Church youths to celebrate **Year 2000**


The youths of the First Baptist Church of Farwell are preparing to celebrate the year 2000 on New Year's Eve with a special drama presentation.


Highway to have five lanes



Y2 Craze is the word, for area officials. Both Parmer and Curry counties have been extremely busy the past year, tieing up loose ends with their computer systems. So far, everyone the Tribune interviewed says that they are Y2K compliant.

Jimmy Dunn, of the Curry County clerk's office, says that they have been doing studies for two years now and they are, "good to go."

Rhonda Webb, of the Parmer County sheriff's department, says that they bought their equipment already Y2K compliant and that fortunately they didn't have to worry about updating their hardware and software. They were, however, given resonsibility to contact the makers of Y2K sensitive products, such as the elevators, and the equipment for the jail facilities.

When I asked what they thought would happen in the new millennium, the most common answer received was, "I have no idea!"

Of course, most then went on to say that they didn't expect any drastic changes for the year 2000, and that it was just going to be another day like all the rest. Cynthia Thigpen, Farwell City clerk, said, "I think things will keep going just the way they are, and if there are any computer problems they will just get fixed."

While Parmer County Treasurer Anne Norton and Sheriff Walt Yerger both say that they have had more work as a result of this Y2K issue, Michelle Daly. of the Parmer County judge's office; Gerri Bowers, of the Parmer County clerk's office, and Heather Moss, of the Parmer County tax assessor-collector's office, all state that Y2K hasn't really affected them. The same for Texico City Clerk, Teresa Harth. "Most of our bookkeeping is done manually, so it hasn't really affected the office."

I also asked if they thought that we'd encounter problems in the 21st century like the millennium bug. Mrs. Norton said, "I don't know, there will always be some kind of problem or another. But I'm an optimist!"

Jean Patschke researches the 'other Farwell'

It has been brought to our attention, that our Farwell wasn't the only Farwell in

Jean Patschke did some research on the other Farwell and brought in this information:

Back in 1887, Farwell, Texas was established one mile east of Gruver. Ansel R. Clark drew up a town plat, which entails his vision of Hansford County's Farwell.

The town of Farwell sat above Farwell creek.

It was first settled by persons from Illinois and Indiana and had at one time three dozen buildings including a stage stop and post office, dugout residences, and the newspaper -- the Farwell Graphic by 1889.

The town of Farwell lasted only 7 years. When Hansford became the county seat, business in Farwell slowed and buildings were moved to other locations. And sometime in 1882, a wind storm hit the townsite and destroyed the remaining buildings.

In 1894 the post office closed and all papers were transferred to Hansford. Thus, the town closed.

Long-term Success Involves

Short-term Setbacks The stock market has looked pretty rosy in recent years. The Dow Jones Industrial Average has increased more than 2,500 percent in the past 25 years.

This amounts to an average of about 14 percent per year. If you had put \$10,000 into a portfolio mirroring the Dow, it would have grown to more than \$269,000 in

Those results, however, were not achieved without some thorny periods. A study of those 30 months by one mutual fund company found that such an investment would have lost money in 112 months, or three out of every

Monthly losses of 5 percent or more over the 25-year period were not uncommon. Some declines were dramatic, such as the 23.2 percent drop in October 1987

Yet the bottom line is a 2,500 percent increase. The lesson is that over the long term, the stock market is a good place to be.

Still, would it be possible to take advantage of short-term movements to make a quick profit? The study found no obvious patterns over the 25 years. Significant monthly movements, both up and down, came without warning.

Sometimes there was a succession of goods or bad months. Other times, the market moved quickly up and down and back again. Significant monthly declines came in good years, and significant monthly gains occurred in poor years.

Over the long run, the stock market's upward movement has been strong and clear. Investors who simply bought and held equities for at least 10 years have generally done well.

People who appea and content didn't get there without setbacks. Into each life some rain must fall--and that applies to the stock market, too.

But those who remember that every rainstorm ends are more likely to enjoy the silver lining behind the clouds.
