
Case in point: when we ran several stories last summer about the huge number of drug dealers in our area and implored folks to contact the police, only one person called the sheriff.



# Farwell City Council receives RV petitions

The Farwell City Council on Tuesday were presented with petitions opposing the new ordinance that curtailed the parking of RVs on the street and in front yards.

No action was taken because the topic was not on the agenda. Councilman John Carlson asked that it be placed on the November agenda so official action can be taken. He would like to see the ordinance rescinded.

Petitions opposing the ordinance were presented by R.T. Langston. They were overwhelmingly in favor of rescinding it.

But it was pointed out that some of those who signed it didn not live in Farwell. Also, the petition stated at the top that RV parking was banned on folks' property, which is incorrect. It's outlawed in front yards.

Carlson said the petitions show its clear to him that Farwell folks want the ordinance thrown out. He said it boils down to a question of property rights and that safety is not a factor







#### Rate of Written RX Medicine Information Soars

The last time you visited your physician, you probably left with at least one prescription in hand. Almost two thirds (65.2%) of all outpatient doctors' visits in 1995 ended with a prescription drug being written according to the most current government data.



## **EPA** disapproves of Texas' Section 24

Protection Agency (EPA) has disapproved the Section 24 (c) special local need registration that allowed Texas cotton producers to use flowable carbofuran (Furadan 4F insecticide) on cotton to control aphids.

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry issued a Section 24(c) on Aug. 15 when cotton farmers were facing potential losses of \$40 million because of the devastating aphid problems across much of Texas' cotton growing region.

EPA notified TDA Oct. 16 in its five-page disapproval letter stating the action of TDA in issuing a SLN registration was invalid and "procedurally defective in its issuance." The letter contained a strong warning to the Department

The U.S. Environmental that EPA may find it necessary to suspend Texas' authority to issue 24(c) registrations in its entirety if the state should pursue a similar course in the future.

Producers can no longer legally use Furadan 4F insecticide on cotton to control aphids. However, the pesticide may still be used according to the EPA approval label.



The Pleasant Hill Pals 4-H Club decided Sept. 22 to paint the poles surrounding the new addition to the fire department.


The club will also serve lunch for hunters at the Pleasant Hill pheasant hunt on Dec. 20.

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# Cotton growers are crossing their fingers

Cotton growers on the Texas High Plains are crossing their fingers that Mother Nature will keep smiling on them a few more day and they can get their valuable crop harvested in good condition.

The 25-county area surrounding Lubbock annually produces around 3-million bales. That is about half of the state's cotton and 20 to 25 percent of the nation's crop. This year, under provisions of the new farm bill, the USDA says area farmers planted 3.26 million acres and will harvest an estimated 2.5 million bales.

"Mother Nature was really good to us in the Fall," said Dr. Randy Boman, cotton agronomist here with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "What she took away from us early (in the growing season) she gave back to us in the Fall. We've really had a good year, even with the tough start," Boman

At planting time last May and early June, near-record rains delayed planting in much of the area, washed out some fields and provoked some disease problems. Winds, hail and blowing sand also took a toll. "We lost about 250,000 acres, some of which was replanted to cotton," Boman noted. With the area's short growing season, late-planted cotton needs a lot of help from Mother Nature, as well as the growers.

Early in the season "we were at 300 percent of our normal rainfall," said Mark Brown, Lubbock County extension agent for agriculture. "Now we're at 119 percent of normal (precipitation).

In addition to the rain, cooler than normal temperatures slowed the crop's progress. "In June," Boman said, "the average daily temperature at Lubbock was 2.7 degrees Fahrenheit below normal. In July we finally managed to get in the pluscolumn, with readings 0.6 degrees above (the average daily temperature)." July's average daily reading was 1 degree above normal.

Under those conditions, the USDA on August 12 estimated the area would harvest only 3.1 million bales.

But weather conditions in August and September turned things around for the growers. "The average daily temperature at Lubbock in September was 3.5 degrees above normal," Boman noted.

"We had a lot of open weather" with clear, sunny days, added Dr. James Leser, Extension Service cotton entomologist. That was important for accumulation of "heat units," a formula based on temperature and number of hours of exposure to gauge the amount of heat the cotton plant accumulates each day. Growers use this to determine the stages of development of the plant.

A cotton plant needs between 700 and 800 heat units to develop a bloom into a harvestable boll.

From August 20 through October 6, Boman said, Lubbock received 750 heat unites. That's generally enough to mature blooms on the plant August 20 into harvestable bolls, he said.

"The first week of October, we were just ready to get rolling big time (on harvesting) when that cold front moved through

and the cool weather and moisture shut us down," Boman said. While the fields were drying out enough to resume harvesting the moisture also caused the plans to put on some late growth. That creates new leaves which can be picked up by the strippers and cause the lint to receive lower grades at the classing office.


