Mrs. Haseloff has been in the area since 1973. She has been the Parmer County Agricultural Extension Service secretary for the past 2 1/2 years.

Thanks to Lonnie and Yalonda McFarland and crew at the Sherley Anderson Grain Elevator in Lariat, we can tell you. They keep the stats yearround.

The 1997 rain total at the Laria site was 17.19 inches, up from 10.16 inches in 1996, but close to the 17.34 inches in 1995.
The rain totals at their home in Farwell for 1997 was a whopping 22.98 inches, way up from 12.32 inches in 1996.
And the average high and low temperatures in Lariat were 68.9 and 43.6 -- compared to 73.2 and 44.3 in 1996.

## The Chief.s Corner

## From Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:

There seems to be coms confusion as to the responsibilities of various law enforcement agencies. I think it's appropriate at the start of a new year to clarify this issue
Texas Rangers -- These are the state's equivalent to the FBI. They investigate crimes of a felony nature. They enforce federal and state laws and their jurisdiction is anywhere in the state of Texas.

Texas Department of Public Safety -- This is the state's police force and they enforce federal and state laws. While they have all the functions of any law enforcement agency, the citizen usually sees the state trooper, They are the traffic control officers of the state. DPS jurisdiction is anywhere in the state of Texas, but they do not normally patrol within a city limit.
Sheriff's office -- The sheriff of a county and his deputies are responsible for countywide law enforcement, enforcing
federal and state laws. They are also responsible for serving federal and state laws. They are also responsible for serving
legal papers from the courts. A sheriff's department IS NOT legal papers from the courts. A sheriff's department IS NOT
responsible for providing law enforcement protection to a municipality or city. Their jurisdicsion is the county they work municipality or city. Their jurisdicsion is the county they work
in. However, they may take action anywhere in the state on a felony and a certain number of misdemeanors.

Police departments -- A police department enforces federal and state laws and also city ordinances. Their jurisdiction is the city they work in. However, they may take action anywhere in the state on a felony and a certain number of misdemeanors.

Peace officers -- All of the above are peace officers. In any case where life is at rish due to a criminal ace, they can and will take immediate action. In these emergency cases, jursidiction does not matter.
