He suffered a broken jaw, broken collarbone and two broken legs. He is wheelchair bound and will remain hospitalized at least several more weeks.

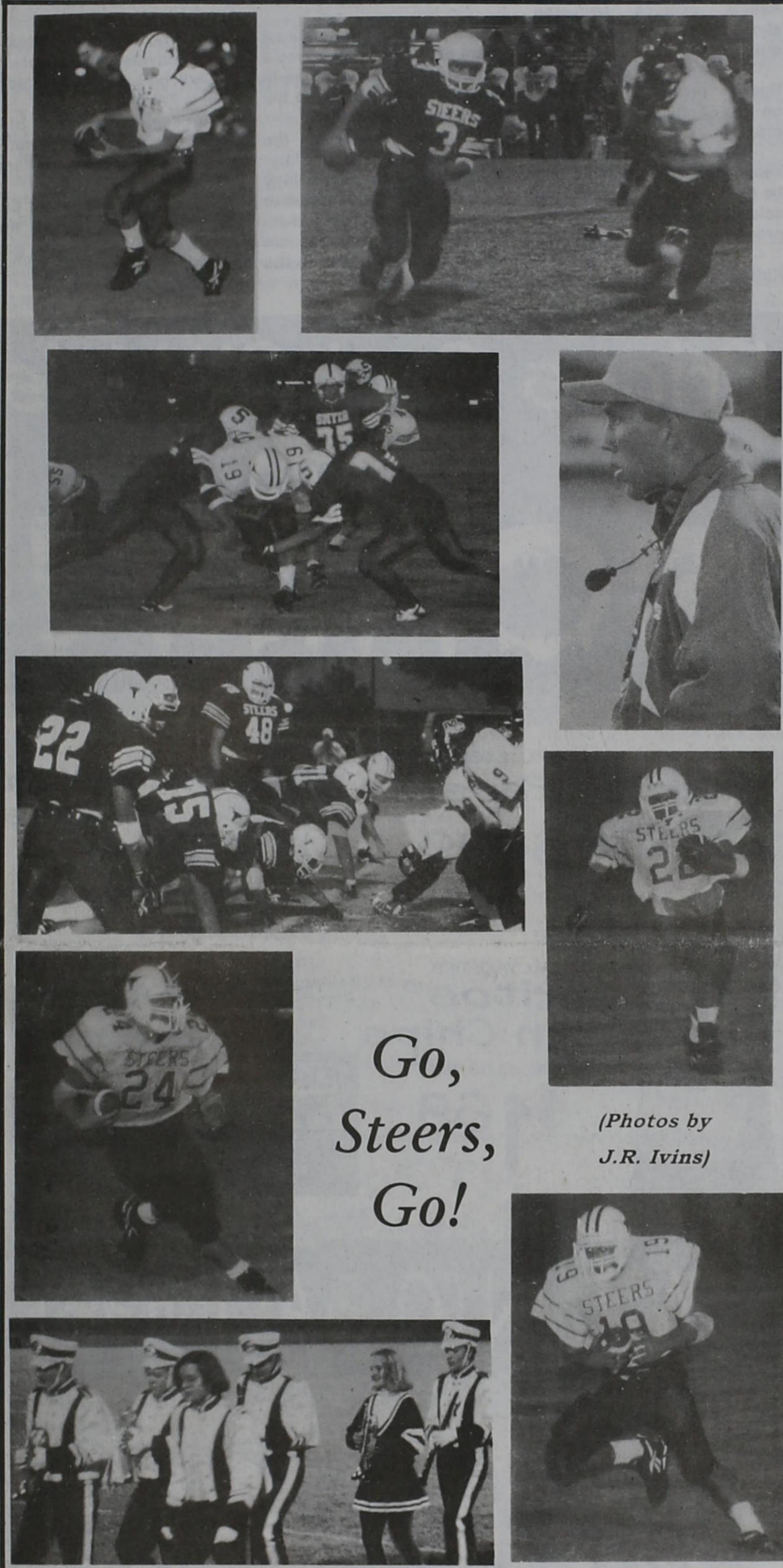

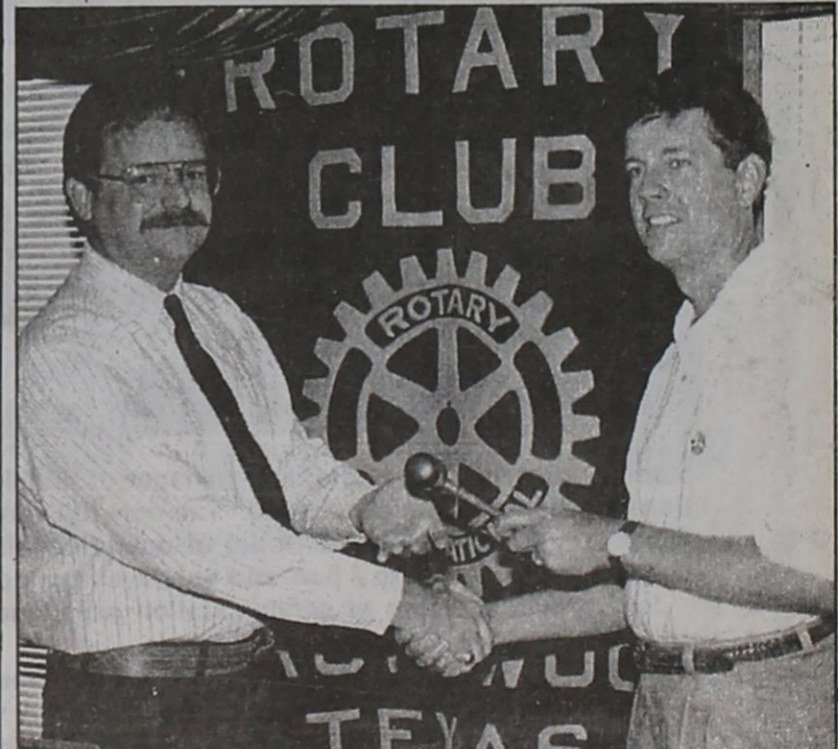

Texico approves change in activity trip procedures

The Texico School Board on Tuesday approved a change in its activity trip procedures (see adjacent story for background).

From now on, parents can have their children ride home

with them if they give prior notice to school personnel before the trip begins.

Previously, parents needed prior approval.

The new procedure says: "Students will ride the bus to and from all activities. Students will only be released to their parents with prior notice to school sponsor/coach and administrator before the activity vehicle leaves the school grounds. Good judgment will be used. Emergencies will be considered."

In other business, the board:

-- Hired Vicky Bermea as an instructional aide for 3- and 4-year-olds.

-- Okayed financial help for FFA'ers going to the national FFA convention in Kansas City Nov. 11-15.

-- Discussed building a marble memorial to the late Bill Queener with the help of the Booster Club. It would be built at the football field and

feature a bell which can be rung.

-- Heard Bobby Lockmiller, a parent, ask about homework procedures when students are taken out of class early. A committee of parents and staff will review this.

-- Rejected bids for a new sound system. Specs will be rewritten.

-- Accepted bids for a perimeter fence at the ag farm, and for window covers on the north side of the high school.

-- Heard a report on the continuing sprinkler system problem. A government agency looked at it and said there were no code violations but they could find no design and that the workmanship wasn't up to par, said school supt. R.L. Richards.

The board will ask the city firemen to increase the pressure in the sprinklers, and also will check to see if eliminating some of the sprinkler heads will help.

-- Heard a presentation on

kits that are aimed at helping deter teenage pregnancies. The board agreed to buy a couple of kits for use at the high school and perhaps upper grades at the junior high.

-- Heard a presentation from a Honeywell Corp. representative on energy savings. It will be researched by school officials.

-- Heard a parent, Tim Askew, express concerns about math assignment requirements.

-- Heard teacher Pam Rucker present information on the first grade phonics program.

-- Was told that training for some staff and students will be held Nov. 4-8 on the new science computer software programs.

-- Heard library aide Cary Kittrell discuss the acceler-

ated reading program at the elementary school.

The student who reads the most books will receive a bicycle donated by the Texico Chamber of Commerce. And the Texico Booster Club has donated bicycle equipment.

Also, principal Diane Cooper has given her students a reading goal. If met, she will spend a day atop the elementary school roof.

The students already are halfway toward that goal and may reach it in December.

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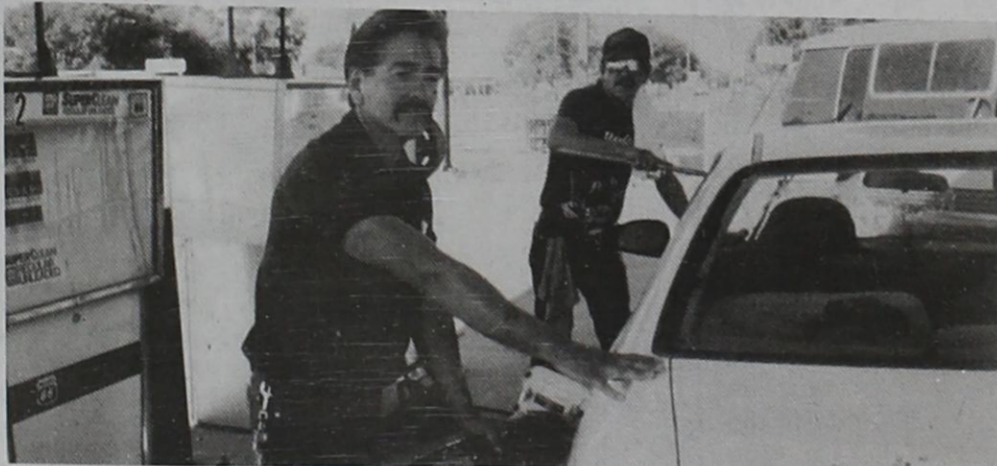

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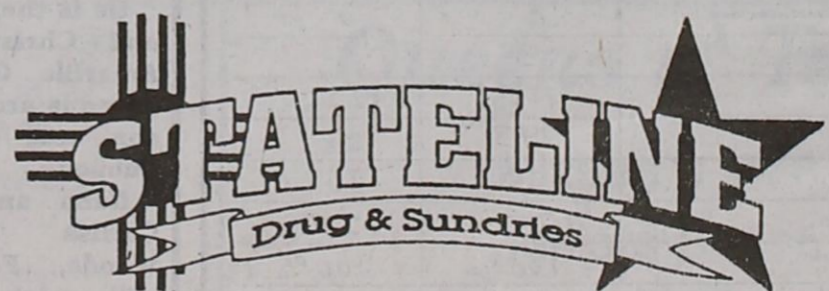

Steers' defense provide shutout win

The Farwell Steers relied on their defensive strength to record their 4th straight shutout last Friday with a 7-0 victory over Happy in an away game.

The Steers are now 4-0-1 on the season and 2-0 in district. They face Springlake-Earth, recently-ranked No. 2 in the state, at 7:30 p.m. today (Friday).

Against Happy, Farwell was hurt by a swarm of penalties. The Steers were penalized 12 times for 144 yards, while Happy was hit only 4 times for 30 yards. Farwell's Brock Anderson, David Everett and Jason Miller combined for 155 yads rushing.

Other team stats were: first downs, Farwell 13, Happy 9; rushing yards, Farwell 41 for 185, Happy 36 for 58; passing yards, Farwell 4 for 8 for 45 yards, Happy 2 for 7 for 3 yards; punting average, Farwell 4 for 40, and Happy 5 for 31.

The game started with Josh Littlejohn returning the kick 35 yards to the Farwell 35. Anderson ran for 20 -- nullified by a penalty. But the Steers moved the ball behind solid runs by Everett, Miller and Anderson. Miller burst up the middle for 27 yards to the Happy 13 behind good blocks by Michael Treadway, Steven Miller and Grant Oppliger. A 20-yard field goal attempt failed.

On defense, good tackles were recorded by Anderson, the Miller boys, Spencer Ketcherside and Anderson, and Farwell took over near midfield. Jason Miller ran for 17 behind blocks by Guerrero Olmos, Steve Miller, Mark Lunsford and Oppliger. But Farwell was held.

The defensive unit played tough again, forcing a punt. Happy recovered a fumble near midfield. Happy got a first down by penalty. Tackles were made by Armstrong, Jason Miller, Gonzales and Russell Williams. Happy punted.

Farwell was held and Williams boomed a 50-yard punt out of his own end zone to midfield. On defense, Steve Miller and Everett had good tackles. Happy drove to the Steers 7 and tried a field goal that failed.

Anderson hit Williams with a 25-yard pass. Williams made an excellent run to the 50. But Farwell was stopped and Williams boomed a 52-yard punt as the half ended.

In the third quarter, Happy moved the ball on the ground. Everett recorded a tackle behind the line of scrimmage, causing a 7-yard loss. Armstrong and Treadway then caused another loss, and a Happy punt to the Farwell 38. A penalty hurt Farwell again and Williams punted from the Farwell 45 into the Happy end zone.

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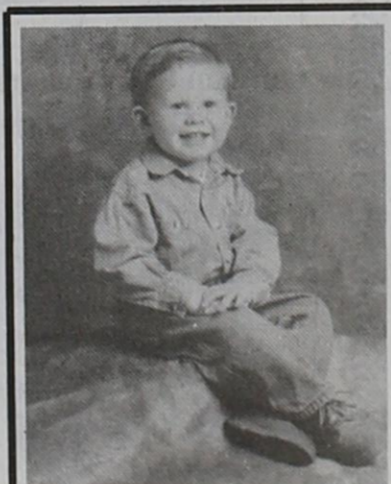

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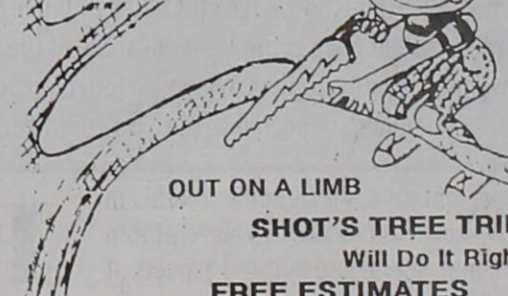

And the winning score came in the final period when St. Clair threw a 17-yard TD pass to brother Adam St. Clair, followed by another Thomas kick.

Dunsworth named to Texico City Council

The Texico City Council Tuesday appointed Eddie Dunsworth as the new councilman, on the recommendation of Mayor Nathan Tharp.

Tharp said the only other candidate for the post, vacated by the resignation of Art Salguero, was Max Carter.

In other business, the council: -- Discussed whether to go ahead with its participation as a member of High Plains Waste Management Association.

At the next meeting, the council will discuss whether to officially sign up with the group, which includes a group of small communities (Tucumcari is the largest) planning a landfill between San Jon and Logan.

The state is loaning the group \$1.5 million. The projected cost is \$60 a ton for the first year and \$49 afterward.

If Texico doesn't sign up, and wants to use the landfill later, it will be treated as a customer -- at a much higher cost.

Councilman Rick Queener was worried about the high costs of transporting trash to the landfill (80 miles) and favors going with Clovis on a landfill. He noted that Clovis' population is very large compared to the small communities in the High Plains Association. He wants to maintain the status quo.

The problem has been that the future of the Clovis landfill has been in doubt. So Tharp asked Queener to contact Clovis officials and invited them to the next council meeting to discuss their plans.

Former Mayor Doyal LaRue attended the meeting to ask what the cost per month for an individual property owner would be if Texico goes with High Plains. Tharp said there is no answer yet because some questions remain such as where to put the collection point, whether Texico contin-

ues using Waste Management, etc.

-- Approved a variance for a trailer home at Kindred and Anderson. Nine letters were sent out, two returned and none in opposition.

-- Heard city attorney Marion Ty Rutter reported on two

condemned buildings. He said Kelly Green Seeds has filed an appeal over the order to condemn its quonset hut. And Rutter said he hasn't heard from the owner of the building (just east of city hall) which has been partially demolished.

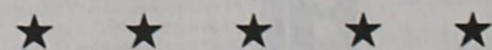

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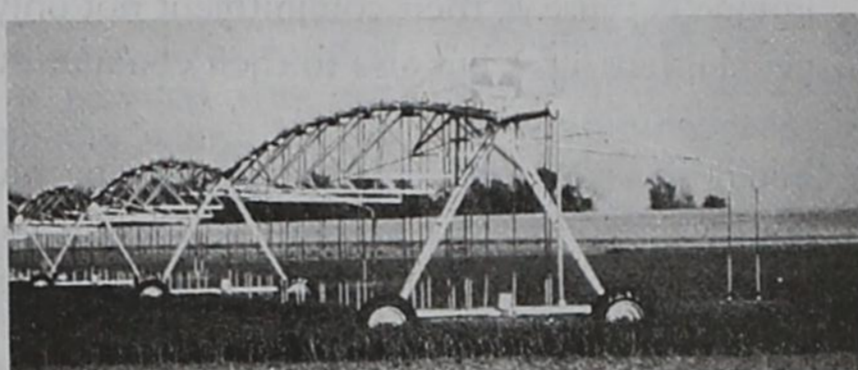
