More than 1900 years ago an empty grave was discovered in Judah. While men have sought to explain its emptiness in numerous ways; none have been agnostic enough to deny its reality. The empty grave existed!

That grave was no sooner discovered to be empty than its effects began to be felt. Because of that empty tomb, soldiers were bribed, lies were told, and lives were changed. Vacillant Peter became the staunch spokesman who cried, "we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard!" Thomas replaced doubt with dedication exclaiming, "My Lord and My God!!" The disciples who had scattered as sheep without a shepard when Christ was crucified, gathered together with "one accord in one place." Because of that empty grave in Judah, the world was literally 'turned upside down'. (Acts 17:6)

The resurrection of Jesus is until this day remembered, In society, it is commenmorated by the setting aside of a national holiday called Easter. More appropriately, it is commemorated by faithful Christians who submit to the authority of the resurrected Lord. It was the risen Lord who said. Nursing Home Summer Aid

An oportunity has come up in Muleshoe for girls 13 years of age and older to perform a much needed volunteer service for the elderly, according to Mrs. John Harris of the Trinity Baptist Church. They said the "Acteens" from the church will begin assisting at the Muleshoe Nursing Home, but more girls are being sought

A meeting at the nursing home Tuesday afternoon has been scheduled, and Mrs. Harris asked all girls interested in the summer project to be at the nursing home immediately after school.

To be set up will be a schedule with the girls working a week, then off a week or two. then working another week.

They will be supervised and taught to spoon-feed patients at the evening meal who are unable to feed themselves: take wheelchair patients outside o. for rides; take fresh water to rooms: deliver and read mail; comb hair; write letters and read to the 49 patients in the nursing home.

Mrs. Stonecipher, supervisor of the nursing home, said there are only three employees working a shift to care for the 49 patients, and they find their time too limited to be able to do many of the small things Cont'd, on Page 3, Col. 2

Representative Clayton discussed Constitutional Amendment Four, which will be voted on in a special election, with three other amendments, on

He also discussed the status of other bills in the Austin legislature, as well as giving a number of facts supporting Amendment Four, which is called The Clean Water Amend-

In explaining Amendment Four, Clayton said, "Constitutional Amendment Number would \$100,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds earmarked for state assistance to local governments in construction of waste water treatment facilities, thereby clearing the way for increased federal matching funds."

He stated, "Disposal of improperly treated wastes is causing a serious threat to the quality of the water supply in all parts of the state and assuming that all Water Development Board bonds are sold and Rederet construction maney is available, the state would be eligible for more than \$180 million in Federal funds."



In many cases, dressing rooms are now used for storage of supplies and equipment. There are still some theatres in large cities suitable for large productions such as the Zogi Revue, but special permits to transport and unload equipment at their stage doors must be obtained from the city and transfer companies hired to bring the tons of equipment through the downtown city streets during the small hours of the morning, due to the ever-growing traffic problems. 

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


