He had laid out his outfit and his "cool new shoes" as he referred to them. As he was getting dressed, he stopped and looked at me and said, "Will I get a coffee break?"





The Texico Chamber of Commerce voted Monday to donate \$100 to Texico Elementary School for its accelerated reader program. The money will be used to buy a bicycle to be used as the grand prize in the spring.

Texico Elementary School principal Diane Cooper and librarian Cary Kittrell asked the Chamber to help them supply prizes for the program, which encourages students to read more library books. Sometimes, the school gives candy or pencils or paperback books as weekly prizes.

The Chief's Corner

Most of the articles I write for the Chief's Corner are informative and, for the most part, fun. This is one I am really uncomfortable about, but due to the concern voiced by the public and the various comments I have received, I believe it is necessary to do.

Over the last 3 1/2 years I have been in Farwell, there have been a number of "Peeping Tom" complaints. First of all, is there a law against this conduct? Yes. It is under Chapter 42, Disorderly Conduct and Related Offenses of the Texas State Penal Code. PC 42.01 (a) (7) states: "A person commits an offense if he intentionally or knowingly enters on the property of another and for a lewd or unlawful purpose looks into a dwelling on the property through any window or other opening in the dwelling." The offense is a Class C misdemeanor.

What can be done about it? First of all, a peace officer can do nothing about the offense unless he views it in person. When the offense is viewed by a citizen, it is necessary for the citizen to make a formal complaint to the police before any official action can be taken.

Out of the many reports of Peeping Tom activity, one individual has been positively identified twice. In each case, the witness has refused to testify, and while this reluctance is understandable, the end results is that without a witness there is

What can you do to thwart this activity? After dusk, when you turn on your lights, make sure your blinds and curtains are closed securely.

I close with a personal note to the perpetrator: You are known. You know the risk you are taking and yet you persist. Get help for this sickness because if ever a witness will testify, you will be arrested, jailed and prosecuted.




