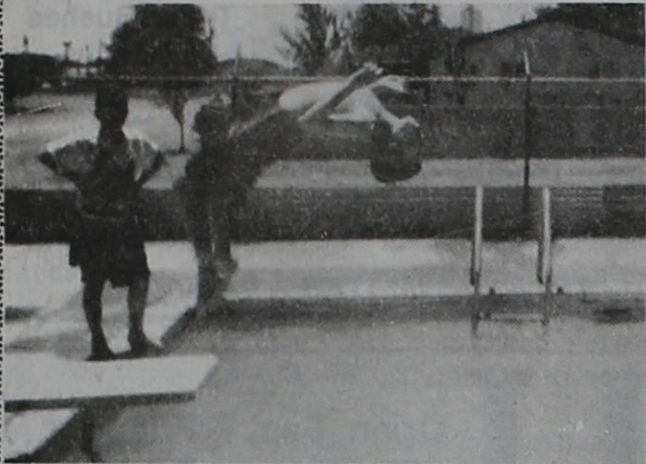

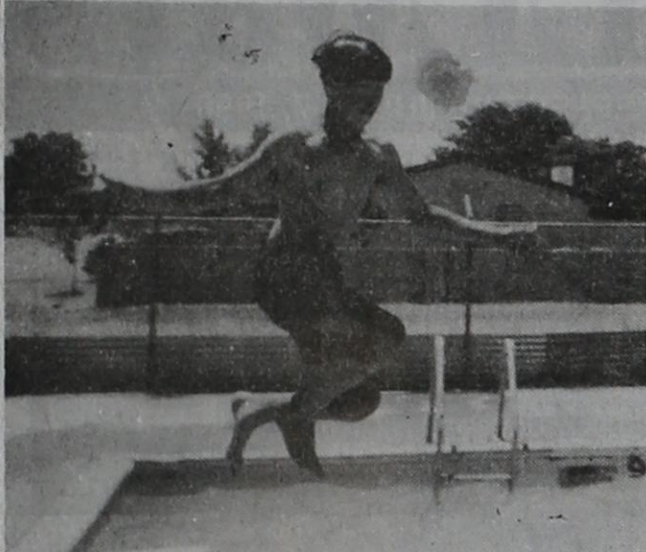

KEEP COOL

Did you hear that there is supposed to be a cold front coming in? Yes, it's only supposed to be in the low 100s and high 90s these next few days.

If you haven't noticed, it has been hot these past couple of days, with temperatures in the 100s. What is causing all this heat? Everyone has their own ideas. Texas Tech atmospheric sciences professor Richard Peterson says the current dry spell stems from a stationary jet stream and high-pressure system above the area that makes for warm temperatures and clear skies.

Then you have some people that say it's *La Nina*, the counterpart of *El Nino*, that is the cause of the recent onslaught of hot dry weather. The warming of vast amounts of water in the Pacific Ocean west of South America is known as *El Nino*. *La Nina* is the sudden cooling of those waters. As *El Nino* can bring cold, wet weather, *La Nina* may bring elevated levels of hot, dry air.

Then again, one Farwell old-timer I talked to said that the only hot air is the stuff that comes out of Mike's mouth.

How does this weather compare to the past? Gilbert Kaltwasser, Neil Stewart, and Herman Gerries, who have been in this area for a long time, say that they don't remember it ever being this hot for this long. According to the National Weather Service, Monday was the sixth consecutive day with temperatures exceeding 100 degrees, and the 15th 100-plus day for the month of June. June 1998 will not break the record for most 100-plus days in a month, though.

That record belongs to June 1990 with 19 days that were 100 or hotter, including 12 days in a row.

Wednesday and Thursday of last week both registered a paltry 103 and 102, while the record for both dates is 108. Friday was 106, well below the record of 111. Saturday reached 108, but the all time record high was 114. Finally, Sunday's 106 was close but still below the 108 degree record for the date.

With these temperatures, we need to keep children protected. "Infants and young children are susceptible to heat-related injuries because their sweat glands are not fully developed," said Mike Cowan, D.O., a pediatric emergency physician at the Children's Emergency Center at Methodist Children's Hospital, a member of Covenant Health System. "Therefore, the body is not able to cool itself."

To protect children from heat-related illnesses, follow these precautions: avoid activities from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., drink plenty of liquids, avoid caffeinated drinks, stay in the shade whenever possible and wear loose-fitting clothing. "The most important thing is to watch your children closely for signs of heat-related problems," said Dr. Cowan.

Heat cramps are muscle spasms in the abdomen, arms or legs that often follow strenuous activity. As strange as it seems, people suffering from heat exhaustion have a low or normal body temperature. A quick remedy for heat cramps is to drink tomato juice, sodas containing sodium or hydrating sports drinks. Call a doctor if in doubt or if cramps persist.

Heat exhaustion happens when the body is exposed to extremely hot temperatures and is more common in people who are not used to the heat. The first symptoms of heat exhaustion may include: headache, vomiting, dizziness or slowed reaction times. Mild symptoms are a warning to stop your activity, seek a cool area and drink more fluid.

Heat stroke is a life-threatening condition also resulting from exposure to high temperatures. Signs of a heat stroke include a body temperature of 104 degrees or higher; hot, red skin; no sweating; and severe delirium. To treat a heat stroke, move to a cooler location; apply cool, wet cloths; and contact medical assistance immediately.

License plate crackdown coming

Beginning July 13, the Farwell Police Department will issue tickets to those persons who reside in Farwell but whose vehicles bear New Mexico license plates. This action is the result of complaints received by members of the city council, reported Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa.

Municipal Judge P. C. Howard has stated that those claiming exemption from the law will have their claims judged on a case by case basis. However, they should be prepared to present proof to back up their claimed exemption.

McGaa cited the laws governing the license plates:

Texas Vehicle Registration laws are found in section 502 of the Transportation Code. The law requires any Texas resident who owns a vehicle and operates it in Texas to register that vehicle in Texas with the County Tax collector of the county in which they reside. Section 502.001 (16) defines owner as any person who holds the legal title of a vehicle or who has the legal right of possession thereof, or the legal right of control of the vehicle.

(1) New Mexico company owned vehicles are not owned by employees. Employees (not sons, daughters, wives, etc.) are permitted to drive those vehicles without Texas license plates. If you own a business registered in the State of New Mexico and a relative operates a vehicle owned by that business, be prepared to prove employment.

(2) As a general rule, if you claim a business in New Mexico but only have a Post Office box number, without physical location, you must have Texas license plates if you reside in Texas.

(3) Owning a vacation home in New Mexico does not exempt you from having Texas license plates.

(4) Out of State students and active duty military personnel and their families are exempt.

(5) Don't take a chance on a ticket, court appearance or fine. If you are in doubt, check with the Parmer County Tax Assessor and Collector, in the Parmer County Courthouse at 401 3rd Street in Farwell.

A question has also been asked regarding 15 year old Texas residents with a New Mexico drivers license. That drivers license could only be obtained by giving false information in the State of New Mexico, a felony offense in New Mexico. A resident of Texas, found operating a motor vehicle in Texas with a New Mexico drivers license, may be charged with operating a motor vehicle without a valid drivers license.

Mrs. Swenson had held the post since May 1.

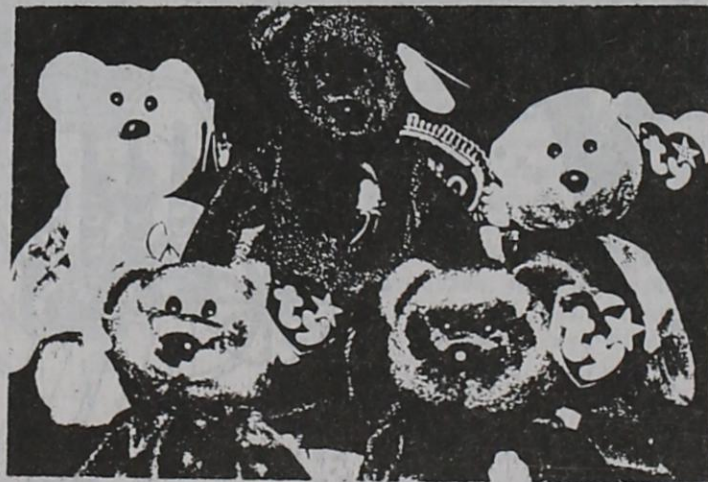
The turnover in the clerk treasurer's position began after longtime city clerk treasurer Mrs. Christian retired last summer.

Parmer County boasts one of the largest goat dairies in Texas

What has 2,000 legs, kids, and gives milk?

A goat dairy in the Rhea community.

This one-time small operation has become one of the largest goat dairies in Texas, says Jesse Abarca, owner of the dairy.

He started his business in 1991 after he retired from the U. S. Air Force. When he started, he only had two goats; now he has close to 500 goats at his dairy. "This thing has gone way past a hobby," he said.

When he first started off, he used the goat's milk to feed his baby calves. Over time, he kept the best milkers and got rid of the rest. It got to the point that he had so many goats that he had to decide between the goats or his cattle. "We are now the first grade A goat dairy in Texas," Abarca said.

Abarca started building his dairy in January of this year. All 8,000 square feet of the goat dairy was built by him, Miguel, his brother, and Aaron, his son. "Welding is my passion," Abarca said. He built the whole thing during the day, while holding a fulltime job at Excel at night.

"We are sort of the Rodney Dangerfield of the dairy business," Abarca said. When you look at the differences between a dairy that has cows and a goat dairy, a goat dairy

has its advantages. For the cost to raise one cow, you can raise 10 goats, said Abarca. Plus, he said, when you lose a cow you lose about 50 percent of your investment in that cow, but when you lose one goat you lose only about five percent.

Also, when a goat has babies they usually have twins, triplets, and sometimes quadruplets. Cattle normally have only one baby. Goats only take five months to have a baby while cattle take nine months. Then there is the price per pound of milk -- goat's milk nearly gets double the price that cow's milk gets, he explained.

The world consumes generally about 80 percent goat's milk and 20 percent cow's milk, according to Abarca. Though America is not real big on goats milk, it is purchased a lot in big cities from immigrants that want something from their home land.

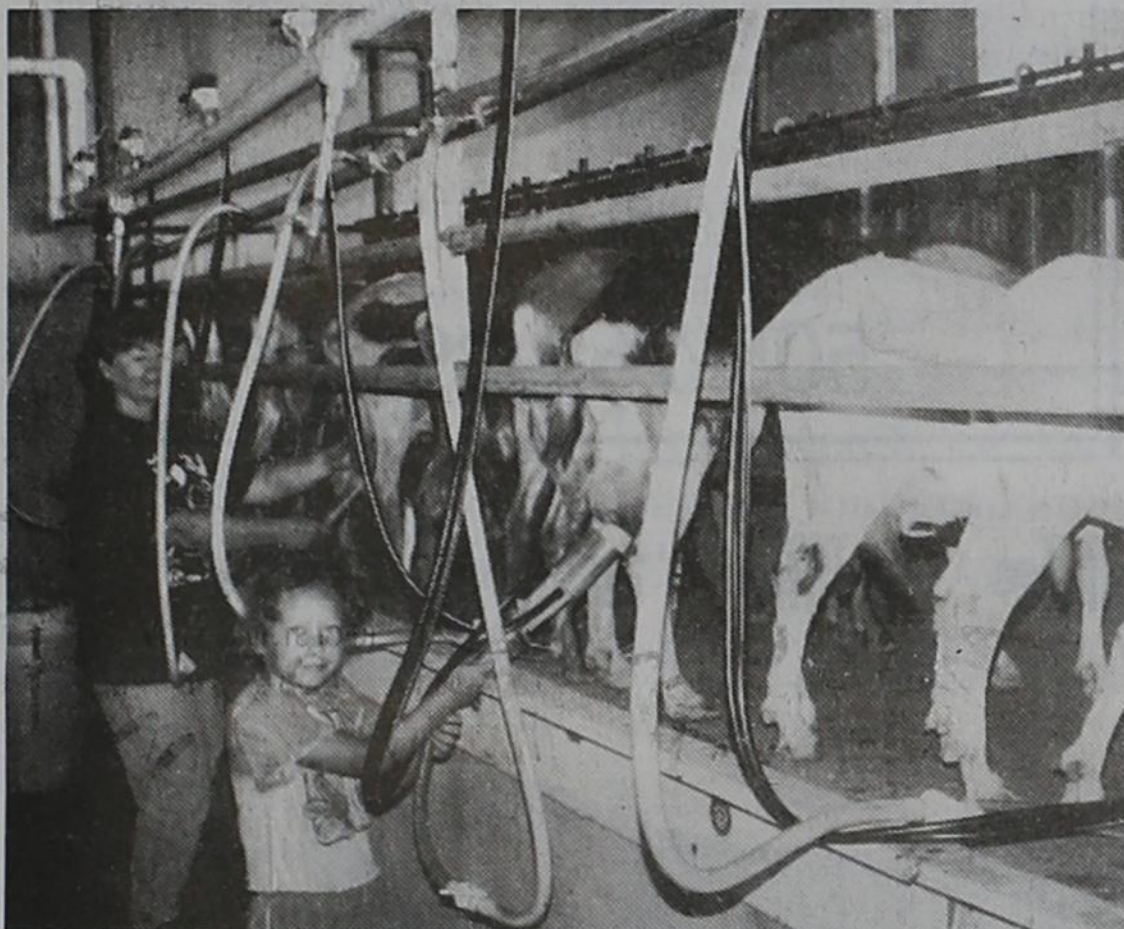
He has five breeds of goats at his dairy: La Machas, Toggenburgs, Alpines, Saanens, and Neubians. One-third of all his goats are registered, "but papers don't put milk in the tank," Abarca said.

Right now Abarca can milk 60 goats in one hour, but in a

couple of weeks he will be able to milk 120 when he gets the rest of his milking stalls complete.

The Yellow Rose Dairy in Dublin, Texas, is Abarca's buyer. They buy the milk and turn it into cheese, yogurt, and milk that is sold to the consumer.

Too Much Sun = Cancer, Cataracts & Wrinkles

The absence of sunlight in winter may cause seasonal depression, but too much sun in the summer can cause skin cancer, premature aging, and cataracts. Today most people know that exposure to the sun causes skin cancer. Of all cancers, it is the most prevalent, with more than a million new cases diagnosed annually. The most common types of skin cancer are basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma and malignant melanoma.

Basal cell carcinoma usually appears as raised, translucent lumps or bumps. While it does not often spread to other parts of the body through the blood stream, basal cell carcinoma can cause local damage and disfiguration through direct growth and invasion. Squamous cell carcinoma is usually distinguished by raised reddish growths, which can spread to other parts of the body. About 2,000 deaths occur annually from this form of cancer. Malignant melanoma, the most serious type of skin cancer, appears first as a light brown to black irregularly shaped blemish. It spreads to other parts of the body through the bloodstream and lymph system. If undetected and untreated, melanoma kills --- 7,000 people in the U. S. die each year from malignant melanoma.

Premature aging and wrinkling of the skin is another deleterious effect of excessive exposure to the sun. People who stay out in the sun too much begin to show signs of photoaging before the age of 30, while skin that ages chronologically doesn't show such changes until 40+ years of age. Manifestations of aging skin include fine wrinkles, freckles, dilated capillaries, irregular pigmentation (liver spots), and a general loss of elasticity.

Cataracts and other eye disorders are also caused by exposure to the sun and UV rays. Cataracts are a leading cause of blindness --- and 50 percent of adults over the age of 60 are estimated to have them. Other eye problems associated with UV exposure include corneal sunburn and growths on the outer surface of the eye.

Few people are aware of the association of cataracts and other eye problems with sun exposure, so be sure to tell your patients about this potential hazard. Both skin and eye damage from the sun can be prevented or minimized. Advise people to avoid long exposure to direct, or even diffuse, sunlight --- particularly at peak times (10 a.m. to 3 p.m.). Other preventive measures include:

- Apply sunscreen with SPF > 15 to all exposed areas of the body.
- Re-apply sunscreens every two hours, even on cloudy days.
- Wear clothing that covers the entire body.
- Wear a broad-brimmed hat to shade both face and eyes.
- Wear sunglasses when outdoors, even when it's overcast!

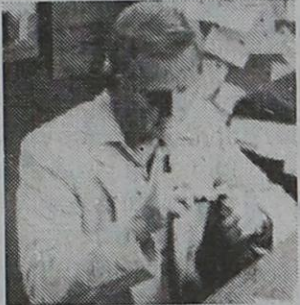

Before you decide to get a goat dairy, you might want to think about it awhile. Abarca starts working at 7 a.m. and stops at midnight. He milks the goats twice a day and when he is not milking, he is tending to the other aspects of the business, like giving medical attention to the goats. He said, "It's something you have to want to do and enjoy, because there is a lot of labor involved."

Abarca's long range goal is to have about 700 milking goats. He also wants to make feed yard for his goats, where he will have about 1,000 baby goats a year.

Sheriff's Report

Here is the weekly report from Parmer County Sheriff Walt Yerger:

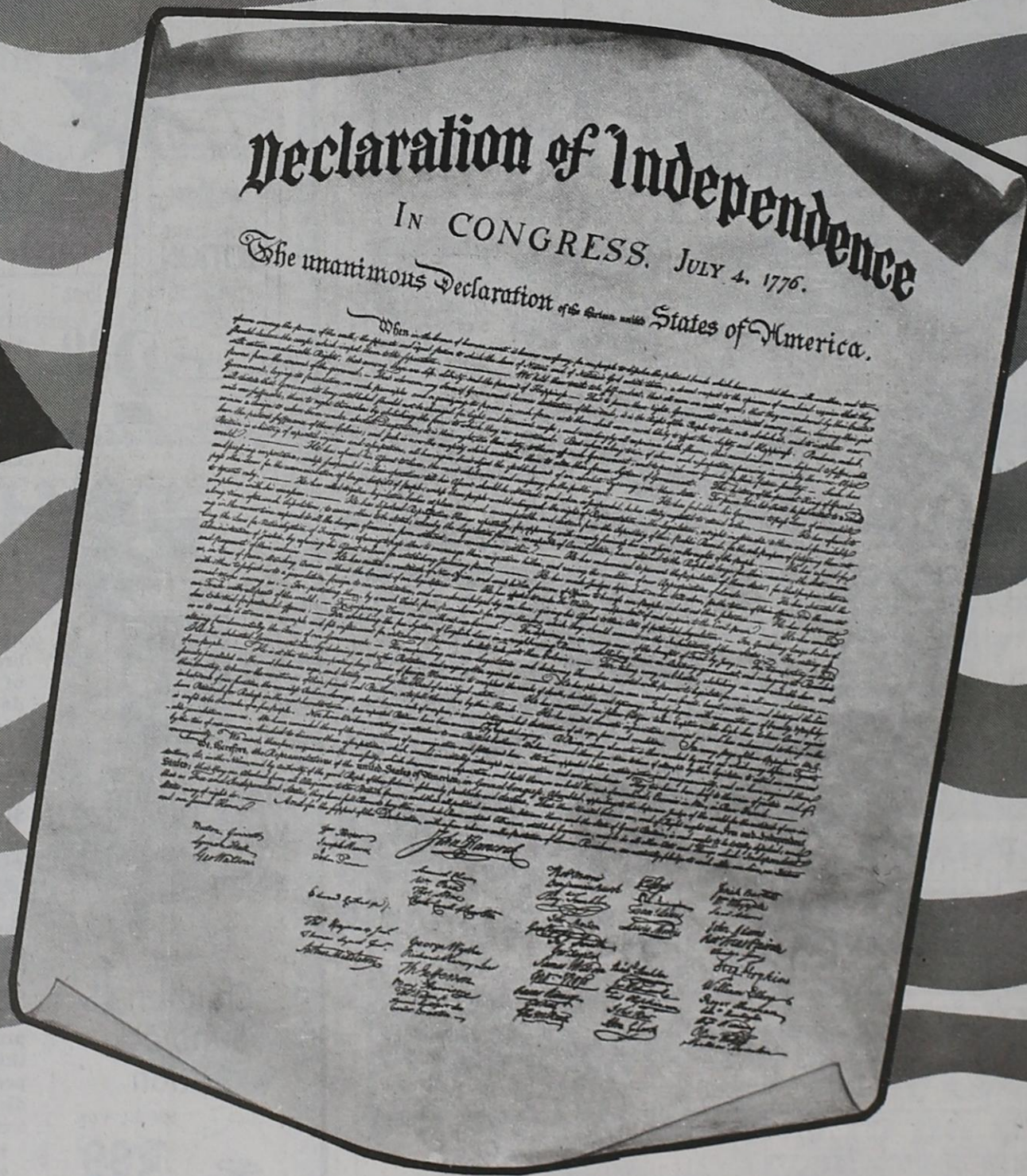

WHEN, WHERE, AS and IF

The Bible contains many requirements. Some are general; others, quite specific. God may require performance of a given act to be done at a fixed time and place in a certain manner. Only by doing what is required, at the time and place specified and in the way indicated, can one be truly obedient.

The Law of Exclusion is a most vital Bible-related law. Here is the rule: In any required program of work, worship or service, any and all things are excluded except those warranted by scriptural precept, apostolic example or necessary inference. Moreover, when a certain form or method is prescribed or when certain elements are required, then all other forms and methods are excluded; other elements are debarred when a specific element is stipulated.

Cain and Abel made offerings. Abel acted by faith, i.e., he heard and obeyed the voice of God (Heb. 11:4; Rom. 10:17). At that time, other offerings were excluded.

God specified gopher wood for the construction of the ark (Gen. 6:14; Heb. 11:7f). Any and all other types of wood were excluded.

Elisha, God's prophet, was quite specific in directions for Naaman, the leper: "Go and wash (dip) in the Jordan seven times...and thou shalt be clean" (2 Kings 5:10). Four things are spelled out. (1) He was to go to the Jordan. Jordan was not to go to him. (2) He was to wash (dip). Sprinkling Jordan on his head or simply dipping his finger or foot in Jordan was not sufficient. (3) Jordan was specified; not Nile or Tigris. (4) Seven times was specified; not two, ten or twenty. He was healed because he met the Divine requirements. All else was excluded.

Bread and the fruit of the vine are required by our Divine Saviour in the communion service (Matt. 26:26-29). All else is excluded.

Oral music is required in Christian worship (Eph. 5:19). All other types of music are excluded.


The Law of Exclusion is superior to the Law of Expediency. Nothing can be expedient if excluded.

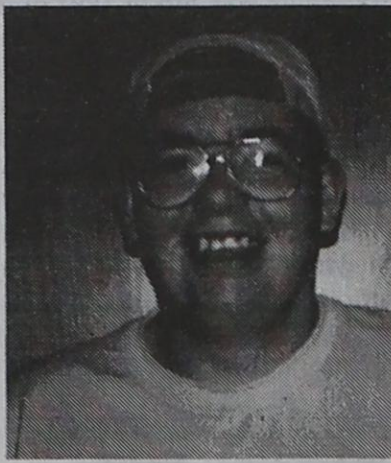

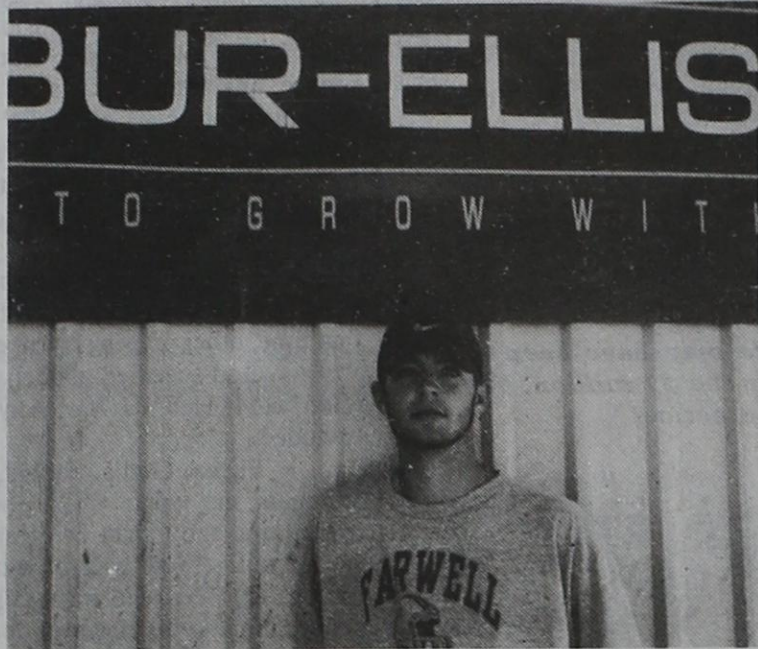

1997 cotton crop harvest totals given

Final figures for the 1997 Texas High Plains cotton crop showed a total production of a healthy 3.415 million bales from 3.3 million harvested acres.

This translates to an overall average yield of 496 pounds per acre harvested. Acreage abandonment was 7 percent.

Parmer County totals were: Planted acres, 70,900; harvested acres, 67,300; yield per acre, 776; and production bales, 108,800.

Bailey County totals were: Planted acres, 101,600; harvested acres, 80,800; yield per acre, 564; and production bales, 94,900.

"Border Games," the new video slot machine business in Farwell, is doing some remodeling. They are putting on a new roof and front so the building will look like a saloon. Then they are going to put up a new sign with a lot more lights, also.

The business is opened Monday through Saturday. They feature eight machines that you must be 18 years or older in order to play. Four machines take nickels and the other four take pennies. If you win, you are given tickets that can be redeemed for \$5 certificates to any Wal-Mart affiliated store.

If a player chooses, he can turn his certificates or tickets back in for more games, but cash is not awarded. Such machines giving out cash elsewhere in Texas have been raided.

"We had a person win up to \$360, in certificates in one seating," said Jeanette Holmberg, a worker at Border Games. "We're picking up all the time, we get more people in here every day"

She said that most of their customers come in the evening from Clovis, but they do get some from Farwell. They also get a lot of customers from Lubbock.

"They used to play the games in Lubbock till they were closed down there. Now, whenever they come through Farwell they stop here and play."

At 8 p.m. local talent will perform, contest winners will be announced, and the 4-H concession stand will open, at the city park.

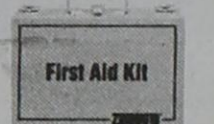
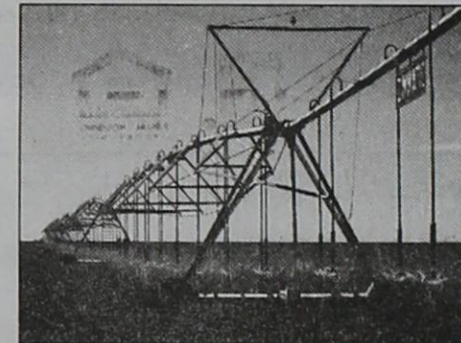
