## Dairy farmers seek stabilized market

## By Teresas Mesman

An article that appeared in the Lubbock AvalancheJournal on Sept. 10, described the situation that many dairy farms are in due to decreased milk prices. The article quoted a dairy farmer from upstate New York as saying "we need a minimum wage for dairy farmers."
The milk prices per hundred weight have been decreasing across the United States over the past several years. An all time low has been reached by this region at $\$ 10.11$ per 100 pounds of milk. However, based upon the milk cooperative that the dairy farm belongs to, the price that has been paid to the farmer has varied
The base milk price is set by the particular Federal Order for the region and the current Minnesota-Wisconsin Cheese price. These orders are set by the demand for mik from each section of the United States. The Federal Order program has come under fire in recent years by the dairy farmers and their cooperative umbrella organization, the National Milk Producers Association.
According to Berny Mesman, a local dairy farmer, the Federal Order program doesn't make any sense. "The way the program is set up is stifling to a free market system and is handicapping the dairy farmer. It has also caused a lot of problems between the dairy co-ops around the nation. They've almost gotten into price wars with each other and their member dairies.
Even though the Federal Order price is set at, say $\$ 10.11$ per hundred weight, a milk cooperative can increase their

Homer Carrell Johnson died in the South Pacific May 13 1945. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. C.E. Johnson who re sided in Texico.
