Portions of several Texico streets to be widened

The Texico City Council on Tuesday voted to have portions of several streets widened.

They are Hamlin, Hudson, Kindred, Mildred and Eunice.

The cost will be \$57,500, with the state paying 75 percent and the city the remaining 25 percent.

The council picked Bermea Construction, of Friona, to do the job.

In other business, the council:

-- Said the communications with Duncan Disposal had improved. The city went three weeks without trash pickups, said councilman Doug Scioli, due to two trucks being down.

-- Approved a 4 percent pay raise for Fire Chief Lewis Cooper.

-- Continued its contract with building inspector Terry Martin, but no pay raise was given.

-- Met in executive session with city employee Michael Hannagan to discuss his pay rate.

-- Heard Scioli report that two overhead doors at the fire station had collapsed and repairs were needed. The cost will be at least \$5,000, and it was approved.

-- Heard Hannagan report that Phyllis Arnold wanted to rent the Texico Community Center for a family reunion. Mrs. Arnold wanted to know if some folks could sleep at the center in sleeping bags

The council said this was okay as long as she rented the center for two days.

-- Three bids were received for the water main project which will provide a better loop for water lines, with a sleeve going under the highway.

The bid of LCI-2, of Clovis, of \$172,000 was accepted.

The lowest bid, of a Roswell company, was about \$3,000 cheaper but the council wanted to go with a local bidder.

-- Heard Police Chief John Mares report that some street signs have been knocked down. On South College, two stop signs are down and the speed limit signs stolen. New signs have been ordered.

-- It was noted that the swimming pool is open but the diving board is broken and the pool isn't getting a lot of customers.

A discussion was held about cracks in the concrete and the council is very unhappy about this.

-- At Hannagan's suggestion, the council voted to add disability insurance to its insurance package. It was said this will cost the city \$5 a month. Employees present favored this.

-- Heard Hannagan report that the city budget has been tentatively approved by the state.

-- Was told that the state has changed its method of reimbursing the senior citizens group.

Of the \$18,000 budgeted for it, the state will provide a maximum of \$10,000 instead of the whole amount. The exact reimbursement will be decided by actual participation, so the final figure could be far less than \$10,000.

Farwell Mayor Mace urges clean-up campaign be started

The Farwell City Council on Tuesday heard Mayor Jimmie Mace urge that a cleanup campaign be started.

As part of it, the city will send a trailer to person's homes on request to pick up their junk items. This will be done for free in July only (normally the cost is \$25 per load).

Normally, the person needs to load the trailer themselves with the junk items. And the city will return later to pick up the trailer and take it to the city landfill.

However, if the person needs help, city employees will try to accommodate them with the large items

To schedule a pickup, call City Hall at 481-3620.

Mace reminded residents that there are cleanup ordinances in effect and that building permits are needed for construction and/or moving in storage buildings.

In other business, the council:

-- Approved four building permits: Wayne Gruben, a carport; T.J. Kittrell, 600 2nd St., a carport; JoAnn Walker, 607 4th St., a greenhouse addition; and Gary Cates, 304 8th St., a storage building.

-- Heard a request by Robert Thurman to keep a mobile home in place at 100 San Andres. The unit had been approved there in 1991 for his father, who was handicapped. The father died last year.

The area is not zoned for mobile homes and Thurman was given 60 days to remove it.

-- Heard City Clerk Cynthia Trower announce she was resigning on July 31, 2007, after having been in that post for almost 20 years.

She was giving the city an early heads-up so they could hire a replacement who would work with her and learn the job.

-- Plans to move rapidly on finding a new police officer since the post is now vacant. The council plans to hire two officers. It was noted that the salary being offered is a problem to potential employees.

-- Talked with EMS personnel about the rates being charged. The billing company has told them that they need to adjust their rates sharply upward.

For example, the Farwell EMS charges \$5.50 a mile. The billing company suggests \$16 a mile. Another example: for IV supplies, the city charges \$30; the

billing company suggests \$146.

There wasn't any support for the sharply higher rates suggested by the billing company. Instead, the EMS will look at what insurance companies will pay for the services provided, then report back to the council with recommendations.

-- Met with Donnie Allison, of GrantWorks, a private grant consulting firm

Through the Texas Home Program, HUD is channeling \$275,000 to communities for home reconstruction. Targeted are elderly, disabled and/or low income persons who own and live in their own houses.

Applications went to the state in April and Allison said it appears Farwell will get that amount, enough for four or five homes. What they do is demolish the current home, put a new 2- or 3-bedroom home (just under 1,000 square feet) on the site, while the occupant lives elsewhere for a couple of months.

Allison will report back in August. If the go-ahead is given, he will seek applicants.

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


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
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Muleshoe events will be held on July 4th


With June being National Dairy month, Mike thought it would be appropriate for me to write about showing and raising animals.



The cheerleaders and mascot thank all for the support that enables them to attend camp.


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
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

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
Muleshoe 4th of July adds new events



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



While he was here, Farwell officials were looking at resumes for a second officer.

So here is my suggestion for Farwell officials:

Just go with one cop. But increase his salary and benefit package between 50 and 75 percent. By doing that, the quality of resumes should improve dramatically and the chances are you will get a fine police officer who will look to stay.

A new study I read recently talked about the increasing isolation of Americans.

In a nutshell, it shows how the nation's social structure is breaking down.

Folks don't report that many friends and/or relatives they can confide in, or seek help from in an emergency. So if their spouse dies or leaves, many get a sense of hopelessness.

I wonder how much the Internet is part of this.

Folks used to go out for walks, or join clubs, or get together with other on a social basis more. Now they don't have time --

they are on the computer. I used to play a lot of bridge in Clovis. The number of tables has declined to the point where the future of the bridge club there is in jeopardy.

I also play a lot of tennis. The number of tennis players locally has dwindled over the years to the point where you can go to the college to play on a Saturday afternoon -- and be the only one there.

Remember the Texico-Farwell Lions Club? It was a group that did a lot of good for our community, such as initiating Lions Park in Texico. The club is now gone ... due to lack of membership.

Add to that another change in our social structure, the belief that "it's someone else's fault" instead of the old way of accepting responsibility

for your actions.

When I was younger, and for the 4,000 years before that, it was a given that when a person took an action, they assumed responsibility for it.

No more.

Remember the Church Lady's "the devil made me do it?" We laughed at that on the old Saturday Night Live show as a joke.

In today's society, it's not a joke. Kids are placated so much by society that when failure happens, they cannot deal with it. Somebody else must be to blame. The devil?

And another change I have pointed out before in this column: For the first time in recorded history, the U.S. has literally adopted the doctrine that the minority can supercede the will of the majority through our court system.

Do you see what I am saying? Major societal change after change is taking place in an unbelievable short span in the U.S.

What was good for 4.000-plus years has been thrown out the window in a couple of decades.

By the way, one of my traditions almost slipped by me this year.

Each May, I always make as part of one of my columns, my annual message to the graduates: No matter what, they need to get governmental jobs when they graduate.

This ensures them the health benefits that most cannot afford unless they join a large company that can deal with them (and that number is declining

For the most part, wheat yields are not having the best of years

From Monti Vander, Parmer County extension agent for pest management:

Hot dry weather has accelerated wheat maturity and allowed wheat harvest to progress quickly. A few good irrigated yields have been reported but for the most part irrigated yields have been fair to poor. Dryland yields are being reported from 2 to 15 bu/acre.

The low wheat grain yields throughout much of Texas and Oklahoma will likely result in a shortage of quality wheat seed for the next crop. This will likely be compounded by increased demand by producers who normally would have saved some of their own planting seed but were unable to because of the poor crop.

A good wheat crop starts with quality seed regardless of the crop's purpose, forage production or grain. One exception to this may be wheat planted for cover. Test weight is generally considered a good measurement of seed quality. Generally wheat seed with a test weight of at least 58 pounds per bushel is considered adequate for planting.

Burn ban back for northern part of Parmer County

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday voted 3-1 (Michael Haseloff opposed) to reinstitute a burn ban. Two weeks ago, they lifted the ban for all the county's unincorporated areas. This time, they put it back in for the area north of U.S. 60 from the Castro County line to Bovina, and north of FM 2290 from Bovina to the Curry County line. County Judge Bonnie Heald said this was done for safety reasons; the area with the ban has more CRP and grassland. The new ban is in effect until July 24, when the commissioners will vote on whether to continue it or end it. However, it is still okay for all the unincorporated areas to burn in earthen pits and on drizzly, foggy or rainy days if the wind is less than 10 miles per hour.
