Bennett's enjoy the Olympics

If Ramsey Bennett is asked to write an essay on "How I Spent My Summer Vacation" when she returns to school next week, she'll have quite a lot to write about. Ramsey spent her vacation at the Olympic Games in Atlanta and she saw history in the making.

Ramsey won the trip to the Olympics through the Avon "Achieve The Dream" sweepstakes. She had filled out a sweepstakes questionnaire provided by local Avon representative Annette Black. Ramsey was one of only eight consumer winners selected to win an all-expense paid trip for four. She received word about her selection the second week in June, while she was at camp in Dallas.

"My mom called and asked me if I remembered signing up for the sweepstakes," Ramsey said. "I said that I did and then she told me that I had won the trip. I was really excited!"

The trip provided a great opportunity for a once-in-a-lifetime family vacation for Ramsey and her family. Her mother Ruth Anne, sister Roslyn and brother Reace travelled with her to Atlanta on July 29. Their trip was somewhat overshadowed by the recent bombing incident at Centennial Park.

"We knew that security was going to be tight everywhere that we went, so we were pretty prepared," Ramsey said. "It wasn't bad though, the crowds still flowed very well and it didn't take that long to have the security guards check your bags and purses."

Because of the Avon sweepstakes, the family was treated to a wide variety of Olympic events and side programs. Avon hosted a hospitality suite at the hotel they were staying in and they provided a breakfast each morning at the hotel restaurant. The sweepstakes winners were brought in "waves" throughout the Olympics. These waves were made up of company employee and manager winners and families and the consumer winners and families. There were 130 people in the wave group that the Bennett's were in for the four days that they were in Atlanta.

One of the highlights of the trip was a dinner that Avon hosted called "The Olympic Woman" Celebration Dinner. This dinner featured Olympic athletes and ambassadors Janet Evans, Nancy Hogshead and Alice Coachman. Janet and Nancy were both swimmers and Alice was a member of the track & field team in 1948, she was in the high jump and was also the first African-American woman to win a gold medal.

These athletes spoke at the dinner and then mingled with and talked with the guests. Ramsey got each of their autographs and some great pictures with each of them. The dinner also featured a video entitled "A Dream Fulfilled" and it highlighted the efforts made by women athletes all over the world. Each of the guests at the dinner were also given a limited edition Olympic collectors pin set.

Pin trading is an Olympic tradition and it attracts collectors from all over the world and of all ages. The first pins were designed as colorful badges to identify athletes, officials and media. At the Athens Games in 1896, the athletes began trading their pins as gestures of goodwill. Pin trading has been dubbed the "most popular spectator sport of the Olympic Games."

For serious pin collectors, trading has become big business. According to Ramsey, traders lined the streets that led up to the Olympic Games area.

"They would lay out big towels that had pins from all over the world, from past Olympic Games and corporate sponsors," she said. "The price of pins ranged from about \$4 to hundreds of dollars."

Pin trading is typically an easy and enjoyable way for most attendees to meet people from all over the world. Ramsey spent most of her time in Centennial Park trading pins and talking to other traders.

"Sometimes, there was a language barrier and we had to figure out ways to communicate. Somehow, we managed to understand each other. It was fun talking to people from other countries," she said.

The athletic events that Ramsey and her family won tickets to were Track & Field, Baseball, Badminton, Women's Basketball and Men's Handball. They were part of the crowd that got to see Carl Lewis win the gold medal in the Long Jump and Michael Johnson make history by breaking his own world record in the 400 Meters. They were sitting in some choice seats that made seeing the events even more fun. They were 19 rows off of the track and very close to the long jump pit.

The Baseball game they saw was the United States vs. the Netherlands. The U.S. won 17 - 1. From there they went to the Badminton venue, where they saw the men's mixed doubles with Korea vs. China and then the men's singles with Denmark vs. Indonesia.

Texas releases school ratings

The Texas Education Agency has released its annual accountability ratings and Farwell Schools fared well.

Farwell School Supt. Richard Boothby was very pleased with the ratings. Farwell's accreditation status was "recognized."

As for the three campuses, ratings were: Farwell High, exemplary; Farwell Junior High, recognized; and Farwell Elementary, acceptable.

The rating system goes in this order:

Exemplary is first, followed by recognized, acceptable, and low performing.

Boothby was happy because the statistics showed positive increases in most categories.

For the entire district, reading scores were up 1.8 percent; math scores were up 3.3 percent, and writing scores were up 6.7 percent.

Since the same students are involved, this shows major improvement, he noted.

As for the elementary school ratings, reading scores were up 7.1 percent; math scores were up 2.9 percent, and writing scores were up a whopping 20 percent.

Also, Farwell High's "exemplary" rating was the second year in a row it had achieved that status.

But one area school didn't fare as well. Saturday's Lubbock newspaper carried a Page 1 story on the ratings, noting that Bovina Schools was one of only 12 districts in Texas that were ranked "academically unacceptable" by the Texas Education Agency.

The story quoted Bovina School Supt. Sue Nuttall as saying Bovina landed in the lowest category because it failed to meet the state's dropout standards in two student subgroups, lower socioeconomic and Hispanic.

To be rated acceptable, a district or individual school campus must have a dropout rate of 6 percent or less for each subgroup. The attendance rate is to be 94 percent or higher (Farwell had a 97 percent attendance rate, for example).

Ms. Nuttall said Bovina had problems because some students attended school there briefly, then returned home; also, some gang members moved into the district, then left after they ran into problems with the law.

She noted that Bovina Elementary School achieved recognized status in the ratings.

Lazbuddie School Supt. Phil Warren said his school, considered one campus, achieved an "acceptable" rating.

He said that one subgroup scored below 70 percent

(Hispanics in math) that prevented Lazbuddie from achieving "exemplary" status.

Warren said the SAT and ACT scores had "exemplary" status. More than 85 percent of Lazbuddie's students took them with 35 percent scoring over the 24 mark.

"I felt pretty good about our overall scores, but we need to improve in math," said Warren. "If the individual scores had been broken out, for ex-

ample, our elementary school would have had "exemplary" status. But improvements are needed at the secondary level."

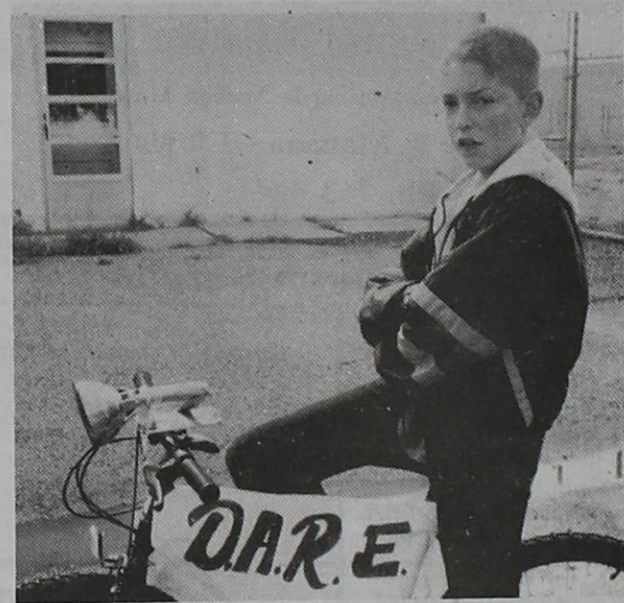
Of the three key statistics, two showed increases over last year and one was down: reading was at 88.7 percent, up 3.0 percent over last year; math was at 80.4 percent, up 4.1 percent; and writing was at 86.8 percent, down 5 percent.

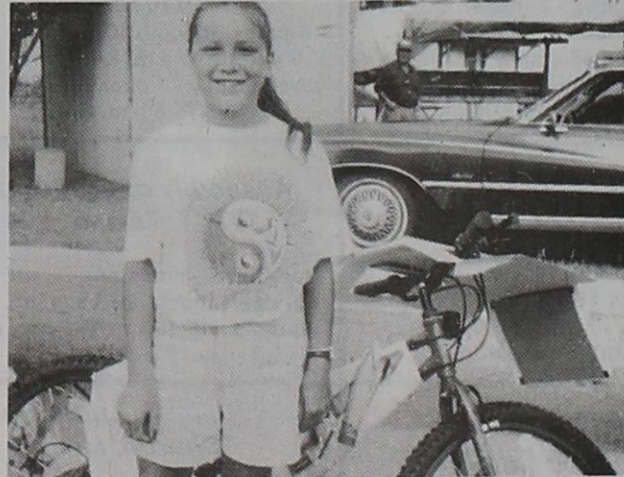

"It was very interesting to see this game being played on this level," Ramsey said. "We think of the game as just a backyard game played with a plastic birdie. But in the Scandinavian countries, the Middle East and most other parts of the world, Badminton is a very serious, competitive game."

The object that the players hit is never called a "birdie." It is a "shuttlecock" and it is made out of real goose feathers. After every major volley, the players requested a new shuttlecock because of the force that it was being hit with. They could destroy one in a matter of minutes.

The Women's Basketball games that they saw were China vs. Zaire and Korea vs. Canada. The Men's Handball games they saw were Algeria vs. Brazil and the first Olympic win ever by the U.S. vs. Kuwait.

"We didn't know what to expect going into the Handball games because we didn't know about the game. It is a cross between basketball, soccer and a little bit of American Football," Ramsey said. "Some of the people that were in our group understood the game and helped us to learn all about it. It is a very competitive and high scoring game. The players can throw the ball very hard and they are very physical."

The family was very impressed at how friendly everyone in Atlanta and around the games were. The city and Olympic areas were very easy to get around in and the weather was excellent while they were there. It rained at least once a day and that kept it pretty cool.

"The spectators were filled with such high energy and that made each of the events that much more meaningful," Ramsey said. "Another great thing was that 'The Wave' was done in the audience in just about every event."

One of the pins that Ramsey collected was one that featured the Olympic Mascot "Izzy." When asked what the creature was or represented, no one ever seemed to know the answer.

"Izzy really isn't anything at all," Ramsey said. "The reason it's named Izzy is because people kept asking 'what is he?'"

It was also explained to the Bennett's that the mascot was developed in a way that would not cause any racial tension. The Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games felt that it was best to find a creature or symbol that would not represent or offend anyone. The Izzy mascot was not a success at the Games.

Ramsey is now looking forward to going to another Olympic Games. She and her family are going to do their best to go to the games in Sydney, Australia in the year 2000.

Pomper told her that the BTD Committee has authorized the Express to be used only for Texico-Farwell functions.

-- Heard Pomper say that he has arranged with Cy Koehn, of Pleasant Hill, to do annual maintenance on the Express.

and 1120 Wheeler to Clovis hospital.

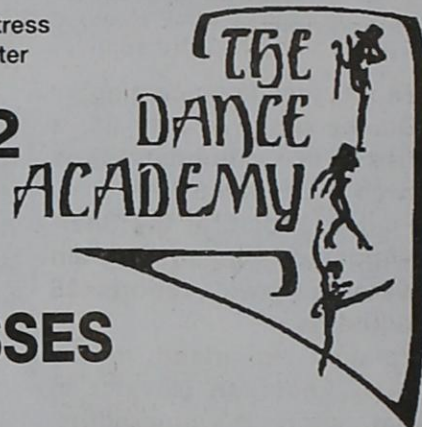

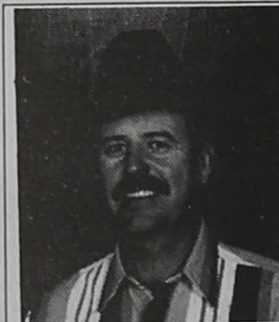

Recipe of Week

Elegant Meringue Heart
2 large egg whites at room temperature
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/4 cup red currant jelly
2 cups mixed strawberries, cantaloupe, honeydew and seedless grapes
1/2 cup whipped cream cheese
Mint sprigs

2 tablespoons at a time, beating until stiff peaks form. Spoon or pipe over heart outline on foil, building sides to make a shell for the fruit. Bake in preheated oven 45 minutes or until dry and just barely changing color. Turn oven off and leave meringue in oven 1 hour. Remove meringue shell from foil and store in airtight container at room temperature. (You can store in airtight container for up to two days, or freeze for up to two weeks.) Melt currant jelly over low heat; cool to room temperature. Combine fruit in shallow bowl; set aside. Combine 1 tablespoon melted jelly with whipped cream cheese in a small bowl. Just before serving, stir remain-

ing jelly into prepared fruit. Spoon fruit into center of meringue. Spoon cream cheese mixture over fruit or serve separately and garnish with mint sprigs.

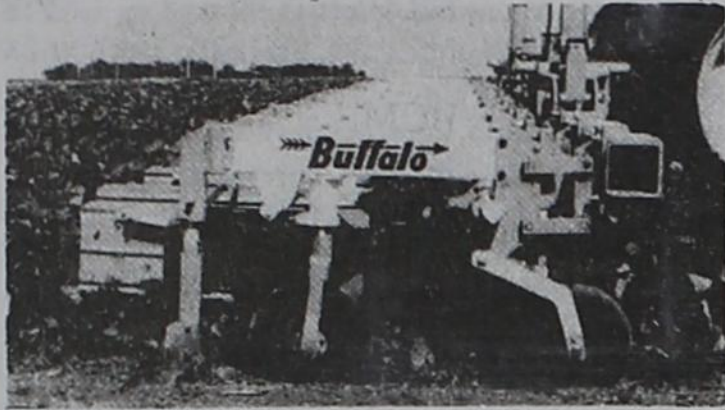

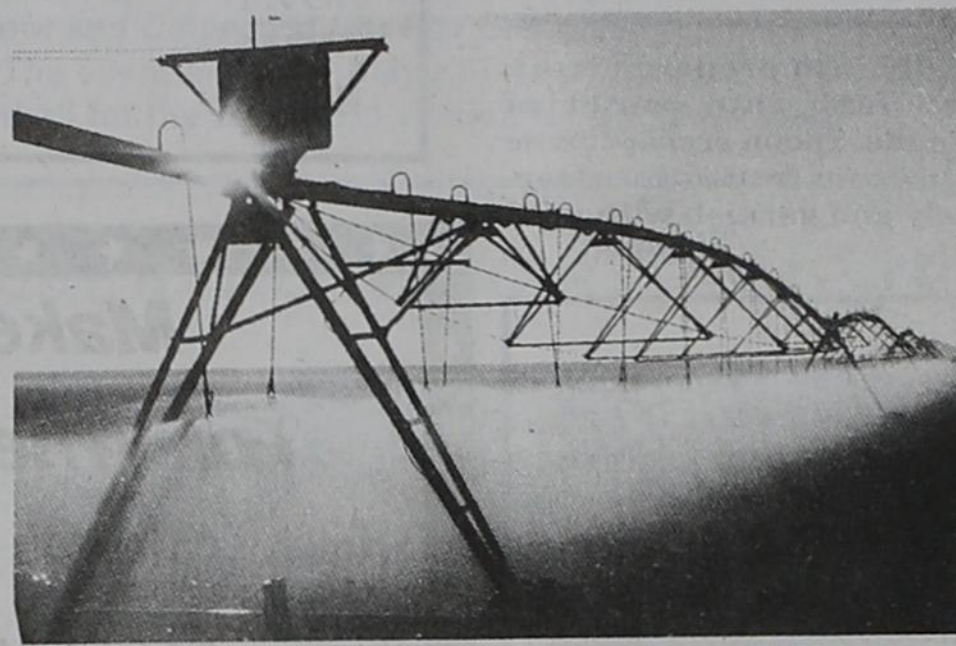

Cotton survey conducted

Extension agents on the High Plains have conducted their second large plant survey of cotton conditions. From July 23-26, they inspected 400 fields.

Parmer County has experienced good growing conditions with warm weather and much needed rainfall. Both boll and square retention is adequate, they found.

On average, dryland cotton was 12 inches tall with 11 nodes generating a height to node ratio of 1.07 inches/node. Dryland cotton has excellent horsepower as shown by NAWF's of 6 or above.

Irrigated fields were on average 17 inches tall with 13 nodes for a height to node ratio of 1.28.

Cotton is on target to recover much of the yield potential lost due to the adverse spring weather. How much of that potential is regained will depend on August and September weather. The next plant map survey will be conducted at the end of the month and should focus closer on crop prospects.
