Aycock elected state bar group president-elect

Parmer County has a real feather in its cap.

Farwell attorney Charles Aycock was elected last week as the president-elect for the State Bar of Texas.

Aycock is a member of the law firm of Aldridge, Aycock and Actkinson. He has been a partner in the firm since 1969.

He won the prestigious state position with 52 percent of the votes over his opponent, Clyde Siebman, of Sherman, Texas, who garnered 41 percent.

Aycock won every voting district in Texas except for Siebman's home district.

The remaining votes went to write-ins.

Aycock will serve on the state board as president-elect for one year, then take over the state bar's reins from June 1999 to June 2000. He then will continue to serve on the state board for another year, as past president.

It is believed that Farwell is the smallest town that a state bar association president has ever been picked from.

Aycock and his wife, Margaret, have two children, Chris, who also is an attorney, and Karen, who will be attending college this fall.

Aycock has served as Parmer County Attorney since 1981. He is also on the trust committee at Security State Bank.

He has been city attorney for Farwell and Bovina, a Bovina school board attorney, a Texas assistant attorney general, a legislative aide in the Texas House of Representatives and on the staff of the late Congressman George

Aycock has served on various state bar association committees, and was a member of the Texas Board of Directors from 1990-1993.

graduate also graduated from Texas Tech University, where he was president of the Student Council and president of the Saddle Tramps Spirit Organization, while being named Mr. Texas Tech in 1963.

He then received his law degree from the University of Texas Law School in 1967.

Aycock is a former president of the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club and been named a Paul Harris Fellow.

He is a former president of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce and was named Man of the Year in 1995.

He has served on the Farwell School Board, Farwell Hospital District Board, Farwell Community Center Board, Farwell Development Corporation and is a member of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church.

He is a former scoutmaster and was named El Llano Grade District Scoutmaster in 1987.

In addition to his law practice, he has farmed, raised cattle and horses and been involved in numerous businesse ventures including current ownership of title plants in Parmer and Bailey counties.

County to stay out of 8-liner controversy

Parmer County Attorney Charles Aycock said Monday he will not take action against the new business in Farwell that has video slot machines, pending the outcome of court cases involving the popularly called "8 liners."

Border Games, with the video slot machines, opened in Farwell two weeks ago.

The slots cost a nickel to play and winnings are paid out in the form of coupons.

Randy Knight, who said he is one of the business's three partners (along with Darryl Cook and Bob McAfoos), said the coupons are redeemable for merchandise and discounts at Wal-Mart and its

grocery department.

Here's the background on legal questions involving 8-liners, said Aycock:

The state legislature okayed an amendment that would appear to make 8-liners legal if operated within certain parameters.

These limits say that the business can award non-cash prizes that don't exceed 10 times the amount you put in, or a \$5 maximum.

Thus, he explained, that if you play a nickel machine, the prize per play can be a maximum of a coupon worth 50 cents

Or if you play a 50-cent machine, the maximum can be \$5 per play.

However, after the legislature passed this amendment, the Texas attorney general issued an opinion that 8-liners were illegal because they conflict with the state's antigambling laws.

After this opinion was issued, authorities in several communities, such as Lubbock and Levelland, raided businesses with 8-liners.

But those businesses immediately went to court and got restraining orders, allowing them to continue operating the video slot machines pending a court decision.

Aycock explained that if he

Farwell High School principal named


Bill Bizzell will be confirmed at the May 7 meeting of the Farwell School Board as the new Farwell High School principal.






Marrion Hudson displays the District 1-1A Sweepstakes Award that Farwell High won this year. The honor is based on UIL literary, track, tennis and golf.

Call Return enables a customer to automatically return the last incoming call. If the call back number is busy, this feature allows a user to camp on or queue the called party. When an on-hook condition is detected, both numbers will ring to establish the call.

Call Screening permits a customer to block an incoming call and/or calls from a maximum of ten (10) specified telephone numbers within the customer's local calling scope, Extended Area Calling scope, or Long Distance Telecommunications Network (where facilities permit) and functions as a screening service for the customer. A customer may create, by dialing an activation code, the list of telephone numbers. In addition, if a customer receives an unwanted call from an unknown telephone number, the customer may block future calls from that unknown number by immediately dialing the Selective Call Rejection activation code after the unwanted call is terminated. The Cooperative's equipment will review all incoming calls and will block those from numbers that appear on the customer's list. Blocked telephone numbers are directed to a Cooperative recorded announcement. Standard call completion will occur if a call originates from a central office that is not equipped for CLASS.

Call Trace allows a customer to request an automatic trace of the last incoming call. Call Trace may be activated at any time during or immediately following the call to be traced. The Cooperative retains this information and will provide it only to appropriate law enforcement authorities upon proper request from the customer subscribing to the service.

Preferred Call Forwarding allows a customer to preselect a maximum of ten (10) telephone numbers that can be forwarded to a customer-specified telephone number. The Cooperative's equipment will screen incoming calls and will forward calls to the customer only if the caller's number appears on the customer's screening list. When a call is placed to the customer from a number not on the screening list, the caller receives an announcement indicating that the called party does not wish to receive calls at this time.

Priority Ringing permits the customer to preselect a maximum of ten (10) telephone numbers that can be given a distinctive alerting signal, ring or call waiting tone for priority calls. A customer creates, by dialing an activation code, the list of telephone numbers. The Cooperative's equipment will screen incoming calls and provide the appropriate signal, ring or tone for these numbers that appear on the customer's

Repeat Dialing enables a user to automatically place a call to the last outgoing call. The last outgoing call is defined as the last number dialed. If the called number is busy, this feature allows a customer to camp on or queue the called party. When an on-hook condition is detected, both numbers will ring to establish the call.

Special Call Acceptance permits a customer to select a maximum of ten (10) specified telephone numbers within the customer's local calling scope, Extended Area Calling scope, or Long Distance Telecommunications Network (where facilities permit) from which the customer wishes to accept calls. A customer may create, by dialing an activation code, the list of telephone numbers from which the customer is accepting calls. The Cooperative's equipment will screen incoming calls and will allow calls to ring on the customer's telephone if the caller's number appears on the customer's screening list. When a call is placed to the customer from a number not on the screening list, the caller receives an announcement indicating that the called party does not wish to receive calls at this time.

Other Miscellaneous Services:

Cancel Call Waiting allows a customer with the Call Waiting feature to cancel the operation of Call Waiting for one call. The customer dials the Cancel Call Waiting code and dial tone is heard. Without hanging up, the customer then places the call. During this call only, the Call Waiting feature is inactive. Call Waiting tones will not interrupt this call.

Do Not Disturb allows the called party to automatically reject calls if the calling party does not have the called party's special Personal Identification Number (PIN). Those callers without the PIN will either receive a busy signal or an announcement saying that the called party is not accepting calls at this time.

Personal Ringing allows up to three different telephone numbers to ring at a premises without installing additional local exchange access lines. Incoming calls to each number are identified by different ringing

Toll Restriction Service denies the local exchange user access to the long distance telecommunications network while permitting the user access to the local exchange network.

Enhanced Toll Restriction Service allows subscribers of the Toll Restriction Service feature to access the Long Distance Telecommunications Network for calls placed to 1+800 and 1+888 numbers only.

Toll Restriction Service with PIN Override prevents the origination of toll calls from an access line except for those calls where a PIN is entered prior to placing the call. This override function is only valid for the single call placed immediately after the PIN is entered and is deactivated at the end of that single call.

Warm Line Service provides that a preselected 7- or 10-digit telephone number will ring whenever the subscribing customer's telephone is off-hook for a minimum of thirty (30) seconds. The designated number may not be public emergency numbers such as police, fire, ambulance or 911 service where available.

In association with the deployment of Caller ID Services, "percall blocking" and "per-line blocking" will be automatically available, free of charge, to all West Texas Rural customers. "Blocking" prevents the caller's number and name from appearing on the Caller ID display unit. Any customer who wishes to block his or her number and name on a per-call basis, simply needs to press *67 on their touch-tone phone, or dial 1167 on their rotary phone before dialing the telephone number. Per-line blocking automatically blocks a customer's number and name on every call without the need to press *67 or dial 1167. If a customer selects per-line blocking, he or she can unblock their number and name, free of charge, on a single call by dialing *82 or 1182 on their phone before dialing the telephone number. Per-line blocking will be automatically reactivated at the end of this single "unblocked" call. Per-line blocking will be offered, at no charge, to any customer upon the customer's request. All requests for per-line blocking will automatically be granted free of charge. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID to have per-call or per-line blocking. Per-call or pre-line blocking will display a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on the Caller ID display unit. Blocking will not be provided on calls from







Water management impacted here

The passage of Senate Bill 1 during the 75th Texas legislative session impacts water management in Parmer County.

It requires water management plans be developed for every county in Texas by Sept. 1, 2000, and that the plans be updated every five years thereafter.

The plan must include an evaluation of the current water reserves (groundwater and surface water) in each county, the historic and projected water use by each town or city in the county, livestock water use, mining water use, irrigated agricultural use, steam and electric power generator water use, manufacturing water us, and rural water use within the

Comparing water use to water reserves, a determination has to be made as to whether the water supplies will be adequate to meet the short term (0-30 years) needs and the longterm needs (30-50 years). If the water reserves will not meet future needs, water management strategies must be developed to determine how future water needs will be met or, in the alternative, what economic and social effect will occur as a result of not meeting those needs.

Towns and cities also are required to develop drought management plans.

This particular truck is unusual because of the effort made by the department themselves in designing and building it. Last year a C70 4x4 Chassis truck was donated by an anonymous company, but renovation and repairs would need to be made before Texico would able to use it for firefighting pur-

Bill Morey of Clovis helped come up with the new design and cost estimation of the truck which Texico had determined would be used as a "brush" truck- the rescue unit taken to grass and brush fires as the name indicates. Members of the Texico department were able to input their own ideas and features they wanted to be implemented to fit their particular needs as well.

It took around six months before the design was completed and Texico put the project up to bid. Southwest Sandblasting entered the lowest bid to construct the truck. After borrowing money from a finance company to purchase tank, pump and other equipment, work began.

It took four months to build the truck which features a platform on front to carry two firefighters and a walkway on both sides and the rear for other personnel. The truck will be equipped with self-contained breathing apparatus' to aid firefighters in heavy smoke.

The truck carries 1,000 gallons of water and a pump with the capacity of 300 gpm and 150 psi. It has 300 feet of 1 3/4 inch hose and carries a 110 volt generator and floodlights. It is an especially valuable addition to the department as it can be used as a tanker and water shuttle or taken to structure fires in cases of extreme emergency.

"It's operator friendly," volunteer Twila Kos commented as to the truck's easy availability and operation.

The truck is also especially asthetically-appealing as well. Much of the material needed to equip the truck was donated by various businesses and individuals and members volunteered their own time and services to fully "polish" the finished project.

"David Kube did a lot of body work and painting on the truck," chief Lewis Cooper said. "He painted it to match the bed and tank built for the truck. Dewayne Foreman and Mark Kos did a lot of work on the emergency lights too."

The finished effect of the truck is so admirable that other departments have in fact been looking at and observing Texico's efforts to get ideas for their own improvements.

The truck has been in service for approximately 60 days but as of yet has not been taken on an actual call.

"It was really an entire department effort to get it ready for operation," Cooper said. "We want to thank everybody who had a part in the project."
