


Union treasurer Cynthia Smith was suspended from her job as a computer science instructor at Friona High School.




We may have a record high temperature on Jan. 2. It was in the mid-70's, a very springlike day.



Farwell's Will Anderson A tribute to the wardogs

By WILL ANDERSON

(Editor's note: U.S. Navy Commander Will Anderson, a Farwell High graduate, is the son of Bob and Carrie Anderson. Periodically over the years, he has sent articles about his postings as features for the Tribune. Currently, he is stationed in Guam. Following is one of several articles he has sent us about that fascinating island.)

Muleshoe is justifiably proud of being the home to the National Mule Memorial, a tribute to the hardy and stubborn animal which has served the USA so well in our history. But Guam has its tribute to another noble animal, to the wardogs of the U.S. Marine Corps, who gave their lives in the liberation of this island from the Japanese in World War Two. These dogs did not have bits in their mouth, sticks on their back, or carrots dangled in front of their face. And they would not work for just anyone, they lived and died to protect and serve their brother Marines, and no one else.

During the invasion and in the months thereafter of searching for Japanese soldiers hiding in the caves and jungles of this island, the wardogs saved lives every way they could. They alerted Marines of coming attacks, they carried messages under fire, they "took the point" on patrols to detect mines and draw fire, they explored dark caves which may or may not have contained desperate Japanese soldiers. The National Museum at the invasion beaches at Asan has a display for those brave animals, telling of the wardog who posted himself by his Marine's grave and stayed there until he died himself.

One of the wardogs, named Tam, was buried at sea with full honors, but the other 24-killed-in-actions were buried together in the jungle near Yigo. Two years ago, a new monument was put up for the wardogs on the Naval Station and all the headstones were moved to that location, and it is a beautiful tribute by our country to creatures who were faithful to their service even unto death. The graveyard has since been left unmarked and unknown, and the jungle is wrapping its arms around the area once more.





Parmer County has its own 'People's Court'

There is a popular television program called "The Peoples' Court" and it stars a very knowledgeble (and very verbal) judge by the name of Judge Wapner. In this program, actual small claims court cases are heard and judged.

Parmer County has its very own "Peoples' Court," minus the lights, cameras and overly dramatic plaintiffs and defendants. It is housed in the very office of Justice of the Peace Louise Hancock.

Mrs. Hancock is one of three Justices of the Peace in Parmer County. She is JP for the Farwell area precinct.

Many people have a misconception about a Justice of the Peace. Many don't even realize that a JP is an actual judge and is a licensed state official. The Justice of the Peace office is also an actual peoples' court, where cases can be heard and judged without representation of an attorney.

Louise filled the position after the resignation of Albert "Blackie" Smith seven years ago. She subsequently ran for the office in the following election and won the position. She took her official office in January of 1990.

When asked to describe what it is like to be the Parmer County Justice of the Peace, Louise summed her feelings up by stating "every day you learn something new!"

Louise started her JP training with a 40 hour Justice of the Peace School. Each year that she serves as the JP, she returns to school in a 20 hour training school that is held in January. At these schools, all Texas JP's are informed of all legislative changes and the new laws that have been enacted.

But once back in her office, what are the exact duties of a Justice of the Peace?

A Justice hears cases and deals with all of the following:

1. All class C misdemeanors, which encompass all traffic citations, charges of public intoxication and possession of (drug) paraphenalia. When a traffic citation is dealt with, she is the only one that can authorize a Defensive Driving Class for settlement of a citation.

2. All small claims cases that deal with monies up to \$5000, excluding real estate.

3. All civil suits. Examples of this type of suit would be forced entry and detainer and delinquent personal tax cases.

4. Inquests or certification of death. She pronounces people dead at the scene of fatal accidents, is called to the nursing home to certify time of death for deceased patients. Any where or at any time there must be a certification of death, Justice Hancock is called out to perform this duty. 5. In addition to the certification of death, she is also responsible for ordering autopsies in certain death situations. The Justice of the Peace also performs civil service marriages, conducts administrative hearings for cases dealing with unsafe drivers, and acts as a magistrate for setting bond for any kind of case. In this situation, people are brought to her out of jail and she reads them their Miranda Rights. She is then able to set bond for them. Justice Hancock also issues the arrest warrants for felony cases. She also issues subpeonas for cases that require them.

The JP office is also responsible for Juvenile cases that involve Class A, B & C misdemeanors. One of the most interesting types of juvenile case that she has to deal with is called "Thwarting of School Attendance." In this, Justice Hancock has the student and their parent(s) brought before her and she finds out why the student is not in school. The parent(s) can be fined and, in some instances, ordered to attend school with the student as part of their judgement.

She hears quite a few cases dealing with traffic violations and fines each week and is amazed at the excuses that she hears for the driver's "innocence!"

"I'm also suprised at the number of people that think that they do not have to pay for their traffic tickets," she said. "The State of Texas is cracking down on this by having JP's put non-payers into the Texas Warrant Data Bank. If the driver is ever stopped or picked up again, or even identified by an officer, they will be arrested and brought in. And those drivers that live in other states are not free from their obligation either. We have an out of state compact with the other states that will have the same information as provided by Austin. That persons' state then will suspend

or revoke their drivers license."

Justice Hancock has a sign in her office that reads "No Whining!" This is what she would like from the people that come before her for all the various types of cases she hears.

"Common sense is the major key to almost every case I hear," she commented. "If people would just think about their situation or case, they would realize that no one is above the law."

The law is the law, according to Justice Hancock and she intends to fairly enforce it in every situation. "I want to be fair to everyone that comes before me," she said. "I'm also a big proponent of living by The Law - the Law of the Bible. If people would just do what God has told us to do, there wouldn't really be in any need for people in my position or





Notice of Property Tax Reporting Requirements

Property which was valued in 1996 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1997 or subsequent years EXCEPT FOR:

1. mobile home

2. livestock, and

land used for agricultural purposes.

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office.

All non-governmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1997 if the exemption was not claimed in 1996.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February

If you made improvements to your real property and:

1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and

a building permit for the improvements was not issued.

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by that assessor.

If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:

1. describes the property affected,

2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and

states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the last day of February.

If the veterans exemption was claimed and allowed in 1996, no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1996, and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1996, no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1996 and it is not claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

Beginning in the 1982 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor, as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain as such and need not be made in subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their property to be residential in 1996 and desires that classification for 1997, they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February 1997. Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, can be obtained from the county assessor or the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, Central Assessment Bureau, P.O. Box 630, Santa Fe, New Mexico, 87509, Phone: (505) 827-0893.

This notice is only a brief statement of the provisions of Section 7-38-8. 7-38-8.1, 7-38-13, 7-38-17 and 7-38-17.1 NMSA 1978 of the Property Tax Code. "I want to be able to talk to these kids about the consequences of their actions before they get into trouble," she declared. "I want to educate them about the law and show them that if they do the crime or act in certain ways as to what will happen."

The job of Parmer County Justice of the Peace is technically a half day job, but the effort that Justice Hancock puts

into it extends way past a half day. She truly enjoys her job and takes her duties very seriously.

"I have always liked the law, and what it takes to uphold the law," she commented. "Perhaps it comes from my family heritage in law enforcement."

Louise and her husband Mac "Bigun" Hancock are the parents of two sons, Mac III and Ron, that are now Attorneys-at-Law in Houston. Their daughter Debra is married to Ray Dennis who has been a Lubbock Police Officer for almost 17 years.

Mac's father was the sheriff in Morton for many years and his two brothers were sheriffs in both Lamesa and Morton following their father's term.

Justice Louise Hancock believes in practical straightforward administration of the law. It is in these beliefs that lie a fair and truthful advocate for justice and for people. So, the next time you want to see a real "People's Court" judge in action, turn off the television and go talk to Parmer County Justice of the Peace Louise Hancock.

Her door is always open, she'll always make time for you and you don't even have to have a ticket!

Deadline for payment paperwork is Jan. 15

Cotton producers wanting to receive their 1997 Ag Marketing Transition Act (AMTA) advance payment should have all necessary paperwork turned into county Farm Service Agency offices by January 15.

The 1997 advance AMTA payment will total 3.7 cents per pound. Producers who do not have all necessary paperwork in place by January 15 will receive the total payment by September 30.

The advance payment rate for cotton represents 50 percent of the final payment rate of 7.4 cents for 1997. Advance payment rates for other crops are also subject to the January 15 deadline. A complete list of advance payment rates for 1997 is shown below.

Texico reports 1996 fire call totals

The Texico Fire Department reports they went on 154 calls in 1996.

Of that total, 154 were EMS calls, and 30 were fire calls. It took 177 man hours on the EMS runs, and another 52.2 man hours on the fire calls.

The department has 18 members on its roll, and have taken 192 hours of training.
