

Bovina got hit hard by the storm Sunday. "It was the worst I have ever seen," said Harry Johnson, of Sherley Grain Co. of Bovina.

Farwell, Lazbuddie schools announce excellent TAAS scores

The news continues to be outstanding from Farwell Schools on its annual Texas Academic Excellence Indicator System scores, popularly known as the TAAS tests.

School Supt. Larry Gregory said the 1998 scores were excellent and he was very gratified with the results. "We are in great shape," he added.

Farwell Schools' scores took a sharp turn upward in the mid-1990s; and have, continued to be in the oustanding category for the past few

The results announced by the state are preliminary. Official results will be reported this fall, and the status report for Farwell Schools will be included. Texas gives its schools four ratings, in descending order -- exemplary, recognized, academically acceptable and academically unacceptable. Farwell's ratings will be announced in the

But the TAAS scores show that Farwell will be near the top of each category.

Here are the unofficial totals, showing the percentage of students who passed the TAAS tests:

High School 10th grade Reading -- 91%. Math -- 100%. Writing -- 95%. Junior High School 6th grade

Reading -- 94%. Math -- 83%.

7th grade Reading -- 100% Math -- 97%. 8th grade

School Supt. Hardy Carlyle had some really good news to report to the Lazbuddie School Board on Tuesday about the TAAS results -- they were very high.

"We saw real good improvement and were very pleased," said Carlyle. "Our math scores jumped way up. Overall, we were well above 90 percent passing."

Sheriff wants vehicles, home confiscated

Parmer County Sheriff Walt Yerger is sending a strong message to folks who deal in the narcotics trade -- get out of Parmer County!

Yerger is working at confiscating the vehicles and homes of persons charged with narcotics offenses.

On May 19, Pablo Galvan, 42, of Bovina, was arrested by the sheriff's office on charges of delivery of cocaine, pending in district court, and possession of a controlled substance, pending before the grand jury.

Galvan was the sixth person to be charged with a narcotics violation following a year-long probe into drug dealing in Parmer County. Earlier in May, a county grand jury returned 15 sealed indictments against 1 persons.

The sheriff's office has

confiscated five vehicles which were found at the Galvan residence, including two last week.


The vehicles have been taken to a transmission business in Clovis for safekeeping, pending a hearing before 287th District Court Judge Jack Young. No hearing has been set yet.

The county is alleging that the vehicles were used in an illegal enterprise, making them subject for confiscation and sale by the county.

Yerger also reported that county attorneys are doing the paperwork to have the Galvan home confiscated,

"We want to send a strong message to drug dealers," reiterated Yerger. "Stay out of

Parmer County."





Warren looks back on his tenure as Lazbuddie sup't

When Phil Warren came into office as the Lazbuddie School superintendent in January 1990, things really started to change in the small school system and community.

He saw a need for change and he began to put the wheels into motion for the changes to take place. However, Warren is the first person to tell you that he didn't make the changes alone. He credits having a great team of teachers and staff members that were ready, willing and able to put new ideas to work as the major key to the turnaround.

"The first thing that was changed was the way we (the schools) looked at ourselves," said Warren. "We began to put the image of being too small behind us and we emphasized the facts that we really were capable and very smart."

Warren began to build a support structure for the students within the school system to achieve whatever their hearts desired. The teachers and staff made every effort to help a student reach their goals of academic, vocational or

"We began to see the community get behind our every effort and the pride factor within the community and the schools began to soar," said Warren.

Lazbuddie had every right to be proud, with the emergence of a national UIL Literary champion, being ranked in the top four State Class A Literature rankings and winning a regional academic UIL championship.

"I feel that I came to Lazbuddie at just the right time," Warren stated. "I don't want to take the credit for the accomplishments, but I do feel that I helped to provide the necessary support and attitude toward improvement."

Warren began his ninth year as Lazbuddie superintendent this January. During his tenure, Lazbuddie ACT scores have improved each year and there are more students taking the college entrance exam. Scholarship monies have become more readily available to Lazbuddie students and applications for scholarships have increased.

"I feel that the major change that has taken place is the change in attitude toward academics," said Warren. "Our kids see that it's pretty cool to be smart and that they are very capable to compete in national competitions and on the university levels."

Peer pressure is an issue that Lazbuddie has fully addressed. The administration, school board, teachers and staff have helped students to see that learning is the key to their futures and that they are "expected" to do well in school. The pressure to be "cool" has been lessened, thus the impact of peer pressure is off the students.

"We've got a great group of kids here in this community and they're being given and shown every opportunity to succeed," said Warren. "I like the feeling of being part of the success of our students."

But academics is not the only area of improvement for Lazbuddie under Warren's leadership. The athletic program and the vocational programs have also greatly improved. There are positive aspects to every program within the school system and Warren is greatly responsible for planting the seeds of change and then stepping back and letting the instructors and the students blossom. He's been a great one-man support system for every program in the school system.

The facilities at Lazbuddie have also been greatly improved during Warren's nine years. He was instrumental in obtaining federal and state grant money to offset the building, renovation and improvement costs. Only 10% to 20% of actual Lazbuddie Schools money was used for any of the projects.

Warren has also been instrumental in obtaining new technologies for the schools. Lazbuddie is a charter member of the Panhandle Information Network, which works to






