While local residents were spending the week before Christmas safely sheltered inside against the unusual wintry weather, two others from the community were soaking up the sun in the land of beaches and palm trees.

Ramsey Bennett, a junior at Farwell High, had the opportunity to participate in the Aloha Bowl held in Honolulu, Hawaii on Christmas Day, an experience that turned out to be very exciting and even educational for Ramsey and her mom

Ramsey was selected last summer at a cheerleading camp at ENMU as an All-American cheerleader, making her eligible for the trip to Hawaii. At camp, staff members nominate girls in specific categories such as tumbling, jumps, dance, and leadership. They then can try out for All-American. Ramsey was nominated for jumps and also earned the All-American honor and the right to participate with girls across the nation in the 1997 Jeep-Eagle Aloha Bowl.

To finance such a trip, Ramsey had the help and support of the community. She raised money by selling peeler cards at local businesses and spirit face tattoos. She also received

"I just want to thank everyone who helped me," Ramsey said. "I couldn't have gone without the support of everyone in the community."

The adventure began Dec. 19, when Ramsey and RuthAnn traveled first an hour and 45 minutes to Dallas by plane then took another 7 1/2 hour straight flight into Honolulu. On that plane were about 70 of the girls Ramsey would be working with, so she got a head start on meeting some new friends and co-cheerleaders.

"We were greeted at the airport with the Hawaiian natives." Ramsey said. "They gave us a lei and kissed us on the cheek and all those traditions. It was really neat."

The girls then met up with another group and they traveled to their hotel (which overlooked the beach) in busses. They spent the first evening just walking the streets and familiarizing themselves with the area. This was quite eye-opening for Ramsey, a small town rural America girl.

"I couldn't get over how crowded it was and with all kinds of people," she said. "The streets were filled with people trying to make money, from little kinds singing, or guys trying to sell teenagers fake id's, all kinds of things."

Meanwhile, they were preparing for the big performance. A week before she was scheduled to leave, Ramsey received a video with the choreography of four dances she was supposed to have down before arrival. Then in Hawaii, the girls learned two more.

The first practice was held in Kapioloni Park, a huge area near the street so passing tourists and natives could watch the girls rehearse. They practiced 3 1/2 - 4 hours every morning, then another 4 hours each evening in preparation for the performance on Christmas Day.

The sponsors had several activities planned for their visitors. They attended a Paradise Cove luau, intended for everyone involved in the entire function. The night before the big day, the girls attended the Aloha Bowl Banquet along with the football teams, staff, and everyone associated with NSG productions. About 1,900 people were present.

During Ramsey's practice, RuthAnn had the opportunity to visit several interesting places. She went on the Pearl Harbor tour one day, and then another day visited the Polynesian Cultural Center.

Ramsey and her roommate from Los Angeles also worked in some playtime into their schedules, hitting a huge three story mall and the beaches. Here Ramsey experienced the highlight of her trip-surfing.

"Surfing had to be one of the best parts of the trip," Ramsey said. "It was a lot of fun."

She and her roommate first took lessons before they hit the waves and learned some of the techniques required and eventually got the hang of the traditional beach sport.

Of course the main focus of the trip was the performance. Ramsey was one of 650 performers. She was in the dance portion but the entire group included cheerleaders, color guard, dancers, drum majors, and twirlers. In the huge formation, Ramsey was very near the front on the third row.

"I was pretty nervous," Ramsey said. "During the dress rehearsal, a camera got right in my face, and so I was concentrating so hard on smiling and all that that I was off on the choreography! I didn't want to do that in the real thing."

What happened to all the county candidates?

When you go to vote in the primary election this spring, you'll notice there are no contests on the county level.

Why is this the case?

I asked several county officials and personnel for their opinions for the reasons why there is lack of candidates for each office up for election this year.

Teena Hughes of Friona, the former Republican Party county chairman, feels that the lack of candidates reflects the attitude of people all over the U.S. People are happy with their lives right now and they don't want to do anything that will "rock the boat" or cause things to drastically

She also voiced the sentiment of apathy that many people tend to have right now. Many feel that politics, be it on the city, county, state or national levels, is out of control and that it doesn't matter who is voted into office. The feeling that "my vote doesn't matter anyway" is a very big problem in our country. This feeling may be a factor in keeping someone who really wants to try and make a difference from seeking office.

The Parmer County Commissioners - Tom Ware, Raymond McGehee, Jerry Davis and John Tannahill - all voiced the opinion that the cost of running for an office may be a cause for not running. Currently, it costs \$300 to file for the Justice of the Peace positions and it costs \$600 for all other county offices.

A candidate must then spend quite a bit of money getting their name out to the public through flyers, posters, cards, ads, meetings, etc. The money put up for the filing cost is not refunded to the candidates if they lose the election.

However, all of the commissioners felt that if a person is sincere in wanting to make a difference or to do the job to the best of their abilities, the money shouldn't be a factor.

The county jobs, such as the position of County Commissioner, pay respectable salaries and are good jobs to have. . The pay and position should be attractive enough to people to have a fair contest for each election; but this has not generally been the case except for a few past elections.

The commissioners also stated that the contests for positions also tend to be better in elections that take place during the years that the President is elected.

"It's almost as if everyone that works at the Cancer Center has been hand-picked by God to work there," Leslie stated. "The way they treat and care for the patients is just incredible. There are patients from all over the world at the center and they come because of the excellent care they receive and the technology being implemented." Leslie's doctor is Dr. Karel

Dicke. He is from Holland and is considered to be one of the foremost oncologists in the field of cancer research and treatment.

The chemotherapy she is currently taking is concentrating on the lesions on her lung and liver. As of Monday, she was on her sixth day of a nine day series of chemotherapy.

The status of the tumor on her eye is that it is the "same." It has neither grown, nor shrunk. Her doctor informed her that this tumor will be treated with radiation later.

She went through an MRI recently and was given the good news that the tumor in her right temple and the tumor on her hypothalmus have both shrunk.

"I have total faith in the Lord and in whatever He holds for my future. I don't think He's quite finished with me and what I have left to do for Him on earth, but whatever His will is, I'm okay with it," Leslie stated. "The main thing that helps me through all this is that I gather all my strength from the Lord and my dear family and friends."



The Rotary Club recently used its manpower to put a new roof on the center. This volunteer labor was estimated to save the city more than

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



Precinct financial totals given

With the start of a new year, the Tribune thought it would be a good idea (like we did last year) to let Parmer County folks know how much monies are in each precinct's funds.

The funds that each precinct has can be used for any precinct business, such as employee salaries, equipment, machinery, fuel, supplies, etc.

All funds are maintained by the county treasurer.

Parmer County has four precincts -- Pct. 1, represented by John Tannahill of Friona; Pct. 2, represented by Tom Ware of Bovina; Pct. 3, represented by Jerry Davis of Oklahoma Lane, and Pct. 4, represented by Raymond McGehee of Lazbuddie.

There has been some talk recently of Pct. 3, which includes Farwell, of being in some financial difficulty but a check by the Tribune shows the financial situation to be in good shape.

Here's a rundown on how much each precinct has, as of

Cash on hand is maintained in the Farm to Market Fund and the Lateral Fund. The Lateral Fund consists of money that comes from the state each October based on the number of road miles in each precinct.

Thus, funds are distributed to each of the four precincts based on their road miles. This distribution is: Pct. 1, 249 miles, receives 23.8 percent of the state funds; Pct. 2, 230 miles, receives 22 percent of the state funds; Pct. 3, 314 miles, receives 30 percent of the state funds; and Pct. 4, 257 miles, receives 24 percent of the state funds.

Pct. 3 has far more miles than the other precincts to take care of due to the 1991 county redistricting, which was necessary to equalize racial statistics. But, as pointed out in the above paragraph, the precinct receives more funds, too.

The current cash on hand each precinct has shows, with last January's totals in parentheses:

Pct. 1 (Tannahill) -- \$19,590 (\$29,013).

Pct. 2 (Ware) -- \$21,670 (\$35,867). Pct. 3 (Davis) -- \$21,209 (\$49,595).

Pct. 4 (McGehee) -- \$13,493 (\$32,082).

In addition to cash on hand, some precincts also have Certificates of Deposit and Tex Pool investments. Tex Pool is a statewide investment group that many governmetnal entities, including Parmer County, are members of.

The only precinct to have a current Certificate of Deposit is Pct. 4. McGehee has one CD for \$260,000, at 5.6 percent.

Two precincts have Tex Pool funds -- Pct. 1, for \$80,000, and Pct. 2, for \$190,000.

Pct. 3 doesn't have any CD's or Tex Pool investments.

Thus, when you add cash plus CD's plus Tex Pool investments, here's a breakdown on how much each precint has as of Jan. 12 (with last January's figures in parentheses):

Pct. 1 -- \$99,590.00 (\$184,013.00)

Pct. 2 -- \$211,670.00 (\$210,867.00)

Pct. 3 -- \$21,209.00 (\$49,595.00) Pct. 4 -- \$273,493.00 (\$307,082.00)

Pct. 3 also has a debt in that the precinct is paying for a road grader. The next payment of about \$36,800 is due in May. County Treasurer Anne Norton said she sees no problem in

the precinct being able to make that payment. There has been a major change recently on how tax monies are doled out to the precincts. This involves the right of way fund, which was established to purchase right of way -- it was

needed for the widening of U.S. 60. It's up to the discretion of the commissioners court (that is, the four commissioners deciding together with the county judge) on how Right of Way funds are to be used. This totals about \$180,000 during the current fiscal year. Some years, this money was put into the Farm to Market funds to help with

But currently, about \$20,000 was put into the county's caliche fund. The remaining \$160,000 was pushed into the general fund to help with the situation there. At last year's budget time, the Tribune reported at length on the county's financial problem with more money going out of the general fund than

How did each precinct do with its Farm to Market money during 1997? Here's where each precinct stands:

Pct. 1 (Tannahill) -- Started the year with a balance of \$10,591 and ended the year with \$13,142.

Pct. 2 (Ware) -- Started the year with a balance of \$20,326

and ended the year with \$20,272. Pct. 3 (Davis) -- Started the year with a balance of \$26,678

and ended the year with \$21,131. Pct. 4 (McGehee) -- Started the year with a balance of

\$11,135 and ended the year with \$13,493. And here is how each precinct handled its Lateral Fund

money last year:

Pct. 1 -- Started with \$3,613 and ended with \$6,448.

Pct. 2 -- Started with \$1,469 and ended with \$1,397. Pct. 3 -- Started with \$4,240 and ended with \$775.

Pct. 4 -- Started with \$5,986 and ended with 0.

Aware that the above article was to be published, Pct. 3 commissioner Jerry Davis asked that his following written statement be reported to the community:

"It has come to our attention that Pct. 3 is struggling with finances, different than previously reported. Upon entering office, Davis assumed a debt of 4 annual payments of \$36,800 when he took office, in addition to the bank balance of \$49,000 reported. Also due to shortage in general funds, he will not receive Right of Way Fund of approximately \$40,000 which will be added to the General Fund.

"Although struggling, Davis will be able to handle all necessary functions, according to the treasurer. He has lost two personnel during the year and replaced only one, due to shortage of funds. He has one part-time personnel, which does help."

Notice of Property Tax Reporting Requirements

Property which was valued in 1997 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1998 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:

1. mobile homes 2. livestock, and

3. land used for agricultural purposes

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be except from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1998 if the exemption was not claimed in 1997.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and:

1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and a building permit for the improvements was not issued;

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by that assessor.

If you believe property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement

1. describes the property affects,

2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the last day of February.

If application for the Special Method of Value for Land used for Agricultural Purposes was allowed in 1997 no new application is required. However, if that claim was not granted in 1997 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor
