Texico tackles zoning problems

The Texico City Council on Tuesday tackled several zoning problems:

-- A public hearing had been scheduled on a variance request by Jose and Cynthia Martinez concerning a house they had moved into town at Kindred and Anderson streets.


The house doesn't meet city codes which say they must have at least 800 square feet.

City clerk Marie Christian said the Martinezes, who weren't at the hearing, had called earlier to ask that it be put off. So Mayor Nathan Tharp said it would be held at the council's next meeting on July 9.

But Tharp allowed folks who had come to the hearing to speak.

Eddie Dunsworth, who owns nearby property, opposed the variance, saying it would depreciate the property around it.

Anita Zachrel said the Martinezes should be given a chance to fix up their house. Tharp noted that Mrs. Zachrel lives nearby but that her property is owned by someone else, who has cited his opposition to the variance.

Also speaking on the matter was Katherine Hall.

-- Approved a variance for a house owned by H.W. Moore at College and Hutson streets. Only two councilmen were present, Ronnie Warmuth and Oran Jay Autrey. Both supported Moore's request. Absent were councilmen Art Salguero Jr. and Rick Queener.

Mrs. Christian said three letters were sent to nearby property owners on the variance request and none were returned. The house will have less side yard size that stipulated in the city ordinance.

Moore will need a new aesthetic review permit.

-- Heard a complaint that someone is living in a travel trailer on Wheeler Avenue across from the former Burger Barn restaurant. Marshal Gil Holguin will check on it.

-- Heard Darrell Hampton, a Eulie Street resident, question about whether two trailers on a corner lot (121 Eulie) are meeting city ordinances. Tharp said city officials will check to see if there are any violations.

Hampton also complained about Waste Management parking dumpsters full of garbage on their property in Texico. City attorney Marion Ty Rutter said this is a civil matter if Hampton wants to pursue it.

Hampton also asked what the city was doing about trailers in town that don't appear to be meeting city codes. Rutter said the city has been working on the problem.

-- City street Supt. Matt Meeks reported on a mobile home at 113 Eulie. When it was moved into the city, owner Rase Longo was given 90 days to meet the requirements of the aesthetic review permit (ending May 16). Meeks said some skirting has been put on but no driveway put in or landscaping added. The topic will be on the next council agenda.

In other business, the council:

-- Signed an agreement with the state to renovate Highway 108 between Craig Street and Wheeler Avenue. The \$303,000 cost will be broken down this way: 1) the city pays \$1,000; 2) the state highway department has given Texico a \$75,000 grant; and 3) the state contributes the remaining \$227,000.

The highway portion will get curbs and gutters, a bike path and sidewalks for kids walking to school. Also, the street will be repaired. The portion of it at its Wheeler Avenue intersection has become very rough over recent years.

Mrs. Christian noted that Texico currently has received about \$1 million in state and federal grants for ongoing construction and projects.

Funeral services for Joe A. Helton, 78, of Texico, were Monday at Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church in Farwell with the Revs. Beth Harrington and Ken White Jr. officiating.

Burial was in Llano Cemetery in Amarillo.

Mr. Helton died June 20 at Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso, N.M. He was born July 22, 1917, in Jacksboro, Texas, one of 11 children of James and Bonnie Helton.

He was raised in Groom, Texas and attended West Texas State University on a football scholarship.

He joined the U.S. Army Air Corps and was commander of the 47th Night Bomber Squadron. He served in the Philippines during World War Il and commanded the first aircraft that landed at Osaka Air Force Base in Japan. He received a ceremonial surrender sword from the Japanese base commander.

He served as commander of a trainer squadron in Clovis and was discharged a major. He then moved to Amarillo.

He married Dardanella Whatley on Oct. 1, 1943, in Groom. In 1949, Mr. Helton and his brother Newt bought Phillips 66 Distributing in

He was owner and operator of Helton Oil in Farwell, a member of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church, a member of the Clovis Hospital Board, former mayor of Texico and sponsor of the Helton Oilers softball team.

He was active in church activities and was a charter member of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club, receiving the Melvin Jones Fellowship and several other Lions honors. He was a member of the state eye bank.

In 1986, he was named Texico Man of the Year and had been Texico fire chieft. He was one of the originators of the Farwell Country Club, and initiated construction of

Texico's first paved street while mayor of that city.

Surviving are his wife; a son, Hal, of Clovis; a sister, Nettie Fields, of Amarillo; 2 brothers, Allen, of San Antonio, and Carrol, of Borger, Texas; 2 grandchildren, and numerous nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his parents and 7 brothers. Casket bearers were Lewis Cooper, Robert Lucio, Jerry Cochran, Alan Warren, Jerry Whatley and Charles D. Fields.

Honorary bearers were Lucia Ceniceros, Tim Engram, Jonnny Jobe, Bob Dollar, Joe Smallwood, Barry Williams, the Texico-Farwell Lions Club and all friends.

The TCAO will have lots of games for persons of all ages.



The tourney will start at 3 p.m. and use the Rally format -- a point is scored each time the ball is served. There will be no time limits because the games go quicker.



Parmer County ranked No. 1 in cotton yield/harvested acres

Final production figures from the 1995 High Plains crop indicate the 25-county area produced slightly over 2.6 million bales.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG) the main reasons for the production drop were early season drought, a midseason flood (in some areas) and high insect pressure.


Compared to 1994, when producers chalked up their second 3 million-plus bale effort, the 1995 crop reflected a 14 percent drop in production.

Abandonment figures for 1995 indicate only 9.5 percent of the 3,621,900 acres initially planted went unharvested. This figure is slightly higher than the 6 percent lost in 1994.

A side by side comparison shows the true colors of last year's crop. What really stands out about 1995 is the fact that area producers harvested 250,000 more acres than they did in 1994 and made 427,900 bales less. Average yields across the 25county dropped from about one bale per acre to only 385 pounds per acre.

"Judging from the number of acres that were eventually harvested in our area it appears that producers tried to make cotton on just about every acre that they could," notes PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "Unfortunately the combination of drought, heavy September rainfall and insects proved overwhelming causing a significant per acre yield reduction across the entire area."

As usual several Texas High Plains counties managed to remain the top ranked cotton production




So far the 1996 crop has gotten off to an even worse start than did the 1995 crop. Already, estimates of up to 1 million acres being switched out of cotton and into alternative crops are being made.

The following table shows 1995 planted and harvested acreage, as well as total production in 480-pound net weight bales for each of the 25 PCG counties.







Local men attend Promise Keepers' meeting

First Baptist Church of Farwell

Eleven men from the First Baptist Church of Farwell attended the Promise Keepers men's conference last weekend in Denver.

They attended the conference Friday night and all day Saturday. The theme for this year's meeting was "Breaking Down the Walls" -- walls of racial indifference and walls of family strife.

Promise Keepers was launched six years ago as a maleonly group. It now operates across the U.S. and in 25 foreign nations.

Members of Promise Keepers pledged at least \$1 million to rebuild some of the black churches that have been torched in a string of arsons from the South to the Northwest. That money would be augmented by labor donated through local ministries.

About 51,000 men gathered in Mile High Stadium to listen to speakers reveal God's word concerning the walls that are built between people. One particular message by Dennis Rainey, executive director of Familylife in Little Rock, Ark., impressed

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
upon the men the importance of fathers to lead their children through the difficult situations that youth face today.

Rainey used traps, ranging from a mouse trap to a bear trap as visual aids to help the men picture how youths are faced with problems. He explained that peer pressure might be compared to a mouse trap in a youth's life, and a bear trap represents the morality problems facing youth today.

Rainey's message was concluded by the presentation of an estimated 4,500 young boys who marched into the stadium as men cheered and lifted praise support for today's youth.

Rainey also concluded by demonstrating the role of the father for his children. He had all the traps set and placed on the stage floor. He placed a blindfold over the eyes of a barefoot teenage boy. Rainey instructed the boy to walk across the stage. The boy began to walk and when the first trap came close, the boy's father instructed the boy to stop. The father then went to the boy and placed his boy's hand upon his own shoulder and led his son across the stage, avoiding the traps.

Messages such as this and the voices of men praising God helped men to understand that God expects more from men than men have given to Him.


