I recall writing how fantastic it was that we had won the war on drugs and now we didn't have to worry about it anymore.

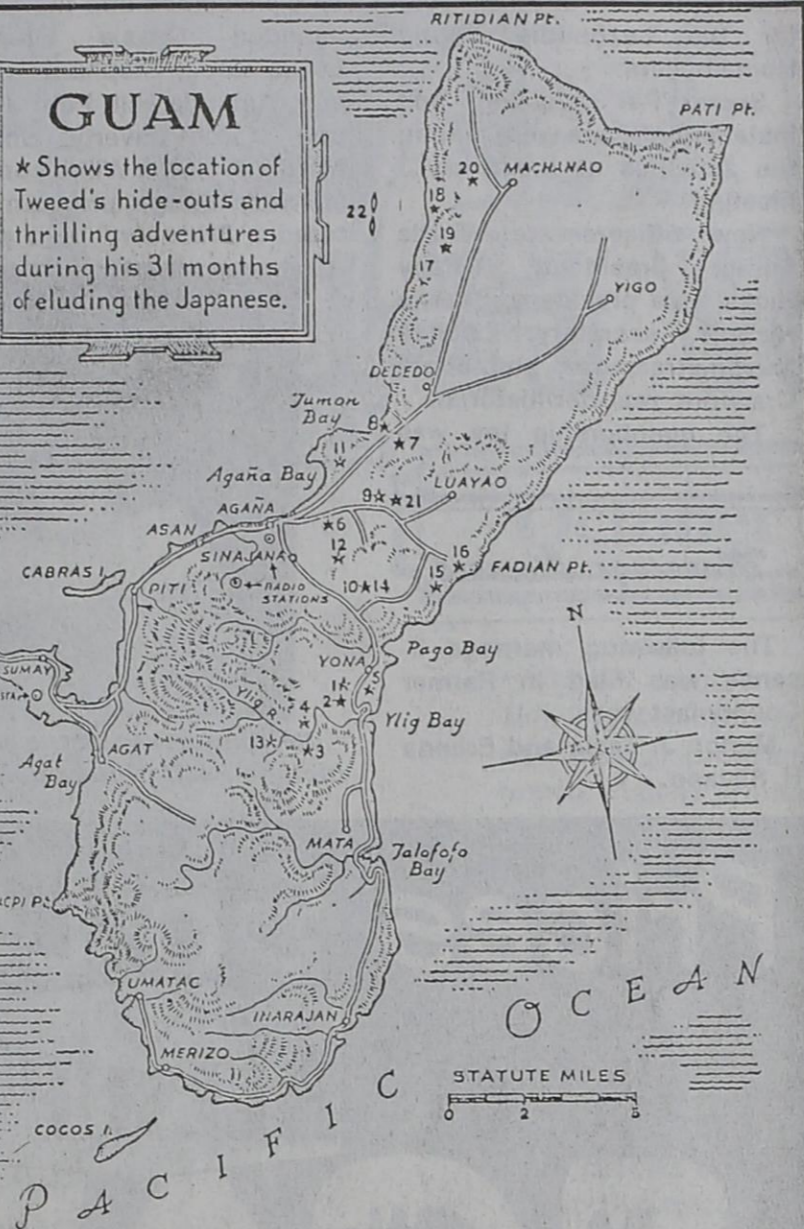
President Reagan's pronouncement was correct, wasn't it?

George Tweed: an American hero

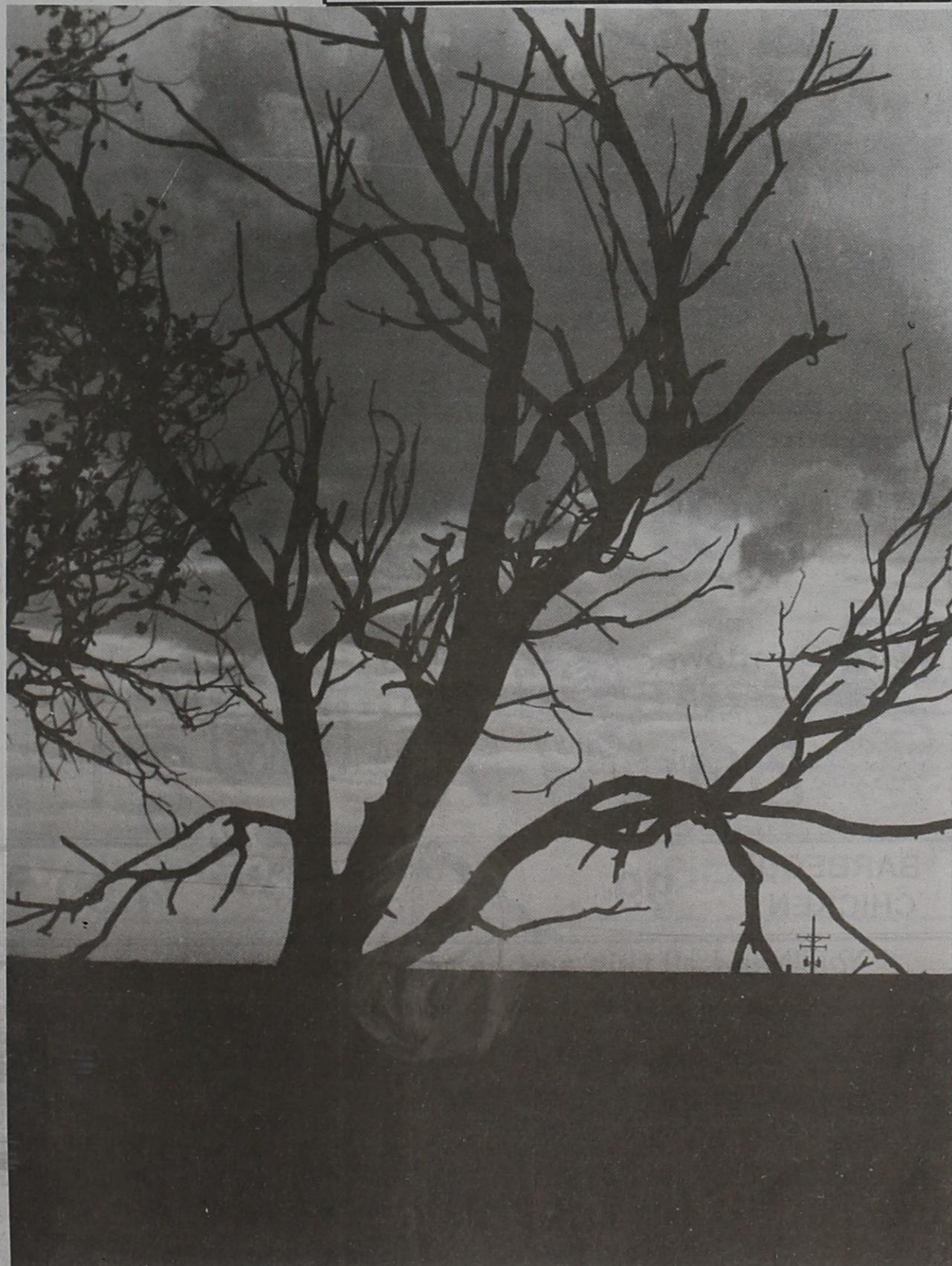

(Editor's note: U.S. Navy Lt. Commander Will Anderson, a Farwell High graduate, is the son of Bob and Carrie Anderson. Periodically over the years, he has sent articles about his postings as features for the Tribune. Currently, he is stationed in Guam. Following is one of several articles he has sent us about that fascinating island.)

One hot summer day in 1962, I biked down to the old Border Theater there in Farwell with my buddies and we watched a movie called "No Man Is An Island" about an American sailor who managed to avoid capture by the Japanese forces on Guam from December 1941 to July 1944. Thirty-four years later, I still remember the movie, oddly enough, about this Radioman First Class, U.S. Navy, named George Raymond Tweed, and his fight to stay alive.

Tweed worked in the communications shack for the naval governor of Guam in the capitol city of Agaña, and carried the information on the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor (it was 08 December on this side of the International Dateline

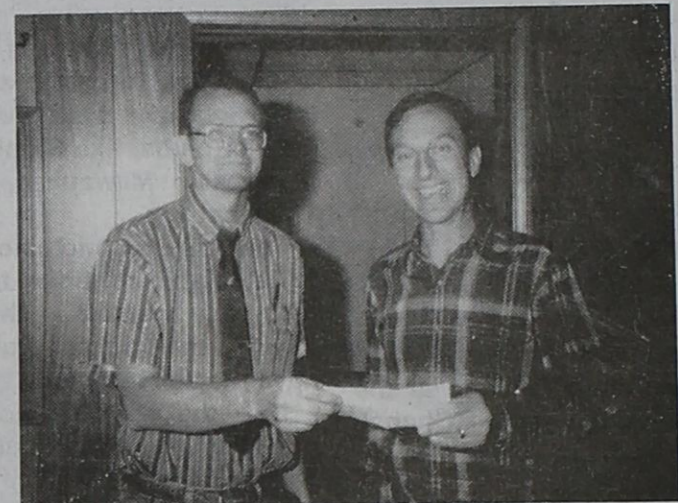

And even juicing up the ball as the baseball honchos did this year to create more offense can't change it.

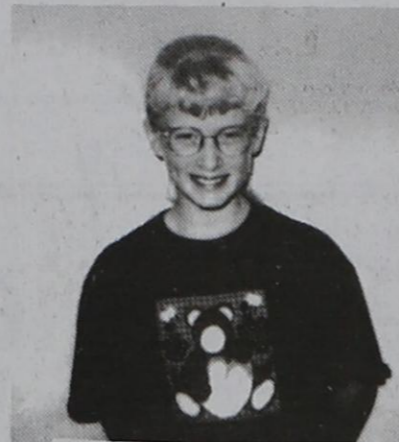

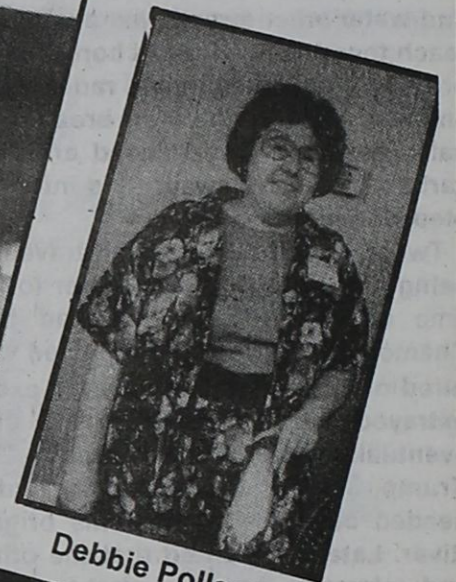

The 4-H program has expanded steadily for the past 25 years, with our numbers totalling up to more than 5 million 4-H'ers throughout the United States.

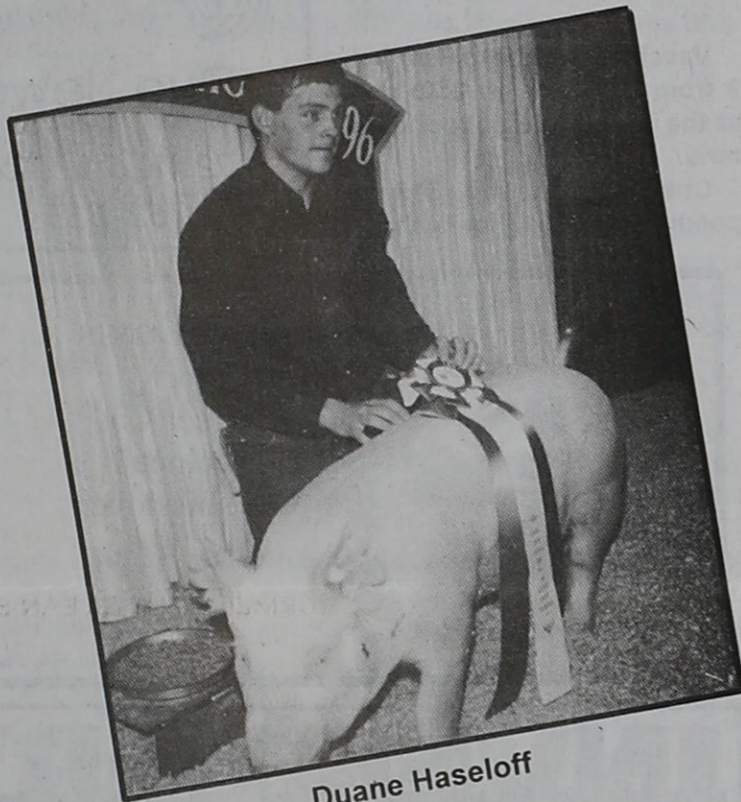

during the attack in Hawaii on 07 December.) Japanese planes and ships began pre-invasion attacks on positions on Guam, and everyone knew that hard decisions had to be made immediately when the overwhelming Japanese forces landed. Guam had received no funding for self-defense prior to the war, it had a small detachment of U.S. Marines who determined to defend the airfield on the Orote Peninsula (where the Naval Station is located today), and the Chamorro Insular Guard were mustered in front of the governor's residence and issued ammunition (they always drilled with empty rifles and this was the first time that some of them were to actually fire their weapons).

The Japanese assault forces landed and moved towards the Insular Guard positions, cutting them down one by one. Wishing to avoid a slaughter, the governor ordered a surrender of the Marines and all other forces, and anyone who wanted to avoid being a prisoner of war of Japan could take his own chances of running into the jungles. This is what Tweed and his friends decided to do and their old car was chased by Japanese riflemen as they labored up the hill and headed to the south end of the island.

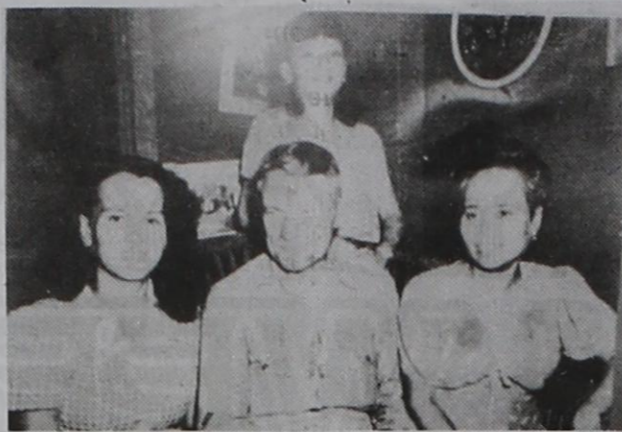
The Japanese captured the personnel rosters intact, they knew the names of those who had surrendered, and they had the dog tags of those they had killed. With this information, the Japanese knew from the very beginning the name and information on every single man who had determined to avoid capture in the jungles. Over the next several months, these men were aided by the loyal Chamorros, moved from place to place, hidden in caves and barns, receiving food and water whenever it was available and whenever it could reach them safely. For a short time, Chamorros were able to provide Tweed with an old radio which he was able to repair, and the news of the war, broadcast from the USA, was finally available. Tweed used an old manual typewriter and carbon paper to type up this information and it was distributed all over the island.

Tweed soon found himself traveling alone, smaller groups being harder to find and easier to feed, and he moved anytime he felt his position had been compromised. The Chamorros who were suspected of helping him were tortured or beaten and many were executed, but he was never betrayed. His friends were not so fortunate, and Tweed eventually received words from a Chamorro that his friends Krump, Jones, and Yablonsky had been captured and beheaded on the spot near his original hideout on the Ylig River. Later he learned that the other two hold-outs, Tyson and Johnston, had been shot to death in the north.

That left Tweed as the last survivor, and the Japanese had a platoon of 50 men specifically charged with finding and killing him. These soldiers knew he was there someplace, they knew his name, and they were tightening the noose, slowly and surely. Tweed left his cave on Fadian Point literally minutes before the Japanese patrol surrounded the area and closed it. Tweed made a desperate move to the other end of the island and received the protection of a Chamorro landowner named Mr. Artero.

Artero guided Tweed through dense jungle between the surf and the top of the coastal cliff, and then up a steep incline, and then a vertical climb up a white stone cliff. And there, in a narrow cleft in the rock, shrouded by trees and vines, he showed Tweed the hideout that was to be his home for the next 21 months. Artero never told anyone he had Tweed on his land, and he carried his supplies there himself, one night a week, never leaving a trail. Tweed's mission was to avoid capture by the Japanese. Obviously, they would have beheaded him, but a major reason now was because he was a symbol that America would be coming back to Guam.

Meanwhile, the U.S. armed forces had stopped the Japanese advance, and then, one island at a time, had begun to roll it back. Some islands were invaded to establish bases for land-based aircraft and facilities to support ships. Other

islands with large Japanese garrisons were simply skipped over, pounded from sea and air with artillery and bombs but never invaded, the Japanese garrison there isolated and removed from the war completely.

Finally, in May 1944, Tweed saw American aircraft overhead and saw American ordnance falling on Japanese positions on Guam. The invasion of Saipan to the north had begun, and the preparations were starting on Tinian and Guam. By July, American warships were off the shores of Guam, firing on targets of opportunity. Tweed saw two destroyers close to his hideout and he signaled them with a mirror (very nearly drawing the fire of their guns!) He hurried down the cliff from his hideout and swam out to a boat that had come in cautiously, believing that the mirror was a Japanese trap and that no American could still be alive after all that time.

Tweed gave the force commander the intelligence he could give him on Japanese positions and the invasion of Guam began 21 July 1944. Tweed was promoted to Chief Radioman and after Guam was retaken, came back to find and thank his Chamorro friends. Many of them had been executed, including the Chamorro priest who was beheaded the same day that Tweed escaped on that boat. But Artero and his family survived, and Tweed brought a special gift for him, a brand-new car donated and shipped to Guam by the Chevrolet Company. After the war ended, Tweed never returned to Guam again and he died in the USA in 1989, a hero of the war that many people have forgotten.

But I remember Tweed, because I saw a movie about him in 1962, and because my office is built on land that used to be owned by a man named Artero, on the top of a cliff looking over the sea, a few hundred meters (and a 40 minute trek) from the cleft in the rock where Tweed hid for 21 months.

Alicia is the daughter of Karen and Curtis Smith and is a graduate of Farwell High School.

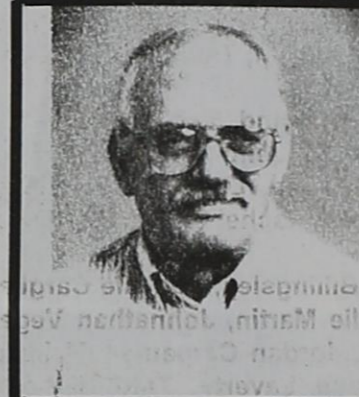
Red Lonsdale of Farwell is completing his last year of college at ENMU in Portales. He is due to graduate in May with a degree in education.

CHICKEN POT PIE

Prep time: 20 minutes Bake time: 28 minutes

Crust (below)

1/4 cup margarine, butter or spread*
1/4 cup Bisquick Original baking mix
1/2 teaspoon parsley flakes
1 cup chicken broth
1 cup frozen vegetable mixture (any style)
1 cup cut-up cooked chicken
1/2 cup Bisquick Original baking mix
1/3 cup milk

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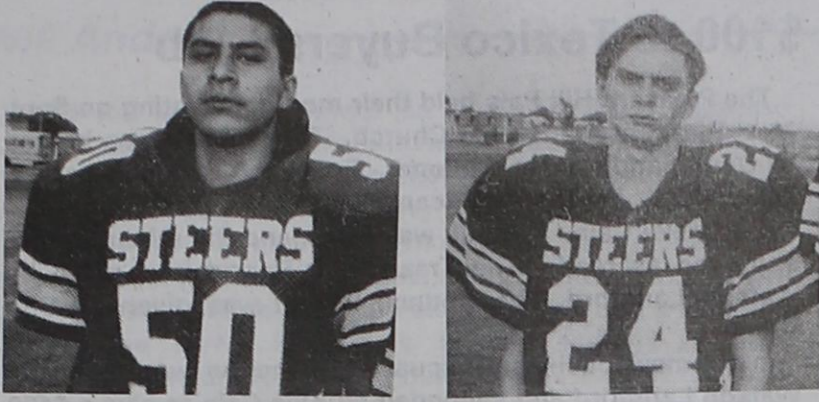

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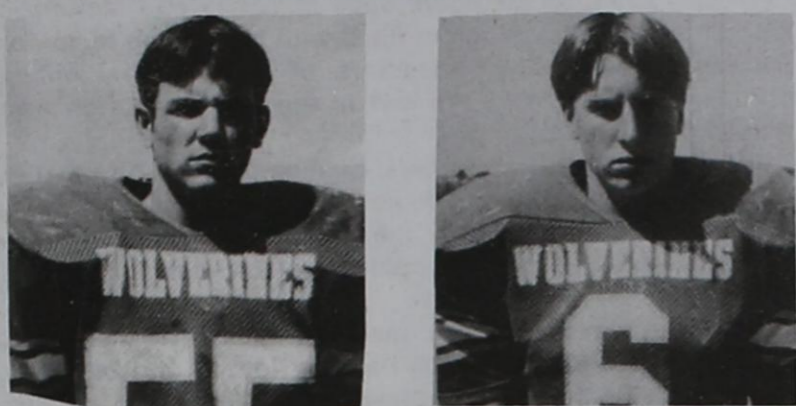

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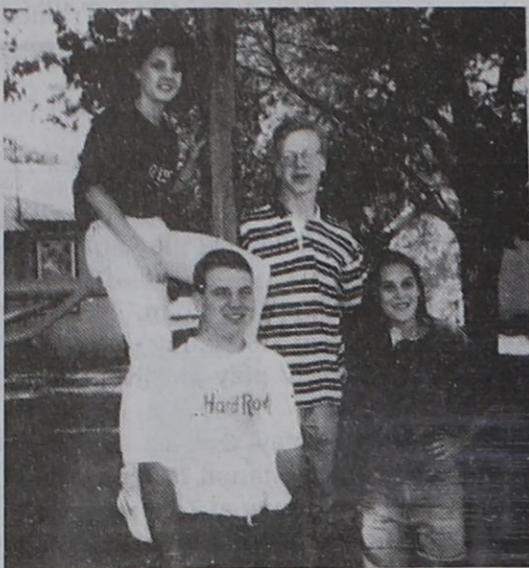

New officers are: Edward Terry, president; Shana Foster, vice president; Heath Brown, treasurer; and Roxann Warren, secretary.

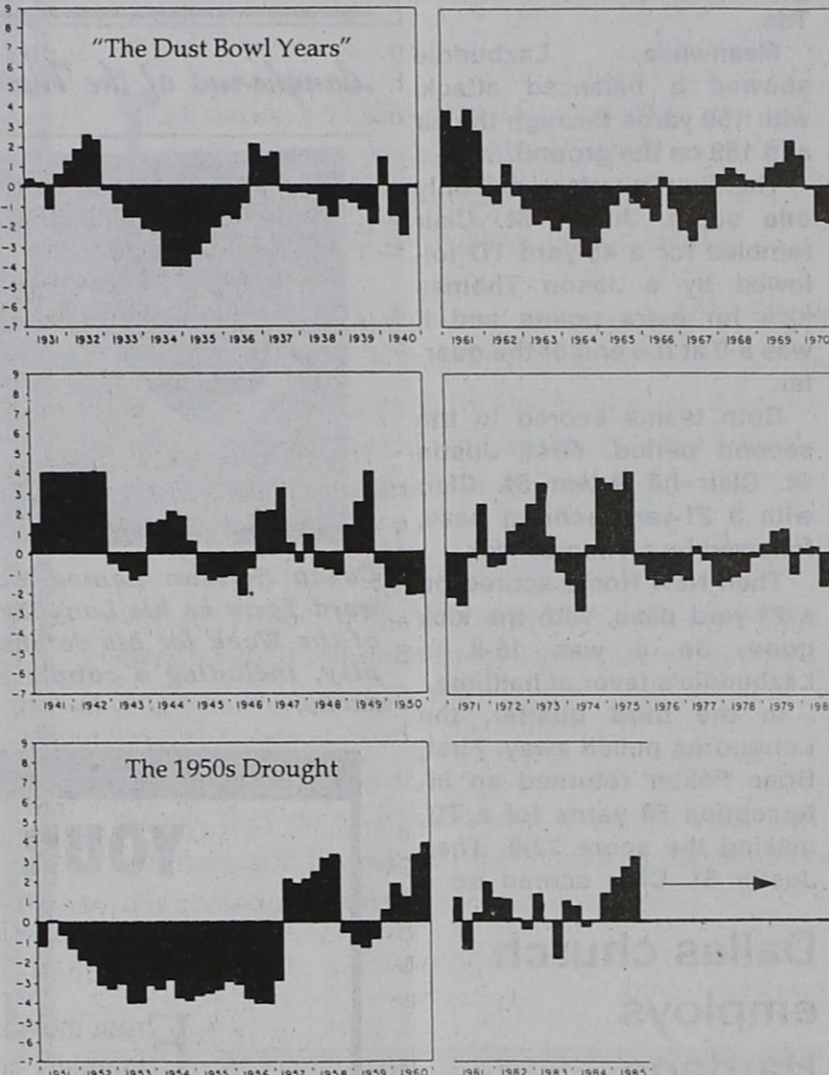
Members participated Sept. 21 in training for the LazBuddies program, a "big brother/sister" type program matching elementary pupils to high school students as

Texas Droughts 1930-1985

Drought conditions in Texas during the past 55 years have been recorded using the Palmer Drought Severity Index (PDSI). The drought severity index takes into account several factors, such as precipitation, evaporation and soil moisture. According to the PDSI, a value of >0 indicates normal to wet conditions; 0 to 0.5 is near normal; -0.5 to -1 indicates incipient drought; -1 to -2 is mild drought; -2 to -3 is moderate drought; and -3 to -4 is severe drought; and <-4 is extreme drought.

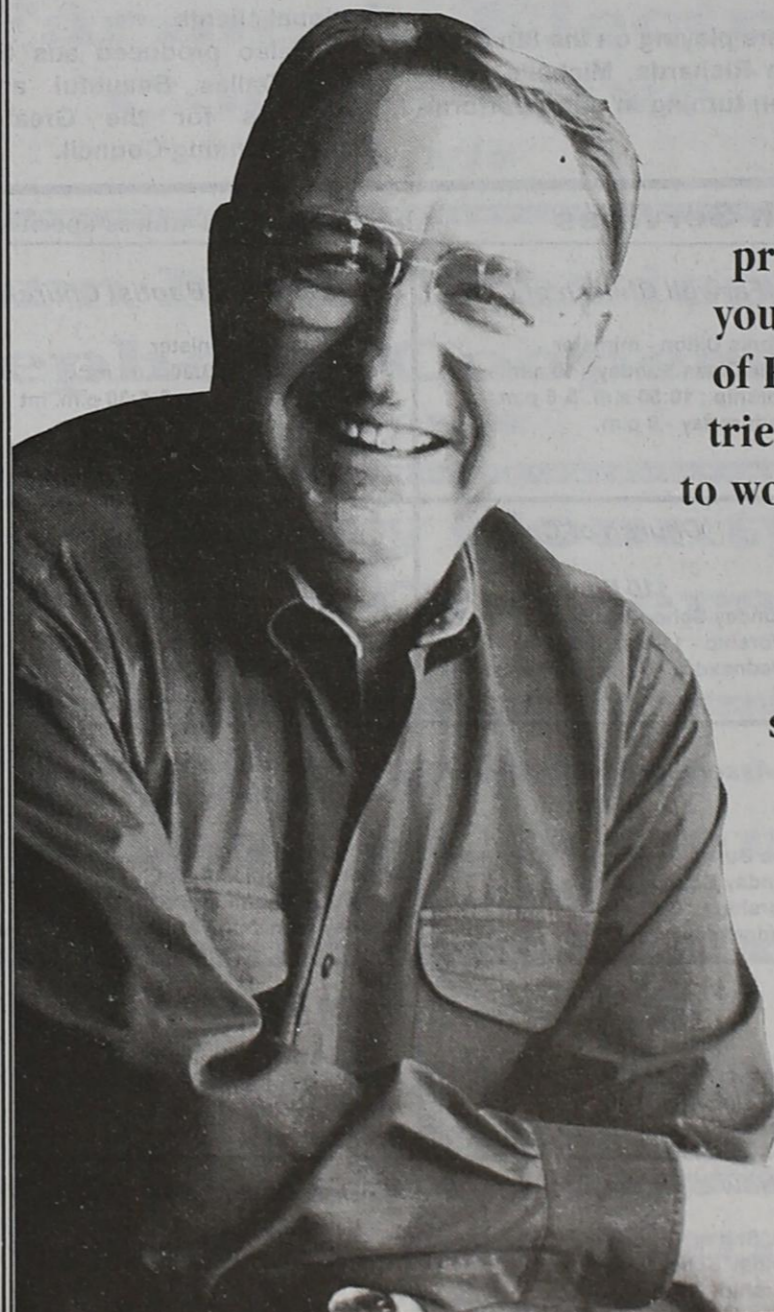
