Texico ambulance fees may cost \$350 - \$375 but criteria to be used

The Texico City Council on Tuesday approved new state guidelines that are mandating community volunteer fire departments to charge for ambulance service.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey estimated that Texico will be charging between \$350 and \$375 per ambulance call, depending on mileage, income level and insurance.

Texico's rates still must be approved by the State Corporiation Commission which will have a hearing at 1:30 p.m. mst on Sunday in the Clovis City Hall commissioners meeting room.

Fire Chief Lewis Cooper will announce in next week's Tribune the exact rate structure and the guidelines to be followed.

What has happened is that the state is reducing the amount of funds given local fire departments, Autrey said.

"We hate to charge rates. But we need to keep our ambulance service," he said.

The city's approval of the state rules means that if the Texico fire department falls short of funds, the city will assist.

-- Plans to meet with Lupe Olivas over a house moved into the city a couple of years ago that reportedly still doesn't meet city codes.

-- Put on the agenda for the next meeting drainage problems near the Santa Fe Railroad right of way (behind Town & Country convenience store and To and From Bus

--Heard city marshal Gil Holguin suggest that city limit signs be put up at each end of Texico.

Parmer County Commissioners approve higher tax rate

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday unanimously approved the new county tax rate.

It shows a 7.9 percent increase from the effective tax rate. The new rate is .3732 cents \$100 assessed valuation.

In other business, they gave their annual approval for the fees charged by the sheriff's office on serving civil papers. They include:

\$60.5 million awarded

The Lubbock newspaper reported that an El Paso jury last Friday awarded \$60.5 million in damages to the parents and three surviving children of Gregorio and Maria Gutierrez, who were killed in a car-train collision at a rural railroad crossing near Friona.

The accident occurred on Aug. 16, 1993.

Also killed in the collision was their son, Greg Gutierrez, 15, a Friona School student.

State Police said the three were in a 1984 Mercury on a private dirt road that crosses the Santa Fe Railway track. The accident occurred at 8:05

No one on the train was reported as injured and the 28car train did not derail.

The jury found the railroad was grossly negligent in failing to sound a whistle warning and in maintaining a haz-

ardous crossing, according to the law firm that represented plaintiffs, Fadduol, Glasheen & Valles.

The crossing was marked with only a cross sign and had no automatic lights or gates, the release said. State law requires trains to sound a whistle warning 1,320 feet from a crossing.

The local cotton crops were not negatively affected by the rain, but it needs a good run of hot, windy days to get the best bolls blooming and filling out.



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

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OBEDIENCE OF FAITH

Paul opens and closes the Roman letter, using the very significant expression, "Obedience of faith." Christ extended grace and apostleship to Paul, "unto obedience of faith" (1:5). In the closing paragraph he states that the gospel was made known "unto obedience of faith" (16:26).

The major thrust of the Roman letter is justification by faith. It is one of the most dynamic documents ever written on the subject. It is appropriate that the beginning and ending of this marvelous epistle should embody the concept of obedience. Like great archways at opposing sides of a temple, so "Obedience of Faith" stands as a most significant herald as one moves into the faith start of the epistle and a most vivid reminder as one arrives at the close.

"Obedience of faith" means obedience which grows out of faith. It is the fruit of faith. The phrase may be translated, "Obedience to the faith," which signifies obedience to the gospel (cf. Gal 1:23; 3:2,5).

Clearly, faith is coupled with obedience. The only faith which justifies is a faith which works -- which obeys. One is not justified by "faith only," but by an obedient faith. When Paul speaks of justification by faith apart from works, he most often refers to the works of Moses' law (Gal 2:16; Eph 2:8-10). The question is not WHETHER obedience was required but WHAT obedience was required. In all of his writings, when Paul speaks of salvation by faith, the meaning is always an "obedient faith."

Many scriptures sustain the idea of "obedience of faith." Christ said, "Not everyone that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father who is in heaven" (Matt 7:21). James declares that faith apart from works is dead (Jas 2:20-26). Paul states that those who "obey not the gospel" will be punished (2 Thes 1:7-9). "Obedience of faith" cannot be ignored. The New Testament is saturated with it.


