Texico tops Hagerman to clinch playoff spot

The Texico Wolverines have put together back-to-back district wins by defeating the Hagerman Bobcats 41-14, at home Friday. The victory put Texico into the state playoff!

Texico received the kick but on the 3rd play from scrimmage, fumbled and the Bobcats picked it up, returning it 34 yards to the 9 yard line. Three plays later, Hagerman was on the board. The kick missed the uprights and the score was 6-0.

The Wolverines came right back with a score of their own on a 1-yard QB keeper by Zane Anderson, set up by a 28-yard scamper by sophomore Brandon Bare. Bare saw lots of action at running back because Justin Garrison sat out the night with an injury. At the 4:43 mark in the first quarter, the score was 7-6.

On the Bobcats' next series, they had a run of 20 yards before Crios Meza stopped the runner for a 5-yard loss and Billy Scott made a similar tackle for a 6-yard loss, forcing a punt.

Bare returned the punt 43 yards to the Hagerman 28 but the Bobcat defense held the Wolverines on downs at the 25. A quick gain of 19 yards on a pass moved the ball to midfield before Aaron Vaughan sacked the QB. The drive ended and Bare had a good punt return of 27 yards.

Texico started on the Hagerman 45 and on the first play Anderson broke loose for 42 yards. Two plays later, Eddy Segovia scored and the Wolverines led 14-6.

The Bobcats put together an 11-play, 72-yard drive and converted the 2-point play knotting the score at 14 with 4:53 remaining in the half.

Bare returned the kickoff 64 yards but a penalty negated the field position. It didn't stop the Wolverines as they scored just before half on a 15-yard run by Segovia highlighted by a 33-yard pass from Anderson to Ricky Burns.

In the 2nd half, Kyle Teitz intercepted at midfield and seven plays later the Wolverines were in the end zone with Segovia scoring on a 16-yard run.

The Bobcats moved the ball to the Texico 23 yard line before Burns intercepted on 4th and 9 and returned it 92 yards for the TD. A two-point conversion run by Segovia made the score 34-14 with 1:58 left in the 3rd quarter.

Hagerman again moved the ball into Wolverine territory, getting all the way to the 4 yard line but a good tackle by Ethan McDaniel and a QB sack by Michael Johnson, Segovia, and Vaughan forced the Bobcats to turn the ball over on downs at the 13.

The Wolverines had a 72-yard run by Dustin McDaniel called back on a penalty and were forced to punt. Bare intercepted, setting up the last score. Anderson found Segovia streaking downfield for a 44-yard TD pass making the score 41-14.

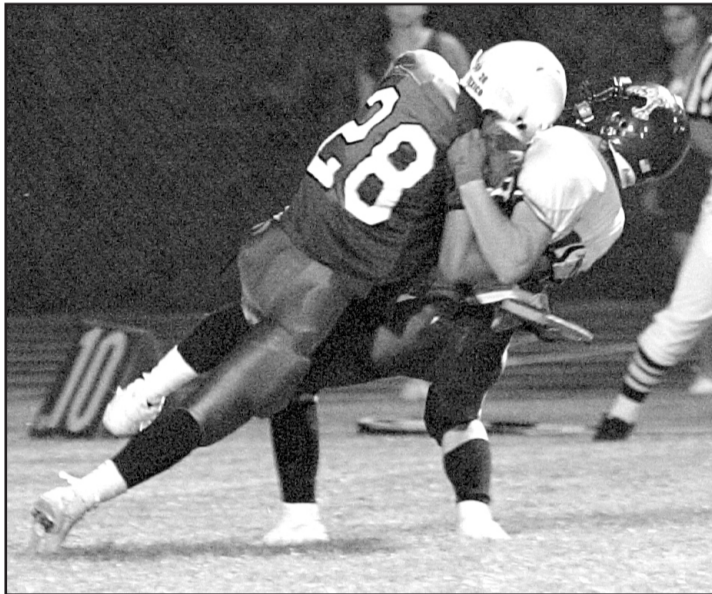
With 5:20 remaining in the game, many of the substitutes got to play the rest of the game.

The think tank makes a push for Individual Development Accounts (IDA's) which are interest-bearing bank savings accounts, which are restricted, like the GI Bill, to placing a down payment on a home, starting or expanding a micro-business, or paying for college or vocational school.

I commend this think tank -- it does an excellent job for New Mexico.

It's so sad that the federal government can't learn from them.

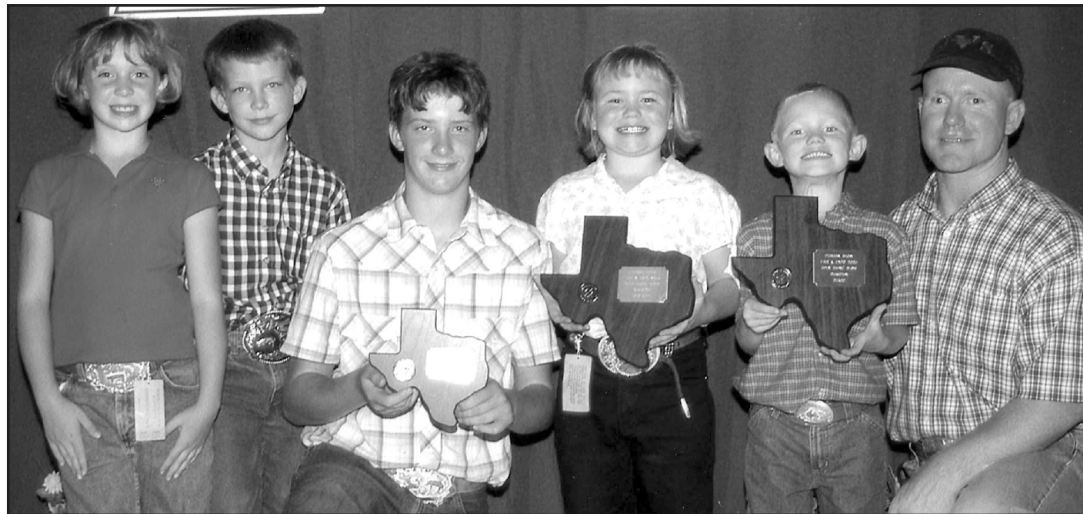

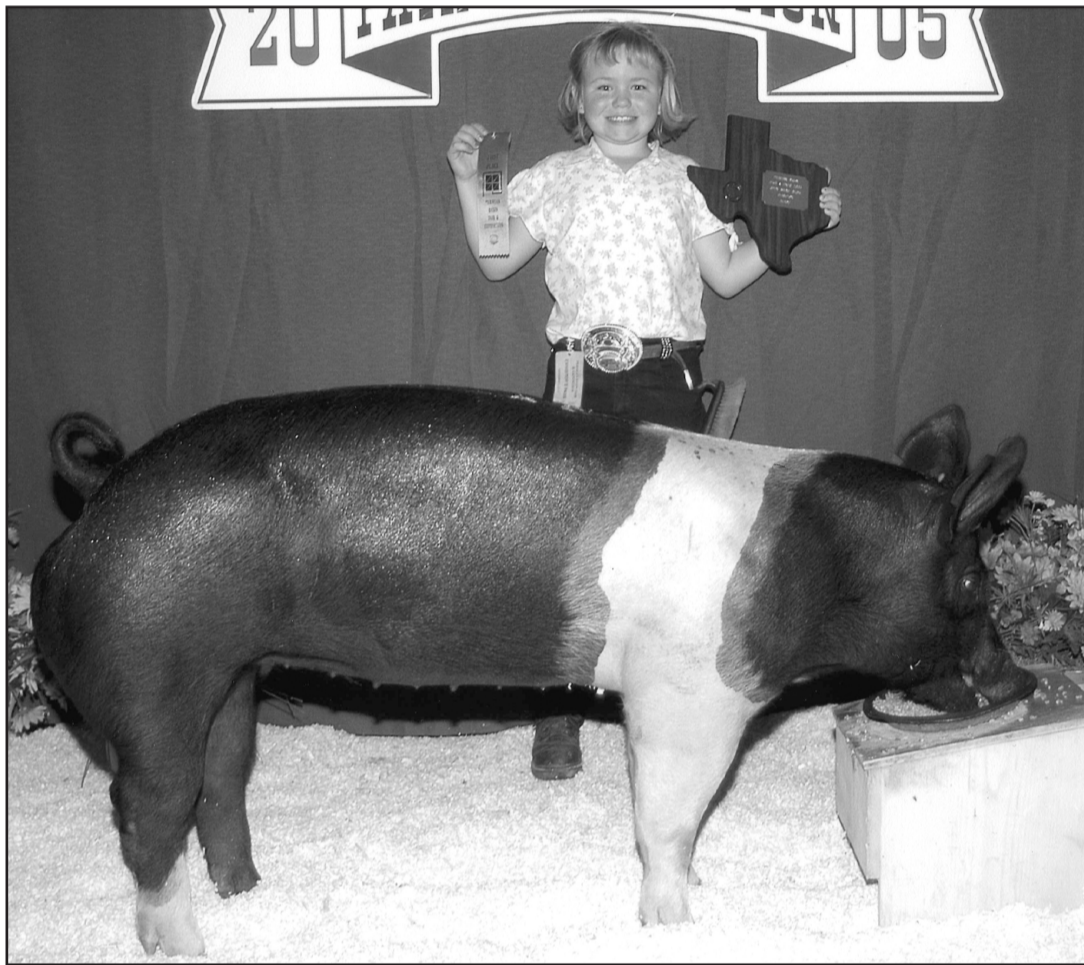
Dear Mike,

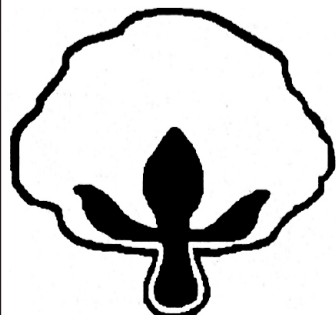

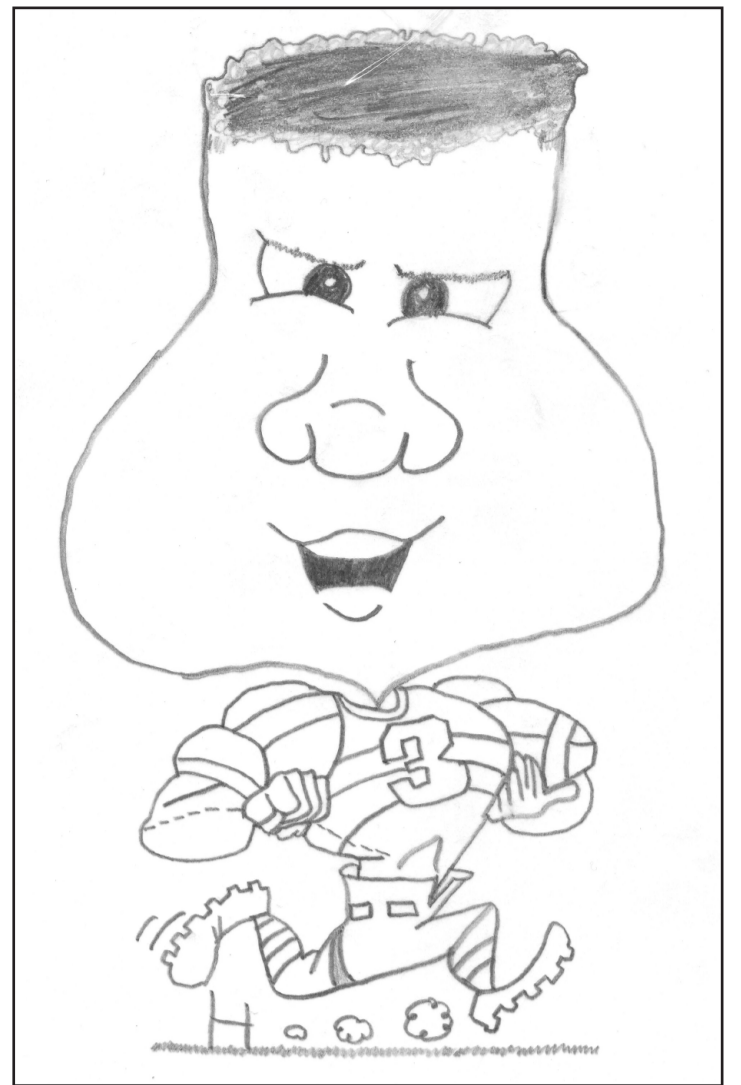
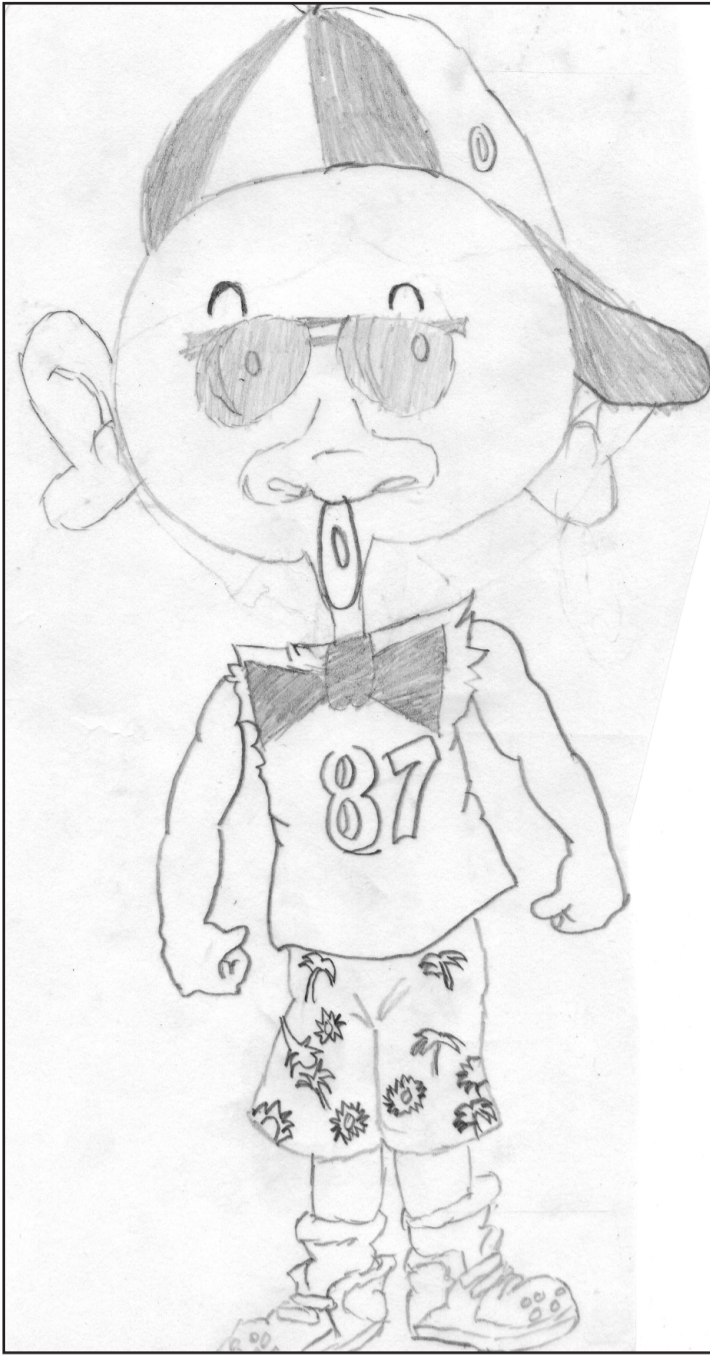
