Foreign exchange student sees lots of differences in the U.S.A.

"It's different."

This is Eric Haselkamp's No. 1 observation after spending almost 9 months in the United States and although it may be a brief descrption of his impressions, it nonetheless encompasses fully his experiences.

Eric, a foreign exchange student from Liege, Belgium, came to West Texas to stay with the Jerry Monk family and attend Farwell High School. So far he has really enjoyed his stay in America, though he finds it so different from his home cul-

"Everything is different- the way the teachers teach, the education program, sports, everything," Eric said. "For example, in Belgium, schools are all academics. There are no sports. If you want to play sports, you join a team outside of school and practice after school hours and the games are mostly on the weekends."

Of course coming to the plains of the Panhandle must have been a shock for Eric, who grew up in a European city. In America, the cites are more organized as far as the way they are laid out and there are a lot more of them.

"In just 10 years, Belgium has gone from having quite a bit of open country to being mostly cities," Eric said.

Eric has been able to see more of the United States than just the immediate area however. He has traveled through interesting sites in Colorado and New Mexico, and visited our nearest "big city," Dallas. Even Dallas is not like European cities. The streets are wider and buildings smaller and less people. The population density is 900 people per square milesomthing hard for people in this area to fathom.

The education system also poses some changes for Eric, but nothing he can't handle. In Belgium, the schools are divided into elementary school (grades 1-6) and then a secondary school consisting of grades (6-12). After finishing three years of secondary schools, students can choose to receive a diploma and then attend a technical school to receive instruction in a specific trade and then enter the work force. The other option is to finish all 6 years of secondary then attend a college or university.

"I graduated after the 3rd year and went to a technical school for accounting and finished that," Eric said. "I could go to work when I go back but I'm going to go to college first and study nautic architecture (designing boats)."

Eric has also had to learn how to fit English into his expansive grasp of languages. Belgium has 4 official languages, Dutch, Flemish, German, and French. Sometimes, especially when tired, he invents a language of his own incorporating

Sports in America are somewhat different for Eric, mainly because since he lived near an ocean, many outdoor and extracurricular activites involved the water, such as sailing and surfing. Soccer, tennis, and summer hockey (played on grass) are the most popular sports.

Mealtime has introduced a few adjustments for Eric. Fish is the major meal condiment in Belgium but in West Texas, the availabilty of fresh fish is obviously quite limited. Instead Eric eats a lot more actual meat- beef and chicken.

The major cultural difference Eric has encountered is the way America views alcohol use among young people. In Belgium, there is no drinking limit and children grow up with liquor as just an aspect of their culture.

"For fun, everybody just goes downtown on the weekends where there are all the pubs," he said. "That's where all your friends hang out and that is just where you go to find them. It's much different in America. There are no downtowns. There is just no one place everyone gathers in the cities. And of course here you get in trouble for drinking."

Basically, Eric finds the whole American outlook and attitude much different than the European way of thinking.

"Belgium is much more open-minded," he said. "They really don't care about your beliefs or anything. They are more relaxed."

Although Eric has missed his home in some respects, he has really enjoyed being in America and is not particularly over-anxious to return to Belgium.

"I like it here," he concluded simply.

Video slot machines come to Farwell

Parmer County Attorney Charles Aycock is studying the legality of a new business in Farwell.

Border Games, featuring which is popularly called 8-Liner video slot machines, opened on Avenue A last

According to Randy Knight who opened the store Monday morning, the business has three partners -- Darryl Cook, Bob McAfoos and himself.

The slots cost a nickel to play and winnings are paid out in the form of coupons.

According to Knight, the coupons are redeemable for merchandise and discounts at Wal-Mart and its grocery department.

Each video slot machine carries a license from the State of Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts. Knight said the business is also permitted by the Texas Coin Operated Machine Division.

Border Games is open seven days a week. You must be at least 18 years of age to play, said Knight.

Aycock told the Tribune that the Texas Attorney General has given an opinion that such gambling violates state

Eight-liners have become available in other communities and law enforcement officials have closed them down. But some businesses have received restraining orders pending the outcome of an official court ruling on their legality.

Court rulings are pending in Levelland, Lubbock and Brownfield, for example, said Aycock.

Also studying the legality of 8-liners is Farwell city attorney Jeff Actkinson, who was asked to check into it by Mayor Jimmie Mace.

Aycock said that if determines that Border Games violates criminal law, his office will act on it.

Charges under a "Class A misdemeanor" call for a fine and/or imprisonment if a guilty verdict is returned, said Aycock.

A problem facing legal authorities involving this type of gambling is that state statutes are somewhat vague on such activity.

And the attorney general's opinion is just that, an opinion.

It appears that a final decision on whether 8-liners are legal or not will not be made until the case finishes a lengthy run through the court system.



He has hummingbirds phtographed from Central America to Canada, but the exciting thing is that he has spotted many of them right in our area. He studied eagles in Pal Duro Canyon for years. He says Arizona considers itself the spoilers which operate like No. 1 state for hummingbirds, the flaps on an airplane. As a but he expects New Mexico to pilot, he recognized this phesurpass them this year.

True has the photographic missed. expertise needed to photograph critters that fly past at incredible speeds, and which are capable of flying backward if they desire.

His cameras use electronic beams that open the shutters each time the beam of light is broken.

He estimated that some hummingbirds flap their wings 60-74 beats per second (not minutes) -- that's fast! He must have a very fast shutter speed and film that records action instantly with his still camera.

As a writer, my ear tuned into True's vocabulary rather than the content of his scientific research.

He talked a lot about "rufous" hummingbirds. I was surprised to learn that "rufous" means dull red or rust colored.

Also, I didn't know that the colored throat patch of a bird is called a gorget, which he pronounced with the Old French long "a" ending, rather than the American jit sound.

The word that he used that took me three dictionaries to find, though, was used in conjunction with eagles circling an area.

I wasn't sure if I had heart "burkeling" or "burgling."

"Burgling" didn't make sense in this situation. But one dictionary told me that (Continued from Page 1)

Robert White, of Farwell, is the Parmer County representative to the Central Plains Center for Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse in Plainview.

He pointed out that the center offers many services to Parmer County residents and folks need to be aware of them.

For example, the center has opened a ROPES Challenge Course which is open to everyone on a fee basis. This is an experiential process that increases self confidence and a sense of personal achievement through challenge and risktaking in a controlled environment, while improving problem solving skills, teamwork and trust in others.

The center can be called at 1-800-687-1300. Here are some of the services also offered:

Mental health services

-- 24-hour crisis hotline is a staffed telephone service providing information, support, intervention and referrals to individuals in crisis. The number is 1-800-687-1300,

-- Mental health outpatient clinics provide psychiatric

services in Friona and Muleshoe.

-- Rehabilitation services provide skills and supports in the person's chosen environment for people with psychiatric dis-

-- Case management services are available for people who need coordination and linking of services with a variety of service providers.

-- Dual diagnosis unit serves folks who have a diagnosis of both mental illness and substance abuse.

Children's mental health services

-- In-home and crisis intervention services provide intensive services to folks needing emergency services.

-- Outpatient prevention/intervention services provide the person, group and family counseling to assist individuals with problematic issues.

-- Case management functions provide assistance in coordinating services.

-- Day treatment provides day-long programming for persons who are not functioning effectively in their school environment. The program consists of an educational as well as a skills training component.

Early childhood intervention services

This is an infant education and stimulation program. The program's trained personnel are committed to providing education for children from birth to three years of age who are developmentally delayed, have a medical diagnosis which has a significant risk of developmental delay, or display atypical development. Family-centered services are a staff priority.

Transdisciplinary assessments are provided for each child.







microscope to check for cancer cells. Cancer is a group of more than 100 different diseases. Cancer occurs when cells become abnormal and keep dividing and forming more cells without controller

All organs of the body are made up of cells. Normally, cells divide to produce more cells only when the body needs them. If cells divide when new ones are not needed, they form a mass of excess tissue, called a tumor. Tumors can be benign (not cancer) or malignant (cancer).

The cells in malignant tumors can invade and damage nearby tissues and organs. Cancer cells can also break away from a malignant tumor and travel through the bloodstream or lymphatic system to form new tumors in other parts of the body. The spread of cancer is called metastasis.

Cancer is caused by both external (chemicals, radiation, and viruses) and internal (hormones, immune conditions, and inherited mutations) factors. Casual factors make act together or in sequence to initiate or promote carcinogenesis. Ten or more years often pass between exposures or mutations and detectable cancer

Many causes of cancer can be prevented by not using tobacco products, avoiding the harmful rays of sun, and choosing foods with less fat and more fiber. In addition, regular checkups and self-exams can reveal cancer at an early stage, when treatment is likely to be ef-

DON'T WAIT TO FEEL PAIN: EARLY CANCER USUALLY DOES NOT CAUSE PAIN

Cancer is treated with surgery, radiation therapy, chemotherapy, hormone therapy, or biological therapy. The doctor may use one method or a combination of methods. The choice of treatment depends on the type and location of the cancer, whether the disease has spread, the patient's age and general health, and other factors.



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

Spray a large skillet with vegetable oil spray. Heat skillet over medium heat. Cook mushrooms, onion, and garlic for 10 minutes, or until mushrooms are tender and liquid has evaporated. Stir in cream cheese, dill, salt, pepper, and nutmeg. Remove from heat.

Preheat oven to 375° F. Working as quickly as possible so it won't dry out, stack phyllo dough on a clean dish towel. Leaving 1/2-inch edge, slightly mound mushroom filling at one of the short sides of phyllo dough. Fold in sides and roll up phyllo and filling jelly-roll style, using the towel to help you roll.

Spray a baking sheet lightly with vegetable oil spray. Place strudel on baking sheet, seam side down. Spray strudel lightly with vegetable oil spray. Bake, uncovered, for 30 minutes, or until phyllo is golden brown and mushroom filling is heated through.

Transfer warm strudel to a cutting board. Cut into 8 slices. Serve warm or at room temperature.

Rather, baptism brings one "into Christ."
- Enjoy the new life in Christ. "Wherefore if any man be in Christ...all things are become new" (2 Cor. 5:17). The new creature wears a new name; has a new relationship; rejoices in the new hope. He has access to all spiritual blessings (Eph. 1:3). The Christian graces will adorn his life (2 Pet. 1:5f). He will bear the fruit of the Spirit and grow up in Christ (Gal. 5:22,23; Eph. 4:15).
- Abide in Christ. Jesus said, "Abide in me and I in you...If a man abide not in me he is cast forth as a branch and burned" (John 15:4,6)
- Die in Christ. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord..." (Rev. 14:13).
- Live eternally with Christ (Phil. 1:23). Travel the right road and reach the right destination.

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
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
