Election Day will be Tuesday

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. throughout Parmer County for voting on Nov. 5.

On Election Day, the polling places will be: 101, Calvary Baptist Church in Friona; 210, Bovina EMS Building; 202, Friona Community Center; 203, Rhea Community Center; 301, Farwell Community Center; 302, Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church; 303, Bovina Ridgelea School; 401, Lazbuddie School, and 402, Friona Fire Station.

Voters are asked to bring their voter registration cards with them to the polling place.

The most contested local race involves four candidates seeking to be the Parmer County Pct. 3 (Farwell area) county commissioner. Candidates are Lowell Primrose, Democrat; Jerry Davis, Republican; and write-in candidates D.H. Foster and Ed Corn. Primrose defeated incumbent Robert White in the Democrat primary.

Another race for county commissioner involves Pct. 1, the Friona area. Republican John Tannahill faces off with incumbent Democrat Johnny Mars.

The one countywide race pits incumbent Democrat Doris Herington against Republican challenger Teresa Ancira for Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector.

Three county candidates are unopposed and thus are re-elected: Rex Williams, county sheriff; Charles Aycock, county attorney; and Johnny Atkinson, district attorney.

This could be a record year for having local Republican candidates on the ballot. Besides Davis, Mrs. Ancira and Tannahill, longtime state representative incumbent Pete Laney, a Democrat, has a strong challenger in Hollis Cain, a Republican.

At the upper end of the ballot, voters will pick for president between incumbent Democrat Bill Clinton and Republican challenger Bob Dole. Ross Perot, the Independent Party candidate, is expected to finish a distant third in this race. There also are candidates put up by the Libertarian Party, U.S. Taxpayers Party and Natural Law Party.

For U.S. Senator, Republican Phil Gramm, the incumbent, is opposed by Democrat Victor Morales, a surprise winner in his party's primary election.

For U.S. Representative, Republican Larry Combest is the longtime incumbent. His opponent is Democrat John Sawyer.

Also on the ballot are these posts: railroad commissioner; Chief Justice, Supreme Court; Justice Supreme Court, Places 1 and 2; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Places 1, 2 and 3; and Chief Justice, 7th Court of Appeals District.

Texico

The polls will be open in Texico from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. mst in the Texico Community Center next to City Hall.

Texico voters won't see any locally contested races. Billy McKibben is unopposed for state senator and Earlene Roberts is unopposed for state representative. Also elected will be Bruce Deavours, county commissioner; Coni Jo Lyman, county clerk, and Linda Hall, county treasurer.

The main races voters will be interested in are for president, (Clinton and Dole), U.S. senator (Democrat Art Trujillo and incumbent Republican Pete Domenici), and U.S. representative (Republican Bill Redmond and incumbent Democrat Bill Richardson). There are also races for corporation commissioners, Justices of the Supreme Court and judges of the Court of Appeals.

Pleasant Hill

For Pleasant Hill voters at the fire hall, there is a locally contested race. Vying for state senator are Warren Frost, a Democrat, and Pat Lyons, a Republican. Unopposed are Anne Crook, state representative; Paul D. Barnes, county commissioner; Coni Jo Lyman, county clerk, and Linda Hall, county treasurer.

Wilson retires from postal service



Loren Wilson

Loren Wilson, of Pleasant Hill, retired today from the postal service after 43 years. Most recently, he has been a rural carrier for Portales' Route 1.

He started his career Feb. 27, 1956 as a temporary rural carrier on Texico's Route 2. He started fulltime 8 months later. In 1958, he transferred to Texico's Route 1, then to Portales' Route 1 in 1981.

The U.S. Postal Service and National Safety Council have awarded him the "million mile" honor for "outstanding performance in driving a million miles" -- and 40 years without an accident.

Wilson graduated from Pleasant Hill High School and served in the U.S. Navy during World War II. He was on a destroyer in the South Pacific. He served Japanese Kamikaze attacks and also ran the "whale boat" to pick up survivors. He earned 7 Asiatic Pacific area and 2 Philippine liberation battle stars, plus American area and Victory WW2 medals.

In 1946, he married Geraldine Hale. They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary last June with children Veda, Janet, Linda and William and their families.

During his tenure, Wilson has served in several jobs with the New Mexico Rural Letter Carrier Association, including president, secretary-treasurer, executive committeeman, state steward for 8 years, editor of "The Nu-Mex" for 12 years, and was president of the Western States Conference NRLCA. He also was state auto insurance representative for 20 years.

As state steward, Wilson achieved the first and only "100 percent loal steward state" within the national association. And when he was secretary-treasurer, the New Mexico Asso-

U.S. 60 from Texico to Clovis has been a major concern for engineers in the district, but due to the financial conditions in the state, funding for projects has decreased over the years. The Texico situation has been placed on the forefront of action by both state and district engineers.

The Lazbuddie Longhorns ran their unblemished record to 8-0 overall and 3-0 in district with a 54-8 win over Cotton Center in an away game last Friday.

The game was called due to the 45-point rule about 7 minutes into the final quarter.

The win sets up the big meeting with Whitharral to-night (Friday) at home at 7:30. Whitharral is ranked No. 1 in the state and also is unbeaten.

Top receivers were: Weir 3 catches for 95 yards and 2 Tds; Seth Black, 3 catches for 54 yards; and Deon Gallman, 2 catches for 64 yards.

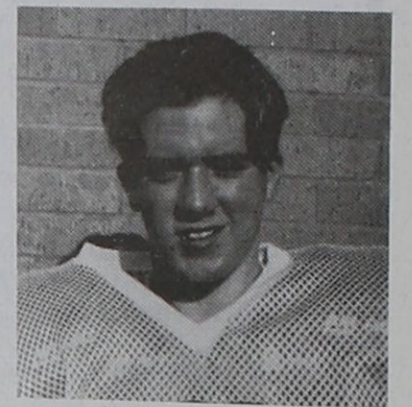
Jeffery Seaton, a freshman, rushed 9 times for 44 yards and a touchdown.

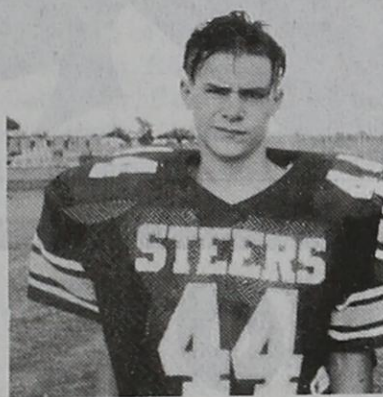
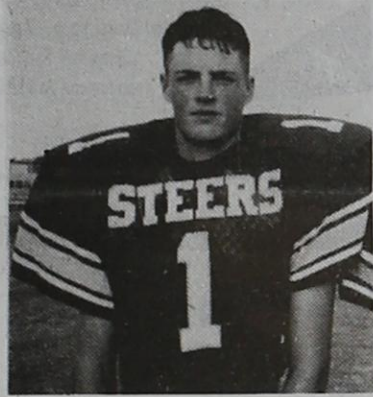

Pheasant population is topic

A discussion of the declining pheasant population in the area highlighted Tuesday's meeting of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce.

Gene Miller, an employee of the state's wildlife division, was invited to discuss what could be done to increase the area's pheasant population so a more successful pheasant hunt can be held each winter.

ESA Sorority is planning a hunt again this winter. But Beta Sigma Phi won't hold its annual pheasant hunter's breakfast.

Miller said the area's pheasant population has declined dramatically since the early 1980s because land use has changed.

Land has gone from intensive row water irrigation to sprinkler systems. Tailwater and "dirty" ditches are gone, and there's a shortage of winter cover and less grain food available for the birds in this area.

Miller stressed that pheasants have high reproductive rates and that the hunts are not a factor in why the population is down.

"We'll never see the numbers (of pheasant) of the late '70s and early '80s again," he said.

As to what local folks can

do to build up the pheasant population, Miller said farmers need to work with local governmental units like the Soil and Water Conservation District to make their lands more attractive to pheasants.

If proper habitats are provided, the numbers will increase, he said. Grasslands around playa basins helped recharge the Ogallala aquifer as well as provide a habitat for birds.

Miller was asked if pesticides affect the birds. He replied that they affect the environment more than the birds themselves.

In other business, the Chamber:

Wolverines win, earn state playoff berth

The Texico Wolverines shut out the Springer Red Devils at home last Friday, 48-0, to earn a berth in the state playoffs.

Texico is now 6-3 on the season and 1-0 in district. They face Ft. Sumner tonight (Friday) in an away game. Since there are only three teams in Texico's district (Ft. Sumner, Texico and Springer), and Springer has lost both its games, that automatically qualifies Ft. Sumner and Texico for the playoffs.

But tonight's game is important. It will determine the district champion and also the seedings for the playoffs.

From the start of the Springer game, it was all Texico. With less than 4 minutes into the first quarter, Pecos Chumley scored the first of Texico's 7 TD on a 1-yard plunge. Texico's Tobie Askew scored 4 of those 7. And by the end of the night, Chumley and Mel Askew added 2 more scores. Phillip Schneeemeier hit 6 of 7 extra point kicks.

Texico's defense never let up on the Red Devils, allowing only 2 first downs in the first half. All told, Springer was held to 32 yards rushing the entire game, while the Wolverine offense gained 43 yards passing and 239 rushing.

Othe team stats were: first downs, Texico 8, Springer, 4; total yards, Texico 282, Springer 32; passes, Texico 2 of 8, Springer 3 of 12; punting average, Texico 38.8 yards, Springer 21.6; penalties, Texico 7 for 75 yards, Springer 3 for 26.

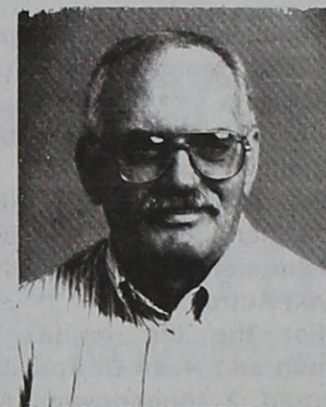

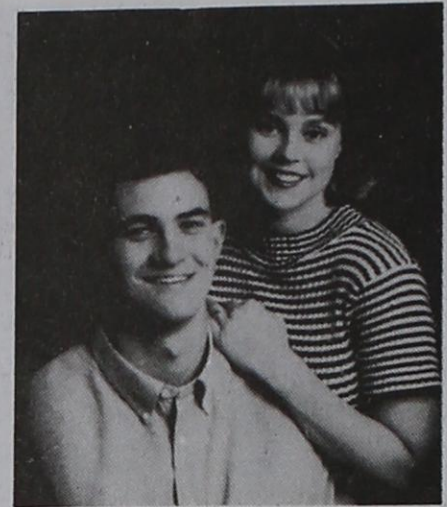
Among the girls' teams, Sudan is ranked No. 1 and Nazareth is No. 3.

Mars responds to criticism

Former Parmer County Commissioner Ernest Anthony placed an ad in last week's Friona newspaper criticizing current county commissioner Johnny Mars.

Mars defeated Anthony in the Democrat primary four years ago for the Friona area seat on the commissioners court. Mars is opposed in this year's general election by Republican John Tannahill.

In the ad, Anthony said Mars sold Precinct 1 (the Friona area) on Dec. 20, 1995, "his 21-year-old junk tractor for \$14,000. It cost the precinct and county another \$4,253.31 to get the tractor to run, although the tractor has never been in the precinct as of Oct. 22, 1996 -- 10 months later. The commissioner may not have acted illegally, but it was definitely unethical. Can we afford another four years? I believe not."

Anthony told the Tribune Tuesday that his ad in the Friona paper was incorrect in three places. He said he found out that Mars had paid the \$4,253.31 himself to repair the tractor, not the precinct and county as was stated in the ad. The tractor was bought by the county through Parmer County Implement Co., Friona. And Anthony said the tractor has recently been put in the precinct.

Mars told the Tribune Tuesday that the tractor in question "was the best I had." He said he had it overhauled with a new interior, new air conditioning and other work. And he stressed that he paid for the work himself.

Mars said the reason it took a long time for the tractor to be repaired and brought back to the precinct was that in February he took it to Dale Gallman, a John Deere repairman, and told him there was no hurry in getting it up to snuff. Mars said it was his mistake to have said "no hurry."

Mars said the tractor was used around Gallman's shop in Bovina while it was being readied. Now, the tractor is in the county barns and has a shredder hooked on.

In his discussion with the Tribune, Anthony also raised the question on why no vote was taken by the commissioners court on buying the tractor for \$14,000.

Texas government code says if a purchase is below \$15,000, it doesn't have to go through the bidding process. So the bill was put with other bills that came in and was approved by the commissioners court with the other bills. No separate vote was needed.

Where are they now?

The Aguilera family from Mexico is one of Farwell's real success stories. The following story was related by Rose Aguilera Marquez:

It took place in the mid-1950s when Pablo Aguilera came up from Mexico to work for Lonnie Wilhite in the West Camp area as a farm hand. With Wilhite's sponsorship, Pablo became an American citizen in 1957 and brought his family here from Chihuahua -- wife, Soledad, and three children, Rose, 6; Pablo, 3, and Celia, 4.

Rose said her father had no formal education but was self-taught. "He instilled in us a high work ethic. He didn't take handouts. At that time, school lunch for the week was \$1.50 -- and each of us kids paid \$1.50. My dad was a hard worker and worked for what he got."

On the other hand, "mom was a dreamer. She gave us high goals and a vision. We pursued education and were straight A students in the 1960s at Farwell Schools."

Rose said "Farwell Schools were very supportive of us. Farwell had a great sense of community. When we came here, none of us knew English. Lonnie would listen to me read English in my house to help me learn it."

"Lauretta Pool was my second grade teacher. She was the greatest influence on my life and that's why I went into education. She kept track of us throughout high school. She hired me as a teaching assistant as a summer job. Celia was a cafeteria worker during the summer and Pablo was a custodial helper."

Rose also credited Lenora and Amos Tatum for their help. Lenora was the school librarian and Amos was high school principal. "Lenora was very encouraging. When she got new books in, she would save them for us to read. And I still keep in touch with Jerry Dee Owen, the current junior high principal. He was not only a teacher but a wonderful friend. He helped us find summer work. You have to have a support system in life -- and Farwell really provided it!"

And how did the kids from Mexico who couldn't speak English when they came here turn out?

Rose received a bachelor's degree from West Texas State, followed by a master's degree. Today, she is a principal at a San Antonio school with 750 students -- more than the combined enrollment at all the Farwell schools.

Celia Aguilera Meach also graduated from West Texas State and is employed in the personnel department at the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms in Washington, D.C.

Pablo received a bachelor's degree from West Texas State and a law degree from St. Mary's. He practices law in San Antonio.

Lonnie Wilhite has passed away. But his wife Emma Lue still lives on the same home place in West Camp. They have two children -- Delton Wilhite, of Muleshoe, and Patsy Camp, of Farwell.

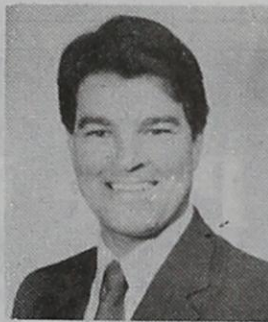

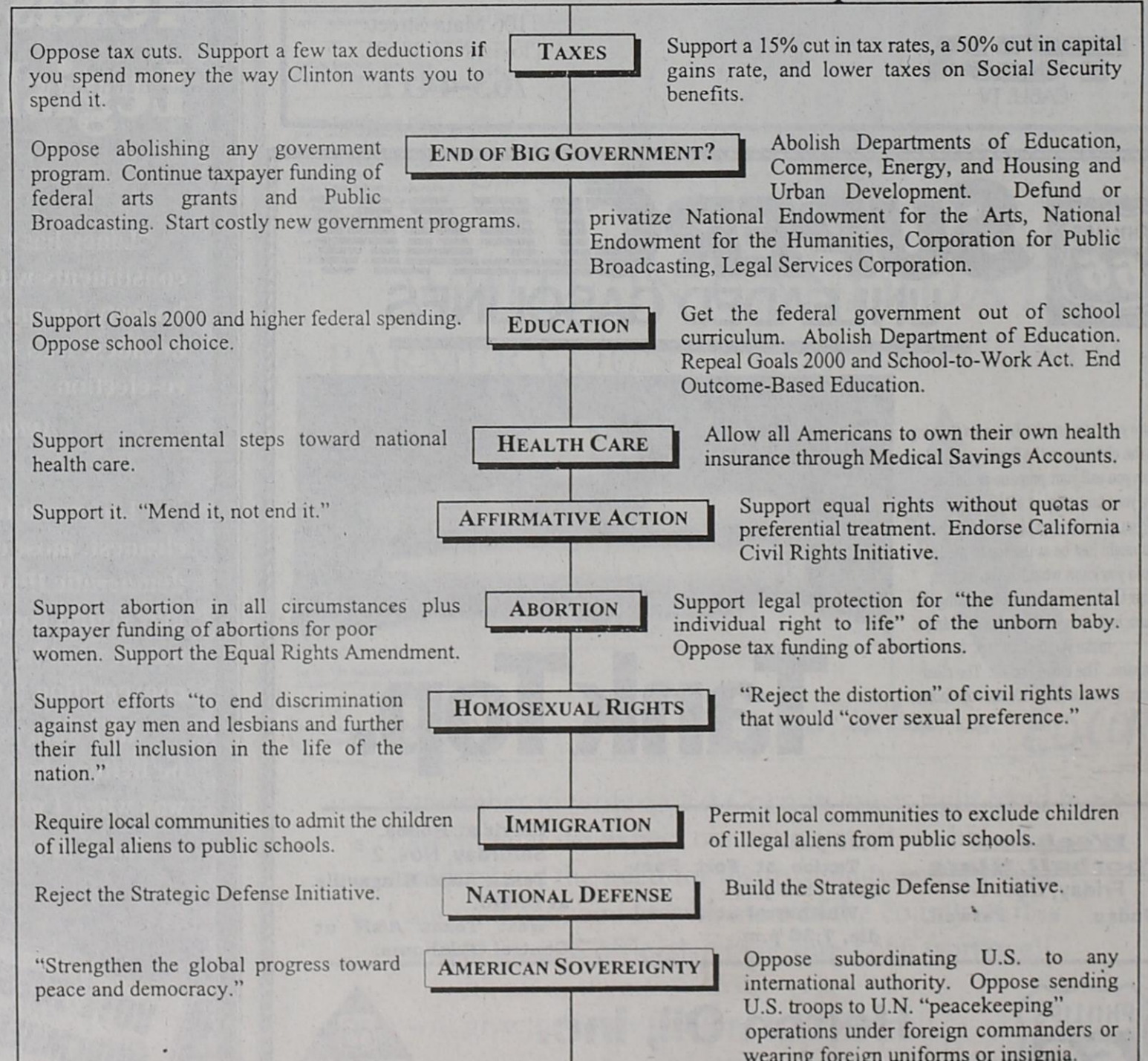

Harvesting activity expanding

Harvesting activity on the High Plains continues to expand. According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., producers making use of harvest aid products appear to have the upper hand on preventing late-season aphid build-ups.

"Essentially fields with the highest potential for late season aphid build-ups are later maturing and have some new growth on them," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson.

According to recent estimates, only about 35 percent of the area crop has been treated with harvest aids at this time.

Johnson adds that avoiding potential aphid problems will help reduce the chances of a repeat of 1995's limited sticky cotton problem.

"For the individual producer it is important to be as proactive as possible in every aspect of crop production," notes Johnson. "In addition to other tangible benefits, timely harvest through the use of harvest aids will significantly reduce the potential for sticky cotton."

Sticky cotton causes serious problems for manufacturers. If allowed, sticky cotton could also reduce the over-all demand for High Plains cotton that producers have worked so hard to create.

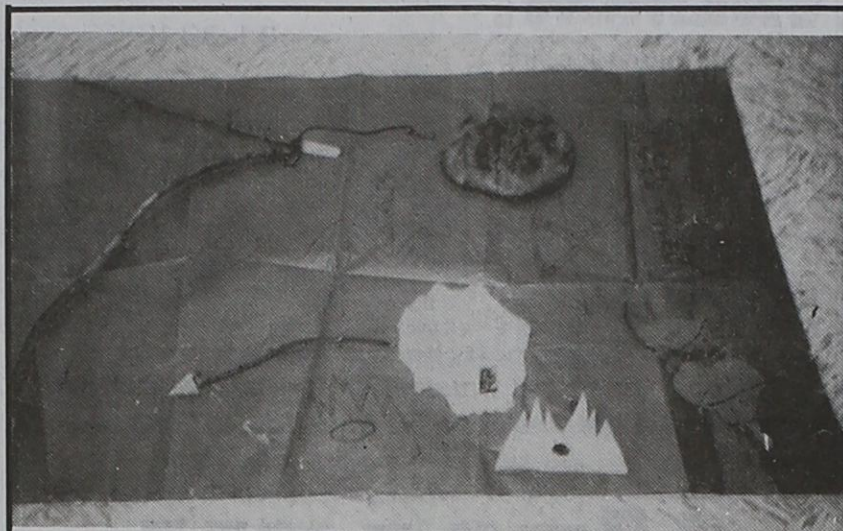
So far less than ten percent of the area has been harvested and the USDA Cotton Classing office at Lubbock has run a total of 44,624 samples from the 1996 crop.

Quality-wise, early returns exhibit a fairly typical pattern. Almost 30 percent have been called barky so

far, which indicates fields being stripped a little to quickly.

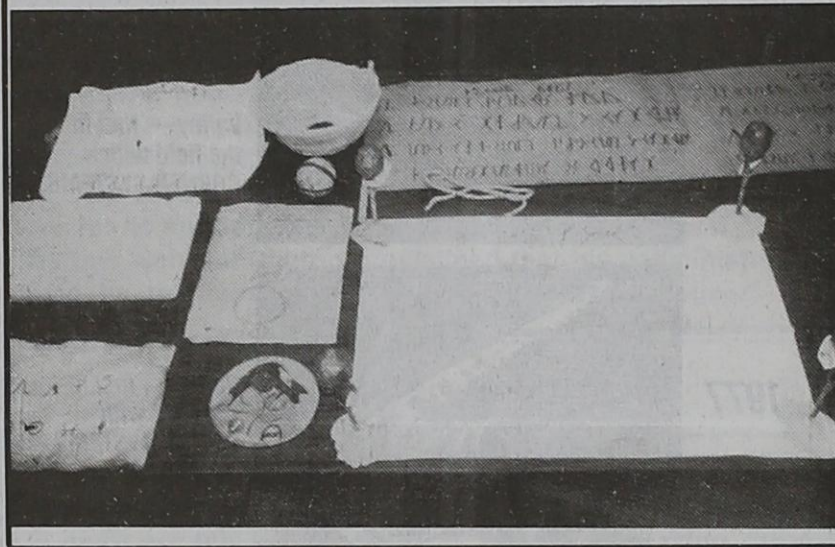

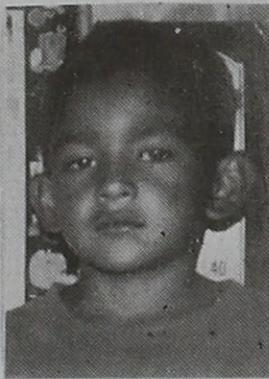



The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday approved a request from the Parmer County Crime Stoppers.

Funds raised are used to offer rewards to help solve cases.

The Crime Stoppers board asked that \$20 be added to all court costs earmarked in county and district court criminal adjudications. This extra \$20 per case would go to Crime Stoppers.

Currently, court costs in county court are \$221.50 in DWI cases and \$166.50 in all others.

Effective Jan. 1, these costs will be increased to \$241.50 and \$185.50, respectively, with the added \$20 going to Crime Stoppers.

Similarly, costs in district court will rise from \$242 in DWI cases to \$262, and from \$157 to \$177 in all others.
