Bristow begins family practice

(Editor's note: The following article about Chris Bristow comes from the July 21 issue of the Palestine, Texas, Herald-Press. Chris is a Farwell High graduate. His father, Rev. Dudley Bristow, formerly pastored at Farwell First Baptist Church. Chris' wife, Lisa, hails from Pleasant Hill. Her father formerly pastored at Pleasant Hill Baptist Church. The Bristow's have three children.)

Chris Bristow is part of a new breed of rural doctors recruited by the Fairfield Memorial Hospital Board of Directors three years ago as 4th-year medical students. The board courted them by providing financial assistance for their education and their residences.

Bristow began his family practice Monday at the Medical Arts Clinic in Fairfield for a minimum 6-year commitment. He has completed a 3-year residency emphasizing obstetrics, gynecology, pediatrics, minor surgery, emergency medicine and general internal medicine. He will help reopen the obstetric department and deliver babies at Fairfield Memorial Hospital.

The hospital board contacted Bristow through a Rural Health Initiative health fair in 1993 in Austin. The program was designed by the state legislature to attract physicians to rural areas.

Bristow, 33, was born in Lubbock but reared in Farwell. After high school, he worked as a paramedic and got hooked on medicine. He completed undergraduate work at Texas Tech University, followed by formal medical training at the University of North Texas Health Science Center in Fort Worth. He stayed in Fort Worth to complete his residency at John Peter Smith Hospital.

"That's what the Lord had for me to do. That's usually the ultimate guide for everything in my life," said Bristow. "We have definitely felt very welcome here. This is going to make our job easier. It's just a more rural-type atmosphere. This feels more like home."

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Railroad crossing survey taken

The Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad has sent a letter to the Farwell Chamber of Commerce noting a survey taken by the railroad of train traffic through the Twin Cities.

Recently, the Farwell Chamber has suggested that an overpass be built between the two communities due to increasing train traffic.

The railroad took a survey for seven days, from May 19 to May 25. Their train counts were:

May 19, Sunday - 68. May 20, Monday - 60. May 21, Tuesday - 41. May 22, Wednesday - 54. May 23, Thursday - 66. May 24, Friday - 55. May 25, Saturday - 68. The average for the seven

days was 58.8. The railroad projects a 5 percent compound annual growth over the next four years. Thus, they expect their daily total average trains to climb from the 58.8 current

hears suggestions

The Texico City Council on Tuesday heard some suggestions from Gene Phillips. He noted four things:

-- That the residential speed limit of 30 miles per hour is too high and dangerous when kids are walking.

Mayor Butch Tharp responded that the city tried to lower the limits several years back but the state, which sets the limits, wouldn't allow it.

-- That parking on the north side of Wheeler Avenue obstructrs the vision of motorists. He said off-street parking is available.

-- At least one irrigation pump is inside the city limits. He said the one near College Avenue needs to be quieter.

City attorney Marion Ty Rutter will check on this.

-- That pedestrian crossings could be used across Wheeler Avenue. Tharp said the city will look into this. In other business, the council:

-- Heard that the street sweeper the city is buying for \$4,500 will be delivered next month.

-- Agreed to buy two more fire hydrants, at \$800 apiece.

-- Voted to buy a couple of dozen more meters, about \$40 each.

-- Heard Tharp compliment the city's public works department employees for working hard to improve the city's appearance.

-- Noted that the Border Town Days Committee is included in the city's insurance coverage for its portion of the BTD parade within the Texico city limits.

At the previous meeting, BTD Chairman Mike Pomper had asked about it. The Farwell portion of BTD is covered by the city of Farwell's insurance.

Juniper trees to be planted

Fourth graders from the Bovina elementary school will soon learn that the Texas Department of Transportation does more than just build roads.

These students have been invited to participate in an environmentally-significant event that will teach them the importance of using vegetation to prevent heavy highway maintenance.

students will help the highway On Wednesday, department and the Texas Forest Service plant several hundred juniper trees on the right-of-way on FM 1731, west of Bovina.

These trees, planted in rows 25-40 feet apart, and 200 feet from the roadway are called a "Living Snow Fence." The junipers are designed to catch blowing snow during the winter months. The fence blocks the wind and drifting snow, making the roads easier to blade and keeping them open longer. A row of Aromatic Sumac will be planted in front of the junipers making the snow fence three rows deep.

Snow fences are not a new concept, according to Bob Fewin, area forester with the Texas Forest Service in Lubbock.

"These fences have been used for years in the Northern Great Plains," he added. "We brought the concept to the Panhandle several years ago."

of brooms, mops and other household aides. Funds we raise are used to buy eye glasses for Texico-Farwell kids who are indigent, and for other local projects.



It will take four to five years before the young saplings are large enough to make a difference, commented Ann Finley, maintenance contract administrator for the highway depagrtment's Lubbock District.

"But we should see a major difference when these trees and bushes mature," she added. "The snow fences have been tremendously successful in the northern U.S."

"This is preventative maintenance at its best," Finley added. The fabric and windscreens will protect the small trees and prevent weeds from hogging the moisture. The fabric is placed around the base of the trees.

"If we prevent weeds from growing - which is what this mesh fabric will do - the trees can grow on natural moisture. We won't be out the expense of watering," she noted.

"This is our opportunity to give back to the environment instead of always taking away," she said. "And, this is a great opportunity for our children to see how vegetation can assist us in maintaining highways."

Other locations where the department will build snow fences are: U.S. 60 on Parmerton Hill, two overpasses on Highway 214, south of Friona, FM Road 2298, north of Friona and Highway 214, northwest of Friona.

The department will plant 850 juniper trees and 1,575 bushes at six locations around Friona and Bovina.


Lloyd elected to state group

Lazbuddie School is one of several in the state participating in a new lunch program this year.

For most schools, a set lunch is offered -- main course, fruit, vegetable and dessert.

But this year Lazbuddie School students will have choices for the main course and side dishes each day.

For example, on Monday the lunch will feature hamburger basket, pizza, burritos, sandwich with chips, <u>and</u> chicken nuggets. Students can choose one main dish.

That allows students a choice from five main entries.

The side dishes for Monday includes corn, green beans, mashed potatoes and gravy, salad <u>and</u> fruit. Again, students have a wide choice of side dishes to choose from. Students can choose two side dishes.

Each lunch also offers a dessert and milk.

Here's an example from next Tuesday's menu: Entries consist of hamburger basket, pizza, corn dogs, sandwich with chips, and meat loaf. Side dishes include corn, green beans, mixed vegetables, salad and fruit. Again, students can pick one entree and two side dishes.

However, students in pre-kindergarten, kindergarten, first and second grades don't have entree choices.

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More rain falls

Slow, steady rain and drizzle fell all over the region last weekend and continued on into Monday. The showers were remnants of Hurricane Dolly that made landfall last Friday near Tampico, Mexico.

According to the Associated Press, an upper-level trough in the far west combined with moisture from the remnants of Dolly. Together, this brought showers and thundershowers to West and South Texas.

The majority of rainfall was west of a line from Wichita Falls through Fort Worth and Waco, according to the National Weather Service. West Texas and Eastern New Mexico received the least amounts of rain as compared to the heavy, torrential downpours that the other parts of the state received. Flash flood warnings were posted in the the central sections of Texas.

Sherley-Anderson-Pitman in Farwell received 1.20 inches over Friday and Saturday. According to Lonnie McFarland, of Sherley-Anderson in Lariat, he measured 1.45 inches in his rain guage at his home in Farwell. The elevator in Lariat only received .60.

Sherley-Anderson elevator in Lazbuddie reported only .45 on Friday and nothing for Saturday. Many farms around the Lazbuddie area received a light drizzle throughout the day, but nothing measurable.

Some areas around the region received up to 2 inches of rain. Greg and Roberta Howard of Farwell reported getting almost 2 inches at their house.

More rain fell on the area on Monday and Tuesday, but to a lesser extent.

McFarland said a tenth of an inch fell Monday and .02 on Tuesday. At Lazbuddie, Shirley Steinbock said just a sprinkle occurred. The biggest numbers were in Farwell where about .30" more moisture came down.

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The Chief's Corner

From Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:

Recently, I had the pleasure of teaching again at the S.P.A.G. Regional Law Enforcement Academy. The class consisted of basic academy recruits who were in their 15th and last week of training. They were instructed in criminal investigation, crime scene search and crime scene protection.

At the class conclusion, students were presented with a simulated homicide to work and present in court. A real judge and attorneys volunteer their time to show the recruits what really happens in court. When they are hammered by the defense attorney, the stunned expressions on their faces is a good indicator that they had no real idea of what they were in for. All were grateful it happened in training rather than in a real trial.

One older student said he had no idea of what was involved in being a peace officer. It was a good point and I'll sum it up for you. The basic peace officer course is now 560 hours of training, consisting of many subjects. They just scratch the surface in each topic.

For example, criminal investigation, crime scene protection and search covered three days. Within that time, homicide was covered, but a course on homicide alone covers three days; a section of homicide investigation, such as sex crimes, can also cover three days. Fingerprints are also touched on in these same three days, but the fingerprint school in Austin is two weeks long -- 80 hours.

These students are now aware of the fact they have not completed training - -they have just completed the basic training necessary to start a life of continuous training that will last throughout their careers.

There is a definite advantage in teaching: it keeps me thinking. I have not worked a homicide in about five years, yet I teach a homicide class 3 to 4 times a year, thus constantly retraining myself in the procedures. The old saying "if you don't use it, you lose it" is very true in law enforcement.


Lazbuddie's JV team is small this year, with 7 members. Against Groom, the defense was okay but the Longhorns weren't able to move the ball well, Scisson said.

Under this proposal taxes on the average home would <u>increase</u> by \$7,08or <u>6.13</u> percent compared with last year's taxes. Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would <u>increase</u> by \$.0168per \$100 of taxable value or <u>4.61</u> percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.

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The good, old days



In 1932, a huge 16-ft. tusk from a prehistoric mammoth was found along with some distinctive projectile points at Blackwater Draw, just south of Clovis. These projectile points have been used to prove that human beings hunted in this area more than 11,000 years ago. The site is still classified as the place of the earliest human habitation on this continent by many archaeologists. In 1995, Reynaldo Rivera created a beautiful sculpture, shown above, for Clovis Community College. It depicts a Paleolithic hunter thrusting his spear with its distinctive Clovis point into the eye of a mammoth. Its curved tusks tower over the hunter, who is barefoot and clad in furs.
