Texico sets ambulance call fees

The Texico Volunteer Fire Department's new fee schedule for ambulance calls is now in effect.

Texico Fire Chief Lewis Cooper went before the State Corporation Commission at a hearing in Clovis on Monday.

He said Texico has received temporary approval for its fee schedule and he expects final approval in about two weeks.

The state has mandated guidelines for its volunteer fire departments which necessitate them to charge fees. The state has cut back on its funding to local volunteer fire departments.

The new schedule any time you call for a Texico ambulance is this:

* Basic Lifesaving Service, such as for a broken arm or leg, the cost is \$300 plus mileage.

Intermediate Lifesaving Service, which mean that IVs. heart monitors, etc., are used, the cost is \$350 plus mileage.

* Non-emergency treatment, such as transporting a person for a checkup with a physician, the cost is \$250 plus mileage.

Cooper noted that these fees will be applied to everyone regardless of where they reside.

This is important because the Texico ambulance makes calls to areas outside the city limits, such as to Farwell and to rural Curry County.





Dairy farmers seek stabilized market

By Teresas Mesman

An article that appeared in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal on Sept. 10, described the situation that many dairy farms are in due to decreased milk prices. The article quoted a dairy farmer from upstate New York as saying "we need a minimum wage for dairy farmers."

The milk prices per hundred weight have been decreasing across the United States over the past several years. An all time low has been reached by this region at \$10.11 per 100 pounds of milk. However, based upon the milk cooperative that the dairy farm belongs to, the price that has been paid to the farmer has varied.

The base milk price is set by the particular Federal Order for the region and the current Minnesota-Wisconsin Cheese price. These orders are set by the demand for milk from each section of the United States. The Federal Order program has come under fire in recent years by the dairy farmers and their cooperative umbrella organization, the National Milk Producers Association.

According to Berny Mesman, a local dairy farmer, the Federal Order program doesn't make any sense. "The way the program is set up is stifling to a free market system and is handicapping the dairy farmer. It has also caused a lot of problems between the dairy co-ops around the nation. They've almost gotten into price wars with each other and their member dairies."

Even though the Federal Order price is set at, say \$10.11 per hundred weight, a milk cooperative can increase their

member payments with added market pricing. The Associated Milk Producers, Inc. and Mid-America Dairymen are the two milk cooperatives that have member dairies in the area. They are also the largest dairy cooperatives in the nation with Mid-America being slightly larger than the AMPI. The difference in their member payments have been as high as .80¢ higher than the base price in past months.

The plight of the dairy farmers in the midwest and eastern United States is getting to condition critical.

"These states have the most concentrated areas of smaller dairy farms; those that milk under 150 cows," said Mesman. "Dairy farms of this size are not going to be able to survive unless milk prices come up and are stabilized. The solution is not necessarily getting the government involved. The dairy industry is now seeing that cheese is not the savior to pricing as it was onced viewed. Fluid milk sales have been the best for getting a higher milk check to the dairy farmer, but some of the dairy co-ops have been off in another direction entirely."

In an attempt to get a stabilized market and price for dairy farmers in the southwest and midwest regions, a revolutionary merger may soon be taking place between Mid-Am and the AMPI. This would hopefully cut out the price difference paid to farmers and would help to maintain a fair market for fluid milk sales to processors.

Voting for the merger will be taking place within the next several months.

"The dairy industry has been slow in some sectors to face the fact of the market oriented system that products must go through," Mesman said. "It is sad to see the smaller family farms go through such hard times. Even the larger dairy operations are struggling through this. Ironically, the size of the farms and the number of cows milked has had to increase in order to stay afloat with the current pricing. It's almost a 'damned if you do, damned if you don't' situation."

The criteria the Tribune is using is this: if a person had lived in the Texico area and died while being in the Armed Forces during wartime, he ought to qualify.

The city council has budgeted funds for a memorial to be built at the new community center. The memorial would contain the names of servicemen who died during wartime.

World War I

* Glen Snodderly lived with his parents about two miles east of Pleasant Hill and reportedly attended Pleasant Hill School until the sixth grade. He was the son of Sam Snodderly, a farmer.

He reported to the military during World War I but died at the age of 19 in San Diego, Calif., of measles and pneumonia. Simple illnesses caused many deaths during World War I, both for the military and civilian populations.

World War II

* Pvt. Jeff Ruckman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Theo Ruckman who lived on a farm 8 miles northwest of Texcio, died of injuries received in action in Germany as part of the Battle of the Bulge on Jan. 16, 1945. His wife, the former Lillian Reeves, lived in Clovis at the time. He was 24 years old.

* Pvt. George B. Duke, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Duke of Clovis and formerly of Texico, died as a Japanese prisoner of war in the Phillipines. He was a member of New Mexico's famous 200th and the date of his death is unknown. He was 20 years old and had served almost 2 years. Duke was well known in the area as he lived in Texico for a number of years and attended school locally.

* Roy Lee (Junior) Robison of the Marine Corps was listed among the casulaties suffered on the first day of the invasion of Iwo Jima on Feb. 22, 1945. He was a brother of Mrs. Milland Ingram of the Fairfield community and attended school in Texico in 1935.

* Homer Carrell Johnson died in the South Pacific May 13, 1945. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. C.E. Johnson who resided in Texico.

Sgt. Maj. Thomas Randol (Snooks) Osburne was accidently killed on duty at Camp Papago, Ariz., Nov. 7, 1943. He was the 24-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bart Osburn, longtime Texcio residents. He died when returning a weapons carrier truck to

Sgt. Osburne came to Texico at the age of 2 with his parents from Grandburry, Texas. He attended Texico Schools.

Survivors included a brother, T. Wesley Osburne; a sister, Mrs. Duncan Williams, and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T.J.

Sgt. Harry O. Williams, son of Mr. and Mrs. Abe Williams of Clovis, died in June 1943 while being a prisoner of the Japanese in the Phillipines. He made his home in Texico for a number of years and was a Texico High School graduate. Surviving were his wife, Mrs. Letha Goodman Williams; and 3 brothers, Duncan, Felix and Hollis.

He was a member of New Mexico's famous 200th, the majority of whom were taken prisoners at the final stand on Corregidor in the Phillipines.

At his funeral service, tributes were paid by three persons closely associated with him.

Charles "Chick" Taylor, who was his commanding officer when he was a member of the National Guard unit at Clovis, said "Harry carried his colors through."

Anne Overstreet, who was his Sunday school teacher, recalled his conversion to the Christian faith and called him "a young man who always had noble aspirations."

J.O. Ford told of moving to his farm near Farwell 22 years earlier, and was Harry's Sunday school superintendent. "I have no fear for his eternal destiny. Harry lived a consecreated Christian life," said Ford.

Korean War

* Private First Class Alfonzo Gonzales, 26, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pedro Gonzales of Texico, was killed in action during the Korean War on March 2, 1951. He was a member of Company I, 23rd Infantry Regiment.

After serving 14 months during World War II, he was recalled to service on Oct. 15, 1950 and had been overseas only a short time when he was killed. He was married to Mary Cervantiez on Sept. 13, 1950.

He received the Silver Star for gallantry in action in Korea. The medal was presented to Mary Gonzales by the mayor of

Lacy Gant, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Gant of Texico, was killed in a motorcycle accident on April 13, 1952, in Asto-

He was a junior at Texico High School when he enlisted in March 1951. He received boot training at San Diego and had been receiving further training at Astoria.

Surviving were his parents; a grandmother, Alta Fought, of Texico, and an uncle, Harold Fought, of Texico.

Vietnam War

* Hospital Corpsman Harvie P. Winkles, 20, son of Perry and Rada Winkles, of Texico and now living in Clovis, died in Vietnam on Dec. 8, 1968.

Winkles, a Navy man attached to a Marine Unit, was killed in "Operation Mead River," south of Da Nang.

The 1966 Texico High graduate entered military service Dec. 13, 1966. After boot training at San Diego, he was sent to Guam for seven months. He then returned to San Diego for special training as a hospital corpsman, and arrived in Vietnam in June 1968.

At the time of his death, he had only two days to serve until a replacement would have taken his place at Da Nang and he would have returned to serve in a hospital out of the immediate danger zone. He had earlier suffered shrapnel wounds in his leg but had returned to active duty some time ago.

As a youth, Harvie worked on area farms, as a sack boy at Capitol Food, at Fab Steel in Clovis and as a carrier boy for the Clovis newspaper. He was a member of Advent Christian Church in Clovis. Surviving are his parents; a sister, Beverly Winkles, of Texico; a brother, Terry Winkles, of Texico; and grandparents Mrs. Cassie Morgan and Mr. and Mrs. H.P. Winkles Sr., of Texico.

After a sluggish first half, the Farwell Steers put it all together last Friday and romped to a 41-12 victory over Motley County in an away game.


The Steers, 4-0 on the young season, host Happy at 7:30 p.m. today (Friday). It's Homecoming and the beginning of district play.



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
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A bird in the hand...

"We made eye contact with Pretty Bird and he quieted down and sat very still," Baize said. "Then we had to figure out a way to get him down from his lofty perch."

Jenny went to the door of the homeowner and asked for assistance. The man had an extension ladder and they very carefully raised it to a place where Kevin could climb up to rescue the bird.
