

Last month, a marker honoring longtime Lion Joe Helton was placed at Lions Park in Texico.

This event marked the end of a Texico-Farwell Lions Club project that began seven years ago to take a debris-filled lot in back of the First Baptist Church of Texico and convert it into a community park.

In 1991, the Texico City Council gave the Lions Club permission to renovate what was then called "Water Tower Park." A park, it wasn't. It was filled with broken glass, busted rocks, concrete chunks from a former volleyball court and other assorted debris. There was no playground equipment, benches, or other supplements to what folks normally think of when the name "park" is mentioned.

The key to the success of the project was the donation by Helton, a former Texico mayor and charter member of the Lions club, of an underground sprinkler system.

But first, Lions Club members, city officials and employees, youths from the community and others held workdays to clear the site of the rubbish that had accumulated. Then the sprinkler system was installed by club members and city employees.

The area was seeded twice and grass began to grow nicely. And a real park began to take form. Then the club, spearheaded by Joe's son, Hal, got playground equipment to add to it. Another workday was spent in repairing and painting the equipment.

The finishing touch came in March with the construction of the marker noting "Lions Park" and honoring Joe Helton for his longtime service to Lionism.

The new sheriff will hold office until the votes are canvassed after the Nov. 3 general election. Since votes must be counted within seven days of the election, that means the tenure of the person chosen sheriff will end by Nov. 10 unless he or she is elected in that election.

Sept. 4 is the deadline for the Parmer County Democrat and Republican executive committees to place candidates' names on the November ballot.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Mike,

With the special election of a new sheriff coming up, I just wanted to offer my thoughts on some rather strange voting criteria that I have often heard, and one question that I rarely hear.

"I won't vote for someone who doesn't shake my hand and ask for my vote."

If an active duty peace officer can find the time to shake every hand in the county, it only means that he or she is not doing the job they were paid to do. Any peace officer who campaigns while on duty is breaking the law.

"I only vote a straight ticket."

Politics has absolutely no place in law enforcement. Should any peace officer treat a member of one party differently than a member of another party, he or she does not follow the Law Enforcement Code of Ethics. A Sheriff is responsible for the safety and protection of all people in the

county, including yours. To vote for less than the best is an act of a fool.

"My choice is for the one who was born and raised in Parmer County."

The only time this should be a factor is when deciding between two equally qualified candidates. Remember, a few murderers, robbers, rapists and plain thieves were born and raised in Parmer County, so how does that make for a good Sheriff? It makes no difference to a professional officer where he or she works; their mission in life is to provide service and protection to the people, whoever they may be.

"I'll vote for him; he's a good ol' boy."

Does that mean he or she is a good peace officer, that they love the job and will work hard at it? All too often, "good ol' boy" means a likable person. There are a lot of likable people in law enforcement, some of them are sorry excuses for peace officers.


"How do I know who to vote for?"

You must take the time to find out. Your community organizations should sponsor a public forum, giving each candidate an opportunity to make a public introduction of himself or herself. Even working peace officers can make time for this. You should ask questions about your concerns on law enforcement. Use common sense to make your determination, remember that some outstanding peace officers are not accomplished public speakers. Ask yourself these questions: Did the candidate convince me that he has the answers to questions? Did the candidate convince me that he was sincere in his answers? Does the candidate have the experience and training necessary to do the job? And finally, was the candidate all talk or did he or she point out past accomplishments?

As a final word, "If you don't vote, you have no right to complain."
