# Sheriff's office records checked

At the request of the Parmer County Commissioners, Kirkland, Kirkland & Co., CPA, also examined various records in the Parmer County sheriff's office "due to the changes in personnel."

Walt Yerger was appointed county sheriff by the commissioners on May 1 following the resignation of Rex Williams.

After Yerger took office, it was discovered that some equipment was missing. Authorities said the equipment has been returned.

Based on the examination, CPA Jack Allen Kirkland recommended the following:

1. An inventory list should be maintained of certain equipment, i.e., guns, cameras, etc., belonging to the sheriff's office. Controls should be established to monitor the assets as to their location and the parties responsible for them.

2. There should be supporting documentation for each expenditure made from the sheriff's funds.

3. Each request for payment submitted to the county treasurer should be complete and accurate. The request should include the signature of the authorized personnel requesting the payment and a copy of support for the expenditure (.eg., invoice, sales ticket, snipping notice, credit card receipt, etc.). 4. Business lunches should be documented as to a listing of the parties who were furnished a meal, the business purpose of the meal, and the business that was discussed to

### **Pest Management** Update

**Parmer County** Entomologist **Cherinell Riley** 

More than a few people have told me I couldn't have picked a better year to come here because I'm getting to see a practically worse case scenario for Parmer and Bailey Counties. The season began with heavy thrips migrations from the wheat into the cotton. Edgar Walters of Hub comments that "temperatures are 20 degrees above normal to 20 degrees below normal," when Parmer and Bailey experienced the sudden cold spell in May.

Dryland cotton didn't make and it looks the same for the grain sorghum planting that followed the dryland cotton. In addition to little to no rain, producers also experienced some severe sand burned and hail damaged cotton which resulted in having to replant in some areas in June.

Now, with the extreme 101 plus temperatures and harsh wind, not to mention the lack of rain, much of the area corn exhibits an uneven or "wavy" affect. This is due to the lack of extra moisture normally accumulated from rainfall. Corn is tasseling earlier than usual because of the stress of the season. Ordinarily, corn is over "head high" before tasseling, however, there is debate on how much an early tassel affects the corn yield. I'm not sure if Parmer and Bailey were ever officially declared to be in a brought, but area corn producers certainly think so.

As for the Boll Weevil, Dr. Jim Leser, Extension Cotton Entomologist at Lubbock, says that Parmer County's boll weevil activity is not varying in either direction in contrast to last years activity according to the Agri-Partners Grid Trap Line. However, Parmer County did catch it's first boll weevil one month earlier than last year. In 1997, the first boll weevil was trapped in June, but in 1998, the first was trapped on May 12.

### Sprinkler use advice given

#### By Greg Qualls

Everybody wants a green yard during the summer, but the recent shortage of water has promoted people to conserve their water. Here are some tips from Don Brumfield, of Green Thumb Nurseries in Clovis, to help you water your yard more efficiently the first time, so you can save water.

Brumfield said it is best to water your yard in the morning. There is less wind and it gives the plants a good drink of water before the day starts. Also, when you water at night the water sets on the grass till morning and this promotes fungus growth.

When watering during these hot weeks, you need to put about two inches of water on your yard a week. You can use a rain gauge, or if you don't have one, use anything with straight sides and a flat bottom, size doesn't matter. Then just measure with a ruler.

Brumfield said that one of the biggest problems this summer people have had is that they are not giving their yard enough water. "Seventy-five percent of the people that call me are not watering their yards enough," he said.

In addition to watering your lawns this summer you should water your trees and shrubs once every two weeks. When you just water the lawn, the grass steals the water from them since the tree roots are deep in the ground. So, you need to give them a deep watering with a sprinkler or just the hose.

If you follow these suggestions, you should have a green yard that is watered right the first time. And you will be doing it as inexpensively as possible.

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

## The Chief's Corner

### **Troubling statistics**

From Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:

Over 300 names will be added to the total number of names on the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial bringing the number of names on the memorial to 14,622. Since the monument was dedicated in 1991, there have been 2,105 new names added, or an average of 300 per year.

One hundred and sixty of the officers added to the memorial this year were killed in 1997, representing a 21% increase over 1996. The other 145 died in previous years but were just recently discovered by Memorial researchers. Of the 10 officers killed in 1997, 67 were shot to death, 45 died in automobile accidents, 14 were struck by vehicles, 11 succumbed to jobrelated illnesses, six were killed during falls, five were knifed to death, five lost their lives in aircraft accidents, four died in motorcycle accidents, one was strangled, one died in a bombrelated incident, and one officer was struck and killed by a train.

For the fourth straight year, California ranked as the deadliest state for the law enforcement profession, with 16 police fatalities. Texas followed with 11 deaths, then Illinois and Florida with eight deaths each and Indiana and Georgia with seven deaths each.

Six of the officers who died were killed by juveniles, which is part of a continuing and troubling trend. During the past 10 years, more than 100 cop killers were under the age of 18 when they murdered a police officer. Another troubling statistic was the high number of alcohol-related police fatalities. Alcohol was the contribution factor in at least 19 deaths, where officers were killed by drunk drivers or murdered by people who had been drinking.



HEAVENLY SUNDAE PIE

Recipe of Week

1 cup Quaker oats (quick or old fashioned, uncooked)

8 servings

- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour 4 tablespoons margarine,
- melted 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1 quart fat-free vanilla ice cream, slightly softened
- 2 cups fresh fruit such as blueberries, raspberries, sliced strawberries, sliced bananas or pitted sweet cherries
- 1/2 cup fat-free fudge sauce, warmed slightly

Heat oven to 350°F. Spray 9inch pie plate with non-stick cooking spray. In medium bowl, combine oats, flour, margarine, brown sugar and water; mix well. Press firmly onto bottom and sides of pie plate. Bake 18 to 20 minutes or until golden brown. Cool completely on wire rack. Spoon softened ice cream into cooled crust, spreading evenly and smoothing top. Cover and freeze until firm, about 5 hours. Remove pie from freezer 10 to 15 minutes before serving. Cut into wedges; top with fruit and fudge sauce.

# Wilcox sentenced to prison

Sentencing was held in U.S. District Court in Lubbock on July 2 concerning bank fraud charges against Terry Wilcox, former owner of Friona Motors.

He was sentenced to six months in prison, followed by six months in a halfway house in Lubbock, followed by a supervised release of five years.

He is to report to prison by July 23.

Also, he must pay restitution of \$164,000. This includes \$129,000 to Lubbock National Bank and \$34,000 to Friona State Bank.

No fine was levied against Wilcox because of the defendant's inability to pay, court records said.

Restitution payments are to begin while Wilcox is in prison and the balance shall be payable through monthly installments of at least \$400.

Charges against Wilcox centered on transactions in which titles to vehicles were never processed after the vehicles were bought at his dealership.

Friona Motors has since closed.

# 1998 -- a record year ... unfortunately

By Brent Bean, extension agronomist


Regardless of rainfall and temperatures for the rest of the growing season, 1998 will long be remembered by corn farmers as one of the driest and hottest summers on record. All things considered, as of July 1, most of the corn appears to be in resonably good condition due to several factors.

First, farmers in recent years have realized the importance of matching the number of acres of corn they plant to their irrigation capacity. Generally this is around 5.5 gallons perminute per acre or 2 inches of water per acre each week. Second, adoption of the use of irrigation systems that are very effecient in delivering water to the crop.

However, we are now entering into the most critical growth period for the corn crop. This period is usually defined as two weeks prior to tasseling to the blister stage of the corn. Because of the high water demand of the crop during this time, we usually want to have the soil profile full of water by July 1.

However, because of recent drought conditions and high temperatures experience in May and June, a full profile of water has been very difficult to achieve for most corn farmers. The result is that the crop will likely suffer from water stress during the next three weeks even under the most optimistic weather conditions.

Research has shown that yield reduction of 25% can occur if corn is stressed due to lack of adequate water during the tasseling stage and as much as 50% during silking, pollination, and early grain fill. The effect on yield will be minimized by

whatever soil moisture is available from rainfall and irrigation, even if it is not sufficient to fully meet the needs of the crop.

Some producers are considering abandoning a portion of their corn acres in order to concentrate their water on less acres. This option should only be considered for those producers who have less than 5 gallons of water per minute per acre available to their crop and who have depleted their deep soil moisture supply.

Producers in the Dalhart area may get by on less water due to less ET demand on the crop in this area of the Panhandle. For most producers, too much money has been spent on the crop at this point to abandon acres. Abandoned acres would likely not make any grain if not at least partially irrigated during the next three weeks. By at least partially meeting the water demand of the crop, some grain will be produced on all of the acres.

When looking at historical records, there is no correlation of rainfall amounts that occur in May and June to that which occurs in July and August. In other words --- don't give up yet, we still may get some help form Mother Naure.

In 1994, rainfall was less than two-thirds of normal for the months of May and June. In addition, June was exceptionally hot. In that year, when irrigation amount was reduced to 80% compared to fully irrigated corn, yield was reduced 13%. When irrigation was reduced to 60% of the crops need, yield was reducd 30%. Unforunately, if rainfall does not begin to occur soon much of the areas corn will not receive more than 70% the water needed to produce optimum yields. Considering that last year the area produced over 160 million bushels of corn, at \$2.60 a bushel the impact on the area coud easily reach \$100 million.

The final impact of this year's drought and high temperatures cannot be predicted at this time. Clearly yields have already been effected, but to what degree will largely be determined by weather conditions that occur during the next two to four weeks.




