That's wonderful.


This year's graduation at Farwell High will be special for us at the Tribune because we will see one of our own get her degree -- Rachel Embry.




Sculpture to be dedicated





The lawsuit over Farwell's mandatory drug testing policy for students involved in extra curricular activities was filed early last year by Charlie Gustin, then a Farwell High seniors, by his parents, Don and Mary Gustin. They were represented by the American **Civil Liberties Union.**

Later, the Gustins dropped their suit but it was kept in effect by the ACLU on behalf of another student whose identity has remained confidential and was called "Jane Doe."

The constitutionality of Farwell's new policy is the crux of the issue.

A mediation hearing was held April 28 by lawyers for both sides.

Farwell school officials didn't attend but were connected by telephone to their attorney. Boothby and School **Board President Ronald Byrd** were involved in this.


No decisions were made at that mediation hearing.

PRIESTHOOD OF ALL CHRISTIANS

Every true Christian is a priest. Christ is High Priest (Heb. 4:14f).

Peter addresses Christians: "Ye also, as living stones, are built up a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God through Jesus Christ" (1 Pet. 2:5).

Man is conscious of sin; he has violated divine law. He is reluctant to approach directly the higher, holier power. He seeks a representative in "things pertaining to God" (Heb. 5:1).

During the age of the Patriarchs the fathers served as priest. The office descended with the birthright; was transferable with it. No trace of a caste priesthood is discernable in this early period.

When Israel became a nation a special hereditary order of priests was created. A place was set apart for sacrifice; solemn ritual was prescribed; distinctive garments were ordered (Exod. 28,29). This was the Levitical priesthood, the divinely ordained mediator between God and the Hebrews. This order ceased when Moses'-law was abrogated (Col. 2:14). "For the priesthood being changed, there is made of necessity a change of law" (Heb. 7:12).

Under Christ, there is no caste of clerical priests. Every spiritual child of God is a priest. Christ made Christians to be a kingdom, "to be priests unto his God and Father" (Rev. 1:6). The Christian as priest, is bold to approach God's throne, only through Christ, the Christian's High Priest. Only one stands between the Christian and Almighty God; that one is Christ. "For there is one God, one mediator also between God and men, himself man, Christ Jesus" (1 Tim. 2:5).

Great damage was done when ministers adopted wrongly the name and function of priest. They usurped rights belonging to every Christian and helped build a wall between the pulpit and the pew. As an officiating priest, the Christian offers spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God, through Christ. Blessed privilege! Blessed estate!

From Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa: Question: Is a high speed pursuit worth it?

When something doesn't ring true, or something seems wrong, a peace officer will stop and interview the individual. Sometimes there is an innocent explanation, most times an arrest is made based on that interview, and interview that starts with a stop. Rarely does anyone run from the police just because they got caught speeding. There is usually another reason, and lots of criminals get caught in this fashion.

Why do the police get blamed when someone dies or gets hurt? Because the punk who runs, who starts and is the cause of the pursuit, who disobeys the law, who couldn't care less about endangering the public, doesn't have any money, and it doesn't do any good to blame him. So we blame the cops, sue the cops, the department and the local government.

I will tell you this, if things keep going like they are, sooner than you think departments will ban pursuit. All anyone will have to do is to drive like a complete fool to get away.

Radio ahead? This is West Texas. There are usually many side roads between one police car and the next.

Question: Your car was slightly damaged. But what if it had been totaled? Is it worth the cost to the city?

Your choice. But, if you as citizens, want something like this aimed at yourselves, your parents, grandparents, children or grandchildren, simply make your views known to the city council and I assure you that the policy will be changed.

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Caller ID Services:

Calling Number/Name Delivery (Caller ID) delivers calling party information to parties being called. Calling party information may indicate the directory number/name of the calling party or may indicate the number/name of the calling party is private or unavailable.

Anonymous Call Rejection permits a customer to automatically reject calls from callers who have blocked their number/name, either through the use of per-call blocking or per-line blocking.

Enhanced Custom Calling Services:

Call Return enables a customer to automatically return the last incoming call. If the call back number is busy, this feature allows a user to camp on or queue the called party. When an on-hook condition is detected, both numbers will ring to establish the call.

Call Screening permits a customer to block an incoming call and/or calls from a maximum of ten (10) specified telephone numbers within the customer's local calling scope, Extended Area Calling scope, or Long Distance Telecommunications Network (where facilities permit) and functions as a screening service for the customer. A customer may create, by dialing an activation code, the list of telephone numbers. In addition, if a customer receives an unwanted call from an unknown telephone number, the customer may block future calls from that unknown number by immediately dialing the Selective Call Rejection activation code after the unwanted call is terminated. The Cooperative's equipment will review all incoming calls and will block those from numbers that appear on the customer's list. Blocked telephone numbers are directed to a Cooperative recorded announcement. Standard call completion will occur if a call originates from a central office that is not equipped for CLASS.

Call Trace allows a customer to request an automatic trace of the last incoming call. Call Trace may be activated at any time during or immediately following the call to be traced. The Cooperative retains this information and will provide it only to appropriate law enforcement authorities upon proper request from the customer subscribing to the service.

Preferred Call Forwarding allows a customer to preselect a maximum of ten (10) telephone numbers that can be forwarded to a customer-specified telephone number. The Cooperative's equipment will screen incoming calls and will forward calls to the customer only if the caller's number appears on the customer's screening list. When a call is placed to the customer from a number not on the screening list, the caller receives an announcement indicating that the called party does not wish to receive calls at this time.

Priority Ringing permits the customer to preselect a maximum of ten (10) telephone numbers that can be given a distinctive alerting signal, ring or call waiting tone for priority calls. A customer creates, by dialing an activation code, the list of telephone numbers. The Cooperative's equipment will screen incoming calls and provide the appropriate

signal, ring or tone for these numbers that appear on the customer's list

Repeat Dialing enables a user to automatically place a call to the last outgoing call. The last outgoing call is defined as the last number dialed. If the called number is busy, this feature allows a customer to camp on or queue the called party. When an on-hook condition is de-

Toll Restriction Service denies the local exchange user access to the long distance telecommunications ne twork while permitting the user access to the local exchange network.

Enhanced Toll Restriction Service allows subscribers of the Toll Restriction Service feature to access the Long Distance Telecommunications Network for calls placed to 1+800 and 1+888 numbers only.

Toll Restriction Service with PIN Override prevents the origination of toll calls from an access line except for those calls where a PIN is entered prior to placing the call. This override function is only valid for the single call placed immediately after the PIN is entered and is deactivated at the end of that single call.

Warm Line Service provides that a preselected 7- or 10-digit telephone number will ring whenever the subscribing customer's telephone is off-hook for a minimum of thirty (30) seconds. The designated number may not be public emergency numbers such as police, fire, ambulance or 911 service where available.


In association with the deployment of Caller ID Services, "percall blocking" and "per-line blocking," will be automatically available, free of charge, to all West Texa's Rural customers. "Blocking" prevents the caller's number and name from appearing on the Caller ID display unit. Any customer who wishes to block his or her number and name on a per-call basis, simply needs to press *67 on their touch-tone phone, or dial 1167 on their rotary phone before dialing the telephone number. Per-line blocking automatical ly blocks a customer's number and name on every call without the need to press *67 or dial 1167. If a customer selects per-line blocking, he or she can unblock their number and name, free of charge, on a single call by dialing *82 or 1182 on their phone before dialing the telephone number. Per-line blocking will be automatically reactivated at the end of this single "unblocked" call. Per-line blocking will be offered, at no charge, to any customer upon the customer's request. All requests for per-line blocking will automatically be granted free of charge. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID to have per-call or per-line blocking. Per-call or pre-line blocking will display a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on the Caller ID display unit. Blocking will not be provided on calls from pay phones.

The proposed effective date for the new services is July 1, 1998, for all exchanges served by the Cooper ative. The estimated annual revenue increase recognized by the Coop erative is \$21,115 for the first year of service, which is less than 1.20% of the Cooperative's gross annual intrastate revenues. The following monthly rates have been proposed for these new services.

Farwell fire dept. proposes policy change for county disbursements

The Parmer County Commissioners received a proposal on Monday from the Farwell Fire Department to change the way the commissioners disburse funds to the county fire departments.

Involved are the Rhea, Bovina, Farwell, Friona and Lazbuddie departments.

Currently, here is the method used by the commissioners to disburse funds from the \$50,000 budget:

Each of the five departments receives a \$5,000 advance payment each year.


Then the total (\$50,000) is divvied up according to the number of fire calls each department makes in the county.

Regardless of how many calls, each department receives a \$5,000 minimum. This is especially important for the Rhea Hollene Fire Department which makes many calls in New Mexico (the Pleasant Hill area).

Thus, under the current reimbursement policy, here is how much each department received in 1997:

-- Rhea, \$5,000

-- Bovina, \$5,000

-- Farwell, \$5,480 -- Friona, \$20,272 -- Lazbuddie, \$14,248

What Farwell's department is proposing that the \$5,000 "advance" become a "base". That would mean that each department would continue to get at least \$5,000, but then the next \$25,000 would be divvied up depending on the number of calls. Using this formula (based on the 1997 fire calls), here is what each department would receive:

-- Rhea, \$5,000 -- Bovina, \$7,744

-- Farwell, \$8,049

-- Friona, \$16,280

-- Lazbuddie, \$12,927 If the new formula is used then, then the Farwell and Bovina departments would get more money, while the Friona and Lazbuddie departments would get less.

The topic was tabled as the commissioners will look into it further.

Texico approves policy for out-of-district students

The Texico School Board on Tuesday approved a new policy for out-of-district students.

The board set maximum student numbers for each grade level:

In pre-kindergarten, if less than 12 pupils are signed up, then out-of-district pupils will be accepted up to 12.

For grades kindergarten through 3rd, if less than 17 sign up, then out-of-district pupils wil be accepted up to 17.

For grades 4 and 5, if less than 20 sign up, then out-ofdistrict pupils will be accepted up to 20.

For grades 6 through 12, if less than 23 sign up (using the English classes as the standard). then out-of-district students will be accepted up to that number.

Also, out-of-district students must sign a contract with the school, maintain at least a 2.5 grade point average, participate in at least one extra-curricular activity. Also, the parents must allow the use of corporal punishment in school, the student cannot be a discipline problem, and the student's previous records must meet with board approval.

The program also included performances by the Fifth and Sixth grade bands and the Junior High band.


Junior High band student Anna Quezada was named Outstanding Musician for the year and Yvette Favila received the Director's Award.
