# Does crime pay?

#### by Teresa Mesman

The status of the investigation into the missing funds of \$300,000 to \$350,000 from the now defunct Parmer County Teachers Credit Union is simply this - whoever took the money got away with a lot of cash and has had no legal repercussions from the deed, so far.

Does this mean that crime pays?

Apparently so, according to the legal system, because no one involved with the case seems to be willing to make comment on the case until it becomes "public record."

Public record? Didn't the moment that this large wad of money disappeared from the Credit Union coffers make this incident public record?

On Monday, I spoke to Mark Nichols, the lead attorney in the U.S. Attorney's office in Amarillo. I asked him if a grand jury had been called to hear this case. He simply stated "No comment."

I then asked him to explain to me why his office would never make any comment. According to him, it is the policy of all sections of the Dept. of Justice to never make comment on any case it is dealing with. This policy also applies to the FBI.

But when I explained to him that the Amarillo FBI office and the Lubbock FBI office continually tell us to contact the U.S. Attorney's Office for the status of the grand jury, he could only state "that's not the proper procedure and I don't know why they keep having you call here."

It was October 1996 when an audit discovered the money missing. The teachers' credit union president said the loss caused the union to close immediately. The FBI took over jurisdiction in the case.

At first, it looked like a speedy end to the case. Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams said FBI officials told him almost immediately that this case would be presented to a

grand jury by Christmas of that year. That's right -- Christmas of 1996!


What has happened during that time? The FBI has said they were investigating it. Finally, at the end of January 1998, the FBI told Sheriff Williams that their information has been given to the U.S. attorney's office.


And that's where it stands... Eighteen months after the money is found missing -- no official action is yet to be taken by law enforcement officials.

Johnny Actkinson, Parmer County District Attorney, was asked by the Tribune if he had gotten any information on the case. But he said the U.S. attorney's office won't talk to him.

And calls to the FBI by Sheriff Williams and Friona School Supt. Hal Ratcliff have gone unanswered in the past, Williams has said.

Parmer County producers may need from 2 to 10 inches of water from irrigation and/or precipitation to bring the five foot root soil profile to file capacity prior to spring 1998 planting, according to pre-palnt soil moisture data released by the Water District and USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service. For more precipitation statistics, see graphs and story inside today's Tribune.

When pre-plant soil moisture was measured in November/December, about 7 percent of Parmer County needed about 2 to 4 inches of moisture, about 45 percent of the area needed 4 to 6 inches, and about 46 percent needed from 6 to 8 inches of moisture. About 2 percent needed from 8 to 10 inches of moisture.

# Rex, Susan McCloy honored

The Hutchinson County Soil and Water Conservation District honored Rex McCloy as the Conservation Farmer of the Year for 1998 and his wife, Susan as the 1998 Conservation Homemaker of the Year. The couple live in Stinnett, Texas and were honored at a banquet held March 16.

Rex was one of the first producers in the county to recognize that irrigation water could be saved with low pressure sprinkler systems. He has made the conversion from furrow irrigation to low pressure center pivot irrigation on a large part of his operation. He is a strong advocate for residue management and was one of the first in the county to begin using minimum tillage or no till planting wheat following corn. In 1991, he began experimenting with a relatively new enterprise of irrigated grasses and has developed a very successful irrigated grass grazing operation.

Susan is the daughter of Farwell residents Gil and Jean Patschke. She and Rex have seven children. She wears many hats as wife, mother, homemaker and teacher, as they home school their children.

Rex and Susan employed conservation concepts in the building of their semi-underground home. Twelve inch concrete walls and the roof were covered with dirt on the sides, back and top. The south facing front is mostly thermal glass. The house is then surrounded by a windbreak of beautiful, yet functional trees.

Susan was honored as the Homemaker of the Year for her efforts in conservation and for the many duties she maintains in keeping a home and raising their children.






"A description of my first skiing experience:



# Above-average precipitation received in our area

The annual survey by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 indicated that above-average precipitation was received in 1997 throughout most of the area, including Parmer and Bailey Counties.

This is good news for local farmers as now the actual soil moisture conditions are thought to be better than indicated by the pre-plant moisture survey data.

The pre-plant moisture survey has been conducted by the water district for several years to assist farmers in making their pre-plant irrigation decisions.

Natural precipitation is typically limited during the November-March months each year. During this time, the long term average precipitation received at Amarillo and Lubbock is 3.53 and 3.28 inches, respectively. During the first 3 months of the year, the average precipitation received in the same cities is only 2.14 and 2.10 inches, respectively.

Generally the amount of precipitation increases in April and May. With this comes an increase in the intensity of the rainfall events, which heightens potential for runoff.

The soil moisture deficit map depicts the amount of additional water need to be added to bring the soil in the plant root zone to field capacity prior to planting the 1998 crop.

Parmer and Bailey Counties were part of the 52% of the district's covered area that generally had from 2-4 inches of moisture in storage. The map illustrating the area-wide distribution of the stored soil moisture differs from the deficit map because different soil types hold different quantities of water.

The water district encourages farmers to keep in mind the fact that land cultivation increases moisture loss and to note the efficiency of their irrigation application as they strive to make the most of available moisture.



#### NOTICE

Wednesday, April 8, 1998, is the day to register children for next year's Farwell kindergarten and pre-kindergarten/Head Start classes. Registration will take place at Farwell Elementary School on Wednesday, April 8, from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

All children who will be four and five years of age as of September 1st and live in the Farwell District need to register for the next school year.

To register, parents need to come to Farwell Elementary with their child's immunization records and official birth certificate. Only official copies of the birth certificate are accepted and they must have been obtained from state offices. Social Security numbers are also required for registration.

Rebecca Smallwood, school nurse, will be available to review immunization records during registration and the Texas Health Department will be on site for any child requiring immunization. For more information, call Mrs. Smallwood at the school, 481-9131.

#### Pre-Kindergarten & Head Start Requirements

To be eligible, a child must be 4 years old as of Sept. 1st, is unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or is from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced price lunches) and is a resident of the Farwell School District.

Head Start requires proof of participants meeting federal income guidelines so income verification, such as check stubs, should also be available for review. Verification or other types of public assistance should also be available for review.

Head Start extends its services to handicapped children.

Texas schools are required to provide pre-kindergarten if 15 or more students are identified.







# Galvan, Armstrong get trial dates

The three individuals who were arrested and charged in the murder of Red Prather face a pre-trial conference with Judge David Bonham in Clovis on April 6.

The murder and robbery took place Dec. 11, 1997, at the Playorama in Texico.

Michael Treadway, 18 of Farwell was indicted on charges of first-degree murder, a capital felony; armed robbery, a second-degree felony; and conspiracy to commit armed robbery, a third-degree felony.

Ronald Armstrong, 18 of the Lariat area and Billy J. Galvan, 17 of Farwell were both indicted on charges of accessory to armed robbery, a second-degree felony; conspiracy to commit armed robbery, a third-degree felony; and harboring a felon, a fourth-degree felony.

A tentative jury trial has been set for Armstrong and Galvan for May 4 before Judge Bonham. This date may be changed following the conference and due to the trailing court docket that the court has for the date.

No trial date has been set for Treadway as of this writing.




