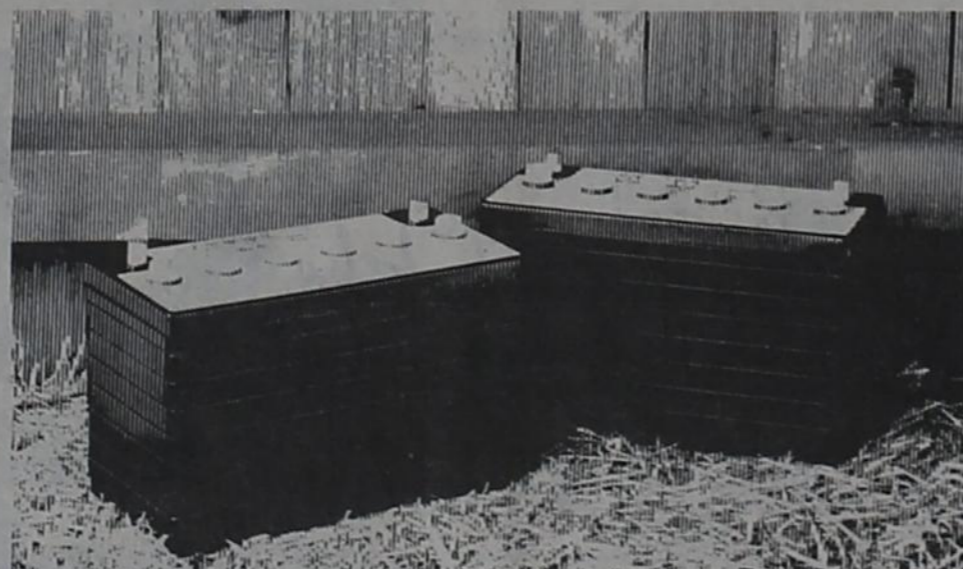
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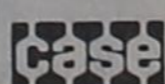


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Cheryl Scott, No. 10, spikes one past an Elida defender

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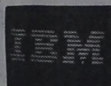

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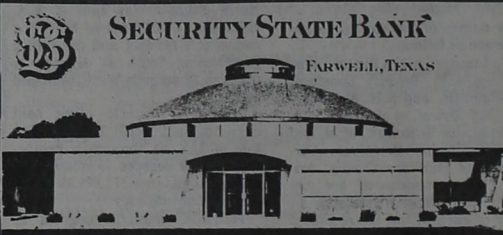
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
